FNB dedicates new .park on Main Street

First National Bank of Eldorado has been a landmark in the community for more than a hundred years. On Tuesday, October 9, 2007, the bank's directors, officers and personnel hosted a dedication service at the corner of South Main Street and West Gillis, where the bank's second building formerly stood.

FNB President Hyman Sauer welcomed all in attendance then set about recognizing a number of the present and former officers and directors.

"In December 1906, several men met and started the process to organize The First National Bank of Eldorado," Sauer told a crowd of approximately three hundred people. "Paper work was signed on January 1907 and our first building was built across the street."

Sauer went on to outline FNB's progress from fledgling bank to modern mainstay of the area economy.

"From 1907 to 1909 our first president was Moses McKnight," Sauer said. "He obviously did a good job as we have been able to continue what he started."

Sauer went on to recognize McKnight's grandson, Tom Davis, and greatgrandson Jeff Davis.

McKnight died in 1942.

In all, seven men have served as president of First National Bank of Eldorado. W.B. Silliman, the founder of Eldorado and long-time civic booster, served as the bank's second president from 1909 to 1919.

Silliman was succeeded by J.B. Christian who held the office until 1952. Christian's grandson, Joe Charles Christian was in attendance for Tuesday's ceremony.

Ed Hill served as president from 1952 to 1963 when he was succeeded by Leslie Baker.

Baker's career at FNB spanned more than 50 years. His daughter, Danelle McCormack, also worked at FNB for a number of years. She, too, was in attendance Tuesday.

Jo Ed Hill, son of the bank's fourth president, would become its sixth. He held the office until his retirement in 1994. Jo Ed Hill, his wife Mary Jo, sister Sarah McCravey and niece Jeanne Snelson, were all in attendance.

Hyman Sauer followed Jo Ed Hill as FNB president, the job he continues to hold today.

Other current and former officers, directors and employees recognized during the event included: Ed Meador, Lynn Meador, Raymond Mittel, Frances Peters, Bob Helmers, Steve Chandler, Marta Sue Oliver, Jeanne Snelson and Shirley Joiner.

The event took place in and around a newly completed pavilion located in the new park. Snacks and refreshments were served.

Vice President Mason Vaughan offered his appreciation to Hyman Sauer for his leadership prior to awarding dozens of door prizes.

Participants were encouraged to sign up for the door prizes, which were awarded in three age divisions: children, youth and adults. Judy Christian won the Grand Prize, a large flat-screen televi-

County works on road without bidding job Commissioners learn of case backlog in county court

Schleicher County Judge Johnny Griffin explained to Success reporter Kathy Mankin on Tuesday that he contacted an attorney in regard to adding County Road 300 paving to the county's ongoing paving projects.

The judge said that the project could be added as a change order without calling for bids. However, a review of the state's change order statute reveals that a contract may be amended up or down by no more than 25 percent of its total bid price.

The county's current paving project was bid at \$103,331.20 and previous a change order totaling \$10,437.20 added

County Road 100 to the project. On Monday, September 24, 2007 the commissioners voted to hire 90 West Contractors to make repairs to County Road 300 for the sum of \$60,304.00 despite the fact that the item was not on the agenda. Neither was the subject on the October 9th agenda.

Work on the road has already be-

In other business County Clerk Peggy Williams advised the commissioners of a visit from Jim Merchant with the Department of Public Safety, who pointed out a 33 percent drop in completed criminal cases. The bottleneck is apparently caused by a number of unfiled cases in the County Attorney's office.

Ms. Williams said she has no control over the number of unfiled cases saying that she wanted the commissioners to understand the predicament.

Judge Johnny Griffin also expressed concern about the backlog.

For his part, County Attorney Raymond Loomis' says that cases are being properly handled by his office. The DPS concern is a technical one, he said, involving multiple charges against a single defendant where a case is being held awaiting a disposition or plea arrangement in another case. Loomis continued by saying that the DPS is addressing this matter with a number of other counties and offered his assurance that his office is running more smoothly than when he took office.

