## County finalizes Orient Heights sewer project

The Schleicher County Commis sioner's Court met Monday, November 13,2006 . The meeting was called to order by Judge Johnny Griffin with commissioners Bill Clark, Johnny Mayo, Kirk Griffin and Matt Brown in attendance.

Among other business the men selected Bill Coffey with the accounting firm of Jones, Hay, Marschall and McKinney as Schleicher's County's lead accountant.

The court then discussed finalizing the sewer project in Orient Heights. Commissioner Bill Clark stated at the last meeting held on October 30, 2006 he was in favor of withholding the last he was in favor or withiolding to the contractor because he felt the job was not completed. Juidge Johnny Griffin received a letter from Johnny Griffin received a letter from engineer David Todd stating the project was finished and the contrac tor would warranty the job for a year

With that news, the men voted unanimously to release the final payment of $\$ 25,862$ for the job.

Judge Johnny Griffin told the commissioners that the county had one more project in Orient Heights add it on, to fill in and cover 32 septic systems. Floyd Fay, the city's utility superintendent, visited with the commissioners briefly about the project. He advised that he was short several employees and would be unable to assist with the project. The commissioners then appointed Bill Clark to oversee the process of finding a conoversee the process of finding a con
tractor to fill in the septic tanks. tractor to fill in the septic tanks. remind the commissioners that the remind the commissioners that the paving projects voted on several years
ago, have not been completed. He said ago, have not been completed. He said the problem was that the paving contractor that received the bid had not fulfilled its obligations.

The court then approved a resolution to submit a 2007-2008 Colonia Construction Fund Grant application to the Office of Rural Community Affairs. The application is seek a grant in the amount of $\$ 297,500.00$ with Schleicher County contributing $\$ 32,500$ in matching funds. The grant is for finishing the water system in the Three Sister addition and the remainder of the sewer system hookups in the Orient Heights Addition.
County Clerk Peggy Williams then informed the court she was going look for an insulated trailer in which to store the county's voting machines. The commissioners had already given their approval for the purchase
The men then approved the County Treasurer Karen Henderson request for budget transfers in the amount of $\$ 190,000$. They also signed and approved the monthly bills.

American life－－the revolution wrought by President American life－－the revolution wrought by President Clinton＇s signing of a welfare－reform bill in August 1996．Pro－work reforms of welfare had been bubbling up from the states since the early 1990s，but the federal legislation completed a change in philosophy that rippled into the lives of single mothers，changing them dramatically for the better．
If the kind of social progress brought by welfare reform had been caused by a liberal policy，its archi－ tects would be enjoying Kennedy School sinecures． But the rebels who changed the welfare status quo were conservative intellectuals and officeholders．

Robert Rector the Robert Rector，the intellectual god－ and in a new book， Work Over Welfare，＂by Ron Haskins，a former staffer on a key congressional committee．
Welfare caseloads have dropped 60 percent tince the passage of welfare reform．Was that just he result of a strong economy？No．Caseloads didn＇t decline significantly in any of the eight periods of economic expansion from the 1950s to the mid－1990s．From 1953 to 1994，the number of families on welfare dropped in only five years，and wo years in a row only once．By 2005 ，welfare

Work requirements，and the message sent by reform that dependence is unacceptable，got former the portion of single mothers who were employed grew from 58 percent to nearly 75 percent，＂Haskins writes．Among never－married mothers，the most disadvantaged group，employment grew by 50 percent．＂Employment changes of this magnitude over such a short period for an entire demographic group are unpre
cords，＂he adds．
If a mother is on welfare，it basically guaran－ rees that she will be poor．If she has a job，she will robably have more income，and her children will be better off．So，child poverty dropped every year
between 1994 and 2000．In 1995，the black child between 1994 and 2000．In 1995，the black child
poverty rate was a little higher（41．5 percent）than poverty rate was a little higher（ 41.5 percent）than it had been in 1971 （ 40.4 percent）．Welfare reform
sent it plummeting to 30 percent by 2001，when the poverty rate for black children was at the lowest point in national history，＂Rector writes．
Welfare reform，then，has affected the lives of millions of people．If the 1999 poverty rate had still been at 1990 levels，there would have been another 4.2 million poor mothers and children．If the illegitimacy rate had continued at its pre－reform pace，another 1.4 million children would have been born out of wedlock．Welfare reform has created a fundamentally different and better dynamic in the nation＇s anti－poverty policy．
More worrisome is that the success of the 1996 law has relieved pressure on policymakers to keep states from backsliding on enforcing work require－ ments．And the ultimate reform in poverty policy won＇t come until government encourages marriage among the women who now become single mothers． f that seems a hopelessly ambitious cause，a little reforming welfare．

