## USDA-NRCS accepting EQIP applications

The Natural Resources Conservation Service office in Eldorado is taking Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) applications through December 15th. The EQIP program is a cost-share incentive program available to landowners and operators for the purpose of carrying out conservation practices on their land.

Each county within the state receives a base allocation of federal dollars starting at \$134,000. This money will be used as cost-share incentives to implement priority practices within the county. Last year the County cost-shared 26 contracts for over \$500,000.

This year's priority concern, as identified by the Program Development Group, is brush management. Cedar, mesquite and pricklypear are the identified high priority target species. Chemical and/or mechanical control methods can be cost-shared to obtain your brush management goal.

Schleicher County also receives additional funding through EQIP to provide technical and cost-share assistance for Special Resource Concern Areas. Over \$500,000 is available to carry out conservation practices within the South Concho and Spring and Dove Creek Watersheds. Brush control, fencing, livestock pipelines, water storages and wells are just some of the conservation practices that can cost-shared within these special project areas.

Cost-share rates are set at 50% of an average cost. The local NRCS employees will review the application and ranking procedure with you and explain the program in more detail.

## Election administrator post created by county

The Schleicher County Commissioners met Monday, October 16, to make up for their October 10 meeting that was cancelled due to lack of a quorum.

Among the business at hand Monday was the creation of a new county position, that of Election Administrator.

County Clerk Peggy Williams and present Voter Registrar Jennifer Henderson discussed the need for an election administrator with County Judge Johnny Griffin and County Commissioners Johnny Mayo, Kirk Griffin and Matt Brown. Commissioner Bill Clark was absent.

Peggy Williams advised that the job of holding elections has fallen to her by law since the county doesn't have an administrator. She noted that the job has become increasingly complex in recent years, especially with the implementation of HAVA (Help Americans Vote Act) and the purchase of electronic voting machines. Also present for the meeting and lending their support to the creation of the EA post were Democratic and Republican County Chairpersons Phyllis Sauer and Bessie Jones.

During the discussion it was pointed out that if the post was created it would be supervised by the County Election Commission as provided by state law. The Election Commission consists of the County Judge, County Clerk, Tax Assessor-Collector and the county chairs of each political party making nominations by primary election.

It was further explained that the Election Commission would have the authority to hire and/or dismiss the Election Administrator. The discussion then turned to ways to fund the post and Ms. Williams presented a proposed budget for the office.

Following a lengthy discussion the commissioners voted unanimously to create the position of Election Administrator but added the duty of assisting Tax Assessor Collector Jeanne Snelson. The EA will also serve as the county Voter Registrar. The new position will begin on Jan. 1, 2007.

The commissioners then visited with representatives of two companies interested in selling the county a new track loader/ripper. Jamie Wes with John Deere and Scott Bryan with Holt Caterpillar each described their company's machinery. Road Superintendent Clay Burleson was on hand for the discussion and gave input on equipment

## Woodward's Real Revelation

Bob Woodward's latest blockbuster book, "State of Denial," is being sold on its bogus "revelation" that President Bush has been deceptive about poor security conditions in Iraq. The book's most important aspect isn't this "news," but the insight it gives into how the U.S. government has arrived at such a middling, uninspired campaign in Iraq -- just enough not to win and just enough not to lose.

As State Department adviser Philip Zelikow thought after a visit to Iraq in 2005, in Woodward's words, "There was too much barely coping, just getting by and making incremental improvements."

We have been barely coping because we have never made a decision to go all-out, partly due to the restraining influence of Secretary of Defense Don Rumsfeld. Oddly, given the way he has become a hate-figure for Democrats, it is Rumsfeld who is perhaps closest to the Democrats' preferred Iraq strategy as any other major figure in the Bush administration.

He is not interested in trying to win the war outright, so much as handing the effort over to the Iraqis. According to Woodward, "Rumsfeld said strongly and repeatedly, the Iraqis need to be given the chance to fail and fall on their faces, and only then would they pick themselves up, dust themselves off and come up with solutions."

This was a constant tension between Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice and Rumsfeld. She wanted to do more; he wanted to do less. They clashed over the creation of Provincial Reconstruction Teams in Iraqi provinces because Rice wanted the military to provide security and Rumsfeld wanted it handled by private contractors. They argued over security for Iraqi oil infrastructure, with Rice wanting more U.S. involvement and Rumsfeld less. Generally, the result has been a down-the-middle compromise, with the U.S. neither overwhelming our enemies nor letting the Iraqis sink or swim.

