Motorcyclist flees cops, crashes in Crockett County

Suspect walks out of S.A. hospital to elude authorities a second time

Jason Earl Cansler, 36, of San Angelo remained at large Tuesday afternoon after escaping police custody by walking out of Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo. Cansler was being treated there for injuries sustained early Saturday morning, July 8, 2006, when he wrecked a 1989 Yamaha motorcycle during a high-speed chase some 15 miles south of Big Lake on State Hwy. 137.

The chase began late Friday evening in Eldorado when Cansler refused to stop for Schleicher County Deputy Jason Chatham who radioed for assistance as the biker fled west on U.S. 190. Chatham gave chase and reported his speed in excess of 130 m.p.h. Chatham also reported by radio that he saw Cansler throw something from the motorcycle near the Schleicher/Crockett County line.

As Chatham pursued Cansler westward, Crockett County Deputy Fred Fierro set up a road block at the intersection of U.S. 190 and State Hwy. 163, some 15 miles north of Ozona. Cansler

and his motorcycle were too quick, however, swerving around the roadblock and continuing west-bound at a high rate of speed. Deputy Chatham continued his pursuit, with Deputy Fierro following closely.

Then, five miles west of the road block, Chatham's police cruiser ran out of fuel and coasted to a stop. Chatham was about to go off duty when the chase began and reported having more than a half tank when starting the pursuit. The high speeds, however, quickly depleted the fuel from his tank.

At that point, Deputy Fierro took over the chase with Schleicher County Chief Deputy George Arispe, who left Eldorado five minutes behind Chatham, monitoring the chase on his radio. Arispe stopped to pick up Chatham and continued the pursuit in order to provide backup to Deputy Fierro.

Cansler turned his motorcycle northbound on State Hwy. 137, some 20 miles south of Big Lake, and continued on at

AZ jury finds Fischer guilty of sex with underage FLDS girl

Kelly Fisher, 39, of Colorado City, AZ was convicted last Friday of having sex with an underage girl after testimony and evidence revealed that he had entered into an arranged polygamous

marriage with a girl younger than 18. He was also convicted on a separate charge of conspiracy to commit sexual conduct with a child, despite the fact that the alleged victim in the case never came forward to testify.

As the case unfolded, jurors learned that Fisher had previously married the girl's mother who later arranged for him to marry her 16-year-old daughter with the blessings of FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs. And, it was Warren Jeffs who reportedly performed the marriage ceremony.

Fisher and the girl later had a child together, a fact that

was crucial to the case since it was the child's birth certificate, listing Fischer and his underage wife as parents, that would weigh heavily in the jury's decision making.

Fisher is a building contractor and owner of Cozy Log Homes, a company that relocated from the twin cities of Colorado City, AZ and Hildale, UT after a judge last year stripped FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs of control of the United Effort Plan Trust. The UEP is the financial arm of Jeffs' Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. The trust controls almost all of the property in the Utah/Arizona border town. Judge Denise Lindberg found last year that Jeffs and other trustees had mismanaged

the UEP and appointed Bruce Wisan, a Special Fiduciary, to oversee day-to-day operation of the trust.

Fisher also has ties to the YFZ Ranch here in Schleicher County. Equipment

owned by him has been seen here and he was stopped by Schleicher County officers when he attempted to pass a pickup driven by an off duty game warden who was passing another car that had pulled over on the shoulder of the road. Fisher was issued a citation for illegal passing and paid his fine before Justice of the Peace James C.

Jurors in the case told reporters afterward that they didn't buy into the "It may have happened, but it didn't happen here," argument.

Kelly Fisher is the first of eight FLDS men to be convicted in a recent round of prosecutions. Seven other men including: Dale Evans Barlow, 48, whose trial begins in August; Rodney Hans Holm, 39; Donald Robert Barlow, 49; Vergel Bryce Jessop, 46; Terry Darger Barlow, 24; Randolph J. Barlow, 33; and David Romaine Bateman, 49, will stand trial soon.

