Cold cash, fast cars and tear-stained letters

A glimpse inside Jeffs' fugitive lifestyle

Cry, cry if it makes

you feel better,

Set it all down in a

Warren Jeffs, the self-proclaimed prophet of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, remains behind bars this week in the Purgatory Correctional Facility at Hurricane, Utah where he awaits trial on two charges of rape as an accomplice. Jeffs, surrounded by law enforcement officers, appeared in court on Wednesday morning, Oct. 27, 2006, where he heard a prosecutor recite the charges against him. With similar charges pending against Jeffs in Arizona and two federal complaints of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution hanging over his head, officials believe it is unlikely that he will be released on bail before all of the charges against him are tested in court.

In the meantime, Jeffs is being kept in an austere jail cell — a far cry from the luxurious

lifestyle he adopted after ascending to the leadership of the FLDS church in 2002.

Authorities told The Success this week that they discovered a treasure trove of evidence in the 2006 Cadillac Escalade Jeffs was riding in at the time of his arrest. Laptop computers, thumb drives and other data storage devices were among the evidence lawmen confiscated from the shiny red Cadillac. While each of items are of great

interest to law enforcement officials, one seasoned investigator said he was stunned by other things found in the SUV. Things like ten sets of keys to other luxury vehicles and stacks of unread letters in which distraught church members Jeffs had excommunicated begged for forgiveness and asked to be allowed back within the fold.

Law enforcement officials have busied themselves since Jeffs' arrest rounding up the cars belonging to the keys found in the Escalade. The Success has learned that one of the vehicles is a new Porsche Cayenne luxury sports SUV valued at more than \$100,000. Another of the cars is a high-end Volkswagen Touareg. While the makes and models of the other cars have yet to be released, the keys found when Jeffs was arrested appear to belong to other European luxury cars like BMW and Audi.

Law enforcement sources say that the envelopes containing letters from Jeffs' repentant

followers had been opened with a narrow slit so that the money they contained could be removed. None of the letters had been removed. Most of the letters were reported to be from loyal Jeffs supporters while many others begged for forgiveness. References to tithes or donations in the letters give lawmen the impression that most if not all them contained cash.

And...authorities did find a large amount of cash, as much as \$54,000, when Jeffs was arrested.

"It really speaks volumes about the guy," one lawman said on condition of anonymity. "He represents himself as a prophet of God and asks his followers to sacrifice and support the priesthood while he's living like a playboy."

Jeffs first came to prominence when he took over the FLDS church following his father's


death in 2002. Since that time his actions and those of some of his followers have caught the attention of law enforcement authorities and have brought unwanted attention to the reclusive polygamous sect.

Jeffs has excommunicated several men from the FLDS Church since he took over. Many of the men have since said that they Jeffs told them to leave their homes which were built on land controlled by the United Effort Plan, the

church's charitable trust. Several of the men's wives and children were taken away assigned to other men. Meanwhile the ousted members were ordered to continue tithing to Jeffs while they considered their transgressions. The men were reportedly ordered to "repent from afar" and to write to Jeffs and confess their sins.

In 2003 Rodney Holm, a policeman in the twin cities of Hildale, Utah and Colorado City, Arizona, the home of the FLDS church, was convicted of bigamy and of unlawful sexual conduct with a minor after Ruth Stubbs, one of his multiple wives, testified against him in open court. The case sent shock waves through the FLDS community nestled on the Utah/Arizona line. It wasn't long before Warren Jeffs' lieutenants fanned out across the western United States and began buying up property.

