## LARGE CROWD ATTENDED RODEO

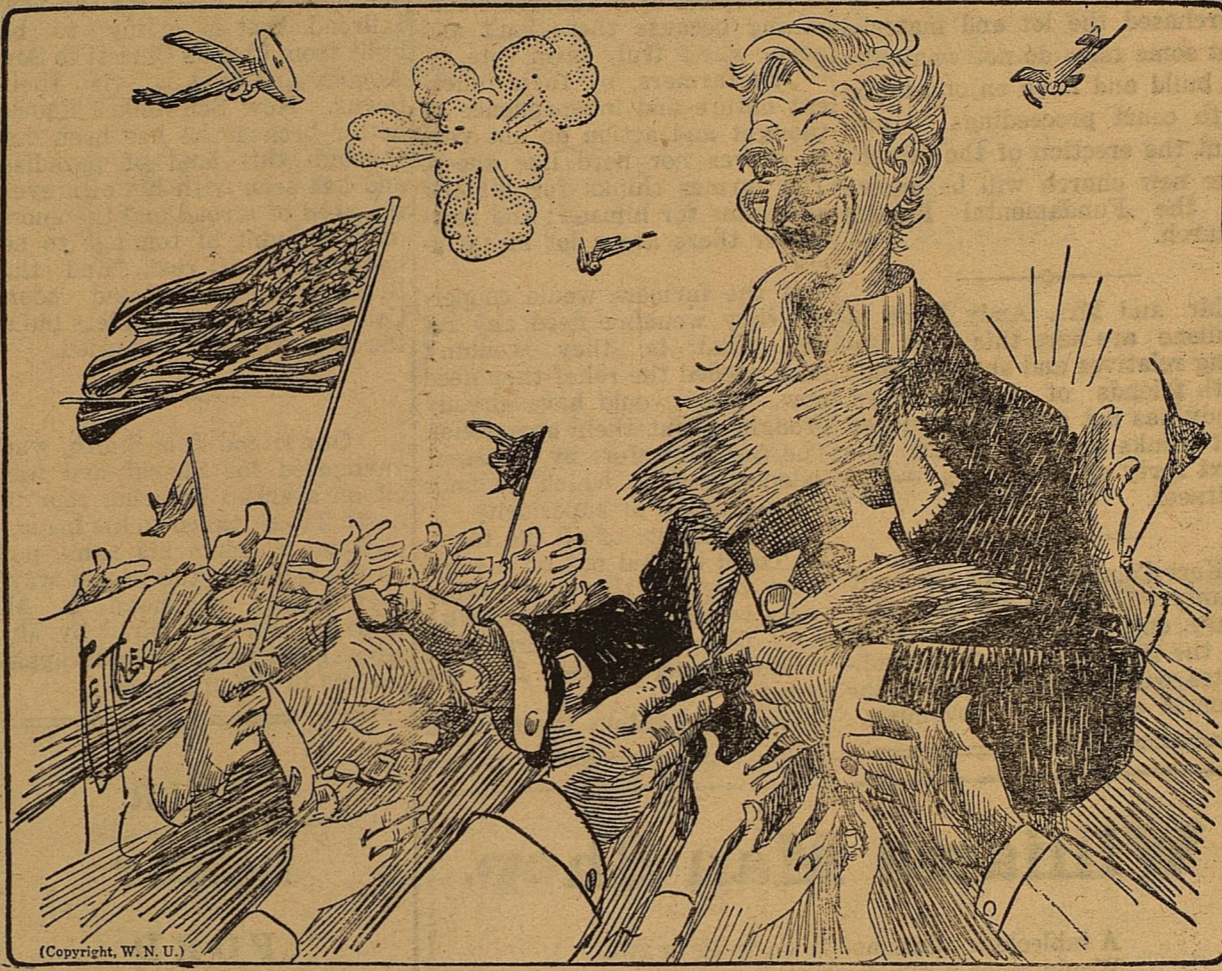

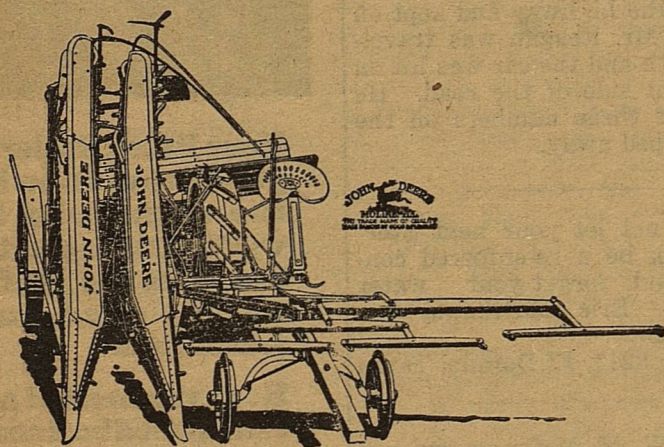

## ELDORADO HAS GREAT RODEO & RACE MEET.

Last Thursday and Friday El Dorado put over one of the best rodeo and race meet that has been witnessed in this part of the state. The crowd was entertained at all times by bronc riding, steer riding, horse racing, trick riding and the famous trick mule. Some of the fastest horses in the state were entered in the races, and the toughest cowboys were present to take seats at the El Dorado broncs, rated to be the best pitching horses this side of Ft. Worth. The first days riding was very easy on the cowboys as the horses were haltered and not being used to this were not very hard to ride but the next day their heads were turned loose and the riders had quite a bid of trouble in staying above their mounts, only three of the eleven riders qualifying, five being thrown and three pulled leather.

There were four races each day: the first race, one quarter of a mile for 2 year olds was won by Tommie, a brown mare owned by Haynes, of El Dorado. Ozona, a chesnut mare, owned by C. M. Berry of San Angelo, was second and Kentia, a chesnut mare owned by Sid Nullspaug, was third.

The second race, a quarter of a mile free for all was won by Pure Gold, a sorrell horse owned by Custer of Spaffard; Shady Lane a chesnut mare, owned by Kincaid, of Uvalde, was second and Jackett, a bay mare owned by Cecil Meador, of El Dorado, third.

The third race, a 3/8 mile free for all was won by Miser, entered by Custer, Kincaid & Clamp of Brackettville, Joe Blair, owned by Clamp of Brackettville, second and Prince Eternal, a Pennell entry, third.

The fourth race, a 1/2 mile free for all was won by Winnie May, owned by Pennell, second went to Simon Kenton, a Gillmore entry of San Angelo and third went to the White stables in San Angelo.

The second days races were as interesting as the first. The first race being a 1/4 mile free

for all won by Pure Gold, second Gracefull Ruby, a Brownwood entry and Shady Lane third.

