## Congress votes to update Endangered Species Act

- The U.S. House of Representatives last week passed H.R. 3824 The Threatened and Endangered Species Recovery Act (TESRA) The bill was passed by a bipartisan vote of 229 to 193 with Representative Mike Conaway voting in the majority.

For too long America's farmers ranchers and property owners have - Seen subjected to harsh government regulations that, in effect, undermine the intended consequences of the Endangered Species Act," said Conaway, who currently serves on the House Agriculture Committee.
"This directly impacts the people of its results for species recovery by District 11. We have had immense difficulty in our attempts to remove the Concho River Snake from the endangered species list and I hope this bill will expedite the process while strengthening current laws and making necessary changes that will minimize conflicts and litigation."
TESRA is aimed at enhancing the federal government's ability to assist in the recovery and protection of endangered species. By passing TESRA, Congress has updated and modernized the ESA to strengthen
turning conflict between landowners and regulators into cooperation. According to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) data, the Endangered Species Act (ESA) has achieved a less-than $1 \%$ success rate for species recovery in its 33year history. In 1973, the ESA was passed with the intent of recovering species identified as threatened or endangered. To this date, of the 1,300 domestic species listed, only 10 species or ${ }^{`} 2 \%$ are considered to have met $76 \%$ or more of their recovery objectives.

## Arizona AG wants civil rights probe into C-City police force

Arizona Attorney General Terry Goddard wants the federal government to look into the Colorado City, AZ police department. Saying that he believes that officers in the department have "engaged in practices and conduct that deprives individuals of their constitutional and civil rights," Goddard last weed asked U.S. Attorney General Alberto Gonzales to conduct a preliminary inquiry into he law enforcement agency.
Much of Goddard's concern about the C-City department stems from the fact that a number of the department's officers are members of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints and follow the teachings of FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs. Goddard believes there is evidence that the C-City police are under church direction and that they are "aiding and abetting criminal activity," including the practice of polygamy, underage marriages and the expulsion of young men from the community who might compete with the church's older male followers for young brides.
Jeffs and several of his followers, including Rodney Holm, a former C-City police officer previously convicted of bigamy and sexual conduct
with a minor in Utah, were indicted in Mohave County Arizona recently on charges of sexual conduct or conspiracy to commit sexual conduct with a minor. The charges relate to the marriage of underage girls to older men in the FLDS church. For his part, Jeffs is charged with arranging the marriages and participating in the wedding ceremonies.
Jeffs is also wanted on a federal warrant for unlawful flight to avoid prosecution. None of his loyal followers will admit to knowing where the fugitive prophet is
Many of those loyal followers now reside here in Schleicher County where construction continues at a dizzying pace on the YFZ Ranch, a 1,671 acre parcel of land that FLDS church members purchased in 2003 under the ruse that it was intended as a corporate hunting retreat

It's because Texas oranges were crossbred with an especially wiry breed of longhorn cattle. That's what gave them their tough hides. In fact a Texas orange is like the character of the Texas people - tough on the outside and sweet on the inside. To get and keep a loyal customer base, a gas station owner not only had to sell gas for less, but he came to your car, pumped the gas for you, washed your windshield checked the air in your tires and checked oil, belts and hose under the hood.

Station owners made their money on the other services and products they sold. They

washed cars, changed oil, fixed flats and worked on just about anything else you needed.

Every so often one or another of the four stations I mentioned earlier would decide to drop their prices. Soon their drive way would be filled with cars and soon after that the other stations would follow suit.

Occasionally, one of the other three would cut prices even more and pretty soon you had a real, honest-to-goodness price war going on. That's how I managed to buy gas at 17.9 when I was in high school. Having lived my entire life in the vast expanses of West Texas, I've learned to appreciate the quiet time I get travel-
ing from place to place. With my cell phone out of range and few, if any, other distractions to interrupt, the windshield time on the open road is downright therapeutic.
And, most of my friends are likely to tell you that I need the therapy. The newspaper business, even at the weekly level, is hectic on its best day, and maddening the rest of the time.
One of my friends in the business, Bob Dillard, owns papers in Ft. Davis, Stanton and Greenwood. So he gets even more windshield time than me. Which he probably needs.

Bob suggested one time that he and I both needed to have our heads examined. I wouldn't argue with that. I just wonder if time on the couch in a shrink's office would be cheaper than the miles and miles of West Texas highway with gasoline at \$3 a gallon.

Niagara Falls is a spectacular natural wonder

For this old boy who lives in a dry country, seeing a million bathtubs of water a minute go over a cliff is a sight to behold. It's been happening for nearly 400 years. Niagara Falls is a fun, exciting, beautiful place. There are two Ni agaras: one in New York, the other in Ontario, Canada. The Niagara River connects Lakes Erie and Ontario and provides a border between the two countries. To get the full impact of the falls, you must go to the Canadian side. Our hotel in Canada gave us a full view of the two waterfalls (the American Falls, a straight line of water cascading down for 184 feet and the Canadian or Horseshoe Falls, which are 170 feet tall). Niagara is an Indian word meaning Thunder Water.
And boy, does it thunder. The oar can be heard all over the area. Casinos have been built on both sides of the Niagara River and they have created a tourist boom, attrac ing 14 million visitors a year.

Niagara has always been a romantic place known as a destination for honeymooners. We saw couples of all ages holding hands as they strolled along the walkway looking at the falls. We saw a wedding in a park and watched a man sitting next to us in a restaurant get on his kne and propose to his girlfriend.
Everywhere we went people were taking photographs. I don't emember ever seeing so many handing cameras over to strangers,
asking them to take their picture with the falls as a backdrop. When we travel, we try to ex perience as much as possible. We rode on the Maid of the Mist, the boat that circles the bottom of the Canadian Falls. Passengers ar issued blue plastic rain ponchos because the mist is like rain and the falls create strong winds. We went behind the falls wearing yel low rain parkas. ## Travis County grand jury indicts U.S. House majority leader DeLay

AUSTIN-A Travis County grand jury indicted U.S. House Majority Leader Tom DeLay of Sugar Land on a charge o conspiring to
 election law that prohibits the contributions to campaigns for
elected office.

## accordance with

U.S. House rules, resigned his position as majority leader. That means he will no longer decide which bills will make it to the House floor for debate. In a post-indictment news conference, DeLay said he was innocent and called Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle, the prosecutor, a "partisan zealot" and the indictment "baseless."
Earle, a Democrat, did not say exactly how DeLay broke the law, but did say that evidence would emerge in the trial.
The charge stems from the 2002 midterm election, in which DeLay's political action committee, Texans for a Republican Majority, sent corporate donations totaling $\$ 190,000$ o the Republican National Committee.
The money allegedly returned to Texas as cash infusions to specific House members' campaigns in the final months of the election. Those races resulted in victories that bolstere GOP majorities in the Texas House and Senate. Legislation redrawing
U.S. congressional districts passed U.S. cong
in 2003 .

The grand jury also reindicted Washington, D.C., fundraiser James W. Ellis and Austin fundraiser John D. Colyandro, both associates of
DeLay, on charges of money-launDeLay, on charges of money-laun-
dering and conspiracy related to the dering and
DeLay was ordered to appear in Austin Oct. 21 for pre-trial processing. His attorneys are asking for the trial to begin before the end of the year.