One of those followers, a man named David Allred, purchased land here in Schleicher **SEE JEFFS ON PAGE 8**

Commissioners meet, vote to sell old fire truck

Schleicher County Commissioner's Court met Monday, September 25, 2006 and voted to sell retired fire department unit #31 to Floyd West for the sum of \$1,300. West's bid was the only one received. The truck was previously given to the Prescribed Burn Association but the title was never transferred and the truck's engine failed shortly after the group put it into service. Rather than repair the truck, the commissioners elected to put it up

The commissioners next considered a request from County Extension Agent Cory Stevens for the use of room #3 at the Civic Center for 4-H Shooting Sport program. The program advocates proper gun usage and safety through the use of small bore rifles. Stevens also asked to use of the same room for a goat judging program to be held on

November 11. Both requests were considered by the commissioners and approved.

Next, L.B. Hollenbeck of Sonora asked that the county assign a number to the road that accesses his property. The road originates in Sutton County but crosses north into Schleicher. The men voted to name it County Road #103.

Commissioners present for the Monday meeting included Bill Clark, Matt Brown and Kirk Griffin. Also present were County Judge Johnny Griffin, Road Superintendent Clay Burleson, County Clerk Peggy Williams and Treasurer Karen Henderson. Commissioner Johnny Mayo was absent.

Among other business, the commissioners approved election voting machine service contracts with other local jurisdictions.

Judge Griffin then advised the

men of flooding in the Memorial Building Lion's Club Room causing the tile to come up. He said the tiles and glue were removed and the floor was painted.

Griffin also advised of other needed repairs at the Memorial Building including flooring, plumbing and air conditioners. He asked the men to consider obtaining a bond to build a new courtroom annex and include repairs for the Memorial Building. He noted that a 1984 remodel of the building cost the county \$200,000.

The commissioners then approved a request by County Clerk Peggy Williams for an amendment to her travel budget so that she might attend a conference in Austin on Dec. 3-5.

*SCISD eyes teaching at YFZ Ranch

SCISD Superintendent Billy Collins met last week with two representatives from the YFZ Ranch concerning home schooling of children on the property. Merril Jessop and Richard Barlow reportedly told Collins that the children were being educated with an appropriate

Texas law prohibits public school officials from overseeing home schooled children. Officials must accept the word of a parent or guardian that the children are being properly

educated. It is unknown, however, whether YFZ Ranch officials may determine that all children at the ranch be home schooled or if the decision must be communicated to the school district by each child's parent or guardian.

Collins told The Success he will continue to explore the law. He says he has no problem with parents who choose to home school their children adding that his only concern is that the children at the YFZ Ranch are being educated according to the wishes of their parents.

My hot Latin blood began to boil when I learned that in a closed-door meeting Arnold Schwarzenegger insulted my people by joking with aides that Cubans and Puerto Ricans are temperamental, excitable, fiery -- hot-blooded.

An audio tape of the session (the California governor likes to record his meetings), which took place in March, was leaked to the Los Angeles Times last month. But then I realized, "Hey, I can't be all bad." My genealogical research showed there's also a Chinese man a mere three generations back, and, best of all, an English woman -- Seraphine Philpot, whose daughter became the wife of the Chinese man.

That means my paternal grandfather was half Chinese, one-quarter English and only one-quarter Spanish.

Whew. I began to calm down. By the time Arnold issued the ritual apology -- hot-blooded Assemblywoman Garcia by his side -- I was all ready to forgive and forget. After all, we English people are famously even-tempered. Who hasn't heard of the phlegmatic English character? Stiff upper lip and all that. Jolly good, by Jove!

Then I learned that a woman named Barbara Outland Baker, who was Schwarzenegger's girl-friend when he first came to the United States from his native Austria, has written a memoir that portrays the then governor-to-be as, well, a fiery, hot-blooded lover

"[W]e could always rely on making love to recharge our intimate connection," the book says. "Our emotional life created turbulence, but our passion justified the challenges." Later, she learned her boyfriend was unfaithful.

Arnold the Latin Lover? Is it possible, with all that cold Teutonic blood running in his veins?

