Utah judge extends freeze on UEP assets

Arizona signs on to case as property disappears from C-City/Hildale

Even before law enforcement officers and private investigators could serve papers on trustees of the United Effort Plan trust (UEP), notifying them that the trust's assets had been frozen by a Utah court, faithful followers of FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs gathered last weekend at two UEP sites to dismantle buildings and remove equipment.

Private investigator Sam Brower was on hand to watch as a large steel building, once occupied by Cozy Log Homes, was dismantled and loaded onto trucks. A video photographer named Mark Folkerson was also present to witness and document the activity.

Their reports, along with photos, made it into the hands of Attorney General Mark Shurtleff, whose office stepped up efforts this week to track down the relocated property. The AG office even went so far as to post a plea on polygamy chat sites on the Internet asking for information.

Meanwhile, the push to wrest control of the UEP away from Warren Jeffs and his lieutenants continued on several fronts, including here in Schleicher County where two sets of

court summons were served on YFZ Ranch officials, but not on Warren Jeffs himself or any of the other UEP trustees.

A public notice appearing in this week's Success (see notice on Page 7) along with other notices appearing in newspapers in Arizona, Utah, Colorado and British Columbia, Canada, is aimed at satisfying court requirements that Jeffs and the other trustees be notified of the upcoming hearing.

Twelve hundred miles north and west of Eldorado, Assistant Utah Attorney General Tim Bodily appeared before a judge in Salt Lake City, UT on Monday to argue that the temporary restraining order freezing UEP assets should remain in place until a hearing on June 22. The judge granted the request and also allowed Arizona Attorney General Terry Goddard's office to join the action as an interested party.

Interestingly, a group of former FLDS members, including Richard Holm, John W. Nielson and Merril T. Stubbs, are supporting the effort to oust the current UEP trustees and are recommending a new slate of trustees be appointed to guide the trust fund. Among

the new trustees being proposed is Caroline Jessop, former 4th sister wife of Merrill Jessop, the man who reportedly oversees daily operations at the YFZ Ranch near Eldorado.

Other former FLDS members who appear on the list of proposed trustees is Rayo S. Johnson, of Hildale, UT, a man who was recently excommunicated from the church, and Winston Blackmore of Bountiful, British Columbia, widely known as the Bishop of Bountiful and a former follower of former FLDS Prophet Rulon Jeffs, late father of Warren Jeffs.

Blackmore's inclusion is interesting since he is also listed on court documents as one of the current trustees the plaintiffs are trying to remove. In fact, Blackmore was a UEP trustee, but was informed that he had been removed from the office by former Prophet Rulon Jeffs before the senior Jeffs' death in 2002. However, Blackmore disputes the removal, claiming that Rulon Jeffs was incapacitated by a series of strokes at the time he supposedly ousted Blackmore. Supporting that claim is the fact that documents officially removing

City again considers accepting YFZ wastewater

The City of Eldorado will once again consider accepting wastewater from the YFZ Ranch at the city sewer plant. That word came during Monday night's meeting of the Eldorado City Council. Mayor John Nikolauk explained to the council that he had been in contact with Merrill Jessop, the man who oversees daily operations at the YFZ. Nikolauk said he was checking with Jessop to make sure that YFZ personnel were not having problems dumping their garbage at the city landfill. He said that sometime during the conversation the topic of hauling YFZ wastewater to the city sewer plant came up.

The council seemed favorable to the idea and discussed options for charging for the service. It was finally decided that Mayor Nikolauk should contact Jessop and offer to accept the wastewater at the sewer plant for 14 cents per gallon.

The meeting was the council's regular monthly session and was called to order by Mayor Nikolauk at 6:05 p.m. with council members Bill McCutcheon, Toni Sudduth, Dora Bosmans, Richard Mendez, and Juaquin Rojas in attendance. Also present were City Secretary Carolyn Mayo and Utility Superintendent Floyd Fay. Councilman Tommy Minor was absent.

