

Congress votes to update Endangered Species Act

The U.S. House of Representatives last week passed H.R. 3824, The Threatened and Endangered Species Recovery Act (TESRA). The bill was passed by a bipartisan vote of 229 to 193 with Representative Mike Conaway voting in the majority.

"For too long America's farmers, ranchers and property owners have Seen subjected to harsh government regulations that, in effect, undermine the intended consequences of the Endangered Species Act," said Conaway, who currently serves on the House Agriculture Committee.

"This directly impacts the people of District 11. We have had immense difficulty in our attempts to remove the Concho River Snake from the endangered species list and I hope this bill will expedite the process while strengthening current laws and making necessary changes that will minimize conflicts and litigation."

TESRA is aimed at enhancing the federal government's ability to assist in the recovery and protection of endangered species. By passing TESRA, Congress has updated and modernized the ESA to strengthen

its results for species recovery by turning conflict between landowners and regulators into cooperation. According to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) data, the Endangered Species Act (ESA) has achieved a less-than 1% success rate for species recovery in its 33year history. In 1973, the ESA was passed with the intent of recovering species identified as threatened or endangered. To this date, of the 1,300 domestic species listed, only 10 species or '2% are considered to have met 76% or more of their recovery objectives.

Arizona AG wants civil rights probe into C-City police force

Arizona Attorney General Terry Goddard wants the federal government to look into the Colorado City, AZ police department. Saying that he believes that officers in the department have "engaged in practices and conduct that deprives individuals of their constitutional and civil rights," Goddard last weed asked U.S. Attorney General Alberto Gonzales to conduct a preliminary inquiry into the law enforcement agency.

Much of Goddard's concern about the C-City department stems from the fact that a number of the department's officers are members of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints and follow the teachings of FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs. Goddard believes there is evidence that the C-City police are under church direction and that they are "aiding and abetting criminal activity," including the practice of polygamy, underage marriages and the expulsion of young men from the community who might compete with the church's older male followers for young brides.

Jeffs and several of his followers, including Rodney Holm, a former C-City police officer previously convicted of bigamy and sexual conduct

with a minor in Utah, were indicted in Mohave County Arizona recently on charges of sexual conduct or conspiracy to commit sexual conduct with a minor. The charges relate to the marriage of underage girls to older men in the FLDS church. For his part, Jeffs is charged with arranging the marriages and participating in the wedding ceremonies.

Jeffs is also wanted on a federal warrant for unlawful flight to avoid prosecution. None of his loyal followers will admit to knowing where the fugitive prophet is.

Many of those loyal followers now reside here in Schleicher County where construction continues at a dizzying pace on the YFZ Ranch, a 1,671 acre parcel of land that FLDS church members purchased in 2003 under the ruse that it was intended as a corporate hunting retreat.

A deed of trust filed in the Schleicher County Courthouse reveals that YFZ officials recently repaid a \$657,500.00 loan to First Ag Credit of San Angelo. The company released its lien against the property.

Sutton says this is not just a local problem, but one that has hit taxing jurisdictions across the state.

Is it better in California?

Comparing Texas and California is a good way for this writer to get in trouble, but I like to live dangerously. I'm out here in Los Angeles visiting my sister. She lives near the beach so she gets lots of company. It's an expensive neighborhood. They sold a two-bedroom bungalow down the block for \$1.2 million. Isn't that amazing? My sister is a school teacher. She couldn't afford to live here except she bought her house 28 years ago when prices were affordable.

It's a good life – the weather is always sunny, but never too hot. I suppose that's why so many millions of people want to live here. If you can get past the traffic and pollution and the high prices, then you're welcome to it.

But that's not my topic. My topic is agriculture. California is the number one farm producer in the nation, equal to the combined value of Texas and Iowa. But being first in farm dollars isn't everything. How about quality?

Consider California and Texas citrus. The crown jewel of citrus fruit in America is, hands down and no question, the Texas Ruby Red grapefruit. A Ruby Red is the summit of excellence and juicy good taste. Texas oranges are sweeter and juicier than the California navel oranges. It's true that a Texas orange is hard to peel. It's because Texas oranges were crossbred with an especially wiry breed of longhorn cattle. That's what gave them their tough hides. In fact a Texas orange is like the character of the Texas people – tough on the outside and sweet on the inside. A California orange is easier to get at, but the flavor is not as good.

For watermelons, Texas also comes out on top. People in northern states don't appreciate the Texas watermelons so much, because Texans get a little selfish about watermelon. They eat the best and sell the remainder out of state. The California watermelon, in comparison, is an industrialized product and a volume business. California is where they invented the seedless watermelon. The seedless watermelon is an abomination and threatens to bring ruin to our nation's heritage.

Watermelons are supposed to have seeds. And the rules of dining etiquette are relaxed a bit when watermelon is served – you get involved when you taste a good melon. There's the indoor style, which is a bit neater, and the picnic style with no rules at all. Everybody has their own method and debates often ensue.

A seedless watermelon? That's the kind of thing that gives California a reputation for being goofy. It's an improvement we can live without. But it's their state. How about Texas barbecue versus California sushi? I won't even touch that.