EMS representative T.J. Rodriguez spoke to Schleicher County Commissioners about purchasing a new ambulance. According to Rodriguez, the EMS has accumulated \$50,000.00 from past

sales tax revenues given to the organization by the county towards purchasing a new ambulance. Rodriguez told the court he has located a new ambulance for \$121,705. Rodriguez also stated the ambulance that has been with the service the longest would be traded in and that the EMS would be asking the county **SEE COUNTY ON PAGE 6**

Former wife of YFZ leader tells her story

"Escape" a book by Carolyn Jessop, former polygamous wife of YFZ Ranch leader Merril Jessop, was released to the public this week. The book is a dramatic first-person account of life inside the ultra-fundamentalist FLDS church, and one woman's courageous flight to

freedom with her eight children.

Carolyn Jessop says that she was eighteen years old when she was coerced into an arranged marriage with a total stranger: a man thirtytwo years her senior. Merril Jessop already had three wives. But arranged plural marriages were an integral part of the FLDS heritage.

Over the next fifteen years, Carolyn says that she had eight children

and withstood her husband's psychological abuse and the watchful eyes of his other wives who were locked in a constant battle for supremacy.

Carolyn's every move was dictated by her husband's whims, she says. He decided where she lived and how her children would be treated. He controlled the money she earned as a school


teacher. He chose when they had sex. She says she could only refuse—at her peril. For in the FLDS, a wife's compliance with her husband determined how much status both she and her children held in the family.

Miserable for years, Carolyn says she

wanted out but knew that if she tried to leave and got caught, her children would be taken away from her. No woman in the country had ever escaped from the FLDS and managed to get her children out, too. But in 2003, Carolyn chose freedom over fear and fled her home with her eight children. She had \$20 to her name.

"Escape" reveals a world tantamount to a

prison camp, created by religious fanatics who, in the name of God, deprive their followers the right to make choices, force women to be totally subservient to men, and brainwash children in churchrun schools. Against this background, Carolyn Jessop's flight takes on an extraordinary, inspiring power. Not only **SEE ESCAPE ON PAGE 5**

Bush Makes Cuba Criticism Easy

Cuban Foreign Minister Felipe Perez Roque couldn't take President Bush's speech at the U.N. General Assembly, so he walked out.

Cuba's U.N. mission said it was "a sign of the profound rejection of the arrogant and mediocre statement by President Bush." Havana's government-controlled press parroted the statement. "Cuba Condemned Bush's Infamy," said a headline in the newspaper Juventud Rebelde.

What was so infamous?

Bush said: "In Cuba, the long rule of a cruel dictator is nearing



its end. The Cuban people are ready for their freedom. And as that nation enters a period of transition, the United Nations must insist on free speech, free assembly and, ultimately,

free and competitive elections."

If the walkout was a sign of anything, it was a sign of the profound rejection of anything resembling democracy by the Cuban regime.

Cuba is in the privileged company of nations like Burma, Iran and North Korea that consider it offensive to hear that liberty of expression and multiparty elections are good things. In fact, the governing systems in those countries have as their foundational premise the rejection of those political values.

Which explains Perez Roque's anger. By definition, the disappearance of the regime in which he is foreign minister is necessary for Cubans to enjoy basic human rights of expression and political participation. Once that regime disappears he will find himself out of a job or -- who knows? -- on trial.

No wonder he finds unacceptable the mere mention of "free speech" or "competitive elections."

It used to be that in defending itself -- defending the indefensible -- the Cuban regime was reduced to boilerplate.

Cuban individuals who dared utter criticism were gusanos, worms. Those who organized in opposition in the United States were the "Miami Mafia."

Havana also loved to accuse the United States of conducting a "genocidal blockade," making it seem as if the U.S. refusal to trade with Cuba was an act of war, with American warships "blockading" the Cuban coast so that no food and medicine could get in, causing a "genocide" of Cuban citizens.

They still use that kind of propaganda. But now they have another, more powerful weapon, and they don't have to lie.

The Cuban government can now say -- and did say, after the walkout -- that the president of the United States of America authorized torture and tried to hold prisoners indefinitely without

It's what the Cubas and North Koreas of the world have been doing for decades. But when they can say (truthfully!) that the United States does it too, it shifts the attention from their own misdeeds to the misdeeds of the United States.