The second race a 3/8 mile free for all, first, Winnie May, second Shady Lane and third Lorene.

The third race a 1/2 mile free for all was won by Simon Kenton, second going to Prince Eternal and third to Lightening Rod.

The fourth race a 1/4 mile race for 2 yr. olds was won by Tommie, second Kentia, and third Ozona.

In the first day's bronc riding the cowboys looked as though they were tied on. All riders except one stayed above their mounts, but as the horses were haltered the bucking was not very rough. Key Dunn, from Odessa, was winner of first money, the opening day; Tuf Welch, from Carlsbad New Mexico, second money and Elmer Hepler, Rosewell New Mexico and Chic Reynolds of Sonora tied for third.

Other riders were: Otis Buie, Payne Bailey, and Dick Merser, of El Dorado; "Booger Red", from Ft. Worth; Jim Bridgett, of San Angelo; Jim Conway, of Rockford, Colo.; D. B. Hipp, of Colo.; and "Smokey" Roberts, of Garden City, Kansas.

This list of riders includes some of the best. Most of them make the larger shows every summer and El Dorado was very fortunate in getting this class of riders but the horses showed most of them a "good" time, especially the last day.

The second day contest: Key Dunn riding "O Bar Brown", a very wicked pitching horse and Otis Buie, riding "Steamboat", the roughest bronc of the show, tied for first and second place, while Chic Reynolds on "Yellow Fever" a very rough and tricky horse, got third. These three were the only ones to qualify in the second days contest; five of the remaining riders being thrown and three pulling leather. These horses and riders gave the crowd many thrills as they did not know how the next ride would come out.

The general average for the low days bronc riding went to: Key Dunn, first; Chic Reynolds, second; and Otis Buie, third.

In the wild brama steer riding contest "Smokey" Roberts took first place, Eldred Roach,

second and Jim Conway, third. Elmer Hepler took first place the second day, with R. J. Page, O. B. Williamson and D. B. Hipp tied for second and third.

