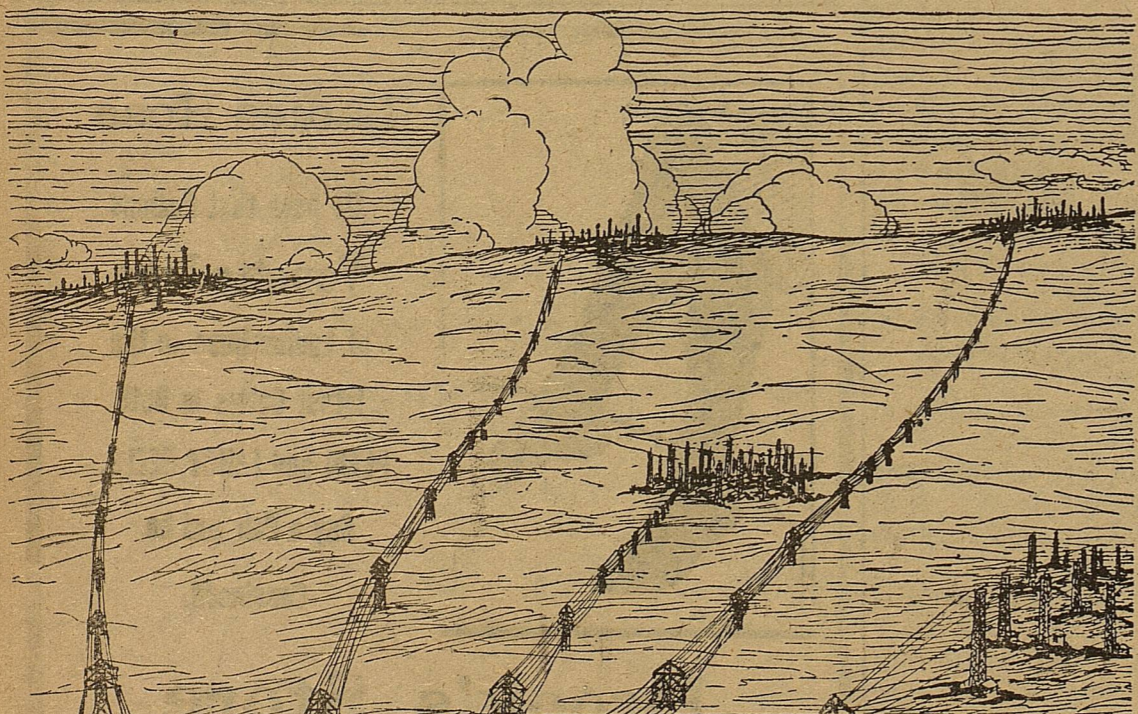

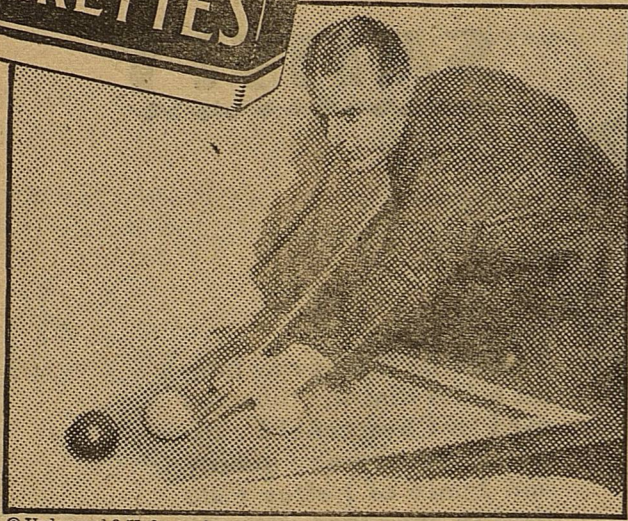

HISTORY SCHLEICHER COUNTY.

(By Alvin Luedecke.)

of John C Page and Miss Kate E. Miller, Dec. 25, 1901. The ceremony was performed by Y. F. Bamett (17).

The first birth registered in Schleicher county is that of Mary Sutton, born April 4, 1903. The second is that of Willie Hinyard, born April 7, 1903. (18)

Although these are the first registered, it is thought that Agnes West was the first child born in Schleicher county.

