

Sales tax receipts reveal economic growth

AUSTIN — Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said last Friday the state collected \$1.85 billion in sales tax in August, up 12.7 percent compared to a

"When the state's 2007 fiscal year ended August 31, sales tax collections totaled \$20.1 billion, 10.9 percent higher than in fiscal 2006," Combs said.

Combs distributed \$447.3 million in September sales tax payments to local governments, a 10.4 percent increase compared to September 2006. So far this calendar year, local sales tax allocations are up 7 percent compared to the same period in 2006.

Locally, the increases are considerably better. The City of Eldorado received \$11,306.79 this month, a 22.12 percent increase over the \$9,258.19 payment received just a year ago. Year-todate the city has received \$112,510.92, up 53.74 percent over the same period

Schleicher County's sales tax payment also grew, coming in at \$16,392.81, a 22.77 percent increase over the \$13,352.34 payment received in 2006. So far this year, the county has received \$157,712.58 in sales tax payments, as compared to last year's \$142,847.84.

Schleicher County also levies a half-cent Health Services Tax, with which it funds the ambulance service. This month the Health Services Tax brought in \$17,999.86, up 35.33 percent over the same month last year. In all, the Health Services Tax has generated \$156,270.90 this year, a 10.13 percent increase over the 2006 year-to-date total of \$141,891.65.

Controller Combs sent September sales tax allocations of \$302.9 million to Texas cities, up 9.1 percent compared to September 2006. Calendar year-todate, city sales tax revenues are running 7.1 percent higher than last year. Texas counties received September sales tax allocations of \$27.3 million, up 12.1 percent compared to a year ago. Calendar year-to-date, county sales tax allocations are 8.2 percent higher than last year.

The 122 special purpose taxing districts around the state received \$15.1 million in sales tax revenue, an increase of 34 percent compared to a year ago. So far this calendar year, sales tax allocations to special purpose districts are up 17.7 percent compared to 2006. Ten Texas transit systems received \$101.9 million in September sales tax payments, up 10.7 percent compared to a year ago. Year-to-date, transit sales tax revenues are up 4.9 percent.

September's sales tax allocations include local sales taxes collected in July and reported to the Comptroller in August. The Comptroller's next local sales tax allocation will be made on Friday, Oct. 12.

Water district sets tax rate

The Plateau Underground Water Conservation & Supply District held a budget hearing Sept 6 to approve a budget for Fiscal Year 2008, and to set the FY 2008

The budget was set at \$96,225, and the tax rate at \$.02500 per \$100 valuation. The new rate is down over 16% from last year's \$.03000. Present at the hearing were Board President Sambo Henderson, and Directors Ronnie Sauer, Lynn Griffin, and Ray Ballew.

The District office is in the Schleicher County Annex Building, 203 SW Main St., and remains available for water quality testing for anyone in Schleicher County.

Prosecution rests its case in Jeffs rape trial

Defense attorneys launch rebuttal

Warren Jeffs, embattled prophet of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints finally got his day in court this week, as the State of Utah pressed its allegations that Jeffs was an accomplice to rape.

Prosecutors, including Washington County Attorney Brock Belknap, elicited testimony from a woman identified only as Jane Doe 4 in which she alleged that she had been forced into a marriage against her will when she was only 14. The woman, now 21, says she was married to her 19-year-old cousin by Warren Jeffs despite her repeated pleas not to be married.

Jeffs later urged her to be submissive to her new husband after she refused to have sexual relations with him, Ms. Doe said in sworn testimony.

Doe said she viewed Jeffs as a spiritual leader and believed her salvation was dependent upon following his

Two of Doe's sisters also testified, saying that they urged the girl not to go through with the marriage but that they could not prevent the union ordered by Jeffs, who was then second in command within the FLDS church to his ailing father, then prophet Rulon Jeffs.

Before resting their case, prosecutors played a half-hour audio recording of a sermon in which Jeffs and fellow church member Sam Barlow addressed underage marriages among FLDS members and the extent to which legal authorities would go to prevent or interfere with the marriages.

While Jeffs and his FLDS church openly promote the practice of polygamy, or plural marriage, the charges facing the prophet in the Utah courtroom involve a monogamous relationship. The age of the bride at the time of the marriage is the primary issue in the case and whether or not she consented to have sex with the man she claims she was forced to marry.

