# Prophet still a no-show, new judge appointed in UEP trustee case

Law enforcement officials in Arizona, Texas and Utah remain on the lookout for Warren Jeffs, the self-appointed prophet of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. Jeffs was indicted by a Mohave County Arizona grand jury June 9, 2005 on two felony counts of Sexual Conduct with a Minor and Conspiracy to Commit Sexual Conduct with a Minor.

Since that time eight of Jeffs followers have been jailed on similar charges, but the prophet remains at large and a \$10,000 reward offered jointly by the states of Arizona and Utah for information leading to Jeffs' arrest has yet to be claimed.

### YFZ update

Here in Schleicher County, work continues at the YFZ Ranch, particularly on and around the massive temple building. Scaffold supports are being erected on the north side of the building, apparently in preparation for the application of limestone blocks, similar to stone that has already been applied to much of the building's south side.

A concrete footer is being poured,

apparently for a wall around the temple. Steel reinforcement bars can be seen protruding upward from the footer and more concrete forms are being installed. Also, a cement silo has been placed near the temple and the area where the temple's front steps will be is being prepared.

Aerial photos taken Tuesday reveal numerous women and children working in the YFZ orchards and gardens and workmen can be seen at various sites on the property. Other photos show several women, dressed in ankle-length frontierstyle dresses, riding around the property on a golf cart. The photos directly conflict with a rumor that spread on the Internet earlier in the week that claimed the temple had been boarded up and the YFZ had been abandoned.

### New Utah Judge

As reported in last week's edition of The Success, Utah District Judge Deno Himonas recused himself from the case involving the appointment of new trustees for the United Effort Plan Trust, a charitable trust once controlled by the FLDS church. Judge Himonas removed Warren Jeffs and several of his followers from the UEP board of directors but when it came to his attention that a law firm he was once associated with now represents one of the people being considered for appointment as a substitute trustee, the judge removed himself from the case.

Judge Denise Lindberg was appointed to take over the case, but reportedly could not attend the hearing slated for today. A new hearing has been scheduled for Thursday, August 4, 2005, at which time Judge Lindberg will hear from interested parties in the case. The judge has ruled that interested parties include: The Corporation of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (FLDS Church); the recently removed UEP trustees; the Attorneys General of Utah and Arizona; and all UEP beneficiaries, including those who have filed lawsuits against the trust. The judge said the beneficiaries include anyone who has "consecrated time, talents or resources to UEP."

# **Income survey to help City** obtain government grants

two the City of Eldorado will be conducting a door-to-door survey to update records used in applying for Texas Community Development Program grants. The City of Eldorado has been very successful in past years. Several water and sewer projects have been completed in Eldorado over the past 20 years with grant funds ranging from \$100,000 to \$250,000 per project. However, outdated surveys may have eliminated the City from recent competition for a project to replace the 70-year old 8" lines in the downtown portion of Eldorado. During the next month or is inconvenienced while the lines are patched. Therefore, it is imperative that these surveys be completed on the entire community prior to the City's next application.

The survey form is a simple one-page form, and it should only take a few minutes of residents' time to complete the 10 questions. Statistical information from the surveys will be compiled to document the number of low/moderate income level beneficiaries in Eldorado. No personal information will be shared. Local survey workers will be working both during the day and in the evenings until the project is completed,

# **Africa Needs** Freedom, Not "Aid"

Politicians are never more dangerous than when they are thinking, "We've got to do something!"

Take the just-adjourned G8 meeting in Scotland. The rulers of the most advanced economic powers (and Russia, go figure) met with the intention of looking as though they were doing something to end poverty in Africa. They pledged to double the amount of money they will send to the continent by 2010 to \$50 billion a year.

Most accounts of this meeting, such as the one in the New York Times, spoke in terms of "addressing African poverty" and "commitments by the eight nations to double their aid."

Let's get real. No "nation" made any commitment. Eight presumptuous men promised to coerce their taxpayers to surrender the money. The forced transfers will not constitute aid if by that word we signify the means to create prosperity. He who defines the

terms wins the debate before it starts. One cannot assume that government handouts are truly aid. One must prove it. History and theory prove

Over the last 40 years billions and billions of dollars have been given to governments and nongovernmental organizations in Africa, yet, according to the World Bank, "average per capita income [in sub-Saharan Africa] is lower that at the end of the 1960s.... The region contains a growing share of the world's absolute poor." That's some track record.

