DAWSON, ONCE PRIDE **OF YUKON, IS FADING**

Scene of 1900 Gold Rush Sliping Into Oblivion.

Dawson City, Yukon .--- A bunch of the boys no longer whoop it up in the Malamute saloon, nor is there a ragtime kid available to hit a jag-time tune on the music box. The episode dealing with the demise of Dangerous Dan McGrew and the reign of the lady known as Lou are but vague memories of bygone days as far as this town is concerned.

When Robert Service wrote the "Shooting of Dan McGrew," the Malamute saloon was one of the many bright spots during the mad gold rush of 25 years ago. Together with scores of other such places, it played host to the hordes-the frenzied gold-seekers. Today, with its kindred resorts, it stands in the last stages of decay. From the status of a thriving city

of 30,000, Dawson City today has dwindled to a struggling village of less than 1,000.

Dawson's mushroom growth had its genesis in the great Klondike strike of 1900. Miners, adventurers, con men and courtesans swept into the frozen city of the North. Fortunes were made and lost over night. The miners made the fortunes, the hangers-on mulcted them. Winnings at the faro tables in the scintillating gambling halls went the same way. Thousands dragged their bodies over the frozen wastesmany to fall from exhaustion before the journey ended-to the gold-mad city. The North exacted a heavy tribute from those who would wrest fortune from the ground.

With the exception of the California strike of '49, the rush of 1900 was the richest in the history of mining. Hundreds of millions of dollars in dust and nuggets was taken from the ground. For more than ten years the yield stood up under the terrific pressure.

From 1900's peak of \$22,250,000 gold production in the territory dropped to \$1,450,000 in 1924. Treasure-seekers dwindled and other sources received S E. Chanler. the rainbow-chasers.

183,000 Ladybirds a **Profit to Insectary**

Los Angeles, Cal.-A checkup just nade on the Santa Barbara county (California) insectary, established two years ago, shows that a small profit has resulted from the operation of the plant, according to F. C. Greer, entomologist in charge. After all expenses including salaries were paid and 10 per cent allowed for depreciation of buildings and equipment, the county made a profit of \$100 from the sale of 183,000 ladybirds at 2 cents each, Mr. Greer found.

The first year the insectary was in peration the county raised 50,000 adybirds, which cleaned up mealy oug infestations in a number of Carinteria lemon orchards. The mealy oug, however, has been spreading rapdly, although prevented from doing great damage by its enemy insects. This year Mr. Greer will try to raise 200,000 bugs in an effort to keep the emon orchards commercially clean. The ladybird is being employed not only in the lemon orchards, but in the walnut orchards as well, and on lettuce and other vegetables.







LIGHTHOUSE BLUES ELDORAD DEFEATS SONORA BANISHED BY RADIO

Music From Air Now Comes to Lonely Isles.

Boston.-Adoption of the radio by keepers of lighthouses and lightships has given brilliant touch to a new chapter in the romance of the Atlantic ocean.

Since the days when first wooden fires were kindled in the tower of Pharos light to warn and guide mariners entering the ancient harbor of Alexandria, the life of the lighthouse keeper has been one of dreary monot ony and isolation.

For ages the keepers have tended their wooden fires, huge wax candles, oil, gas or electric lanterns, never allowing them to burn low or cease their flashing.

Pilots seeing the beacon altered their courses to steer clear of rocky ledge or treacherous hidden shoal. The eral circulation which has been keeper of the light watched their approach and followed their departure until the ship dropped below the horizon or its lights were extinguished in the dark of night, leaving only inten sified solitude in its wake.

Even today visitors are almost unknown at many lights that dot New England's broken coast. Only an occasional visit by a tender ship that brings supplies breaks the monotony that makes all days seem as one. In bad weather the periods of isolation are liable to extend over months. Newspapers and magazines are weeks old and their news, as such, has long since ceased to be.

Their Greatest Boon.

It is not difficult, then, to believe with Capt. George E. Eaton, superintendent of the Second lighthouse district, that radio has proven the great est single boon to lighthouse keepers in generations.

The picture he lays before the landlubber could have its setting in the desolate Great Point light, miles from the mainland, or in the famous Minots ledge light that rises from the water without apparent support. Minot's foundation is cut in the solid rock of one of the most dangerous submerged ledges on the entire coast line.

The last visit of a tender is weeks back. Overhead the signal light flashes and blinks in unceasing rhythm. In the season of gales and out of the bleak north sweep unleashed winds that scourge the Atlantic and froth its surface in foam. Spray turns to ice and coats the glass protection around the flashing light with sleet. The ob ervation loft whistles in the gale. The keeper's "trick" is up and he relieved by an assistant.

He now retires to his room. He turns a knob on his radio set. The scene shifts and forms a new picture. The winds subside and waves no long er pound. It is a peaceful night and strains of Beethoven's "Moonlight Sonata" fill the room. Soon the leader of the Philharmonic orchestra in New York or Philadelphia surrenders his baton to a "jazz" outfit in Pittsburgh


