## Sales tax holiday August 4th - 6th

Texas shoppers get a break from stat nd local sales taxes this weekend durng the state's annual tax holiday. The holiday begins Friday, August 4 and uns through Sunday, August 6, 2006 Lay-away plans can be used again his year to take advantage of the sale tax holiday.
The law exèmpts most clothing and footwear priced under $\$ 100$ from sales and use taxes, which could save shoppers about $\$ 8$ on every $\$ 100$ they spend

The State Comptroller's office offers this word of caution: If you sell items that do not qualify for the exemption, you may not advertise or promise that you will pay your customers' sales tax Additionally, you are prohibited from advertising that you will not collect sale tax on items that do not qualify. You may advertise that tax is included in the sales price of the taxable items that you sell, however.

## Utah man sues cops, city officials in polygamous town

A federal civil rights lawsuit, filed in April, has only now become public, due to difficulties in serving papers against police and city officials in the border town of Colorado City, AZ and Hildale, UT.

Andrew Chatwin alleges in the suit that he was handcuffed and jailed because he was no longer a follower of of his fundamentalist Meffs or a membe Named as defendants in the lawsuit are C-City/Hildale police officers Fred Barlow Heaman Barlow and Jo Barlow, Healaman Barlow and Jonathan Roundy. The men received notice of th lawsuit earlier this week
Also named in the lawsuit is City of

Hildale, which Chatwin says operates as a theocracy.
Chatwin claims he built a 6,000 sq ft . home in the FLDS dominated community in 1992, but vacated the house in 1995 when he voluntarily left the FLDS church and moved away from the polygamous community. At that time, Chatwin's father moved into the home.
Chatwin says he has twice tried to move back in his home only to be blocked by police and/or family mem bers who said they were following the orders of Warren Jeffs.

by the Pew Hispanic Center. by the Pew Hispanic Center.
Almost two-thirds ( 63 percent) of respondents said the marches signaled "the beginning of a new Hispanic/Latino social movement that will go on for a long time." The response was pretty much the same regardless of income, education, ability to speak English or nation of birth, Pew said.
Where is that movement now, just three months later? The radical left failed to take control of the moderate pro-immigrant organizations, but not a single moderate pro-immigrant group has become more visible as a result of the march. Absolutely nothing has come out of those protests other than the reinforcement of anti-immigrant stereotypes. Even more cluelessly, a full 52 percent of Hispan ics polled thought the marches had a positive effect "on the way the rest of the American public thinks about illegal or undocumented immigrants.
Who, exactly, thought better of President Bush's legalization plan after the marches? Even moder ates backed off after seeing one too many Che T-shirts. At least English-dominant Hispanics are more aware of the protest's impact on the American public. Only 32 percent believed the marches had a positive impact, compared with 64 percent who are Spanish-dominant.
The poll's respondents were right about one other thing, though: 54 percent said the debate over immigration policy has made
against Latinos more of a problem.
It's time for the House to end its fake hearings, pass Bush's proposal and solve once and for all the problem of illegal immigration.

## The Lady Bullfighter emerges from obscurity

Pat McCormick saw her first bullfight in Mexico City when she was seven years old. That experience had a profound impact on her life. Back in the hotel room
with her parents, she practiced with her parents, she practiced the moves
bullring.

After growing up in Big Spring she went to the University of Texas in Austin with hopes of becoming an opera singer. Her music instruc tors suggested she switch to art When she brought home some of her artwork and showed it to her father, he said, "Pat, if you're going to draw a tree, it needs to look like a tree." He told his daughter she should enroll in a school that taught realistic art. Pat enrolled in Texas Western in El Paso.
Pat wandered across the border and started hanging out in the Juarez bullring. She met a couple of bullfighters who taught her some rudimentary moves. With an old World War One blanket and a chair, she practiced them in front of a mirror in her dorm room. She practiced a lot. Bullfighting was becoming more important to her than her studies.


She became a familiar figure at bullfights across the border learning a little more at each one learning a little more at each one she attended. Her presence and her fervor did not go unnoticed by a bullfight promoter, who had watched her fight cows in a nearby pen. He lined up a 9 -fight schedule for her. She joined the bullfight ers union, which enabled her to fight the big bulls, the same ones men fought. She became the first woman in North America to join that union.

She had a suit made for her in Mexico City and acquired three swords.

At her first fight, the bull tossed her into the air. Pat got up, brushed herself off and killed the bull. The crowd gave her a standing ovation It was a good kill and Pat got an ear. Her career as a bullfighter was fully launched.

I practiced in secret so my parents wouldn't find out what I was doing," said Pat. "When I finally told them I was going to fight bulls, they were shocked. At that first fight, my father stood on the sunny side at the top. My mother was unable to watch, even though I dedicated the kill to her."
Pat had no sisters or broth ers. Her parents pleaded with her to give up this crazy notion of bullighting. Pat told them, "It's like becoming a fighter pilot. It's just something I have to do." She fought bulls for ten years, from 1952 until 1962. She fought 600 bulls, getting top billing in bull rings in the US, Mexico and South America. She quit fighting when the bulls got smaller. "I didn't want to be remembered as a pe son who fought small bulls." After her bullfighting caree she seldom mentioned it while working as a secretary for an art school in California. Recently she was a guest of honor in Villa Acuna where she had fought bulls. People stood in line to get her autograph. She now lives in her Rio.

## The Quarries

A new ranger station and faci ity is being built for the Alibet area. No one was there wh entered, dropping down when we ren terrain etched from into bar rock. When the lake is at normal levels, you can see the water from station, a ranger told us. Lake Meredith was nowhere in sight on our visit.
You can drive/hike/bike on any dirt road in the vast park. We exited a paved road onto Dolomite Point Road, a dusty path that go progressively rougher. It took 3.7 miles to reach the Point - and it took us a while to figure out we Ore.)


Of course, you can do the same hing by car just south of Dolomite Point Road. Be careful walking out to the top hill; it's a 100 -foot-plus near-vertical drop, a fall that rivals hat Mountain Dew commercial. Far below stretches a hunter's ream - a riparian area, where a unique stream ecosystem attracts ll sorts of animals, including birds, deer, pigs, and turkey. Even in this extra-dry season, plenty of greenery stood out where a strea varying strength ventures. Before reaching the Point, we drove over two miles across the ur truck temperature gauge. (Of de, also said it got up to rry wait the previous week.) A large doe bolted down a hill, tumbled on the red dirt road then bounded into the brush, disappearing immediately. At that time, Chatwin claims he was told he was trespassing and a dozen or more men showed up to remove his possessions and trip the home of its carpet doors and windows.
Last year, a Utah district judge emoved Warren Jeffs and several of his lieutenants from control of he United Effort Plan Trust, the charitable arm of the church that controlled most of the property in C-City/Hildale.
Now, Chatwin is asking the federal court to give him "full and exclusive possession" of the home.
For his part, Hildale Mayor David Zittig has said that city

Chatwin was never charged with a crime. He now alleges that C-City/HIldale police were overzealous when they prevented him