If Rumsfeld had had his way, we might have had one foot out the door already. In a meeting earlier this year in Baghdad, Rumsfeld raised the issue of reducing U.S. troop levels with Iraq Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki. Maliki was shocked. "It's way too early to be talking about that," he said. Rumsfeld's strategy isn't outlandish in theory, but the fact is that the Iraqis haven't yet proven they are up to the burden he wants to place on them.

Rumsfeld has a tacit ally in minimizing the U.S. commitment in Iraq in top U.S. military commanders. Gen. John Abizaid believes that, according to Woodward, "the U.S. military had done all it could" in Iraq. Asked by his friends his strategy for winning, Abizaid responded, "That's not my job." When he visited Rep. John Murtha, the cut-and-run Democrat, Abizaid put his fingers close together and said, "We're that far apart."

So it is that Bush's stalwartness in the Iraq War never quite seems to be matched by the means he applies on the ground. His administration has been riven by debilitating divisions on Iraq for too long. Bush should appoint an Iraq czar, whose charge it is to do everything possible to win at this late hour, and who will have every resource of government at his disposal. Lest the next Woodward book cover how the U.S. handled its ignominious exit.

## Budget makers looking ahead to legislative session

AUSTIN — Thanks to a growing economy, higher oil and gas prices and an increase in tax collections, state budget estimators say Texas could have about \$15 billion more revenue than expected before the Legislature convenes in January.

But money needed for public education and other commitments would eat up much of it.

The budget estimates come from the Legislative Budget Board, headed by Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and Speaker Tom Craddick.

In related news, the University of Texas' Lyndon B. Johnson School of Public Affairs and Strategic Partnerships Inc., a consulting firm, co-hosted a state budget conference in preparation for the 80th regular session of the Texas Legislature.

Among top speakers were the Legislature's chief budgeteers, Sen. Steve Ogden, chair of the Senate Finance Committee, and Rep. Jim Pitts, chair of the House Appropriations Committee.

It will be Ogden and Pitts' job to lead the effort to replace \$7 billion in revenue lost when the Legislature lowered school property tax rates for maintenance and operations from \$1.50 to \$1.

The new business activity tax, passed in the 3rd special session of the 79th Legislature, won't take effect until 2008. That tax came into being as a swap for the property tax cut.

Ogden, R-Bryan, and Pitts, R-Waxahachie, agreed the state's financial condition is good. But both signaled spending demands related to rapid population growth may neutralize the projected record budget surplus of more than \$10 billion in 2007-2008, the next two-year budget cycle.

Simplified, the reason the surplus may not last for long on paper or in the real world is that more people translates to more government services.

### Defibrillator funding to be sought

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst said he plans to seek funding in the coming legislative session for automated external defibrillators in all Texas public schools.

"I want to spare parents, teachers and teammates the horror of watching helplessly as someone's son or daughter fights for their life," he said.

According to Dewhurst's office, only five other states have laws specifically regarding the placement of "AEDs" in public schools, school districts or athletic events.

The estimated average cost of a portable AED is approximately \$2,000.

Awareness of the need for such devices was raised recently, when an Austin-area high school football player's heart stopped during a game. The skilled use of an

AED was credited with saving the player's life.

# Sterling City defeats Eagles 56-0

## Visitors utilize fake punt, two on-side kicks & three time outs to pad score

The Sterling City varsity team came to Eldorado last Friday with a chip on its shoulder — a chip that helped it coast to a 56-0 victory and a 3-0 record in District 16-1A.

But wait, coast probably isn't the right word to describe Sterling City's victory. Coach Chris Bearden clearly felt the game was too close for comfort when, with a 42-0 lead and time running out in the third period, he called for two on-side kicks and a fake punt in order to post more points on the board. And, as if to emphasize the point, Bearden called three time

outs late in the 4th quarter so that the clock wouldn't expire before his high-powered offense could pound the ball into the end zone one more time.

While the action on the field appeared to be between Eldorado's and Sterling City's varsity squads, clearly the Sterling City players, coaches and fans were focused on another, very different game... a game played twenty-four hours earlier between the two schools' junior varsity teams, a game that Eldorado's JV won by a 78-12 margin.

"The head coach over there made the JV game into a big deal," Eldorado's Head Coach Johnny Burleson said. "Yes our JV put up 78 points on them in three quarters, but that just wasn't the same situation."

In fact, it wasn't even close to the same situation. Eldorado's JV squad put up 56 points in the first half of their Thursday night game in Sterling City. "We had linemen

running the ball in the second half. We didn't even score in the fourth quarter."

The last score of that game actually came on a six yard run by an Eldorado lineman, Kaleb Murr.

"All I can say is sportsmanship," Burleson added. "I would be raising an eyebrow if I lived in Sterling City. Coach Bearden jeopardized his whole season over nothing. What if their stud running back got hurt in the fourth quarter because his coach left him in with a 42-0 lead to settle a grudge?"