Oregon man survives plane crash at S.C. airport

There's an old saying among pilots that says any landing you can walk away from is a good landing. If that's true, then Matthew Petz, 28, of Bend, Oregon made a good landing Sunday morning, July 9, 2006, in a plowed field just north of the Schleicher County Airport.

It was the second mishap in as many weeks at the local airport.

Petz reported that he had just purchased the plane, a 1963 Mooney, in Columbus, TX and was on his way back home when his engine sputtered

and stalled a few thousand feet above Schleicher County.

Petz reported that foggy conditions made it difficult to see the ground but that he eventually saw a highway (FM 915) and lined up to land on it. But, moments later, he spotted the Schleicher County Airport and turned determined to try setting is plane down there.

Petz's airplane would never make it, gliding down short of the runway, the Mooney clipped the treetops lining the north edge of a field just north and west

of the airport. His landing gear then snagged a fence and the left wing took out a fence post as the plane spun to a stop in the north-east corner of the field.

It was later determined that the airplane's engine died because Petz had forgotten to switch fuel tanks.

Petz was unhurt, as was the Toy Terrier puppy he had bought to take home to his wife. Petz said he hadn't even given the dog a name yet.

One cannot help but wonder if the name "Lucky" might be appropriate.




Matthew Petz of Bend, Oregon, and his unnamed Toy Terrier puppy surveyed the damage Sunday morning after Petz attempted an unpowered landing at the Schleicher County airport when the engine on his 1963 Mooney airplane sputtered and died. Petz finished his flight a few hundred yards short of the runway after clipping treetops and taking out a strand of barbed wire. Neither Petz nor his puppy reported any injuries.

Flag-Burning and Hate Crimes

Just six days before the U.S. Senate failed to pass a proposed constitutional amendment allowing Congress to ban the desecration of American flags, somebody in Brooklyn set fire to seven American

A despicable act made even more outrageous because one of the banners had been hung by a couple whose firefighter son died at the World Trade Center.

If the offenders are caught, should they be charged with mere vandalism against private property that can be replaced for less than \$100? Or do they



deserve something harsher -- the kind of thing proponents of the failed amendment had in mind?

When it comes to flag-burning, as with so much in American life, noise from bellowing con-

servatives and shrieking liberals shushes the sensible middle.

The right wing is eager to criminalize any and all desecrations of the flag, and never mind if one form of free speech is trampled in the process. Meanwhile, the left wing charges that outlawing flag-burning criminalizes thought. Yet when it comes to ethnic "hate crimes," those same liberals will say that having the wrong thoughts indeed merits extra punishment.

Independent-minded Americans who ignore the shouting match will see striking parallels between laws to punish flag-burning and laws to punish ethnic hate crimes.

Neither kind of law should make any type of thought illegal. This country is strong enough for the worst type of communist scum to have the freedom to burn a U.S. flag as a form of political protest. It is also strong enough to allow the worst type of racist scum to burn a cross as a proclamation of ethnic animosity.

Yet in the absence of that sort of larger crime, there is a line that ought not be crossed. For instance, scribbling "Go Mets" on a synagogue door is obviously not the same as scribbling "Kill Jews." And that is a difference that the law ought to take into account. In this case, it is not the expression of anti-Semitic beliefs that should be made illegal; neither is vandalism the larger crime. The most punishable offense is the act of intimidating an entire community.

Similarly, crazies from the Ku Klux Klan should be free to burn a cross in public spaces or on their own property, but not on somebody's lawn. Intimidation is the problem, and not racist opinions or the scorching of a lawn that can be fixed by spending a few dollars on grass seed.

Same with flag-burning. What happened in Brooklyn wasn't just a legitimate political protest or a little vandalism against someone else's \$49.95 piece of cloth. It was an attempt to intimidate families flying the American flag as a sign of patriotism.

It should not even matter whether the culprits were politically motivated America-haters or local punks motivated by alcohol. It's enough that they interfered with the freedom of families to live in their homes the way they wish.

Protecting such a freedom is at the heart of American democracy. As is the right, salvaged by one vote in the Senate, to protest against those freedoms by burning the banner that symbolizes them best.





On a hot Texas day, there's nothing more refreshing or exhilarating than plunging from a high dive into the neighborhood pool.

