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County adopts 2007 tax rate

Schleicher County commissioners met Monday, September 11, 2006, to adopt a \$2.99 million budget for the 2007 fiscal year. The men then voted to set a 67.78 cent tax rate in order to fund the budget. Commissioners Johnny Mayo and Kirk Griffin voted in favor of the budget and tax rate. Commissioners Bill Clark and Matt Brown were absent.


Included in the 67.78 cent tax rate is 54.6 cents for the General Fund, 11.97 cents for the Farm to Market Fund and 1.21 cents for the Interest and Sinking Fund. The I&S Fund is used to repay money the county borrowed to enlarge the Civic Center and complete the Cemetery Chapel.

The vote came after a series of public hearings at which no one from the community appeared to question or contest the budget. County Judge Johnny Griffin noted that the tax rate is lower than last year's due to a hefty increase in oil and gas properties in the county. However, the lower rate raises more money than last year. Griffin added that the only feedback he has had from community members is that the commissioners should have added even more to the budget so that roads could be paved while the economy is good.

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Among other business, the commissioners voted to accept a sealed bid of \$2.415 per gallon for a transport load of unleaded gasoline from Griffin Fuels, the only company to submit a bid.

Next, the commissioners voted to continue the county's participation in the Texas County and District Retirement System at the same level as in previous years.



Jeffs hires SLC lawyers to plead his case

Warren Jeffs tells his closest followers to, "Answer them nothing," when questioned in a court of law. At least that's what people who used to follow the fundamentalist Mormon leader tell reporters. But, Jeffs apparently isn't prepared to stand silently before a district judge and risk going to prison for the rest of his life.

Word came this week that Jeffs, 51, has hired two experienced trial lawyers, Walter Bugden and Tara Issacson of Salt Lake City, to defend him against two charges of rape as an accomplice.

Jeffs remains in Purgatory Correctional Facility in Hurricane, Utah. He appeared Monday via closed-circuit TV link before 5th District Judge James L. Shumate and answered in the affirmative when asked if he had hired legal counsel.

City council enlightened about light pollution

Street lights were the main topic of conversation at Monday night's meeting of the Eldorado City Council. Just over a year ago, councilman Bill McCutcheon asked a budget amendment to help pay to place hoods on the city's lights in order to curb light pollution. Mc-Cutcheon asked again at last month's council meeting with the a \$500 of city money to be matched by the Eldorado Star Party Organization that meets once a year at the X Bar Ranch.

McCutcheon noted that he is an amateur astronomer and has been involved with the Eldorado Star Party. The group is comprised of astronomers from larger cities like Dallas and Austin where sky viewing is impossible due to major light pollution.

The Eldorado Star Party has grown over the past several years and has become a major event at the X Bar Ranch. Yet another group of astronomers, mainly from Johnson Space Center in Houston, have been coming to Fort McKavett for an annual Star Party for over 22 years.

Last year Bill Wren from the McDonald Observatory near Ft. Davis came to Eldorado and speak with residents and businesses about light pollution. It was then that McCutcheon said the realized that a small investment on the part of the city could help eliminate some of the light pollution that frustrates astronomers.

Stan Meador was on hand Monday night to represent the X-Bar Ranch. He spoke briefly of the economic impact the Star Party has to the surrounding communities of Sonora, Ozona and Eldorado. He said that the dark night skies in West Texas are an unexploited asset, particularly in where altitude, dry air and cloudless skies combine to help stargazers. Meador said that Schleicher County has many of the conditions that are ideal for night-time viewing.

Meador explained that the X Bar Ranch hosted its first star party several years ago, not knowing what to expect. He said the astronomers began arriving in their campers and trailers, bringing with them sometimes thousands of dollars worth of equipment. He said the Eldorado Star Party group consists of many professions, including doctors, lawyers, college professors and teachers who enjoy the hobby.

Meador said that as the group grew for the first star party he suddenly realized the football lights were on in Eldorado. A veteran stargazer told him not to worry that the lights would be off before the serious viewing began. With increased valuation in Schleicher County, the new rate will generate about the same funding as last year's rate.

With directors Sam Henderson, Ronnie Sauer and Ray Ballew present, the board also approved a fiscal year 2007 budget of \$101,351.

The Plateau UWC&SD, as a member of the West Texas Weather Modification Association, is billed at a rate of 4.42 cents/acre per year for cloud seeding. This represents approximately 37% of the district's annual budget.

The District office is located in the Schleicher County Annex Building, next to the library, and remains available to the public for water quality analysis at no charge.

Imagine If He Had Won

Mexico does not have to be at a dramatic turning point in its history, but leftist presidential candidate. Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador dragged it there anyway.

Late last month the Federal Electoral Tribunal released results of a partial recount that unanimous-



ly upheld the narrow victory of his centrist rival, Felipe Calderon. The July 2 election itself was conducted under a new system that included multiple examinations of individual ballots and

independent local recounts of polling places, all designed to end the notorious cheating of Mexican elections past.

It should have been hailed as a new day in Mexico's politics. The electoral reforms mean that Calderon's victory margin of less than 1 percent really is a victory margin of less than 1 percent. A responsible losing politician would have accepted that the stability of the nation depended on graciously conceding defeat.

But that is not AMLO.

His first act of irresponsibility, following the initial announcement of returns in July, was to send followers out on the streets to demand a recount of all 41 million ballots. Mexican electoral law contemplates a review only of suspicious ballots -- what the electoral tribunal undertook. AMLO could have simply challenged the electoral law in the courts if he thought it unconstitutional.