Defense attorneys quickly attacked that notion Tuesday afternoon as they got the chance to offer their case. Several witnesses testified on the prophet's behalf, including Jennie Pipkin, who told the jury that she went to Jeffs to complain that she no longer wanted to have sexual relations with her husband.

Pipkin explained that after having five children with her husband, she grew tired of his attention and went to Jeffs to complain. She noted that Jeffs told her it should be the woman's role in a marriage to determine if and when to have sexual relations.

Pipkin said that when her husband continued to pressure her for sex she complained again to Jeffs. This time, she said, the prophet granted her a divorce.

On cross examination Pipkin told prosecutors that she was not aware of any cases in which Jeffs granted a divorce before a marriage produced children.

Other witnesses appearing Tuesday included Ben Thomas, Margaret Thomas, John Keate, Joanna Keate, Charlotte Jessop, Christine Shapley, Merril Shapley and Verleen Jessop, all of them testifying in defense of Jeffs.


At press time on Tuesday the trial continued with a number of people on the defense witness list remaining to be

Several persons whose names appear on the prosecution's witness list were never called, leading some courtroom observers to speculate that they might be called as rebuttal witnesses.

Also on Tuesday it was revealed that Jane Doe 4, the alleged victim in the case, was seeking a \$1 million settlement in a civil case she has brought against Jeffs, the FLDS church and the United Effort Plan trust. The UEP, once the financial arm of Jeffs' church, was taken over by the court when it was determined that Jeffs and his lieutenants were looting it for their own benefit.

Doe's settlement offer would pay her legal bills and establish a \$1 million "M.J. Fund" to provide food, shelter and other emergency assistance to people displaced from FLDS dominated communities with a special emphasis placed






It's time to draw the line

The now-infamous Moveon.org ad -- "General Petraeus or General Betray Us" -- marks a potential watershed in U.S. political discourse. A radical-left interest group has undertaken to accuse our military leadership of treason for working towards victory in the war against Islamic terrorists.

The open question now is -- will the majority Congressional party continue to tacitly endorse this scurrilous tactic by its most activist supporters, or will this defamation be repudiated? We are about to find out.

The ad in the New York Times defamed a highly respected, highly decorated four star General who has dedicated his life to serving our country. The assault had a specific purpose. It was designed to discredit Gen. David Petraeus in advance of a congressionally ordered report on the situation in Iraq. Gen. Petraeus, while stressing that much work remains, delivered good news about the progress we're making in the

war against Islamic terrorists and rooting out al

For a century or more, as political leaders of both parties have robustly debated defense policy, they have demonstrated the wisdom to avoid personal attacks on the integrity and honor of our military leadership in the field.

But this assault on Gen. Petraeus thus far appears to have the tacit support of one of our major political parties. Most of their members have gone to great lengths to avoid repudiating the ad.

In fact, there is substantial evidence that some members of that party are using Moveon.org as their public hit man, to do the dirty work of character assassination in public while elected officials pretend their hands are clean. On the eve of Gen. Petraeus's appearance before Congress last week, one unnamed Democratic Senator was quoted as saying, "No one wants to call [Petraeus] a liar on national TV.

The expectation is that the outside groups will do this for us." A highly sympathetic profile of an anti-war coalition in the New York Times Sunday Magazine Sept. 9 underscored the close working relationship between the group, including Moveon. org representatives, with Congressional leadership offices -- unnamed, of course.

Shortly after the advertisement appeared, I sponsored a resolution supporting Gen. Petraeus, condemning character assassination of our active duty military leaders and repudiating the Moveon. org ad. The majority leadership made certain the resolution did not receive a vote on the Senate floor

This stratagem is unusual in several ways. Why would a legislative majority be a party to shooting a messenger for bringing them good news? One possible answer -- reports of progress in Iraq are not good news to some in Congress, particularly those who have publicly declared we've already been defeated there.

The Petraeus testimony was especially revealing in checking the anti-war movement's credibility. For months, groups such as Moveon.org have tried to

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What would MacArthur think of Korea today?