But when was the last time you saw a diving board at a public pool? Because of our sue-happy society, or rather the fear of a lawsuit, diving boards have largely evaporated from public and most private pools. Litigation concerns also spurred changes to a Texas statute in 2004 that increased required clearances for diving boards, further driving them from municipal pools.

Alas, one of the simple pleasures of summer is no more. For kids today, this means missing out on the thrill and anticipation that only a high diving board can provide.

A splashless summer is one thing, but it seems no summer activity is safe from lawsuits. From putting on sunscreen, to taking a trip to the ballpark, to an outdoor picnic, summertime fun is ripe for litigation. Who knew so much danger lurked on these long, lazy days?

Consider these summer suits:

• 100 degrees in the shade: A class-action lawsuit was recently filed against sunscreen makers alleging that, while there are no negative medical effects associated with sunscreen use, advertising that encourages the use of sunscreens to protect against sun damage has unfairly lulled consumers into a false sense of

security about sun damage. (Wall Street Journal, June 7)

· A league of their own: A Florida father sued a youth baseball league because his son was erroneously told he'd made the league's all-star team. Because of the cost of the lawsuit, the future of the baseball league was threatened. (Liability Week, June

· Think pink: A psychologist who was denied a pink tote bag during a Mother's Day giveaway at a Los Angeles Angels' baseball game has sued the team, alleging that thousands of males and fans under 18 were "treated unequally" and entitled to \$4,000 each in damages. (Los Angeles Times, May 11)

· School's out forever?: In suburban Milwaukee, a 17-yearold and his father sued a teacher, various school officials and the school district, challenging summer homework assignments made as a prerequisite to an honors precalculus class. Smartly, the judge threw out the lawsuit stating, "Had the family done a bit more homework, they would have discovered that the people of our state granted to the Legislature...the power to establish school boards and the state superintendent and to confer upon them the powers and duties the Legislature saw fit." (Associated Press, March 9, 2005)

· No fun allowed: Climbing, swinging and sliding was once a rite of passage all kids enjoyed during carefree summers. But


thanks to the onslaught of frivolous personal injury lawsuits and fear of future litigation, once-common equipment such as metal slides, seesaws and merry-go-rounds are vanishing. In fact, cities and counties are adopting new "no-fun" safety rules like Broward County, Fla., which recently added a new rule on the playground: "No running." (KATU 2 News, May 8)

• Fat, what fat?: In the latest example of personal responsibility being boiled in oil, personal injury lawyers have filed a class-action lawsuit against KFC alleging that their fried chicken actually may be unhealthy. The suit is currently pending, but backyard picnics and barbeques everywhere may never be the same. (Associated Press,

The lawsuit-happy tactics of some affect all of us. Abusive and frivolous lawsuits cost time and money - even if cases are settled - and taint some of life's simplest pleasures.

It's time to say no to summertime lawsuit lotto.

Words on the walls of the Georgia O'Keeffe Museum


On my last visit to Santa Fe I made my usual stop at the Georgia O'Keeffe Museum. It had an exhibition that highlighted some of the more than 1,000 new works. I've always been impressed with this artist who spent the years 1916 to 1918 in the Texas panhandle creating images of the Palo Duro Canyon. This time, though, I was fascinated with some of her quotations, which were printed on the walls of the museum: "Color is one of the great things in the world that makes life worth living."

"One paints what is around."

"In front of my house there are low scrub bushes and cottonwood trees and, further out, a line of hills. And then I have this mountain. A flat top mountain that slopes off on each side. A blue mountain. And to the left you can see snow covered mountains, far, far away."

"It's my mountain."

"I once spent three and a half months flying around the world.

I was surprised that there were so many desert areas with large river beds running through them. I made many drawings about one and a half inches square of the rivers seen from the air. At home I made larger charcoal drawings from the little pencil drawings."

"Where I was born and where and how I have lived is unimportant. It is what I have done with where I have been that should be

"Singing has always seemed to me the most perfect means of expression...it is so spontaneous... since I cannot sing I paint."

"Nothing is less real than realism....details are confusing. It is only by selection, by elimination,

by emphasis, that we get at the real meaning of things."