The report of the Attorney General of Texas in 1904, shows that in Schleicher county there were two indictments, three trials, one acquittal, two convictions, and \$15.00 imposed and collected in fines. (19)

There are 887,670 acres of land in Schleicher county. Of this there were 222,714 acres of improved land in farms in 1925. In 1925 there were 2,602 horses, 583 mules, 30,326 head of cattle, and 1,460 hogs in the county. (20)

The population of Schleicher county in 1890 was 155, in 1900-515, in 1910-1,893, in 1920-2000 and in 1925-2450. (21)

Schleicher county is one of the most fertile cotton producing areas of Southwest Texas. The first bale was raised by Mr. Garvin in 1904. (22)

The production of cotton became so great that it became necessary for the establishment of a gin. The gin was built by the McCormick brothers. After the people could get their cotton ginned without going to San Angelo, they improved more land and planted more cotton. In 1920 there were 2,800 bales ginned and in 1927, 3,300 bales ginned. (23)

Schleicher county has produced 28,700 bales of cotton and has prospects of becoming the leading cotton county of West Texas.

Schleicher county produces enough feed to feed all its stock as a general rule. Very little feed has been bought in other counties for use in Schleicher county except during the drouth of 1917 and 1918.

The history of newspapers of Schleicher county is very interesting. The first paper edited in Schleicher county was "The Eldorado Paper", first copy of which was printed Dec 1, 1902. Its editor was R. L. Corathers. It was a small paper four columns wide and 12-1/2 inches long. It was chiefly advertising and contained peppy boostings of Schleicher county. (24)

On July 1, 1906 "The Eldorado Paper" was sold to A. T. Wright, and the first issue of the "Success" was printed July 6, 1906. This was also a small paper, five columns wide and 16 inches long, until 1920 when it was enlarged to fill the demand for more space. The subscription on July 1, 1906 was 225, and at present (1927) it is 450. (25)

"The Eldorado Times" was a small paper printed by four different editors: Champey; Goodson; Bennett and Rains. The paper was published mainly on account of political disputes and its work was supervised by the Eldorado State Bank. "The Eldorado Times" was first printed Sept. 21, 1907 and lasted about four years. (26)

The following men served on the first grand jury in Schleicher county: J. W. Alexander, Robert Bailey, C. C. West, H. J. Sanders, John Earnest, J. H. Barkley, D. E. DeLong, J. M. Stone, Geo. Tisdale, Tom Miller, J. F. Marchinson and J. E. Mills. They gave bond to Nat Borton and Jeff Crump, who were accused of theft of hogs. These men were later tried by another jury and acquitted. (27)

The present court house of Schleicher county is made of

rock taken from a pasture about three miles north of Eldorado. It is two stories high and has four room offices on the ground floor. The court room, with a seating capacity of about 250, and two other small rooms for use of Grand Jury are on the second floor. The total cost of the court house and furnishings was \$62,500. The court room seats and desks cost \$1775.75; printing material and county records cost \$1089.03; and filing cases and metal works cost \$1072.50. (28)

The first case of court to be tried in the court room of the present court house, was that of the two negroes Gideon Birdwell and Walter Thompson, who stole a Dodge touring car from Bert Page. The following men were on the Grand Jury: W. B. Baker, foreman, J. B. Sammon, O. Suddeth, Chas. Mund, Sam McGennis, Edgar Spencer, Ed Finigan, Tom Henderson, W. W. Barber, and Joe Williams. These were cases no 79 and 80. The men were found guilty and given a two years sentence. (29)

The Schleicher county jail is a stone building situated in the corner of the public square near the court house. It is two stories high with two large cells divided into several small ones. A run-around and two other rooms are on the second floor. The old bangmans hole and trap door are near the stairs. The four rooms down-stairs are made for the sheriff and his family but also have iron bars over the windows. These four rooms were used for a court house before the new one was built. It was in one of these rooms that Ola May Watson was born during the time that her father was sheriff. (30)

There are four distinct churches in Eldorado. The Baptist church, situated one block north of the post office, is probably the largest. It is an old building with a seating capacity of about 200. The Baptist people are trying to raise money to begin the construction of a new church building (31).

The Methodist church, near the school building, is also an old building, built on an old style, with a seating capacity of about 250 (32).

The Presbyterian church is a new brick building, although not extra large, situated Southwest of the public square. It has a seating capacity of about 200.

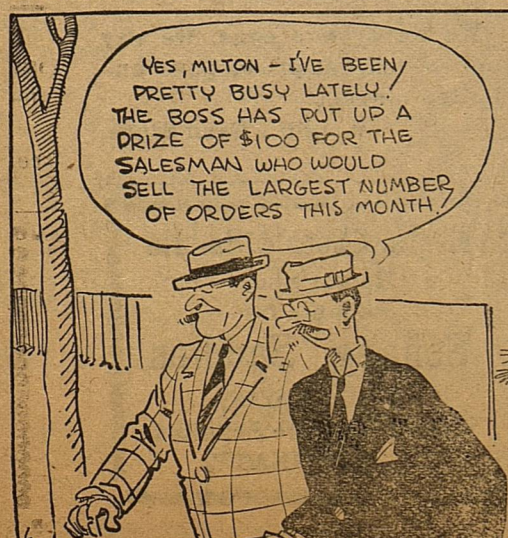

Lesson for April 8

THE RESURRECTION OF JESUS CHRIST (EASTER LESSON)

LESSON TEXT—Mark 16:1-20.
GOLDEN TEXT—Because I live ye shall live also.