It was then that my analytical, studious Chinese blood began to bubble to the surface. The brainy disposition I inherited from my high-IQ ancestors made me see that maybe the governor should have his DNA checked for a dark-haired, hot-blooded, fiery-tempered Mediterranean (or even African) ancestor who several generations back had a little fling somewhere in the Alps of Austria.

What's Up, Wasabi?

Hot dogs have gone gourmet.

Not long ago, this would have been like saying bubble gum has gone gourmet, which to the best of my knowledge, it hasn't -- yet. (Has it?)

This summer a fancy restaurant in East Hampton, N.Y., began selling \$25 hot dogs made from Wagyu beef, which presumably comes from really classy French-speaking Wagyu cows.

And a chain called Franktitude
-- hey, I don't make these names
up -- is offering upscale hot dogs
with toppings such as wasabi mayo,
artichokes and banana chips.

I've been seeing this "wasabi" stuff on menus recently, and I have it on good authority -- my own -- that it doesn't exist. Restaurants serve "wasabi" mayo instead of regular so they can charge more.

Now entrees are going "wasabi." If the waiter mentions "wasabi," just smile and wink to let him know you're in on the hoax. You'll get special treatment.

As for artichokes and banana chips, I'm sorry, but this is the gastronomical version of putting lipstick on a pig. It's a hot dog, people!

Don Flood

It's sad because the hot dog was among the last of the non-pretentious foods.

Now all that's left is the peanut butter sandwich, which gives me an idea -- a chain of upscale peanut butter sandwich restaurants!

Notice I did not say peanut butter and jelly.

While popular, the PB&J is for those with coarser, less refined tastes. I don't plan to allow any in my restaurants.

The keys to success, of course, are the proper recipes. Here's one, of which I am especially proud.

Don's Open Faced Peanut Butter Sandwich

Ingredients:

• One piece of fresh rye bread, chewy, not too soft.

• One humongous gob of peanut butter, smooth and salted. (Some prefer a merely huge gob as opposed to a humongous gob. Some variation is acceptable.)

Directions:

Once you have assembled the ingredients, take a regular kitchen

knife, approximately 6 inches long and not too sharp, and begin spreading.

The reason it shouldn't be too sharp is that after you have finished spreading it's time to dip the knife back in the jar, remove another gob, and lick the knife clean.

If done with one of those Ginsu knives you are likely to slice off your tongue, which will result in a loss of blood and an overall negative impact on the peanut buttereating experience.

Also, you should not dip the knife back in the jar once it has been in your mouth, unless of course no one is looking. Then it's OK.

Serving is two or three slices, depending upon how many gobs of peanut butter you lick off the knife.

If serving with company, especially the hoity-toity types, make sure everybody has his own jar and knife.

The sandwiches go well with anything, from milk to Chardonnay. Pringles make an elegant side dish

Some old Indian bones get a proper burial

There is a special grave in the Cochran County Cemetery in Morton. It contains the bones of an Indian. The bones were found years ago by a rancher who took them to the museum in Morton. The bones were undisturbed for more than 50 years until the museum moved into another building. Someone found the bones among cans of paint in a cardboard box. A note indicated the bones were those of a Native American.

A group of volunteers decided to give the bones a traditional Indian burial. They contacted someone at the Texas Historical Commission who told them they could do anything they wanted to with the bones except display them.

When the group approached the county commissioners court for permission to bury the bones, the commissioners were sympathetic to the cause and not only donated one burial site but also nine more in the county-owned cemetery just in case other Indian bones are uncovered.

The volunteers asked Ken "Yazzie" Chambellan, a physician's



assistant at Cochran Memorial Hospital, to help with the burial. Yazzie is a member of the Navajo tribe. He chose to wrap the bones in a red blanket with a Native American design and seal them in a pine box. At the burial service he sprinkled cedar ashes around the gravesite and spread smoke from native grasses. He played his flute and spoke for two and a half hours.

"We asked for blessings and I talked about living in peace and harmony. Buffalo soldiers escorted me and I placed the bones in the grave."

