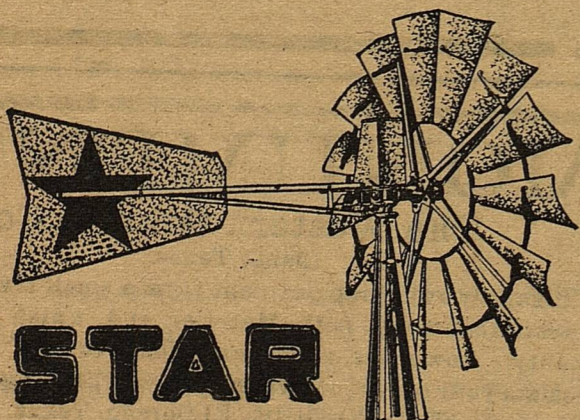

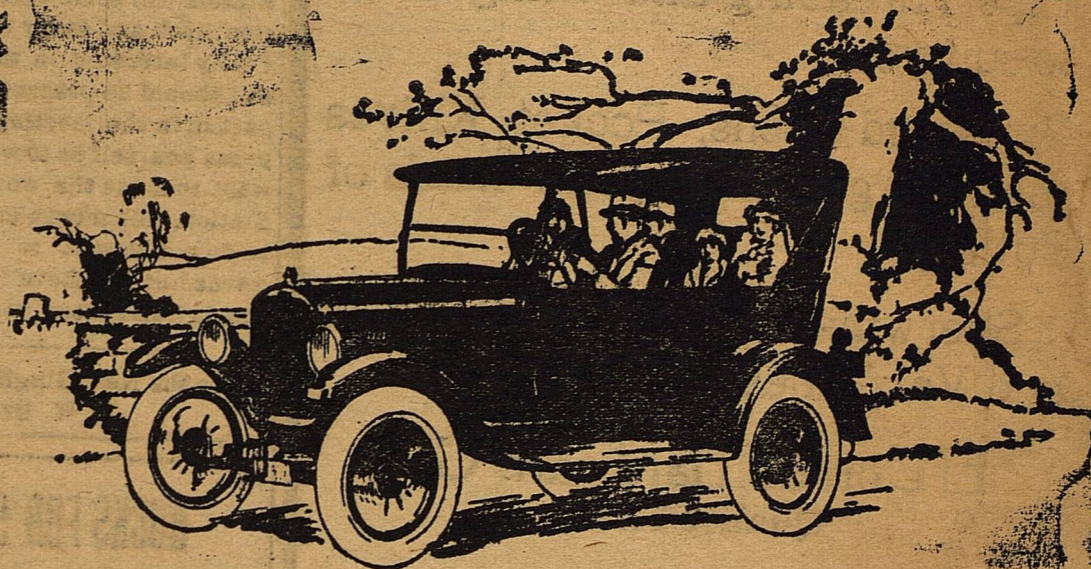

Texas News

Cotton continues to pour into Marshall from the country surrounding Marshall and receipts from all sources this season are far ahead of previous years.

At the meeting of the city commissioners the tax rate for the city of Marshall for the year of 1925 was set at \$1.96 on the \$100 valuation.

Morris Granville was elected president of the La Grange Chamber of Commerce at the annual banquet of the organization held recently.

For the first 11 days of September, 31,108 square bales and 2850 round bales of cotton were exported through the port of Houston.

J. D. Smith, Cherokee county carpenter, has been appointed state building inspector, succeeding the late Captain Hendrickson.

An issue of \$500,000 Galveston County special road bonds bearing 5 per cent and maturing serially was approved by the attorney general's department.

Seventeen cars of stock cattle were shipped from Dilworth recently for a point near Missouri City where they will be put on the grass and fattened for the market.

Taxes in Anderson county for the year 1925 amounted to \$404,926, distributed as follows: State tax, \$117,941; county, \$122,554; road and bridge, \$97,173; county schools, \$63,459.

Work on Galveston County's \$500,000 road improvements, featuring the paving of the Galveston-Houston road, as provided in the bond, issue voted June 20, will start about October 15.

The game, fish and oyster department will pay \$1 each for live grown squirrels and 50 cents each for live young squirrels of weaning age, in an effort to conserve the animals. Commissioner Turner E. Hubby announced this week.

A committee has been appointed to have circulated throughout Waller county a petition asking the commissioners court to call an election on a bond issue to put hard surfaced roads on all the highways through the county. It was estimated the roads would cost the taxpayers \$1,250,000.

Dates for the Texas Mid-Winter Poultry show at Waxahachie have been set for four days, beginning Thursday, December 31, and continuing through Monday, January 4, 1926, according to John V. Singleton, secretary of the Waxahachie chamber of commerce.

Eight thousand new families have moved to Houston since January 1, Charles J. Kirk, public service commissioner, estimated this week. This is based on the report of the Houston Lightning and Power Company that 9000 new light connections have been made this year, Mr. Kirk said.