One of the most disgraceful failures of the Bush administration is that it has taken us to a place where the world's most despotic regimes can accuse the United States of violating basic rights -- and make it stick.

It was one for the ages

A true Dallas Cowboys fan can tell you exactly where he was, and what he had eaten for lunch on the day the Cowboys lost the Ice Bowl to Green Bay in 1967.

To this day I remember watching defensive tackle Jethro Pugh as he tried desperately to carve through the ice with his cleats in hopes of gaining some footing. But, it wasn't meant to be.

Green Bay's center Ken Bowman and right guard Jerry Kramer buried Pugh as quarterback Bart Starr sneaked across the goal line with the game winning touchdown.

That was the 1967 NFL Championship Game, and actually predates the Superbowl.

Then there's the 50 yard TD pass that rookie quarterback Clint Longley threw to Dallas receiver Drew Pearson to win the 1974 Thanksgiving game over the Washington Redskins. Longley was called into action when Cowboys star quarterback Roger Staubach was sidelined with an injury.

The following year, Longley sucker-punched Staubach in the team's locker room and he was promptly traded to San Diego where he sank into obscurity. Meanwhile, Staubach stayed in Dallas until his retirement, earning a place in the NFL Hall of Fame.

Speaking of sucker punches, in 1987 Eagles head coach Buddy Ryan ordered quarterback Randall Cunningham to fake a kneel down at the end of a game the Eagles



were winning handily. Cunningham then lofted a TD pass to run up the score and pour salt on the wounds of Cowboys fans every-

Or, how about the time we learned that Tom Landry, the only coach the Cowboys ever had, up until that point, had been unceremoniously fired by the team's new owner, Jerry Jones.

Let me add here that I have developed a grudging respect for Jones, but I will never forgive him for the way he handled Landry.

Everyone, myself included, knew it was time for Landry to go. In fact, he probably stayed five years longer than he should have. But you simply don't fly in from Arkansas one day, announce to the world that you've bought the Dallas Cowboys then let a legend like Landry learn from TV reporters that he's out of a job.

That was bad form, Jerry Jones, very bad form.

Having said that, however, Jones learned quickly, and his teams hung three Super Bowl banners inside Texas Stadium. That's one more than Landry's teams managed.

Another memorable moment destined to find its way into Cowboy lore was this week's 25-24 come-from-behind win over the Buffalo Bills on Monday Night Football.

Quarterback Tony Romo threw five, count 'em, five interceptions, two of which went for touchdowns. Another of the errant passes lead to a Buffalo field goal. Then, after Dallas managed a field goal of its own, the Bills returned the ensuing kickoff 103 yards for another TD.

But with time winding down, the Cowboys found themselves only down by eight. As he had at the end of the first half, Tony Romo, orchestrated a masterful drive to get within striking distance. Then, he threaded the needle to connect with Patrick Crayton for a touchdown with 20 seconds left.

What followed can only be described as the most frustrating, yet exciting finish I can recall to a Cowboys game. When a two point conversion failed, Dallas was forced to attempt an onside kick, which it miraculously recovered. Then came three passes, two of which were complete and two field goal attempts, both of which were good, but only one of which counted because Bills coach Dick Jauron called a time-out only moments before the first kick attempt was snapped.

Somehow, in defiance of the odds and human reason, the Cowboys pulled out a 25-24 win, to join the ranks of unforgettable Cowboys moments.



A Long Time on the School Board

Tommy McMullan has been a school board member longer than anyone else in Texas.

"This will be my 55th year," says Tommy. "I've been on it since 52."

He is on the school board in the Liberty County town of Devers. The district has 164 students in grades kindergarten thru 8th. Tommy knows all the students and calls them by name when he makes his weekly visit to the school.

"I don't go over there to check on anything or anybody," says Tommy. "I just go to see the kids. Most of them will hug me when they see me. I just brag on them and tell them what a good job they're doing in school. And they are. I'm telling them the truth. In the last ten years we've got an exemplary rating four times. We would have made it this year if one more student had passed the statewide test."

Tommy loves to visit with the kindergarten kids.

"I go in and read with them.