My father was in Korea when the cease fire was signed and the opposing armies settled in on either side of the DMZ or demilitarized zone. That was in 1953. Since that day, there have been few if any steps taken by North or South Korea to bring about a lasting peace. and more than a few steps taken in the opposite direction.

Most notable is North Korea's unwillingness to abandon its failed socialistic system and adopt capitalism, the free market dynamo that has powered the U.S., Europe, Japan and even South Korea to unprecedented prosperity.

Meanwhile, as its neighbor churns out manufactured goods ranging from TV sets to automobiles and computers to gigantic oil tankers, North Korea remains mired in poverty. Unable even to feed its own people, and unwilling to learn from history, the leaders in Pyongyang continue to recite the Communist party line and blame everyone else, but especially South Korea and the United States, for their problems.

But dire situations tend to inspire ingenious, if not risky solutions, much like the one North Korea developed over the course of a decade and a half...thermonuclear extortion.

Kim Jong-il, Chairman of North Korea's National Defense Commission, Supreme Com-



mander of the Korean People's Army, and General Secretary of the Worker's Party of Korea, has become a master at the game of thermonuclear extortion.

Kim's oft demonstrated willingness to take the world to the brink of disaster, only to back down when faced with towering piles of American and European cash, has made him a wealthy man.

So far, three American presidents, two British prime ministers and a couple of French chancellors have fallen victim to Kim's intercontinental ballistic diplomacy.

But the game is wearing thin and now North Korea is implicated in a plot to supply not only the Iranians, but also the Syrians, with nuclear technology.

I can't help but wonder if President Bush, who has demonstrated a willingness, perhaps even an eagerness, to spend every percentage point of his popularity, might be ready to cash-in what little he has left for a couple of preemptive strikes.

My father was in Korea when General Douglas MacArthur announced to the troops that they would be having Christmas Dinner in Peking, China.

President Truman, who was still struggling with the results of his 1945 decision to drop atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, wasn't willing to risk a nuclear war with Russia. Fearing that MacArthur's plan might just trigger such a war, he fired the general and replaced him with Matthew Ridgeway, a general who would be willing to fight a "limited war" on the Korean peninsula.

Truman's decision resulted in stalemate and ultimately the 1953 cease fire that allowed my father to come home, but left the fate of the Korea for others to decide. Now, more than a half-century later, the world is living with the legacy of Truman's decision.

To put things in historical perspective, General MacArthur's father, Arthur, won the Congressional Meal of Honor while fighting in the American Civil War where rifles and bayonets were the weapons of choice. His son, Douglas received the same Medal of Honor during World War II and was my father's first commander in Korea where the fear of nuclear weapons resulted in entrenched armies fighting pitched battles with rifles and bayonets.

Hurricane strikes 3 **Texas counties**

AUSTIN - Gov. Rick Perry on Sept. 13 declared Orange, Jefferson and Galveston counties a disaster area resulting from Hurricane Humberto.

Gov. Perry ordered state agency and military resources and personnel to the

State Capital

area before the storm hit. Relief TEXAS PRESS workers delivered generators, water and ice to stricken areas.

Humberto took only 18 hours to develop from a tropical depression into a Category

1 hurricane with sustained wind speeds in excess of 85 mph and heavy rains.

No tropical cyclone on record ever reached the intensity of Humberto at a faster rate near landfall, the National Hurricane Center reported. After striking Texas, the weather system moved across Louisiana and Mississippi and into Alabama.

Entergy Texas, a major power provider in 26 counties including the three in the disaster zone, reported power outages to 118,019 customers.

Seventy-two hours after Humberto struck the coast, Entergy said power restoration to customers was almost complete. A widely reported early estimate of damages caused by the hurricane came to about \$500 million.

The Texas Department of Insurance urged residents affected by the hurricane to call the consumer hotline, 1-800-252-3439 for answers to stormrelated insurance questions.

Border security council is formed

Gov. Perry appointed 11 members to the newly created Texas Border Security Council to serve at his plea-

The council was created by Senate Bill 11 of the 80th Legislature.

The council's job will be to devise performance standards, reporting reguirements, audit methods and other procedures for homeland security fund allocation and use.