The night was topped off with a large sign held high by the Sterling City fans and cheerleaders stating, "Remember 78-12. When you mess with one of us, you mess with all of us."

"It's safe to say that we won't forget this thing," Burleson said. "We have some real talented kids coming up over the next few years. If they came here looking for a rivalry, they found one."

Coach Chris Bearden did not return phone calls to *The Success* nor respond to our e-mail questions.

Sterling City's last score of the night came with 20 seconds left in the game. The TD was set up by three timeouts.

"It is obvious that we couldn't move the ball on them," Burleson said. "We made some mistakes that led to them having big plays."

Eldorado managed a total of 73 yards offense on the night. Seventy came on the ground, and the other three through the air.

David Hernandez accounted for 65 of those yards on the ground.

Sterling City ended the night with 477 total yards and the lead in District 16-1A.

Eldorado will face off against the Menard Yellowjackets Friday night at Eagle Stadium. "Menard is in the same boat we're in," said Burleson. "They need this win just as badly as we do it."

Kick off is slated for 7:30 p.m. and everyone is encouraged to come out and support the Eagles, as they look for their first win of the season against long-time rival Menard.

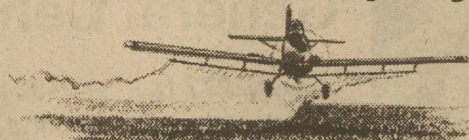

# Air combat returns to West Texas skies

FORT HOOD — West Texans will again see helicopters and military vehicles in the sky and on the roads as the 21st Cavalry Brigade (Air Combat) returns to train the 4th Squadron, 3d Armored Cavalry Regiment. The unit has recently been equipped

with the world's most lethal attack helicopter, the AH-64D Apache Longbow. The 21st Cavalry Bde. is responsible for training all Army aviation units as well as those of allied countries transitioning to the Apache Longbow.

Training will be conducted by Fort Hood's 21st Cavalry Bde. and involve frequent flights in Brown,

McCulloch, Mason, Menard, Llano, Coleman, Concho, Tom Green, Kimble, Runnels, San Saba, and Mills counties during two periods from 17-30 October and 12-22 November. Those counties, along with several neighboring counties, make up what Fort Hood officials call the Western Training Area.

"The realistic training conducted by the 21st Cav. helps units function as a team and operate over the distances which they will encounter in actual combat conditions," a unit training officer explained.

"This intense training program lasts about nine months and culminates with a series of exercises in West Texas areas where land and airspace provide the extended maneuver space that can't be replicated within the boundaries of the Fort Hood Military Reservation."

As part of the training, visually modified vehicles — designed to imitate an "enemy" force — will be traveling throughout the training area and may be seen parked in the Western Training Area while the Apache crews search for them.

No live ammunition is used in the training exercise. However, in an effort to add more realism to the training, smoke may be employed to simulate a "kill" when a vehicle has been located and "destroyed" by the Longbows.

"This smoke may be of various colors," a Fort Hood spokesperson said. "It's non-toxic, and won't pose a threat to local residents or livestock."

Most of the helicopter flight activities during the period will be staged out of the Camp Bowie National Guard Training Center

near Brownwood, Texas. Helicopter crews will be flying both day and night training missions.

Military convoys will be encountered along Texas Hwys. 190, 183 and 84 between Fort Hood and Brownwood prior to and following each training period.

The 4/3 ACR, nicknamed "Longknife" will be stationed at Fort Hood upon completion of their training. The newest Longbow unit will continue to train in preparation for the possibility of deployment at some future date. As in the past, this training in the WTA may involve larger numbers of Army aircraft — including UH-1 Hueys, UH-60 Blackhawks and CH-47 Chinook helicopters.

"With the increased numbers of larger aircraft, there comes an increased chance crews may fly over buildings or livestock," a flight training specialist pointed out.

"It's the aircrew's responsibility to make every effort to avoid direct over-flight of buildings and livestock. Aviation crews are briefed on such avoidance prior to every mission flown."

Col. Gregory Brockman, commander of the 21st Cavalry Bde. expressed his appreciation — and that of the Army — to residents of the Western Training Area "for their continued support of the brigade during these training exercises so that training can be conducted in the most realistic scenarios possible."

"Your reputation for supporting our mission is known throughout the Army and your continued support allows us to train the finest attack helicopter crews and units in the world."

## Sheep and Goat Predator Board mails out ballots

(SAN ANGELO) -- The Sheep and Goat Predator Management Board will mail ballots this week to elect three producers to represent sheep and goat raisers in its 111-county area. In addition there will be a vote for an increase on the refundable assessment from \$.20 per head to \$.30 per head. Ballots must be returned to the Board office by the midnight Oct. 30 deadline.