The meeting began with a public hearing on three proposed city ordinance changes. With no one from the public present to support or object to any of the ordinances, the council voted unanimously to amend the city's traffic control ordinance and designate a 15 mph speed limit in all public alleys. Changes to the utility and animal control ordinances were postponed until next month, giving the council time for further review.

Continuing, Mayor Nikolauk advised the council that he had been engaged in negotiations with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality in hopes of reducing the amount of fines lev-

ied against the city at the landfill and wastewater plant. Nikolauk. advised that he had had some success and was hoping to get the fines further reduced.

The council then agreed to support the Hazard Mitigation Plan as prepared by the Concho Valley Council of Governments and Fire Chief Jerry Jones, acting as the city's emergency services coordinator. The plan will be put in place across the 13-county CVCOG region and was required if the city hoped to qualify for additional grants in the future.

Next, the council appointed Dana Owens and Mayme Green to serve two-year terms on the board of the Eldorado Housing Authority. Other board members are Rosetta Lozano, Sarah Yates, and Jim Martin. Their terms expire in 2006.

Fear Not China

China. Why has that word for so long struck fear in the hearts of Americans? During the Cold War people harbored terrible fantasies about hordes of Chinese swarming over them and imposing a virulent Oriental communism. Now the Cold

War is over, and although China still has a communist-inspired authoritarian government, this is not your father's Red nemesis. Much has changed in the world's most populous country.

Yet we remain in fear. But now it is an economic fear: China will buy up all the beef. China will buy up all the wheat. China will make all the textiles and clothing and take our jobs. China's trade surplus with

the United States will put us hopelessly in debt. Nonsense. It's about time we kept our heads and

applied some basic economics to what's going on. Economically, the Chinese are freer than they

used to be. Chinese entrepreneurs can raise capital, and foreigners can invest their money, to create productive enterprises. Chinese workers have far more choices than they used to have. The result has been stunning economic growth and an export boom fueled by low-priced high-quality products.

Predictably, this worries some people, specifically, Americans and other nationals who make what the Chinese are now selling so successfully. This isn't worrying American consumers, who find that, because their dollars stretch further, they have more to invest or spend on additional things.

But some people just can't take good news. They have to look for the gray lining in every silver cloud. The success of the Chinese sellers and their American customers, we're told, is really not good news. Why not? Because Americans are losing their jobs. Because the Chinese aren't buying enough American goods and the resulting trade deficit puts us more and more in their debt. Because the Chinese government is artificially holding down the value of its currency in order to make exports more attractive (as if politicians know what the exchange rate should be). Because ... because ... because. But the what about the great deals at the stores? Their Marxist (Groucho, that is) response, in essence, is: who are you going to believe, me or your eyes?


I say believe your eyes. None of the objections is valid. A highly advanced economy always is - and always should be — losing some jobs. They are replaced by technology in some cases, by cheaper lower-skilled foreign labor in others. This is progress, because new and higher-paying jobs take their place. In 1905 lots more people were growing food than are today. Were we better off then? The Chinese inroads into the American market have made things more difficult for workers in Bangladesh than for workers here. We demanding consumers deserted other third-world producers as soon as we saw what the Chinese were willing to provide. Let's hear no more trade-deficit-equals-debt buncombe. First, there is no reason to expect bilateral merchandise accounts to balance. None. Second, that deficit is perfectly offset by the capital-account surplus with China: what they don't spend here they invest here. Period. Anyone who is concerned about China's being a creditor should direct his wrath at the U.S. government. It's the one engaging in deficit spending and selling Treasury bills to the Chinese. If none were sold, none could be bought.

Law Enforcement Update: Concealed Handgun License Recognition

My office frequently receives letters about the Texas concealed handgun license law. Many of these come from people who plan to travel in our state and want to know if the concealed carry permit issued by their home state will be valid here. As law enforcement officials, you may encounter visitors who hold out-of-state concealed handgun permits.

