Oldsmobile hits Ford police cruiser, slams into Toyota which hits Cadillac

Eugene Gibson, 75, of Eldorado was taken by EMS ambulance to Schleicher County Medical Center Monday afternoon where he was treated and released following a 4-car accident in downtown Eldorado.

DPS trooper Don Van Zandt investigated the accident. He reports that Gibson was traveling southbound on South Divide Street when he turned left in front of DPS trooper Norbert Ortiz who was driving northbound in his 2003 Ford Crown Victoria police cruiser. The collision sent Gibson's 1997 Oldsmobile 88 careening through the intersection at W. Gillis Avenue and crashing into a parked 2006 Toyota Avalon owned by Julie Griffin.

The Toyota was then slammed sideways into another parked car, a 2005 Cadillac owned by Debbie Joy.

Griffin's Toyota and Joy's Cadillac were parked in front of the Insurance office they share at 10 West Gillis Avenue.


Eight followers of FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs were indicted last year on charges of conspiracy and sexual conduct with a minor. A series of search warrants served May 24 at the homes of four of the men sought saliva samples for DNA comparison. If they were actually obtained, the samples could once and for all "establish the paternity and maternity of the child and would tend to prove the existence of a sexual relationship," court documents claim.

Police won't say if the warrants they served simultaneously on the homes of Dale Barlow, Donald Barlow, David Batemen and Vergel Jessop, netted any DNA samples. However, court records detailing the items taken from each of the four homes list genealogical records, family pictures, tax returns, bank statements, bills and personal journals.

Despite a fanatical insistence on pri-

vacy, Warren Jeffs and his FLDS church find themselves in the eye of a mass media hurricane, especially since Jeffs was named to the FBI's Top Ten Fugitives List. There is presently a \$100,000 reward being offered for information leading to Jeffs' arrest and conviction on a bevy of state and federal charges, all of them stemming from the marriage of under aged girls to older men.

The case against Warren Jeffs and his loyal followers has been developing slowly but steadily since 2003 when Rodney Holm, a police offi-SEE JEFFS ON PAGE 8



Fear and Loathing at Commencement

What a bargain: At a cost of a mere \$100,000 or so, a Northeastern college can take your child and transform him into a delicate flower incapable of handling opinions at odds with his own. It can close his mind and vacuum-seal it against opposing views. And it can, as a bonus, perhaps make him rude and incorrigible.

These were the benefits of liberal education on display this commencement season, as graduating students rose up against the affront of having



to listen to the U.S. secretary of state or a distinguished war hero for a half-hour or so. Students complained that Condoleezza Rice and Sen. John McCain

don't represent them. But since when has it been a requirement that speakers on campus be representative of -- in the sense of totally agreeing with -- student views?

Students at the liberal New School in New York City circulated a petition to have McCain disinvited as the commencement speaker. "McCain does not speak for me," they declared. Well, of course not. No one would ever mistake the (mostly) conservative senator from Arizona as a mouthpiece for the flagrantly tattooed and pierced left-wingers who attend the Greenwich.Village college. But why would they only want to hear someone saying things that they already thought and believed?

The slogan was similar at Boston College, where students objecting to Condi Rice getting an honorary degree and delivering the commencement address said, "Not in my name." That phrase makes it sound as though some atrocity were being committed. The anti-Rice students maintain that her support of the Iraq War violates the Catholic teachings to which the Jesuit college is devoted. But the Vatican has never formally condemned the Iraq War. Protesters would be on firmer ground objecting to Rice's pro-choice position on abortion, but respecting unborn life is a fundamental Catholic teaching that no one bothered to mention.

All the rhetoric about "not speaking for me" and "not in my name" indicates a certain self-obsession. At the New School it was in full flower. As Mc-Cain spoke about the lessons of his life, students yelled, "It's not about you!" and "It's about my life, not yours!"