PRIMARY TOPIC—Jesus Comes to Life Again.

JUNIOR TOPIC—Christ Rises from the Grave.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Jesus, Our Living Leader.

YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Power of the Resurrection.

- I. The Ministry of Love (vv. 1-4).**
 - By whom (v. 1). Mary Magdalene, the mother of James and Salome. They brought sweet spices with which to anoint Him.
 - When? (v. 2). Early in the morning of the first day of the week.
 - Their perplexity (vv. 3, 4). They questioned as to who should roll away the large stone from the mouth of the tomb. To their surprise they found the stone removed.
 - The Angel in the Tomb (vv. 5-8). Jesus knew that these women would come to the sepulcher with perplexed and unbelieving hearts so He had an angel waiting there to announce to them the fact of His resurrection. Note the angel's message:
 - "Be not afraid" (v. 6).
 - "Ye seek Jesus of Nazareth who was crucified" (v. 6). This threefold designation with marvelous clearness shows (1) His humanity—Jesus, (2) Lowly residence—Nazareth, (3) Ignominious death—crucified.
 - "He is risen; He is not here. Behold the place where they laid Him" (v. 6). These words throw light upon His birth, humility and shameful death. He who was born in lowly circumstances and suffered the shameful death on the cross, is now the conqueror of death. His resurrection gives meaning to His death. "If Christ be not risen your faith is vain, ye are yet in your sins" (1 Cor. 15:17).
 - "Go your way, tell His disciples and Peter" (v. 7). As soon as it was known that Christ was risen from the dead they were to tell it to the disciples. The disciples all needed this blessed news, but Peter especially, since He had utterly denied Him.
 - "He goeth before you into Galilee, there shall ye see Him" (v. 7). Christ had told the disciples that He would rise from the dead and meet them in Galilee, but their unbelief kept them from this blessed truth.
- III. The Appearances of the Risen Christ (vv. 9-14).**

These appearances had as their object the restoration of the disciples from their awful failure and discouragement and convincing them without a peradventure of a doubt of Christ's resurrection. Since His resurrection was to be the central theme of apostolic preaching, it was necessary that they have a certainty of knowledge as to this matter (Acts 1:3). Without the resurrection of Christ His death would be meaningless. Out of the ten or more appearances, Mark selects three.

- To Mary Magdalene (vv. 9-11). Mary's heart responded to the Savior who had graciously delivered her from demons. Her sufferings were no doubt terrible. She was first at the tomb; her devotion was amply rewarded by being first to meet the risen Lord. Though her faith was weak she went at once and told the story to the disciples.
- To two disciples on the way to Emmaus (vv. 12, 13). Luke gives full particulars concerning this appearance (Luke 24:13-25). Jesus had walked, talked and eaten with them.
- The eleven disciples (v. 14). Christ appeared to them while sitting at meat and reproved them for their unbelief. The fact that they steadfastly resisted the testimony that Christ had risen, and yet afterward were willing to risk their lives in the proclamation of this truth proves the genuineness of their faith.

- IV. The Commission of the Risen Lord (vv. 15-18).**

After the disciples were convinced of the truth of His resurrection, Christ sent them forth to "preach the gospel to every creature." What a glorious and supreme task is this. What a blessed issue to those who believe and how awful to them that believe not. "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved, but he that believeth not shall be damned" (v. 16).
- V. The Activity of the Enthroned Christ (vv. 19, 20).**

After giving the disciples their commission He ascended on high and from the unseen sphere directed their activities. Wherever they went He confirmed their word. He does the same for His disciples today.

Magpies Often Arrant Rogues

Diet Includes Great Number of Injurious Insects Like Grasshoppers.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)
Magpies, found over much of the northwest quarter of the United States, have a bad reputation among farmers, fruit growers, poultry keepers, and stockmen. Unlike many birds with unjustly bad reputations, the magpie deserves some condemnation. At times it becomes a serious pest, and in such cases shooting or poisoning may be the only remedy. The magpie has no particular aversion to the bitter taste of strychnine, so for bait this poison is recommended by the biological survey of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Magpies Steal Eggs.
Magpies have been known to steal eggs from chicken yards to carry to their young. They sometimes kill chicks. They also show great partiality to cherry orchards. Perhaps their worst offense is harrying weak or wounded animals, and even occasionally sound and healthy creatures. The magpie attack is torturesome. A magpie has been known to keep pecking and enlarging a wound of an animal, finally resulting in death of the animal after days of suffering.

