# State relaxes rules on flu vaccine

# 3-day Flu Shot Clinic begins Monday in hospital lobby

Hospital Administrator Sharon Dietz announced this week that the Texas Department of Health has lifted the restriction on flu shots and is allowing the vaccine to be given to the general population. Dietz explained that a Flu Shot Clinic has been scheduled for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of next week in the Hospital's main lobby. The clinic will run from 9-12 each morning and continue from 1-5 each afternoon.

Cost of the vaccine is \$15. SCMC personnel will be happy to file Medicare claims, Ms. Dietz stated.

Youths under the age of 18 are asked to bring a permission letter from their

parents. Also, children ages 13 and younger may only receive the nasal flu mist and it is only being offered on Monday, February 7, 2005.

"I am happy that a sufficient quantity of flu vaccine has been manufactured and that the TDH has lifted the restrictions," Dietz said.

Ms Dietz went on to note that February and March are historically the peak flu months and she encouraged everyone who can to come by Schleicher County Medical Center to get their vaccine.

The nation's supply of flu vaccine was greatly curtailed late last year when

vaccine manufactured in a British plant owned by Chiron Corporation, was found to have been contaminated. British authorities quickly closed the plant, resulting in a world-wide shortage. As other manufacturers geared up to produce more vaccine, health care providers throughout the world were told to ration the remaining supply of vaccine, targeting only those in high-risk groups.

Here in Eldorado, SCMC received its first shipment of vaccine in November of 2004 and scheduled two flu shot clinics for at-risk groups, including elderly citizens and those with chronic health problems.

# James Powell receives Texas Agriculture Lifetime Leadership Achievement Award


COLLEGE STATION - James Powell of Fort McKavett was given the Texas Agricultural Lifetime Leadership Achievement Award on Jan. 26, 2005 at the Tribute to Texas Leadership reception at the Austin Club in Austin. Lt. Governor David Dewhurst was the keynote speaker.

Powell ranches in Schleicher, Sutton, Menard and Tom Green counties.

A founding member of Texas Agricultural Lifetime Leadership (TALL) in 1987, Powell has served as vice chairman of the TALL advisory board and executive secretary of the TALL Foundation. He also provides financial support to the organization and helps recruit participants.

The TALL program teaches volunteer leaders in agriculture to improve the quality of life in their communities and work places, said Dr. Jim Mazurkiewicz, director of the program.

"I've long admired the dedication and commitment that Jimmie Powell has offered to Texas," said Gov. Rick Perry. "The agriculture community, ranching industry and our entire state continue to benefit from his leadership, and I can think of no one more deserving of the Texas Agricultural Lifetime Leadership Achievement Award."

Powell has been appointed to university boards by two governors, and often hosts university groups interested in studying agricultural management at his ranches, Brockman said.

Through the banking profession, Powell helps young people getting started in agriculture and related businesses and sponsors projects that benefit communities, he said.

"Jimmie is known throughout the ranching industry for his wise use of natural resources through such conservation practices as controlling brush and caring for the grasses," Brockman

"But he is perhaps better known throughout the nation and the halls of Congress as an expert on how taxes affect agriculture. For years, he has advocated valuing agriculture property based on productivity and ownership and has fought to lower the estate tax rate. He has long provided steady, exemplary leadership to the agriculture industry."

Powell has been president of the board of regents for the Texas State University System and chairman of the board of regents for the University of Texas System.

# Gov. Perry seeks USDA help for **Schleicher and Sutton Counties**

Gov. Rick Perry last week asked the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency to provide disaster relief assistance for Schleicher, Sutton and Moore counties where farms and ranches experienced damage due to a series of severe storms that swept across Texas this fall.

Initial reports Schleicher County indicate that 12,000 acres of cotton and wheat were damaged by excessive rains in October and November. Sutton County experienced excessive rains from September through November. Sutton County estimated that 400 acres of wheat were damaged. Estimates from Moore County,

affected by excessive rain and snow beginning in October, reveal damage to 36,500 acres of cotton, wheat and grain sorghum.

