Elgoatarod slated for weekend

Just in case anyone missed it, the 3rd Annual Elgoatarod is planned for this weekend with preliminary activities slated to begin at 6:30 p.m. on Friday night.

Jim Runge is again organizing the event. He is know far and near as Eldorado's own visionary, entrepreneur and festival empressario. Runge says the Elgoatarod is loosely patterned and "kind of named after" the Iditirod dog sled race in Alaska. He is quick to point out that while there may be some similarities between the two events, there are lots of differences. Chief among the differences is the Elgoatarod features goat cart racing, but there are others.

"People have fun at the Elgoatarod," Runge is quick to say, "and you don't get nearly as cold."

There will be plenty of activities scheduled, including the ever popular goat cart races.

In a new twist, Runge announced this week that his ongoing efforts to attract the Olympic games to Eldorado have finally caught the eye of the IOC and that this year's Elgoatarod is being sanctioned as the "Texas Polygamy Games" in honor of the polygamous sect that moved to the county last year.

"Naturally we will be selling officiál souvenirs,"

Runge said. Among the collectibles are VIP Parking Permits, Polygamy Marriage Licenses and embroidered ball caps that proclaim Eldorado as the Polygamy Capital of Texas. Other souvenirs include walking sticks (or wife control sticks), T-shirts, cow chips, Schleicher County stumps and some you will have to see to believe.

Runge says the IOC designation means that all Elgoatarod competitions will now be considered "official" events. These include goat races, washer tossing, chigger catching, crab crawl races, goat pill flipping, goat fry cook off, slug races, gnat catching, goat kissing, goat roping, onion eating, jalapeno eating, mountain oyster eating, stupid pet tricks, best dressed goat, stupid human tricks, blindfolded washer tossing, best dressed goat, stick goat races, best goatee contest, etc.

Included among the attractions will be an inflatable slide, three bounce houses, an obstacle course, jousting ring, boxing ring, Velcro wall and bungee run. Runge points out that IOC actually stands for the Idiotic Olympic Committee.

County closes south end of Colpitts Street

Schleicher County Commissioners met Monday, March 28, 2005, and voted unanimously to close the southernmost portion of Colpitts Street, where it intersects with property owned by Rennond and Cathy Kuykendall. The action came following a public hearing at which no one appeared to express opposition to the closure.

The Kuykendalls asked the commissioners last year to consider closing the south end of the street. The vote was delayed until the couple traded a small parcel of property for a similar piece of land owned by the City of Eldorado.

At one point in time the city planned to drill a water well on its land and did not want the road closure to hinder access to its property. The land swap removed the last legal obstacle, and paved the way for Monday's

The action took place during the commissioners' second regularly scheduled meeting of the month. County Judge Johnny Griffin called the meeting to order with commissioners Matt Brown, Kirk Griffin, Johnny Mayo and Bill Clark in attendance. Also on hand was County Clerk Peggy Williams who was unable to present the minutes of the previous meeting due to computer problems. The minutes will be presented at the group's next meeting.

Also on hand were County Treasurer Karen Henderson, Road Superintendent Clay Burleson and Justice of the Peace James C. Doyle. So were local pilots Doug Garvin and Richard Gibson, who appeared briefly to update the commissioners on the state aviation conference held last week in Austin. Garvin and Gibson explained that they, along with J.D. Doyle and George Spinks met with officials from the Texas Department of Transportation's aviation division and learned that grant funding may be available to assist the county with resurfacing the airport runway and construction of additional hangar space.

The men explained that a hot mix surface would be greatly preferable on the runway and noted that rock chips on propellers and flight surfaces can be caused when small pieces of gravel come loose from the runway's current rock/gravel asphalt top.

As for additional hangar space, the men noted that Tx-DOT has grant funds available for hangar space if the county wants to recruit an aviation mechanic to set up shop at the airport. Judge Griffin noted that bringing in an aviation mechanic would serve as economic development.

Dialing Up Better Service

Lower taxes. Reduced subsidies. Increased competition. New services. Better prices.