On the other hand, the magpie often is beneficial. Its diet includes a great number of injurious insects, in particular grasshoppers and caterpillars in the spring and grasshoppers later in the summer and autumn. The grain the magpie eats is largely waste in the fields, for the bird prefers insects both at planting time and during the harvest season. For these reasons magpies are useful and should be protected wherever the evil they do does not overbalance their good services.

Not Hard to Eradicate.
Whenever it is desirable to eradicate magpies the task is not difficult, for the magpie is a year-round resident, and its elimination in a neighborhood where it is a pest does not cause a diminution of numbers in areas where conditions make the magpie a good servant to the farmer.

Last week the Senior invitations were received and distributed among the Class. Each of the Seniors seemed pleased with them.

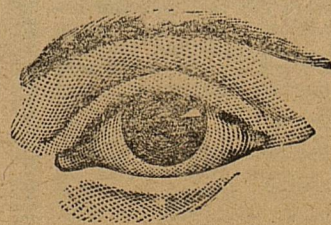
A Senior class meeting was held March 26 to decide upon a play to be given by the members of that class.

The dust of twenty centuries has blown in upon the little garden where Joseph, and Nicodemus, and others, performed a very solemn and a very sorrowful duty when they tenderly spiced the body of the Nazarene, wound it in white linen, reverently laid it away in the hollow of a rock, and sealed the tomb with a stone that was to remain until the angels rolled it away to flood the world with a new light.

Many books have been written about what happened in this little garden; the logic and the eloquence of the world's wisest men have been piled around even some of the minor incidents of the story as we repeat it today; philosophers have dug into it; science has cut into it with the keenest of its lances; but the light and beauty of the story, with its sacred implications, with its promise of the silvered cycles that, unbroken, must run on unendingly, remain unmarred by the bitter bickerings of these two thousand years.

Even now humanity is surging restlessly in its quest for happiness. It is not in wealth, with its evil vanities and coarse ostentations; it is not in power, with its uneasy crowns and wasted opportunities; it is not in fame, with its broken dreams and fading rainbows; and yet, humanity, still fickle as moths, continues to pile itself around these wasting candles still unmindful of the very nearness of the thing humanity craves most. Happiness is in the great quiet which had fallen upon Joseph when he begged Pilate for the body of the Nazarene, in the spiritual awakening which men and women experience when they gather in the quiet places of this earth, where voices are low and tender, and where lights are soft, and where music is gentle and soulful in its reaches.

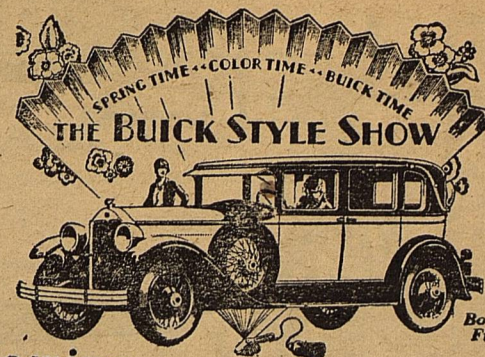
The winds of the marching seasons have scattered the leaves of the little garden of Joseph's time; the rocks are worn by the elements; the lines are broken and changed; the landscape is different; the paths are buried; but the meaning of what happened here is a priceless and enduring human heritage, a radiant hope ever growing in its beauties.

The first to show signs of sprouting is considered to represent the lucky man.—London Tit-Bits.

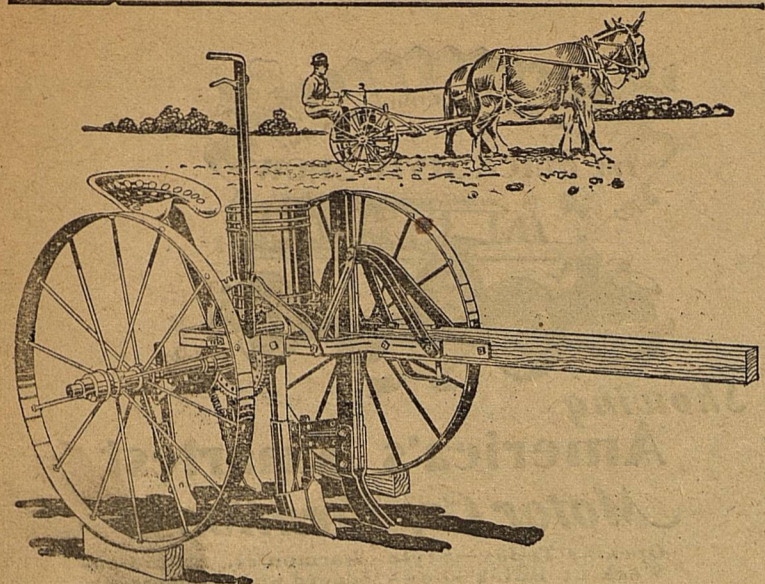