"From experiences of one kind or another shapes and colors come to me very clearly."

"I paint what interests me and what I see."

"Women don't make good painters, they said. I had never thought of it that way. I just painted, that was all."

"It is easier for me to paint it than to write about it and I would so much rather people would look at it than read about it."

"My painting is what I have to give back to the world for what the world gives to me."

"When I was at Mabel's house in Taos, there was an alfalfa field like a large green saucer. On one side of the field was a path lined with flowers....one day walking down the path I picked a large blackish red hollyhock and some bright dark blue larkspur that immediately went into a painting—and then another painting."

Judge rules **DeLay's** name must stay on ballot

AUSTIN — U.S. District Judge Sam Sparks of Austin ruled former Sugar Land congressional Rep. Tom DeLay's name must stay on the Nov. 7 election ballot.

Sparks ruling was on a petition

brought by the TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION (Republican Party of Texas. The party had sought to appoint a candidate to replace DeLay as the nominee for Congressional District 22.



The Texas Democratic Party countered that DeLay's name belongs on the ballot because DeLay gave voters the impression he would run and serve.

DeLay resigned from Congress June 9 and moved to Virginia.

In his ruling Judge Sparks cited the U.S. Constitution's requirement that a candidate reside in the state when elected. So, if DeLay does not return to Texas and establish residence in this state by Nov. 7, he will be ineligible to serve, if elected.

DeLay is still under indictment in Travis County on state charges of money-laundering and campaign finance fraud in connection with the November 2002 election. That election resulted in Republican majorities in both houses of the state Legislature and made it possible for lawmakers to break with tradition and carry out a mid-Census redistricting.

The vote after the redistricting erased Texas Democrats' 17-15 seat majority in U.S. congressional seats and delivered Texas Republicans a 21-11 seat majority.

Some of DeLay's work to reconfigure the state's political map may be shortlived.

Mapmakers diluted the Hispanic Democratic vote in Laredo, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in June.

The high court then instructed a federal three-judge panel to redraw boundaries of the congressional district that runs from Laredo to far west

Meanwhile, the Republican Party of Texas has appealed Sparks' ruling to the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans.

DeLay hinted he might come back to Texas if rulings on pending indictments against him go in his favor.

Whether it will be DeLay or a yetunnamed GOP nominee running for CD-22, former Congressman Nick Lampson will be the Democrat in the

Man sentenced in child porn

A San Marcos man was sentenced for storing sexually explicit images and videos of children on his iPod portable digital video player.

Ron James Guzman, 39, received a 10-year prison sentence for possessing the illegal material and a 20-year prison sentence on a charge of promoting child pornography.

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott said it was the first such child pornography case handled by his Cyber Crimes Unit.

Guzman also pled guilty to four counts of aggravated sexual assault of a child and one count of indecency with a child in a separate plea agreement reached with the Hays County District Attorney's Office for a separate offense. The sentences in the two cases will run concurrently for a total prison term of 40 years.

a high rate of speed for another 5 miles before losing control and crashing the bike just 15 miles from Big Lake.

There, Deputy Fierro took Cansler into custody and rendered first aide until an ambulance from Ozona could arrive. DPS Trooper Castulo Bilano also assisted at the scene. Cansler was then transported back to the intersection of U.S. 190 and State Hwy. 163, where minutes earlier he avoided Deputy Fierro's road block. He was taken from there by AirMed-1 helicopter to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo.

Chief Deputy George Arispe reports that Cansler is wanted in Schleicher County for evading arrest and numerous traffic violations. Arispe says that Cansler also had other warrants for his arrest in Tom Green County at the time of the chase and speculates that the warrants likely figured into Cansler's decision to run.

Officers were reportedly unable to locate the item that Deputy Chatham saw being thrown from the motorcycle. The bike Cansler was riding is reportedly owned by Chester G. Mosely, Jr. of San Angelo.

Cansler was admitted to Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo and medical personnel were asked to notify law enforcement officials when he would be released. Deputy Arispe said that Cansler had other plans, however, leaving the hospital on his own without waiting to be discharged.