If the USDA request is approved, qualified farm operators in designated counties will be eligible for low-interest emergency loans from the USDA's Farm Service Agency. Producers can borrow up to 100 percent of actual production or physical losses, or a maximum of \$500,000. The agency offers additional programs, such as technical assistance, to eligible farmers.

# Hilderbran seeks to eliminate unfunded mandates Speaker Craddick picks Kerrville legislator to chair Tourism committee

AUSTIN - Representative Harvey Hilderbran (R-Kerrville) filed two pieces of legislation last week that, if passed, would spare local governments from having to pay the costs of administrating new state laws.

"There is a lot of legislation that places fiscal implications on the backs of local governments," Hilderbran said. "The state shouldn't be passing new laws that cost political subdivisions without attaching state money to those

Local governments are almost enirely dependent on property taxes to pay for the services they offer. When the state passes legislation that requires the city or county to administer a new law, that government must either raise the property tax or reduce other services.

"State-required services should be funded by the state, not local property taxes," Hilderbran said.

House Bill 115 would halt unfunded mandates by amending the Texas Government Code, while House Joint Resolution 20 would call for a constitutional amendment to be voted on in the general election in November.

"This legislation would remove the

temptation for future legislatures to revert to unfunded mandates and provide a balanced approach, protecting both the political subdivisions and the state," Hilderbran said.

Jim Allison, general counsel for the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas, issued a statement of support for the legislation.

"Unfunded mandates have resulted in financial burdens being imposed on local taxpayers," Allison said. "By filing this legislation, Representative Hilderbran has shown his concern and support in protecting the local taxpayer from unnecessary tax increases."

Hilderbran introduced the two bills the week after many state legislators returned from President Bush's inaugural in Washington, D.C. Earlier in the week, House Speaker Tom Craddick appointed Hilderbran to serve as chairman of the House Committee on Culture, Recreation, and Tourism, and also named him as a member of the House Committee on Natural Resources.

The Culture, Recreation, and Tourism Committee, previously called the State Cultural and Recreational Resources Committee, has jurisdiction


over state parks, the preservation of wildlife and fish, hunting and fishing, and the preservation of Texas' history and memorials.

The committee also oversees the Parks and Wildlife Department, the Texas Commission on the Arts, the Texas State Library and Archives Commission, and the Texas Historical Commission.

Hilderbran was also appointed to the Natural Resources Committee, which he previously served on in 2001

"I wanted to return to this particular committee because water is one of the most important issues facing Texas and Texas' future," Hilderbran said. "Serving on this committee will allow me to protect this natural resource for future generations of Hill Country residents.'

The Natural Resources Committee has jurisdiction over the conservation of natural resources; the control and development of land and water; irrigation; water districts and all similar organs of local government dealing with water and water supply; and the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality as it relates to the regulation of water resources.

### Born to be wild

Downtown Austin's noise level rose higher than normal last Monday as 6,000 leather-clad bikers on their 600-pound road hogs descended on the Capitol, loudly urging lawmakers to change the state's motorcycle helmet law.

Under the current law, someone over 21 must have at least \$10,000 in medical insurance and be a graduate of an approved motorcycle safety course to ride helmet-free. The bikers who came to the Legislature last week want those two restrictions dropped from the statute. Those who crowded into the House gallery were introduced by motorcycle enthusiast Rep. Norma Chavez, D-El Paso, who has filed a measure to that effect, House Bill 264.

Bright Texas school kids surely would like to see House Bill 524 become law.

Filed by Rep. Anna Mowery, R-Fort Worth, the bill would let students doing well in a particular class be able to skip that class on the last day it is held each week. If approved by lawmakers, the law would cover first to 12th grades.

Obviously, a particularly good student could end up with a fourday school week. But passage of the bill is not considered likely.

### Well, well, well

The oldest recorded water well in Texas was dug by hand in 1820 in what is now Starr County. Information on that well and some 130,000 others is contained in a database maintained by the Texas Water Development Board.

The number of wells listed by the agency sounds like a lot of wells, but it's really just a drop in the bucket - more than a million water wells have been drilled in Texas just since 1965. Even so, the database offers some useful information including depth, water levels and water quality.