They start reading early in our little school. I sit down with them and listen to them and help them if they need it."

Tommy, a retired rice farmer, has lived in Devers (population 416) all his life.

"I went to school in Devers and I finished here. We had a high school. The school was built in 1932. We didn't have running water. We had a big ole round potbellied stove in each room."

The district has three buildings now. The newest one bears Tommy's name. Some time ago, Tommy had heart surgery and was recuperating in a nursing home. He had some visitors.

"Two school buses full of kids came to see me. I hugged every one of them."

Tommy has had few opponents in his 17 school board elections and he's not planning to step down anytime soon. The average length of time someone spends on a school board is about six years. He has served continuously since 1952. The state legislature recognized him when he reached the 50 year mark on the board.

Police don't patrol the halls in the Devers schools. The town's mayor, Edna Johnson, is the cafeteria cook.

"She's the best cook in Devers," says Tommy. Tommy got in trouble when he was in the first grade.

"We had rest time every day. Miss Wise was my teacher. I was running around and wouldn't lie down, so she tied me to a big pine tree outside. And why my mother came up to school that day I don't know. She just walked right past me and never said a word. So I stayed tied to the pine tree for a while. Everything I got in school I deserved."

TYC moves inmates from troubled facility

AUSTIN — The Texas Youth Commission removed 197 male inmates confined at the Coke County Juvenile Justice Center in Bronte and transferred them to other facilities on Oct. 2.

Recent audits of the facility, near San Angelo, operated by the pri

vate firm GEO Group Inc raised concerns about the safety and welfare of inmates.

On Oct. 1 TYC acting executive director Dimitria Pope determined the

facility was in an advanced state of disrepair, that programming and rehabilitation efforts were not being pursued, and the overall health and safety of the youth housed there were in jeopardy. She ordered the transfer of the youths.

The state canceled its \$8 million annual contract with GEO Group and an investigation has begun.

Disaster declaration is approved

President George W. Bush on Oct. 3 approved a federal disaster declaration for Bexar, Harris, Jones, Kendall, Medina and Taylor counties to help address severe flooding and wind damage caused by Tropical Storm Erin.

The declaration covers damages incurred Aug. 14-20, when a foot or more of rainfall was recorded in portions of the state, contributing to six deaths, plus road closures, flooded homes and more than 100 high-water rescues.

Gov. Rick Perry on Oct. 3 said individuals and families who are not covered by insurance can apply for financial assistance, temporary housing, tax relief, legal services, crisis counseling and unemployment assistance.

President vetoes kids' health bill

President Bush on Oct. 3 carried through on his promise to veto legislation he said would be too costly and would have made health coverage available to families that are not needy

The federal SCHIP bill was crafted to increase funding for state children's health insurance programs and expand it to cover more families that make too much money to qualify for Medicaid but still cannot afford health insur-

Funding for SCHIP under the vetoed bill would have totaled \$35 billion over five years. The president has an alternative plan that would increase current funding by \$5 billion over

Members of the U.S. House are counting votes to see if there are enough to override Bush's veto.

Texas ranks lowest among the 50 states in making health care available to its poorer citizens.

Texas awards first wind leases

The Texas General Land Office on Oct. 2 awarded the first four bid leases for offshore wind power in U.S. history.

"The Texas Wind Rush is on, and the pioneers are staking their claims," Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson

The leases, awarded to Louisianabased Wind Energy Systems Technology, allow work to begin on the construction of meteorological testing towers on the tracts.

Once the wind farms are operational, the lessee will pay the state's Permanent School Fund a minimum of \$132 million over the 30-year life of the leases.

The additional thirteen cents is "equalized" by the State. School districts are guaranteed that each penny of local tax will be "enriched" to a certain level. This thirteen cents would result in approximately \$70,000 in additional STATE FUNDS for the district. There is no "equalization" for tax levied for bond issues.

Again, we would like to state that our goal in acquiring this additional revenue is to do the very best we can to provide adequate, safe, and durable facilities for our students that, at the very least, conform to all current Code Regulations.

When taxpayers ask why the district specifically needs this revenue, the answer is that it is time to REINVEST IN OUR FACILITIES and this is most cost-effective way to do it.