That pretty much sums up the benefits of the telecommunications bill that just passed the Texas House of Representatives.

House Bill 789, by Rep. Phil King, R-Weatherford, is a major step toward freeing consumers from the high taxes and burdensome regulations that have hindered the delivery of telecommunications services in Texas.

Telecommunications remains one of the most highly taxed and regulated industries in Texas. In addition, a vast network of cross-subsidies shifts hundreds of millions of dollars per year from the pocket of one consumer to another and adds at least \$200 million a year to the overall cost of our telephone service.

HB 789 contains significant reforms that will eliminate many of these problems. For instance, it lowers taxes, reduces intrastate long distance access charges from around six cents a minute to almost one cent, removes burdensome regulations on broadband and video services and allows companies to compete against each other on price.

These are all part of a remarkable shift toward allowing consumers, rather than regulators, to determine the prices they are willing to pay, and the services they want to purchase. This is accomplished in the bill in three ways.

First, substantial progress is made toward removing the subsidies that have formed the foundation of telecommunications policy in Texas. Policy makers have tried to keep voters happy by using subsidies to keep their basic phone bill low. However, this resulted in making other services more expensive. HB 789 would completely end long distance subsidies, greatly reduces the business to residential subsidy and takes baby steps toward reducing the urban to rural subsidy.

Second, the bill cuts our taxes by \$125 million per year by eliminating the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund tax, originally created for hooking up schools and libraries to the Internet. But recently it has funded general government spending. Senfronia Thompson, D-Houston, who led the charge to repeal the tax, said, "If we are charging a tax to wire our schools and libraries, and that purpose has been accomplished, then why should people keep paying because we are having a budgetary problem. We should let the people have their money back."

Finally, voice, video and information providers are relieved of numerous regulations that set prices, restricted competition and mandated services.

Chairman Phil King should be commended on a job very well done. He has authored and passed a bill that will benefit all of Texas. We will soon be the beneficiaries of a freer market, resulting in lower costs, better services and a stronger economy.

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A real Social Security Guarantee

Penn Gillette, the master illusionist, often says that there is an enormous similarity between his profession and politics. Both rely on misdirection. Politicians and magicians want you to look in one place, while the really important stuff is going on someplace else.

To see this in action, just watch opponents of President Bush's proposal to allow younger workers to invest privately a portion of their Social Security taxes through individual accounts. They would much prefer to debate about whether Social Security is facing a "crisis" or only a "problem."

They will talk about cash-flows, transition costs, and memories of the Great Depression. But the one thing they won't talk about is perhaps the most important issue in the whole Social Security debate: ownership.

Under the current system, once a worker pays his or her Social Security taxes into the system, the worker no longer owns that money. Most workers assume that because they pay Social Security taxes into the system their whole working lives, they have some sort of legal guarantee to the system's benefits.

site is true. In two landmark cases, Flemming v. Nestor and Helvering v. Davis, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that workers have no right to receive Social Security benefits. Congress and the president may change, reduce, or even eliminate benefits at any time.

to determine how much money they will receive in retirement. Where is the dignity in such a system? As a matter of fact, Congress has already arbitrarily reduced Social Security benefits. For example, in 1983, Congress raised the retirement age.

Given Social Security's looming financial crisis, additional benefit cuts and/or tax increases are certain. Further, because workers' future benefits are not guaranteed, politi-

cians tend to make promises today that they may not be able to keep tomorrow. Therefore, the entirely political nature of Social Security puts a worker's Social Security retirement benefits at considerable risk.

The second major problem arising from the fact that workers do not own the money they pay in Social Security taxes is that their heirs cannot inherit

their accumulated retirement Unfortunately, exactly the oppo- savings. Upon the death of the worker, no matter how much or how little the worker has paid in taxes or collected in benefits, the money he or she paid into Social Security disappears; none is passed on to his or her children or grandchildren.

> Both of these problems are solved by an individual account Social Security system. A Social

Security system based on individual accounts would provide workers with the benefits and the safeguards of true ownership. Individual accounts would give all workers a true legal right to their benefits. Social Security would no longer be a political football, and workers and retirees would not have to worry that someone in Washington might cut their benefits.