On what grounds, then, do we call the money "aid"? As the great development economist P. T. (Lord) Bauer wrote many years ago, the term "aid" prejudges the effects of the money. "Either gifts or doles would be much preferable [terms] on logical grounds as a description of these transfers."

Semantics aside, is the money needed to lift Africa out of poverty? Bauer wrote in the 1960s, "Foreign aid is clearly not necessary for economic development, as is obvious for instance from the very existence of developed countries. All of these began as underdeveloped and progressed without foreign aid. Moreover, many underdeveloped countries have advanced very rapidly over the last half century or so without foreign aid.... There are many such countries in the far east, south-east Asia, East and West Africa and Latin America. Nor is foreign aid a sufficient condition. It cannot, for instance, promote development if a population at large is not interested in material advance, nor if it is strongly attached to values and customs incompatible with material progress."

The money is worse than ineffective. It is harmful because it politicizes societies, enriches politicians and parasitic organizations, and discourages productive activity. Political decision-making, which is strengthened by aid, is not good for people. This is why the idea that aid should be given only if African governments root out corruption is nonsense. Even if they could end corruption (have the G8 governments ended it yet?) aid would be inimical to progress.

As Bauer pointed out, economic progress grows out of work, the division of labor, trade, saving, investment, and secure property rights. The precondition is a culture that neither discourages nor impedes the creation of wealth. Don't people need capital? It will be generated by the people themselves; but if the above-mentioned conditions are fulfilled, foreigners will be eager to invest.

The upshot is that the poorest African countries hold their destinies in their own hands. They do not need the promises of eight politicians who produce nothing.

# Solons raise their own pay, not teachers'

AUSTIN — Despite House and Senate musters over the July 16-17 weekend, legislation to (1) bring property tax relief and (2) fund public education remained unresolved.

Conference committees met again and again in efforts to solve both issues, but at press time, it was not clear if Gov. Rick Perry had succeeded

in herding the TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION House and Senate toward compromise on the main purposes he recalled lawmakers to Aus-



As if those two issues weren't time-

consuming enough, Perry added judicial pay, telecommunications deregulation and eminent domain to the call:

Having made it through both houses, the judicial pay increase is likely to get the governor's signature (1) because judges have not had a pay increase in seven years and (2) because lawmakers' compensation is tied to it. However, if anyone is to get a raise, stirring speeches on the House floor made it clear that some lawmakers regard a teacher pay increase as much more warranted and many feel more than a twinge of guilt over raising their

· No matter how much time lawmakers spent on tangled telecommunications and utility deregulation during the regular session that ended in May, neither issue can be wrapped up in a day or two. So-called content providers don't sit quietly when, say, utility companies start talking about allowing Texans to get Internet access not just through fiber optics cable, satellite dishes and telephone lines — but much more cheaply via ordinary household wall sockets. They call it Broadband Over Powerline.

An amended version of the Senate's eminent domain bill passed through the House. Now the Senate must concur with the House version or send the bill to a conference com-

Eminent domain sparks a squabble pitting property rights advocates against real estate developers and the highway lobby — who are sometimes the same people. Who is going to win that one?

In either case, Reps. Harold Dutton of Houston, Frank Corte of San Antonio and others want Texans who get kicked off their property because of eminent domain to get a home and yard somewhere else, instead of a check for fair market value that might not be enough to pay for a van down by the river.

### **Big-Issue Solutions Take Time**

House members and senators in the property tax conference committee seemed to agree that whatever plan comes of their efforts to overhaul the state's tax system, it would only be a move toward a solution fair to most Texans, "not the finish line."

Mutterings of the conferees suggested that if no bill emerges, trouble spots could be worked out between now and the next regular session, which convenes in 2007.

Sen. Ken Armbrister of Victoria said "it's not about getting reelected and not about the governor's race."

Sen. Steve Ogden of College Station said it's wrong to do something just to do something.