But no.

Thousands of supporters camped out for weeks in the Zocalo, Mexico City's main square, and engaged in acts of civil disobedience such as blocking traffic and preventing businessmen from entering their offices.

It gets worse. To signal his rejection of the electoral tribunal's recount, AMLO promised to not recognize Calderon as president and called for a "National Democratic Convention" at the Zocalo to elect a parallel government.

In other words, AMLO is saying that the dulyelected and duly-certified government of Mexico to be headed by Calderon is illegitimate, and that only a throng (of his own supporters, of course) mobbing a town square has the right to determine the course of Mexican democracy and name the next "president" of Mexico by ... what? How? Screaming the loudest? Raising an arm?

Hey, Bin Laden, how about a cruise missile for a proportional response



I want to forget the timeworn niceties employed by diplomats. I would ignore the people who argue against massive retaliation and in favor of a "proportional response." Here's your cruise missile, Osama! Here have another! How's that for proportional?

When I consider the innocent people on the four hijacked airliners who were used as human missiles...when I consider the innocent people in the offices of the World Trade Center and the Pentagon...when I consider all the police, paramedics and firefighters who were gathered below the north tower when the south tower was hit...the more I am convinced that this heinous crime was calculated for effect.

And, don't think for a minute it was a coincidence that all four planes were on nonstop flights from he east coast to the west coast. 
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

Report details state economy

The Austin think-tank, Center for Public Policy Priorities, issued its annual report, "The State of Working Texas 2006."

The eight-page report, released Sept. 6, shows how Texans are faring economically, based on wages they earn and other measures.

On the bright side, Texas' unemployment rate continues to decline and the Lone Star State is adding jobs at a faster rate than the U.S. as a whole, the report said.

But nearly five years since the 2001-02 recession, the economy has not rebounded with advances in household income or real wages. Texas has shown a 6.2 percent decline in real median (inflation-adjusted) household income since 2002.

Only an outright violent revolution could be more irresponsible and more destabilizing of Mexico's young democracy. That stage has not been reached. The government of Vicente Fox - he and Calderon belong to the same Partido de Accion Nacional -- has been admirably restrained in handling street disturbances, and Calderon has been reserved in his criticism of AMLO.

Another piece of good news is that the Mexican public seems more politically mature than AMLO. Sixty-three percent of Mexicans, in a poll published by the newspaper El Universal in mid August, actually agreed with AMLO in wanting a complete recount, yet only 30 percent approved of the roadblocking protests.

But the best news of all is this: Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador lost the presidential election, and unless the unimaginable happens, he is not going to be running the country for the next six years.



Are you ready for some Lotto?

The Texas lottery has been around for a while. It was voted in by a margin of two to one in November of 1991. It began on May 29, 1992. Tom Clowe, Chairman of the Texas Lottery Commission, says the first five years the revenues from the lottery went to the state's General Revenue Fund. Since 1997, they have gone to public schools in Texas.

"Revenues to school systems in Texas have totaled over 8 billion dollars," says Mr. Clowe, who lives in Waco. He told me he does not know how the money gets to the schools.

The scratch-off, those lottery cards you get at convenience stores, brings in the most money: more than 75 percent of lottery ticket sales.

"Our instant tickets are growing. We're constantly changing them, getting all kinds of variations. I think a big part of the attractiveness to the scratch-off tickets is the instant gratification. People really like to take their ticket and

Lotto Texas, the big jackpot drawing two nights a week, accounts for only 6 percent of lottery ticket sales. The odds for winning Lotto Texas are one in 26 million.

"I don't think the players are really so much focused on the odds as they are on the amount of the jackpot and what the percentage of payout is."

Mega Millions also accounts for 6 percent of sales. The odds there are one in 176 million. Pick 3, Cash 5 and Texas 2-step bring in a combined total of 11 percent of sales.

"The annual revenue from lottery is about three and a half billion. This year we're projecting 3.8 billion dollars, so the return to the foundation school fund is over a billion dollars annually."

The lottery has generated a total of 42 billion dollars in sales. 13 billion went to the state, 24 billion went to players, and 2 billion went to retailers. Tom says gaming is big business in the US, bringing in more money than the movie industry and broadcasting combined.

Not everybody plays the lottery.

"I have numerous people who tell me they play the same numbers every week and they just know they're going to win. I have other people tell me they've never bought a lottery ticket and never will."

The Texas Lottery has some 16,000 licensed retailer locations statewide and can pay prizes up to \$599. There are 16 claim centers across the state where prizes up to \$999,999 can be claimed. Anything over a million has to be picked up at Lottery Commission Headquarters in Austin.

experienced this decline, but younger workers and African-Americans were hardest hit, the report said.

Education and health services is the fastest-growing sector of the workforce, having increased 15.3 percent since 2000.

McAllen-Edinburg-Mission was the area of the state with the highest unemployment rate at 7.8 percent, but McAllen-Edinburg-Mission also had the highest job growth over the last year, with a 6.5 percent increase.

A chart in the report showed the importance of education. The more educated a Texas resident is, the less likely he or she is to be unemployed.

In yet another measure, Texas had a median hourly wage of \$12.50, far below the national average of \$14.28. But, Texas came in a few cents better than its neighbors, Oklahoma and Arkansas.