## Bone Marrow Transplant Leads to Friendship

When a couple of our friends，
Deidre and Gordon，got married a few years ago，I noticed a man at the wedding wearing a mask over his nose and mouth．I found out this year about that man．His name is Frank Ryan and he lives in Philadelphia．After serving 20 in Philadelphia．After serving 20 take care of his ailing father，who was dying with prostate cancer． was dying with prostate cancer． Just before he passed away he told
Frank to get a physical．Frank said Frank to get a physical．Frank said
he would and after his father died， he would and after his father died， he kept his promise
The doctor told Frank he had an advanced stage of non－Hodg－ kin＇s lymphoma，an increasingly common cancer．For Frank，it was the beginning of a long and exhausting battle against the dis－ ease．He started intense chemo－ therapy sessions that would last for 8 years．
Fifteen hundred miles away in Dallas，Deidre＇s husband Stan was fighting lymphoma，the same disease Frank had．Physicians at Baylor Medical Center put Stan on the bone marrow transplant list and the search began to find a donor．Deidre took a blood test
and got on the donor list．She

was not a match．Finally a match for Stan was found through the national bone marrow registry， a data bank of 7 million people whose blood test indicated they might be potential donors．Just days after a match was found， Stan died．Deidre mourned deeply and gave no more thought to the egistry for years．
Under Fox Chase－Temple＇s Bone Marrow Transplant Program， part of Philadelphia＇s Temple Uni－ versity Medical branch，doctors have performed more than 700 bone marrow transplants．In the atest technology doctors replace atest corory，diself but the blood formin cells．The he blood orming stem cells．These are ma－ ure stem cells found in the bone narrow of adults and sometimes children，but not in newborn ba－ bies or fetuses
Frank Ryan＇s medical team
decided to look for a bone mar row donor for Frank．His broth ers and sisters were tested．None was a match．Deidre was．Deidre who went on the list trying to save someone she loved，is given another chance to save a life．Doc tors at Baylor drew Deidre＇s stem
cells and a courier transported them to Fox Chase．Deidre＇s stem cells were transfused into Frank through an IV．Once the donor cells assert themselves，they attack the lymphoma．Frank＇s disease melted away．
A year later，Frank and Deidre met for the first time．Deidre and her fiancé，Gordon，went to Philadelphia and met Frank at the train station．He was waiting for her with a bouquet of red roses and a big sign bearing her name． When they saw each other，they embraced．Frank said，＂Thanks for everything．＇
As they left the train station， Frank said to a crowd of people ＂This lady saved my life．Bone marrow transplant．＂They became good friends and stay in touch When Deidre and Gordon got married，Frank was an usher at their wedding．

Texas gives Perry another 4 years

AUSTIN－Enough voters signi－ fied their happiness with Gov．Rick Perry in the Nov． 7 election to reward the 56 －year－old Republican with an－ other four－year term in the governor＇s mansion．

An estimated 1.7 million voters － 39 percent of the registered voters who actually cast ballots－picked Perry．This was widely reported as the age for winning the high office of governor in more than a century．But
should Perry serve out the next four years

held the office 10 years－a period two years longer than any of his predecessors
Democrat Chris Bell，a former U．S． representative from Houston，placed second in the race for governor with
29 percent of the vote，or 1.3 million votes．
Outgoing State Comptroller Carole Keeton＂Grandma＂Strayhorn，a Re publican running as an independent， placed third with 18 percent．Writer and entertainer Richard S．＂Kinky＂ Friedman，also an independent，placed fourth with 12 percent．

James Werner，a Libertarian from Austin，drew 0.6 percent．
Secretary of State Roger Williams＇ office reported the statewide voter turn－ out at 32.97 percent of the $13,074,279$ Texas residents who registered in time to vote．
Proceeding down the ballot in some of the major statewide races，rounded results taken from unofficial results showed the two biggest vote－getters in each race，as follows
－Incumbent Republican Lt．Gov． David Dewhurst was re－elected over Democrat Maria Luisa Alvarado， 60 percent to 36 percen．
－Incumbent Republican Attorney General Greg Abbott was re－elected over Democrat David Van Os， 61 per－ cent to 37 percent．
－Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs，a Republican，was elected to succeed Strayhorn as comptroller of public accounts．Combs＇vote percent－ age was 61 compared with Democrat Fred Head＇s 36 percent．
－Incumbent Republican Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson was re－elected over Democrat VaLi
Hathcox， 55 percent to 41 percent．
－Former State Sen．Todd Staples of Palestine，a Republican，was elected to succeed Combs as agriculture commis
sioner，over Democrat Hank Gilbert， 55 percent to 42 percent．
－Incumbent Republican Railroad Commissioner Elizabeth Ames Jones was re－elected over Democrat Dale Henry， 54 percent to 42 percent．
－Incumbent Republican Supreme Court Chief Justice Wallace Jefferson was re－elected over Libertarian Tom Oxford， 76 percent to 24 percent．

Republicans swept the other Su preme Court seats on the ballot．In the courts of criminal appeals races，it was almost a GOP sweep．The spoiler was Diane Henson，a Democrat，who won against Republican Will Wilson in the race for Place 3，3rd Court of Appeals． The margin was 50.32 percent to 49.68 percent．
The GOP also won all but one seat up for re－election on the State Board of Education．

Democrat takes DeLay district
Former U．S．Rep．Nick Lampson，a Democrat，emerged the winner in the race for former U．S．Rep．Tom DeLay＇s U．S．Congressional District 22 seat．

Former House Majority Leader DeLay resigned from Congress in June having been indicted by the state＇s chief