But California pulls out ahead in farm products when you consider olives, avocadoes, artichokes, walnuts, pistachios, almonds, kiwis, strawberries, figs, prunes, nectarines, raisins and a lot more. Texas can only answer, "but we have the best pecans." Yes, California is a golden land.

They also make movies here. Most movies aren't very good, but one in a hundred movies is something that will take your breath away and teach you something about life. You can talk about the trash that comes out of Hollywood, but just remember those two or three movies you saw when you were a kid that you can never forget.

And what is a movie? It's nothing more than the ancient art of storytelling set to modern technology. Tales of romance and adventure, true stories and the imagination of dreams. A good story is a human need almost as necessary as food. Think of Homer's poem, the Iliad, written 3,000 years ago, about Achilles and the Trojan War - a story so exciting that it has been told over and over again for many generations. Hollywood made a movie out of it two years ago, "Troy," starring Brad Pitt.

Or the story of Exodus when the Hebrew people left Egypt to come to the Promised Land. Exodus is a matter of belief for most Americans, but the reason we love it is because the drama is so compelling -Moses parting the Red Sea and the Golden Calf and the rest. It's such a good story.

That's what they do here in Hollywood - tell stories. You know about Brad Pitt and Jennifer Lopez, but you don't know about tens of thousands of people who work in the film and television industry - building scenery, processing film, makeup, marketing and a hundred other specialties -- people who aren't glamorous are famous or unusual in any way. They just make a good living and they're a lot like everybody else.

One more thing - Texas hurricanes and tornadoes versus California earthquakes and mudslides - take your pick.

I have been spending a lot of time on the road lately, so I fully appreciate how expensive gasoline had become. It's a far cry from the 17.9 cents I paid one time when I was a teenager.

I grew up in Jones County, just outside of Anson where, as luck would have it U.S. 277 and U.S. 180 intersected in the center of town. There were four gas stations, Texaco, Mobil, Enco, and Fina — one occupying each of the four corners at the town's only stoplight.

I know it's hard to fathom in today's marketplace, but back then selling gasoline was a cutthroat business. To get and keep a loyal customer base, a gas station owner not only had to sell gas for less, but he came to your car, pumped the gas for you, washed your windshield, checked the air in your tires and checked oil, belts and hoses under the hood.

Station owners made their money on the other services and products they sold. They



washed cars, changed oil, fixed flats and worked on just about anything else you needed.

Every so often one or another of the four stations I mentioned earlier would decide to drop their prices. Soon their drive way would be filled with cars and soon after that the other stations would follow suit.

Occasionally, one of the other three would cut prices even more and pretty soon you had a real, honest-to-goodness price war going on. That's how I managed to buy gas at 17.9 when I was in high school.


Having lived my entire life in the vast expanses of West Texas, I've learned to appreciate the quiet time I get traveling from place to place. With my cell phone out of range and few, if any, other distractions to interrupt, the windshield time on the open road is downright therapeutic.

And, most of my friends are likely to tell you that I need the therapy. The newspaper business, even at the weekly level, is hectic on its best day, and maddening the rest of the time.

One of my friends in the business, Bob Dillard, owns papers in Ft. Davis, Stanton and Greenwood. So he gets even more windshield time than me. Which he probably needs.

Bob suggested one time that he and I both needed to have our heads examined. I wouldn't argue with that. I just wonder if time on the couch in a shrink's office would be cheaper than the miles and miles of West Texas highway with gasoline at \$3 a gallon.

Travis County grand jury indicts U.S. **House majority** leader DeLay

AUSTIN — A Travis County grand jury indicted U.S. House Majority Leader Tom DeLay of Sugar Land

on a charge of conspiring to violate a state election law that prohibits the use of corporate contributions to campaigns for elected office. DeLay, in



accordance with

U.S. House rules, resigned his position as majority leader. That means he will no longer decide which bills will make it to the House floor for debate.

In a post-indictment news conference, DeLay said he was innocent and called Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle, the prosecutor, a "partisan zealot" and the indictment "baseless."

Earle, a Democrat, did not say exactly how DeLay broke the law, but did say that evidence would emerge in the trial.

The charge stems from the 2002 midterm election, in which DeLay's political action committee, Texans for a Republican Majority, sent corporate donations totaling \$190,000 to the Republican National Com-

The money allegedly returned to Texas as cash infusions to specific House members' campaigns in the final months of the election. Those races resulted in victories that bolstered GOP majorities in the Texas House and Senate. Legislation redrawing U.S. congressional districts passed

The grand jury also reindicted Washington, D.C., fundraiser James W. Ellis and Austin fundraiser John D. Colyandro, both associates of DeLay, on charges of money-laundering and conspiracy related to the

DeLay was ordered to appear in Austin Oct. 21 for pre-trial processing. His attorneys are asking for the trial to begin before the end of the year.

Top officials address Rita issues

Gov. Rick Perry and other statewide officeholders toured East Texas counties hit Sept. 23 & 24 by Hurricane Rita, doing what they could to speed relief and recovery efforts.

Perry issued a proclamation authorizing utility companies to lay temporary power lines.

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst made calls to bring in needed supplies. Lawmakers from the area visited their