Apparently what they wanted to hear was: "I'm here to tell you that every unexamined prejudice you hold is absolutely correct. You represent the summit of human wisdom, and in all the years you have left on this Earth, you will never learn anything important that you don't already know as a snotty 21-year-old. And don't let anyone ever dare to tell you otherwise." It's not surprising that students are sophomoric, even if, as graduates, they are supposed to be beyond that. But faculty at both schools joined in the agitation. The opposition to Rice at BC was jump-started by a faculty letter, and some New School faculty turned their backs on McCain. It is these sort of professors who set the tone at top colleges. They act like a medieval guild protecting a monopoly on thought. Dissenting points of view send them into an angry, defensive crouch.

Sometimes a memorial can be pale blue


In light of the recent capture of seventeen accused terrorists in Canada who had in their possession three times the amount of explosives that brought down the Federal Building in Oklahoma City, and in light of the national debate about domestic surveillance, I felt it was appropriate to revisit a column I wrote just a couple of years ago.

I had the opportunity a couple of weeks ago to visit the Memorial on the site of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma, City. Like most people, my only impressions of the memorial, and the deadly blast the led up to it, were based on television images. While one picture may indeed be worth a thousand words, in this case, pictures don't suffice. A person must stand there and soak up the eerie silence of the place.

A field of empty chairs occupies the space where the building once stood. Each one, bearing the name of a person killed in the bombing, occupies a spot near where that person's body was recovered. There are 168 chairs in all, with each of them standing in silent testimony to a life tragically lost.

On the north side of the field of chairs is a reflecting pool, along the path once traveled by the street where Timothy McVey parked a rental truck filled with explosives.

At one end of the reflecting pool stands a black marble wall inscribed with the time... 9:01 a.m. At the other end of the pool stands an identical wall inscribed with the time...9:03 a.m. The two times represent the minute before and the minute after



the horrendous explosion. The pool, and the field of chairs lies between the two walls. They represent the tragic events of 9:02 a.m on April 19, 1995.

I can't imagine the convoluted logic that led McVey and his partner, Terry Nichols, to carry out such a heinous crime. Neither can I imagine what they sought to accomplish. Some blame a twisted hatred of America, others claim the men were brainwashed by others.

Whatever the reason, the result of their actions remains memorialized forever between those two black marble walls.

As I made my way along the walkway between the two walls, I found myself searching the names inscribed on the chairs. At the West end of the building, where the structure did not entirely collapse, there were fewer chairs. As I moved toward the center, however, I found myself faced with more and more of them. At the East end of the structure, where the devastation was at its greatest, was the largest concentration of chairs. And, many of these chairs were much smaller than the others, with each one representing a child who was killed in the building's day care center.

Standing there, looking at those tiny chairs, I glimpsed a pale blue Teddy Bear laying on one of them. At that moment, my half-hour struggle to hold back the tears failed. Just as TV pictures don't do justice to the memorial, neither can mere words express the grief that a child's toy can bring forth.

Across the reflecting pool from the field of empty chairs stands a 100 year-old elm tree. Early on in the planning for the memorial, it was decided to leave the tree in place as a tribute to those who survived the deadly blast. The tree, and the survivors it represents, stands in stark contrast to the chairs across the way.

The thought that an empty chair might represent death dates back to the Civil War. Following the war, as photography became available to the masses, hundreds of American families, North and South, posed around empty chairs, a representation of a loved one who had not survived the conflict.

When I first heard that a field of empty chairs was being considered by Hans Butzer, the memorial's designer, I was reminded of that old tradition. At the time, the bombing of the Murrah Building was the single largest terrorist attack on American soil. Sadly, it was perpetrated on Americans by Americans, also reminiscent of the Civil War.

Yes, I was moved beyond words by the memorial. But the true price of the tragic events of April 19, 1995, was made real to me, not by the monuments I saw, but by that solitary pale blue Teddy Bear.

Governor's plan would fund border action, surveillance

AUSTIN — Gov. Rick Perry on June 1 announced a plan he said would fill TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

gaps in federal efforts to protect the Texas-Mexico border.

