

Laws You Don't Want

Laws requiring the Santa Fe and other railroads to spend money needlessly, tend to keep freight rates up. Limiting length of trains and saying how many men shall be employed to run a train, to that extent prevent lowering costs. This is your problem, too. Think it over.

In a manufacturing business the greater the output the lower the cost per unit. Therefore all progressive manufacturing concerns try to increase volume of out-

The railroads of this country are in the manufacturing business. They make and sell transportation.

Obviously it is to their interest to sell their product at as low a price as possible, in order to increase volume of business handled.

To sell at a lower price they must get their costs down to as low a figure as possible consistent with good service.

They cannot lower prices for materials and supplies, or wages, the latter being fixed by agreements with the men and by the Labor Board established by law.

The only other way left is by more efficient operation—that means handling more freight per man employed. To handle more freight economically means larger locomotives, better track and longer trains.

Laws limiting the number of cars in a train, or saying how many men shall be employed on a train, are laws which to that extent prevent lowering costs and keep

Any laws that require the railroads to spend money needlessly have a tendence to keep up rates.

While primarily this is a railroad problem, in the end it affects your own business as well. That is why your attention is called to it in this way. Think it over.

ROSE POND STILL MECCA OF CURIOUS

Believed to Be Crater of Ex tinct Volcano.

Evening Shade, Ark.—Each summer, with its crop of toulists, sees a renewed interest in "Rose pond," near here, which is thought to be the filledin crater of an extinct volcane and is pointed out to all newcomers as a natural curiosity.

"Rose Pond" is about twelve acres in extent. It is literally as 'level as a floor." It takes its name from the fact that when white settlers first came here it was a marshy place, covered thickly with the wild rose that is native to this section. One oldtimer says he has yet to see a more beautiful sight than was Rose pond in those days, with the early morning dew on the pink and white blossoms.

But the roses have disappeared The first owners found it impossible to clear the pond, so thickly did the rose brambles grow, and water stood in rock-bound courses over the marsh. But Joseph Schales, from Germany, acquired the pond.

Hay meant more than roses to Schales. So with a predigious amount of labor he cut the brambles and rooted them out of the mud, dug out the rocks and drained the pond.

Wild hay flourished for him and later owners, but such prosaic crops as corn and cotton will not grow in the pond with any degree of success. It is as if the spot resents giving up its ancient wild heritage.

Students of geology say there is no other soll in the state just like that of Rose pond. It resembles, so it is said, ashes or lava reduced to powder and mixed with vegetable matter brought in by erosion and water from the slightly higher ground.


Woman's Will Directs

Search for Lost Son Omaha, Neb .- Provision for the continuance of her futile search fer her only child, Harold, was made in the will of Mrs. Emma Haviland, aftythree, teacher for twenty-live years in Omaha schools, who died recently. LESSON TEXT—Genesis 28:10-22.
GOLDEN TEXT—I am with thee and will keep thee in all places whither thou goest.—Gen. 28:15.
PRIMARY TOPIC—Jacob Dreams at Bethel.

I. Jacob's Flight to Haran.

He fled from an outraged brother. His deceit and cunning got him into trouble. His long exile from home was the result of his selfish ambition. "Whatsoever a man soweth that shall he also reap." Rebekah made her plea before Isaac for sending Jacob away, stating her fear of Jacob's probable marriage with a daughter of Canaan, when in reality she feared that Esau would kill him. Isaac at once recog nized the wisdom of her suggestion. He knew that the success or failure of one's life is largely determined by his marriage. It was clear that if Jacob were to continue in the line of the covenant blessing care must be exercised in his marriage. Besides, it is a parental duty to see that chiliren are well married. Among Christians only marriage in the Lord is allowable (I Cor. 7:39). Isaac, alive to Jacob's destiny, issued his comnand and bestowed upon him the ovenant blessing which had come from God Almighty to Abraham (Gen. 17:1). The elements embraced in this

Isaac knew that the blessing was to be Jacob's, yet he planned for Esau o have the place of prominence. He was willing for the sake of a little venison to give to Esau that which God had planned for Jacob. II. Jacob at Bethel.

With a spirit clouded by homesickness on the one hand and by fear on the other, he had a dream that night in which God appeared to him. In this dream Jacob beheld a ladder or stair reaching from earth to heaven ipon which angels were ascending and descending. Above the ladder stood the Lord who spoke to him. This ladler suggests a means of communica ion between earth and heaven, beween man and God. Jesus Christ s the ladder which provides us a means of communication with heaven (John 1:51; 14:6; Heb. 10:19-20). Jesus became a real ladder to us, bridging he chasm between earth and heaven. He was a real man that He might dentify himself with the race. He is ery God, really divine, that He might ift us up to God and secure a reconiliation with Him.