The San Antonio and Aransas Pass Railway Company of San Antonio was granted an amendment to its charter by the secretary of state to construct an extension from Edinburg to Harlingen. Hearing on the proposed extension is to be held by the interstate commerce commission and the Texas railroad commission in October.

Rainbow trout will be placed in Lake Cisco by the state as an experiment. These trout never have been successfully propagated in Texas, according to the state game and fish commission. The commission believes the depth of Lake Cisco—123 feet—provides conditions suitable for the purpose. Fingerlings have been ordered from Neosha, Mo., to stock the lake.

Texas' oyster crop this season is expected to surpass all other in quantity, and the oysters are of good quality, Commissioner Hubby of the game, fish and oyster commission, said this week, following a visit to oyster beds on the gulf coast. Oysters in the Corpus Christi and Rockport beds are excellent, Hubby said, and he is satisfied. He declared Texas oysters are free from pollution.

The railroad commission has issued an order adding Brooks County to the list of counties in the drought-stricken area entitled to receive shipments of feed stuffs at a 50 per cent reduction in freight rates. The commission has also amended that provision in its original order that provided that the reduced freight rates shall be in McLennan County, "south of Waco," by eliminating that provision, and substituting "Waco and south." There are now perhaps 50 counties embraced in the drought-stricken territory of Central and South Texas that are receiving the benefits of reduced rates.

The Orange County truck growers estimate that they will have between fifty and sixty carloads of sweet potatoes to market soon after September 15 when the digging season starts. Due to the recent rains the sweet potato crop prospects have brightened considerably. Most of the potato crops, which are of the Porto Rican yam varieties, will be marketed through the Orange County Truck Growers' Association. G. C. Ellison, county farm agent, will assist the farmers in the matter of marketing the new crop.

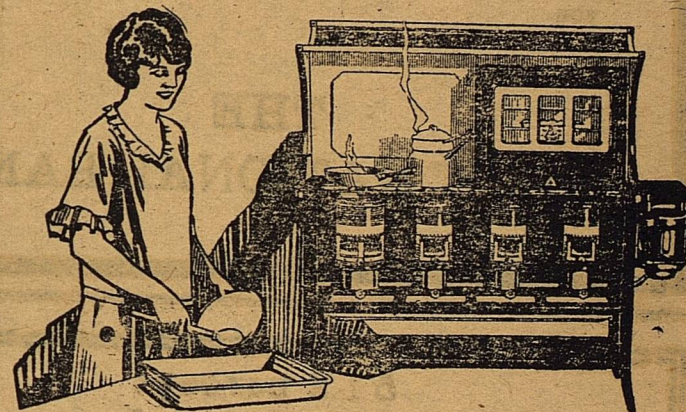

CONDENSED AUSTIN NEWS.

All departments of the State Government closed Monday in observance of Labor Day.

Texas will receive an inheritance tax of \$3,600 on the estate of the late William L. Douglas, millionaire shoe manufacturer of Brookline, Mass., according to State Comptroller S. H. Terrell.

At the next regular meeting of the State Highway Commission at least fourteen contracts for highway construction in various parts of the State are to be awarded, according to Eugene Smith, secretary of the commission.

St. Mary's Hall of San Antonio, girls' boarding and day school, under control and supervision of the diocese of West Texas Protestant Episcopal Church, has been granted a charter. The corporation is without capital stock.

Permit to do business in Texas has been granted to the Southwest Public Service Company, Roswell, N. N.; capital stock \$315,000; Texas headquarters at Amarillo. Purpose, supplying water for irrigation, power, municipal or domestic purposes and manufacture of ice.

Miss Katie Daffan has been appointed State sponsor for the Sons of the Confederacy by State Commander Lon A. Smith of Austin. Miss Daffan will attend the State reunion of the Sons of the Confederacy at Abilene Sept. 30 and the reunion of the veterans of the Confederacy Oct. 1 and 2.

Names and addresses of 40,000 bootleggers operating in Texas have been compiled for distribution among the branch offices of the Oklahoma-Texas division of the prohibition enforcement department as part of the new drive for law enforcement, according to reports received in Austin.

J. H. T. Bibb of Marshall has advised Turner E. Hubby, State Game, Fish and Oyster Commissioner, that the engineers are on the ground and that actual work has started in reinforcing and making permanent the dam at Caddo Lake, the destruction of which was imminent as a result of erosions. It will require between three and four months to complete the work, which is to cost around \$100,000.

While secrecy is still maintained as to the purposes of "Klan Haven," for which an application for a charter has been filed with the Secretary of State, the application has been turned over to the State legal department in order that it may be examined to see if its purposes come within the State statutes. Dallas is the proposed headquarters for the new organization.

Approximately 6.75 per cent of all babies born in Texas during 1924 exclusive of still births, died before reaching the age of 1 year, according to statistics compiled by the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the State Board of Health. At this rate, sixty-seven out of every 1,000 born died under the age of 1 year. Of the number of babies dying, 56 per cent were white, 31 per cent Mexicans and 13 per cent negroes.