The steer Breakaway was won by Jack York in 7 3-5 seconds, Sam Mather second with 7 4-5 seconds and John Reynolds third with 8 2-5.

The Special events such as, Ted Elder, world's champion trick rider, Eva Caskey also a famous girl bronc rider and trick rider, Fog Horn Clancy, Jr. trick roper and Red Sublette and his nationally known trick mule, were enjoyed very much by the spectators. This mule is the only one in the United States that can do the tricks Red makes him do. All these extra event combined with the races, bronc riding and other features went to make it a great show and if you missed you probably missed the best until the big one at Ft. Worth.

Among the other special events of the rodeo was the "dead man's fall" given by Chris McNeal of the Pipe Line Station. This fall was made from a horse running at full speed. The fall was perfectly made each day and was enjoyed very much. He is to give this stunt at the Rodeo and Race Meet at Sonora during their celebration, July 4 and 5. This feat was learned by him while in the cavalry.

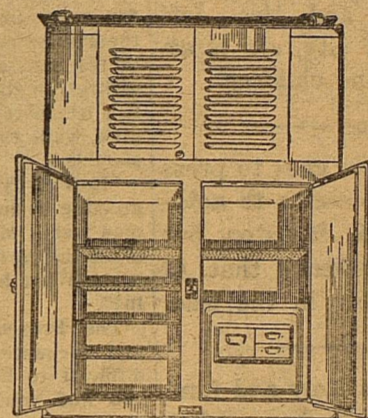

### THE SOCIAL POWER

#### OF MUSIC

What good is music to a community? It is like asking what good is music to the individual. Music is the great leveler - the universal language. A home without music is a home where something is lacking. A community without music is a community without power to socialize itself. A municipal or town band is one of the greatest assets known to the modern world. A school, college or other institution lacking in one of the finest things of life.

The radio, instead of decreasing the desire to perform music for one's self, has increased this desire. It has brought back the old songs, the old standard melodies and folk songs that have been lost to a world seeking the new things. But the radio and phonograph have also shown the way for young and old people to learn an instrument.

One of the greatest things any community can do is to support a community band or orchestra. A boy or girl who masters an instrument of music, whether it be the flute, the drum, the cornet, violin or piano, has learned the art of self control and in turn can master the harsher situations of life. When you see a boy playing in the "town band" you know he has learned to cooperate. He knows what harmony is and exemplifies that virtue in later life. He is above all accomplish-

ing and that is what education is good for. He is engaged in work and play at the same time. In truth, his work is play. Search the records of history, and you will find that the boys of the band turned out right in the great majority of cases.

The greatest benefits of all has not been mentioned. It is that those who perform music receive more good from the act of performing than those who listen. Learning by doing is more lasting than learning by being taught. Educators know that. But the band is a college in which one may enter without a lot of preliminaries. It is the university of early life, where the boy or girl learns the world of cooperation, of harmony, of doing good, of pleasing others, and above all of doing the thing for himself and for herself.

When you say a kind word for group music, when you boost for a community band or orchestra, and when you give a dollar toward helping support such an organization, you have done a wonderful thing for your home

community, and for the youth of your community.

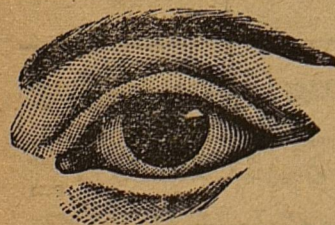

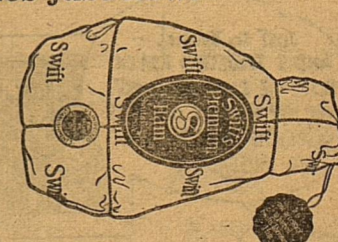

"How do you find yourself?" is the German's greeting, and when a guest rises from table they express the hope that he has had a hearty meal and that he will find himself the better for the cheer of the repast.

Explaining the Wind

The blowing of the wind is owing to the presence of more air at one place than at others. This causes a push from the places of more air toward those of less, and the greater this difference in quantity of air the greater the push, and the faster the winds. Now, it is difference in temperature that causes the difference in the accumulation of air; in March the difference in temperature between the southern and northern portions of the United States is greater than at any other time of the year, hence the difference in atmospheric pressure between these regions is then greatest and the resulting winds strongest. These winds are not mainly north and south, as the pressure is, but from west to east. This is owing to the effect of the rotation of the earth, in a way fully understood, but not capable of brief explanation.