Furthermore, upon the worker's death, the money in the worker's retirement account could be passed on to his or her spouse, children, charity, or to whomever he or she wishes. With individual accounts, workers own their retirement savings!

There is no doubt that Social Security will have to be reformed. The program will begin running a deficit, spending more money on benefits than it takes in through taxes, in less than 15 years. Overall, it faces unfunded obligations of nearly \$12 trillion.

We can use Social Security reform to create a new, better retirement system that gives workers ownership and control over their retirement funds. We can restore Social Security to solvency, while also letting low and middle-income workers build a nest egg of real, inheritable wealth -- many for the first time in their lives. That would be a real retirement guarantee, one that couldn't be taken away at the whim of our elected representa-

Senate unanimously passes \$139 billion budget

AUSTIN — The Senate has passed a \$139 billion state budget, but as the old saying goes, the devil is in the details.

Anti-bullying bill moves quickly...

The day after the March 21 school shooting in Minnesota the Senate passed Senate Bill 152, a measure intended to make Texas schools safer by directing school districts to do more to prevent bullying.

Sponsored by Sen. Judith Zaffirini (D-Laredo), the bill got a 28-1 approval from lawmakers. The border senator said statistics show that 160,000 children skip school every day for fear of being

Preventing bullying is important because bullying has been shown to lead to more serious problems, she said.

She cited a study by the National Threat Assessment Center that found that of the 37 school shootings studied, more than two-thirds involved a perpetrator who felt he had been bullied or otherwise picked on or threatened at school.

A nine-high's not a bad low-ball poker hand, and that seems to be the winning number among the dozen or more gambling bills filed this session.

House Bill 9, filed by Rep. Kino Flores (D-Palmview), recently gained some Republican co-authors, including Rep. Jim Pitts of Waxahachie, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee.

Even if the bill passes, voters will get the final say on whether to expand legalized gambling in Texas.

GLO's Scrap File digitized...

The General Land Office's "Scrap File" doesn't sound particularly interesting, but the plain title belies its historic significance. The file, an earlyday catch-all for land-related records, contains original surveys, survey field notes and various other land documents of high interest to a large but diverse group ranging from title companies to genealogists.

Some of the records go back to Spanish colonial times.

The documents in the Scrap File have now been scanned and made available on the Internet as part of the GLO's land grant database.

To search the newly-digitized Scrap File, go to www.glo.state.tx.us/archives.

Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson has said his goal is to get all of the archival material in the GLO's possession online. To date, the GLO has 45,000 maps and documents digitized.

Similarities and Differences in relation to Physician Assistants (PA's) and Nurse Practitioners (FNP's)

Mid-level providers are just that. There is a care provider level between nurses and physicians and that is where FNPs, CNSs, and PAs dwell.

Physician assistant programs last about 2 years and require at least 2 years of college for admission and most applicants hold a bachelor's degree. Physician assistants provide healthcare under the supervision of physicians. In 47 states physician assistants may prescribe medications. PA's may be the principal provider in an area where a physician is present for only 1 or 2 days each week.

Nurse Practitioners are registered nurses. They begin careers as a nurse and must hold at least a Master's Degree in Nursing specifically. They must complete an advanced practiced educational program and the Certification Examination

recognizes us nationally in an advanced role. Nurse Practitioners specialize in many areas; they practice independently and/or in collaboration with other health care professionals.

Nurse Practitioners are primary care providers and provide a unique perspective to health services in that we place emphasis on care and cure. They assist patients in making better lifestyle and healthcare decisions through treatments and education. Nurse practitioners pride themselves on providing essential, quality, cost-effective health care services as we practice under the rules and regulations of the state in which they are licensed. They can prescribe medications in all states and provide healthcare services in all states as well as in many other countries around the world.

Rebecca "Beckie" Silva, MSN, RN, FNP attended two of the advanced level programs, one for Family Nurse Practitioner and the other as a Clinical Nurse Specialist.