State Representative John T. Smith of Austin, has been notified of his appointment as the Texas representative of the Western Taxpayers' Association. Mr. Smith was selected at the recent meeting of the association in Portland, Ore. He has been a member of the Texas Legislature for the last two terms and is editor and owner of the Texas Tax Journal, a monthly publication dealing with tax problems in Texas and issued here.

Capt. D. K. Taylor of Austin, former State ranger, has been appointed by Game, Fish and Oyster Commissioner Turner E. Hubby as deputy game warden to be in charge of Lake Kemp, near Wichita Falls, and has entered upon discharge of his duties. In addition to enforcing game and fish laws at Lake Kemp, Capt. Taylor will keep trespassers off the newly established State game preserves in Baylor, Knox and Wilbarger Counties.

Comptroller S. H. Terrell has completed the mailing of 13,000 Confederate pension warrants. The warrants for this quarter are for the highest amount ever paid to Confederate pensioners, being in the sum of \$38 each, and the amount will be substantially increased for the next quarter. Mr. Terrell has inaugurated an innovation in the pension division of his office in printing the Confederate battle flag on the department stationery.

Contract for the construction of the first section of "Heart O'Hib Game Preserve and Fish Hatchery," which is to include the largest bass hatchery in the United States and to be located on a thirty-six-acre tract sixteen miles northwest of Kerrville on the Kerrville-Junction State Highway, was let by Game, Fish and Oyster Commissioner Turner E. Hubby to Brown & Root of Georgetown. The construction and value of lands will involve \$40,000. The contractors said they would be ready to begin construction of the hatchery at once.

W. J. DENSON HANGS HIMSELF TUESDAY.

W. J. Denson, wellknown and respected citizen of our city, was found dead Tuesday afternoon by his wife at his home in South El Dorado, hanging to a rafter in the shed at his home.

He had sreviously had his will prepared by Judge Ford, some ten days ago, and had gotten his business in good shape, had plenty for he and his wife to live comfortably on, and no cause is given for the rash act.

Mr. Denson was born May 23, 1857, in Karnes County, Texas, and moved to El Dorado about 15 years ago, and since his stay in our midst has lived in peace with with his fellowman. he was a member of the Masonic order and was buried by the fraternity in the El Dorado Cemetery.

His aged wife is left to mourn over his sad demise.

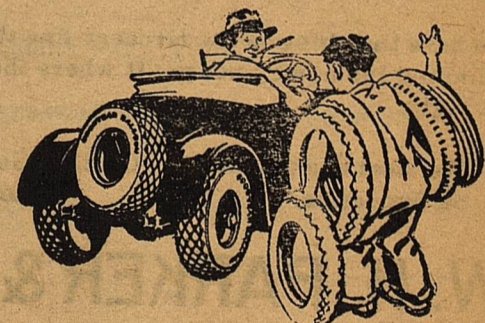

WHAT IS EVAPORATED MILK?

Did you ever stop to figure out the exact meaning of "Evaporated Milk"? The word "evaporated" may give you the idea that in the process of evaporation the milk has lost some of its valuable qualities. It hasn't. It has lost only water. Sixty per cent of the water is evaporated from the milk after it comes fresh from the cow. The first step in processing the milk is the evaporation, when a portion of the water content is removed. The second step is the homogenization, which insures the cream being distributed evenly throughout the milk. The third is the canning. The fourth is sterilization, which takes place in the can when the milk is subjected to sufficient heat to destroy the bacteria. Thus evaporated milk remains as pure and fresh in the container as when it foamed into the pail in the farmer's barn.

Evaporated milk is now generally recognized as the freshest milk available to those not living on farms and producing their own milk. For freshness in milk means purity. Transportation of milk from the dairy country to the city is well systematized and rapid and yet owing to the immense quantities of milk that must be rushed in daily, much of it must be obtained at considerable distances and a large per cent is necessarily some days old when it is delivered by the milkman.

Evaporated milk, on the other hand, is last night's and this morning's milk. From the dairy barn, always under rigid inspection, it is hurried by farmers to factories located in the heart of the dairy country and delivered when it is fresh. Evaporated milk is canned just at its "freshest moment," when it is in its finest state. It is never allowed to get old. The whole process from cow to can requires only a few hours. It may be interesting to know that the process of sterilizing takes place after the milk has been sealed in its containers. Once in its sterilized containers, there is no possibility of deterioration.

The sterilizing of evaporated milk insures its purity—it makes a safe milk for the children. Evaporated milk is boiled milk, and this makes it more digestible.

It may be used for any milk need with safety and economy. For ordinary cream needs, use it just as it comes from the can. When a rich milk is desired, add an equal part of water. For cooking and baking, two parts water and one part milk will usually suffice.