All sheep and goat raisers who reside in one of the three districts are eligible to vote in the upcoming election. The Texas Commodity Referendum Law, which governs the producer board, requires biennial elections. Ballots must bear the signature and address of the voter, and indicate production totals.

Sheep and goat producers nominated for the three open positions on the nine-member board are: District 1: JOHN WADE; District 2: J.R. EVANS; District 3: ALLEN BELK. These producers completed a nomination form with ten qualified sheep and/or goat producers supporting their nomination, and returned the completed form by the Sept. 30 deadline. They will each serve a six-year term.

Sheep and goat producers who did not receive ballots but have sheep and goat production and reside in one of the districts may obtain ballots at the local county extension offices, the Sheep and Goat Predator Management Board office at P.O. Box 3543, San Angelo, Texas 76902-3543, or by calling 325-659-8777.

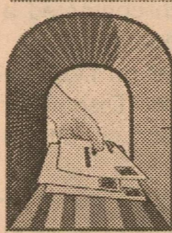

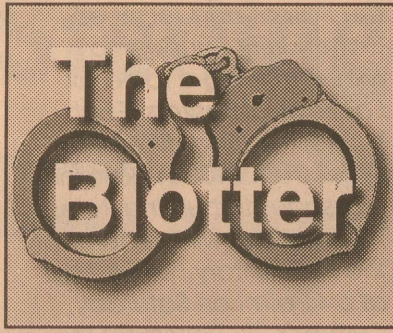

### NOTICE OF GAS RATE INCREASE REQUEST

On May 31, 2006, Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos" or "the Company"), filed a Statement of Intent with the Railroad Commission of Texas ("Commission") and each city within Atmos' service territory, to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders applicable to all customers in the Mid-Tex Division. The proposed revisions to the rates and riders will impact all classes of service, and each of Atmos' approximately 1,500,000 customers (1,371,625 residential, 121,643 commercial, 235 industrial, and 715 transportation customers).

The Company has requested a systemwide increase of its revenues to \$1,758.7 million, resulting in an increase in annual revenues of approximately \$60.9 million or 3.6%, including gas costs, or 14.1% excluding gas cost. In addition, the Company has requested that it recover its rate case expenses and any rate case expenses for cities that are ordered by the Commission. The proposed change in revenues constitutes a "major" change as that term is defined by state law.

The monthly bills of typical customers would be affected by the proposed changes as follows:

The commissioners then voted call for bids for a track loader/ripper including financing options and extended warranty. The bids are to be received by Nov. 20, 2006. The men also decided to offer the county's used track loader for sale by bid.

The commissioners then met with engineer David Todd who asked that the county consider hiring his firm, Enprotec/Hibbs & Todd for upcoming work at the airport. It was noted that the Texas Department of Transportation Aviation Division is prepared to hire an engineer for the project

But the county could exercise their right to specify Todd's firm. But the commissioners chose not to do that and left the decision to TxDOT.

Among other action the commissioners discussed but took no action on a nominee to the Region F Water Board. Neither did they act on hiring a firm to make repairs to the courthouse's masonry exterior.

As the meeting wound down the men voted to declare October as Czech Heritage month in Schleicher County. They also voted to \$350 in dues to Association of Rural Communities in Texas. They also approved the purchase of dollies for tables and chairs in the Memorial Building.

Before adjourning, the men reviewed the county's financial reports, approved a budget transfer request by County Treasurer Karen Henderson in the amount of \$170,000 and authorized payment of the monthly bills.

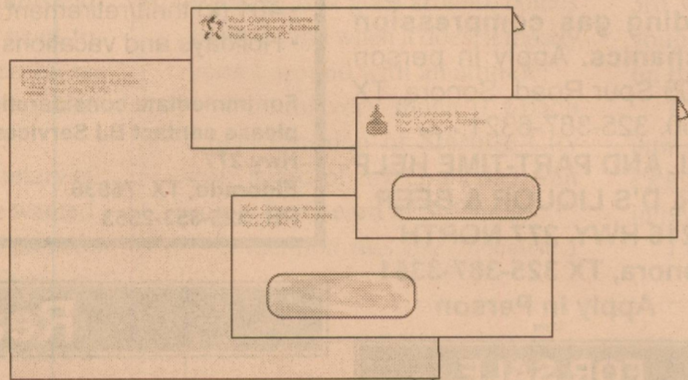

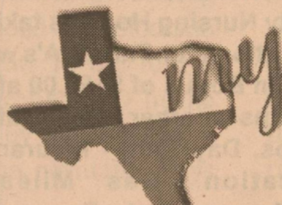