His remarks included the words from an Indian poem:

"I was born upon the prairie where the wind blew free. There was nothing to break the light of the sun. There were no enclosures.

Everything drew free breath. I want to die there, not within walls. I know every stream and every wood between the Rio Grande and the Arkansas. I have lived and hunted over the country I loved. I have lived as my fathers, and as them I have lived happily. The white man has the country I loved and we wish only to wander on the prairie until we die. I want no blood upon my land to stain the grass. I want the land clean and pure. I wish it so all who go through among my people my find peace when they come in and when they leave.

Do not stand at my grave and weep. I am not here. I do not sleep.

I am the thousand winds that blow. I am the diamond glint on

I am the sunlight on ripened grain. I am the gentle autumn

When you wake in the morning hush, I am the uplifting rush of birds in flight. I am the soft starlight at night.

Do not weep. I am not here. I do not sleep."

Guv race gets scrappier with Nov. 7 on horizon

AUSTIN - With 40 or so days between now and Election Day, candidates for governor are punching hard.

Gov. Rick Perry's reelection campaign accused opponent Carole Keeton Strayhorn, in her role as state comptroller, of allowing insiders to secretly set tax policy.

But Strayhorn's campaign countered that the comptroller's tax policy committee conducts open meetings and discloses its actions.

In another salvo against all opponents, Perry touted himself as the only candidate who is thinking big enough to prepare Texas for its future transportation needs.



Strayhorn's counter to Perry has been to appear around the state at public hearings on his proposed Trans Texas Corridor project.

In these forums "One Tough Grandma" regularly knocks the incumbent governor for signing a "secret" deal with CINTRA, a Spanish roadbuilder that has partnered with San Antoniobased Zachry on the Trans Texas Corridor contract.

Strayhorn's camp has in effect called the multi-billion dollar project fiscally irresponsible and a problem for homeowners, ranchers, farmers and businesses that would find themselves displaced in a new superhighway matrix.

After calls by open government advocates to make the Trans Texas Corridor construction contract public, Attorney General Greg Abbott ruled the contract is public information. But the contract is still under wraps because CINTRA has sued to keep certain parts of it confidential.

Meanwhile, Hill Country independent Kinky Friedman was admonished by the Texas NAACP for using racial slurs in an old standup comedy routine and as recently as a year ago on the campaign trail.

Also taking Friedman to task for racially insensitive language were Strayhorn, Perry, Democrat Chris Bell and state Rep. Garnet Coleman, D-Houston.

Also, Perry's camp blasted Friedman for changing his position on border security many times, and criticized Bell for wanting to appoint a panel of experts instead of giving details on how he would improve public education.

Decision to come on money gifts

People who hold public office must report gifts they receive to the Texas Ethics Commission.

But what if a gift is a check? Presently, reporting rules are vague: vague enough to allow an official to report that he received a check from Jane Doe, but not the dollars and cents written on it.

The Texas Ethics Commission, the state agency that handles such matters, has been asked to decide if check amounts need be disclosed.

A decision on the matter is not likely to occur until after the election, if at all. Why? With the Texas Legislature convening in January, lawmakers will be able to rewrite the state election law, where campaign finance tuning takes place.

State Reps. Fred Hill, R-Richardson, and Elliott Naishtat, D-Austin, plan to file legislation requiring disclosure of amounts.

Child identification effort begins

From now through October, 2 million Texas school children in grades kindergarten through sixth will bring home child identification kits and letters to parents or guardians.


Payments are limited to \$10,000 per producer, and the amount of compensation may not exceed the amount of forage production losses. Producers who apply in multiple states cannot receive more than \$10,000 in total compensation, and the same losses cannot be claimed in more than one state.

Funds will be paid on a per head basis. Per head payment rates will be determined by the total number of livestock claimed by all eligible applicants and will differ for cattle and sheep based on standard animal units.