Perry will ask the Texas Legislature to fund his plan, which includes:



• The spending of \$20 million in available state funds to sustain and expand Operation Rio Grande, a border security strategy now in effect through the current fiscal biennium;


• Authorization of another \$100 million in the next legislative session to sustain Operation Rio Grande until the federal government "fulfills its responsibility of securing the border"; and

• Use \$5 million, with the help of private landowners, to begin placing cameras along "criminal hotspots and common routes used to enter this country."

Guv, others cheer tax reform bill

The governor's office and members of the Texas Legislature are touting House Bill 1 as the biggest tax cut in Texas history.

The legislation was signed by Perry on May 23. Texans will save \$15.7 billion on property taxes over the next three years, enough to lower tax rates by 33 percent, Perry said. That means a 33 percent reduction on school district's maintenance and operations portion of the tax rate, not the combined tax rate of all local governmental entities.

Audie Murphy: War Hero and Movie Star

Audie Murphy was born in 1924 at Kingston in Hunt County. He was one of twelve children in a poor family. He perfected his aim by shooting squirrels and other game for family meals.

"I know of two times the family was so poor they lived in a boxcar with no running water and no electricity," says Adrien Witkofsky," Executive Director of the Audie Murphy American Cotton Museum in Greenville.

She says when World War II broke out, Audie tried to join the Marines, but they turned him down.

"I think in not so many words they told him to come back when he grew up. He was only five feet seven inches and weighed just 130 pounds, but he wanted to serve his country. The Army gave him that chance."

He took part in the campaigns for Sicily and Italy and was in the first wave of the invasion of southern France. Audie Murphy's heroic efforts made him the most



decorated soldier in World War II. In addition to the Medal of Honor, he earned every combat decoration the Army offered.

"He saved many, many lives. He was overseas about three years and was wounded several times. Some of those wounds he carried with him the rest of his life. Some of them caused him severe discomfort."

When he got out of the Army, Audie went to Hollywood.

"He was in forty-four films, a lot of them westerns. He wrote a book, TO HELL AND BACK, which was turned into a movie, and he played himself. From doing some research, I found out he was not the first choice for the role. After interviewing several more applicants, the casting people agreed he should play himself. The movie told about his exploits in combat, losing his best friend and getting wounded."

Audie attended school to the 5th grade in the community of Celeste, but didn't get much more formal education. That didn't keep him from accomplishing a lot. He wrote poetry and country songs. He's in the Texas Country Music Hall of Fame. Roy Clark, Teresa Brewer and many well-known people sang his songs.

Audie Murphy died at the age of forty-six when a plane taking him on a business trip crashed into a Virginia mountain.

The Audie Murphy Museum honors Veterans with a special ceremony the middle of June every year. This year it takes place on June 16 and 17. The museum has a life-size statue of Audie in front of the museum. He is in full battle dress carrying a German weapon. Adrien says he ran out of bullets and had to use a German gun he picked up in the heat of battle. Released May 22, the poll shows Perry with 41 percent, Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn with 20 percent, Democrat Chris Bell with 18 percent and Richard S. "Kinky" Friedman with 16 percent.



To certain people, the UT System generously doles out free tickets to University of Texas Longhorns football games.

In a widely published report, it was written that elected officials, state legislators in particular, received about 1,000 free tickets and about the same number of reduced-price tickets over the last five seasons.

Season tickets are selling for \$365. Single-game tickets range from \$50 to \$85. UT regents get free tickets for life.

Security compromises hit Texans

Texas Guaranteed Student Loan Corp. announced May 30 that an employee of one of its contractors lost a piece of equipment containing the names and Social Security numbers of 1.3 million borrowers. The loss occurred on May 24.

Also in late May, Attorney General Greg Abbott Texas asked veterans to take precautionary measures because of a theft of electronic data from an employee with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.

A missing computer hard drive contains name, Social Security number and date of birth for up to 26.5 million veterans discharged from military service since 1975.

On June 2, the Austin American-Statesman reported that Texas Department of Health and Human Services said applicants for state benefits had been sending, by mistake, faxes containing their confidential information to a wrong number that turned out to be a warehouse in Seattle.