Council members include the presiding officer Cameron County Judge Carlos Cascos of Brownville, Brewster County Judge Val Clark Beard, Hudspeth County Judge Becky Dean-Walker, Victoria County Sheriff T. Michael O'Connor, Maverick County Sheriff Tomas S. Herrera, Secretary of State Phil Wilson, Texas Commission on Environmental Quality Commissioner Buddy Garcia and Public Safety Commission member Allan Polunsky.

Three private businessmen, Fred Burton of Austin, Scott A. McLaughlin of El Paso, and Robert Braxton Holt of Midland, also were appointed to the council by Perry.

"Texans understand there can be no homeland security without border security," said Perry. "The members of the Border Security Council will play an important role in reinforcing the state's efforts to strengthen the safety and security of Texas."

More minorities take AP exams

The Texas Education Agency reported minority students represented 52 percent of all Advanced Placement test takers in Texas in 2007.

Fifty percent of those who took the test in 2006 identified themselves as minorities. In 2002, the figure was 45 percent.

High school students who score highly on AP exams can earn college credit for courses, saving their families thousands of dollars in tuition costs and giving students a head start on a college education, the TEA reported.


Cruising the Baltic

In an effort to stretch out summer as long as we can, we usually plan a trip in late August. This time we went to Russia.

The flight from Dallas to Amsterdam was about nine hours. There we boarded Holland America's Prinsendam and left for a two week voyage to the Baltic. We cruised along the Kiel Canal, one of the most fascinating bodies of water I've ever seen. It is the world's busiest artificial waterway, linking the North Sea with the Baltic.

The Kiel is barely wide enough for the Prinsendam, one of the few ships small enough to navigate the unique waterway. It must be a real treat for the people living along the 60-mile body of water to see a cruise ship in their little canal. All along the route, crowds of people were waving at us. A trumpet player in a small sailboat serenaded us. It was a festive event, with spectators in tents and umbrellas, lined up on top of hills.

We visited Rostock, Germany, a large, busy, picturesque city, with architecture very reminiscent of Amsterdam. Most of Rostock's downtown is pedestrian only, no cars. The town square was busy



with booths selling all kinds of merchandise. We climbed a tall lighthouse in nearby Warnmunde, a resort city. I saw a teenager with bright green spiked hair. His legs were tattooed in a leopard pat-

The real purpose of the trip was to visit Riga, Latvia. My wife's grandmother came from there. Riga is a beautiful city with ancient buildings, some of which are in need of repair. The city, like so many cities in Eastern Europe, is still recovering from World War Two. But rebuilding is occurring. We saw lots of construction

The port at St Petersburg, Russia (where my father-in-law sailed out of Russia in 1912) is not too pretty. Tons of ship-loading equipment and thousands of containers are on wharves that go on forever. The city has lots of canals and is

known as the Venice of the North. We visited the Hermitage, which has the second largest art collection in the world. The feeling of oppression we had in Russia left when we reached Helsinki. It is a lively, modern city with little war damage. It has a wonderful freespirit feeling.

Changing of the guard in Stockholm is an hour and a half spectacle featuring a band on horseback, jumping soldiers and a parade of blue-uniformed men and women wearing polished silver helmets.

The most charming place we visited was Visby, a walled Swedish town on a small island called Gotland (good land). Narrow cobblestone streets meander between colorful houses with flower boxes. We arrived there early when it was quiet, serene and peaceful. The water was calm. Concrete statues of rams are throughout the city.

We met friends in Copenhagen and had our pictures made by the statue of the Little Mermaid in the harbor. We sailed on a fiord in Norway and saw ski-jump high on a mountain. What a way to say goodbye to summer.

Law and order comes to Eldorado

Henry J.Y. Mills was the first sheriff of Schleicher County. His opponent was Tom Palmer, and he beat Tom by three votes.

Mills came to Schleicher County when he was about twenty-seven years old. He worked for Sam Henderson, and lived at Kickapoo. Sam paid him \$25 a month until a well driller came along and offered him \$50 a month. Sam raised his pay to \$30 a month, but he was elected sheriff, and had to quit anyway.

Mills served as sheriff during the land rush days, and helped change the law to end this unfair procedure.