We also receive inquiries, many from law enforcement officers, about whether Texas permits are valid in other states. This question is more difficult to answer, as the laws of other states change on a regular basis. Some do not recognize permits from other states, and those that do often have detailed provisions about what kinds of permits are recognized and when and where concealed weapons may be carried.

I hope this column will assist you in determining which permits are valid and which are not. This information is current and accurate as of May 19, 2005, but remember that Texas statutes and the laws of other states are subject to change at any time. Please note that this column addresses only citizen-held permits. As a law enforcement officer, different laws may apply to you. For more information, contact the

New Process for Out-of-State License Recognition

In 2003, the Texas Legislature amended the concealed carry statute to say that the governor shall declare other states' CHL permits valid in Texas if they meet certain legal and procedural requirements. The principal statutory requirement for recognition is that, as part of the concealed handgun licensing procedure, permit applicants in the

other state must undergo a specific background check that looks at whether they are eligible to possess a firearm under federal law before they can get a permit.

When Texas and another state each declare the other's permits to be valid, the Texas governor and an official from the other state sign a mutual recognition agreement. The governor issues a unilateral proclamation when Texas recognizes another state's CHL permit but the other state does not recognize Texas permits. In revising the law, the legislature deleted a requirement that other states recognize Texas permits as a condition of their permits being valid here. If another state's CHL permits meet the requirements set in Texas law, the governor is required to affirm that the permits are valid here, either by unilateral proclamation or through a mutual recognition agreement.


This law, Government Code Section 411.173, instructs the Attorney General to determine whether permits issued by other states qualify for recognition in Texas. Bell rings on Legislature without school finance fix

AUSTIN — Gov. Rick Perry made the school finance issue an emergency item on the Legislature's agenda, but the final bell rang on the 79th regular session May 30 with the matter still unresolved.





2 — the measure that would have overhauled how Texans pay for public education — did not get to graduate into law.

Next step would be a special session, but no official word yet.

The numbers...

The governor has on his desk 1,389 enrolled bills to consider before his June 19 sign-or-veto deadline. Of those, 876 are House bills, 513 Senate bills.

After the last regular session, Perry vetoed 51 bills, compared to the 82 bills he nixed following the 77th Legislature.

Budget certified...

Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn did quickly certify the \$139.5 billion state budget. She said it balanced but didn't go out of her way to support it.

The governor's deadline to sign bills into law or exercise his constitutional veto power is June 19. If the governor does not sign a bill that passed, it becomes law automatically.

Hutchison still not talking...

the council that a recent lightning storm knocked out the "SCADA Unit" that controls the city's wells, resulting in low water pressure. Fay said he is exploring three options for repairing the system, which has proven to be very vulnerable to lightning. Fay noted that lightning also knocked out the computer module on the DAF unit at the sewer plant.

Mr. Fay went on to note that recent rains had flooded the landfill again and that the city is having Tom Thorp Transports pump out the water.

Carolyn Mayo then updated the council on the city's financial position and offered an amendment to the budget which the council approved. She advised that she needs someone to conduct a survey to determine how many city residents would benefit from upcoming grant programs. Ms. Mayo also noted that a new company, Kinder/ Morgan Construction, had asked for a regular trash pickup on U.S. Hwy 277 South.

Before adjourning the council approved the minutes from the May 9 meeting and okayed the payment of the current bills. They also approved a resolution to participate with Schleicher County in its TCDP grant project. The project is comprised of the completion of the water and sewer systems in the Orient Heights. The city will pledge \$10,000.00 and will waive the fees for 17 residential water and sewer taps.





is recognized here, the license holder is still subject to the regular rules and regulations governing concealed carry in Texas. For instance, another state's license may be a "weapons" permit, entitling firearms, or may allow someone under 21 to carry. While in Texas, that license holder may carry only a "handgun" as defined by Texas law and must be 21, just like Texas


Having a Texas concealed handgun license does not automatically permit the holder to carry a weapon in another state, even if Texas recognizes the other state's license. 