There is a pistol in the Whitehead Memorial Museum that was loaned by the Mills family. The pistol was taken from an outlaw in Eldorado. The pistol is one of the very early guns made by Sam Colt for the U.S. Army. It was an old "cap and ball" pistol.

The Texas Rangers notified Mills that some outlaws would County, and he was to arrest them.




CDC states: People with diabetes are about three times more likely to die from influenza (flu) and pneumonia than those without diabetes, yet more than half of people with diabetes did not get a flu shot in a recent year. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) encourages people with diabetes to get a flu shot before the flu season, which generally runs November through

"People may be unaware that diabetes can make their immune system more vulnerable to severe complications from flu including death," said Dr. Frank Vinicor, director of the Division of Diabetes Translation at CDC. "A flu shot is an easy, safe, and preventive measure that people with diabetes should take to protect themselves from the risks associated with the flu."

"Flu shots do not contain a live virus so they cannot cause the flu," said Tamara Kicera, deputy chief for program development and evaluation, Adult Vaccine Preventable Diseases Branch of the CDC's National Immunization Program. "Getting a flu shot is essential for people with diabetes. For other people, such as family members of people with diabetes, the shot not only protects them from the flu, it can help them avoid passing the flu along to their loved ones. A flu shot can be a good idea for anyone who wants to reduce their risk of illness, but people with chronic diseases should be sure to ask their doctor about this vaccination."

CDC also recommends that people with diabetes receive a pneumoccal polysaccharide vaccine to protect against the most common form of pneumonia because they are at greater risk for several comorbidity factors including heart disease and renal failure. Annually, 10,000 to 30,000 people with diabetes die from complications resulting from flu and pneumonia.



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



BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 2007

PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 103)

HJR 103 would update the constitutional reference to Angelo State University to conform with the statutory transfer of that institution from membership in the Texas State University System to membership in the Texas Tech University System.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the continuation of the constitutional appropriation for facilities and other capital items at Angelo State University on a change in the governance of the university."

PROPOSITION 2 (SJR 57)

SJR 57 would authorize the legislature to permit the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to college and university students, and to enter into bond enhancement agreements

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$500 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students and authorizing bond enhancement agreements with respect to general obligation bonds issued for that purpose."

> PROPOSITION 3 (HJR 40)

HJR 40 would authorize the legislature to limit the maximum appraised value of a residence homestead for property tax purposes in a tax year to the lesser of the most recent appraisal valuation, or 110 percent, or a greater percentage as determined by the legislature, of the appraised value in the preceding tax year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide that the maximum appraised value of a residence homestead for ad valorem taxation is limited to the lesser of the most recent market value of the residence homestead as determined by the appraisal entity or 110 percent, or a greater percentage, of the appraised value of the residence homestead for the preceding tax year."

> **PROPOSITION 4** (SJR 65)

SJR 65 would authorize the legislature to permit the Texas Public Finance Authority to issue up to \$1 billion in general obligation

bonds, the proceeds of which would be dedicated to maintenance, construction, repairs, and equipment purchases, as authorized by the legislature for the following state agencies: the Texas Building and Procurement Commission; the Parks and Wildlife Department; the Department of the Adjutant General; the Department of State Health Services; the Department of Aging and Disability Services; the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired; the Texas Youth Commission; the Texas Historical Commission; the Texas Department of Criminal Justice; the Texas School for the Deaf; and the Texas Department of Public

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1 billion in bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for maintenance, improvement, repair, and construction projects and for the purchase of needed equipment."

> PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 44)

SJR 44 would authorize the legislature to permit cities with a population of less than 10,000 to hold an election to allow the city to enter into an agreement with a property owner to temporarily freeze taxes on property either in or adjacent to an area approved for funding under the Downtown Revitalization Program or the Main Streets Improvements Program administered by the Department of Agriculture.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit the voters of a municipality having a population of less than 10,000 to authorize the governing body of the municipality to enter into an agreement with an owner of real property in or adjacent to an area in the municipality that has been approved for funding under certain programs administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture under which the parties agree that all ad valorem taxes imposed on the owner's property may not be increased for the first five tax years after the tax year in which the agreement is entered into."

> PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 54)

HJR 54 would authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem tax one motor vehicle owned by an individual that is used by the individual for both business and per-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation one motor vehicle owned by an individual and used in the course of the owner's occupation or profession and also for personal activities of the owner."

> **PROPOSITION 7** (HJR 30)

HJR 30 would allow a governmental entity to sell property acquired through eminent domain to its immediately previous owner at the original purchase price, if the public use of the property has been canceled, if no progress is made toward that public use by a prescribed deadline, or if the property is unnecessary to accomplish that public use.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow governmental entities to sell property acquired through eminent domain back to the previous owners at the price the entities paid to acquire the property."

> PROPOSITION 8 (HJR 72)

HJR 72 would clarify home equity loan procedures and protections and make conforming changes to the written disclosure provided to the borrower at the loan closing. The amendment would establish that the status of whether property is an agricultural homestead for the purpose of receiving homestead protection, would be determined by whether it was designated for agricultural use on the date of the loan closing. The amendment would provide that a declared state of emergency (e.g., following a natural disaster) would justify execution of a second home equity loan on the same property less than one year after the first home equity loan. It would provide that non-substantive omissions on a loan application would not affect the agreement. It would require a borrower to receive a copy of all executed loan documents, and a disclosure list of fees and costs at closing. It would prohibit the use of preprinted checks for the use of unsolicited loan advances to obtain a home equity line of credit.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to clarify certain provisions relating to the making of a home equity loan and use of home equity loan pro-

> PROPOSITION 9 (SJR 29)

SJR 29 would authorize the legislature to exempt all or part of the market value of the residence homesteads of veterans certified as having a service-connected 100 percent the progression of property tax exemptions available to veterans who are less than 100

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt all or part of the residence homesteads of certain totally disabled veterans from ad valorem taxation and authorizing a change in the manner of determining the amount of the existing exemption from ad valorem taxation to which a disabled veteran is entitled."

> **PROPOSITION 10** (HJR 69)

HJR 69 would remove constitutional references to the former office of inspector of hides and animals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the constitutional authority for the office of inspector of hides and animals."

> PROPOSITION 11 (HJR 19)

HJR 19 would require a vote taken in either house of the legislature to be recorded by record vote, if the vote was on final passage of a bill, other than local bills, a resolution proposing a constitutional amendment, or any other resolution that is not purely ceremonial. The record vote must be archived and available for public viewing on the Internet for at least two years.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to require that a record vote be taken by a house of the legislature on final passage of any bill, other than certain local bills, of a resolution proposing or ratifying a constitutional amendment, or of any other nonceremonial resolution, and to provide for public access on the Internet to those record votes."

> **PROPOSITION 12** (SJR 64)

SJR 64 would authorize the Texas Transportation Commission to issue up to \$5 billion in general obligation bonds for highway improvement projects, the proceeds of which will be used to pay for projects, costs, and payments owed under related credit agreements.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds by the Texas Transportation Commission in an amount not to exceed \$5 billion to provide funding for highway improvement

PROPOSITION 13

HJR 6 would authorize the denial of bail to a person who violates conditions of release

in a family violence case and permit the legislature to authorize the denial of bail to a person who violates certain court orders in

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the denial of bail to a person who violates certain court orders or conditions of release in a felony or family violence case."

> **PROPOSITION 14** (HJR 36)

HJR 36 would limit a state justice or judge's service to December 31st of the fourth year of the term if he/she is elected to all or part of a six year term, and reaches mandatory retirement age during the first four years of

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting a justice or judge who reaches the mandatory retirement age while in office to serve the remainder of the justice's or judge's current term."

PROPOSITION 15

HJR 90 would require the legislature to establish the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas, and would provide for its management, duties, and powers. It would authorize the issuance of up to \$3 billion in general obligation bonds to be used for operations and grants for the purpose of scientific research of all forms of human

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring the creation of the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas and authorizing the issuance of up to \$3 billion in bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for research in Texas to find the causes of and cures for cancer."

> **PROPOSITION 16** (SJR 20)

SJR 20 would authorize the issuance of up to \$250 million in general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board to provide financial assistance to economically distressed areas of the state to help provide adequate sewer and water supply services for residential use.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$250 million to provide assistance to economically distressed areas."
