
product, is of importance. Home economists have found a means to this end in the use of evaporated milk. There are three important reasons why evaporated milk




makes the best ice cream, they point out. Because 60 per cent of the natural water in evaporated milk has been removed by evaporation, there is over twice the percenta e of solids present in this type of milk than there is in ordinary market milk-and, since it is the solids that give ice cream its pleasing flavor, this fact is of moment.

Then, the composition of evaporated milk is constant, for the reason that It has been put through an homogenizing process, which breaks up the fat globules into tiny particles and distributes them evenly throughout the milk. This attribute makes for an icecream mixture of uniform quality and fine texture.

A Close Race

The following year Suez barely exceeded Panama's tonnage; and in Lincoln, Packard, etc., so will 1925 comfortably held its lead. But reports for 1926 to date indicate that Suez is losing, owing to Britain's industrial depression, while Panama is doing better and is pretty certain to resume the lead.

The present Suez Canal has been in operation nearly sixty years, Panama only eleven. Although few neople except antiquarians know it, the. first canal at Suez was built more than 3,000 years ago. It was in op eration as early as B. C. 1380; how long before, is mere conjecture, Before the Christian era began the ditch had been built, destroyed, rebuilt. sitted up and built up again, time after time. When Alexander the Great conquered Egypt the Ca nal was one of the oldest of engineering works.

Early Profits Unexpected

at Panama, neither he nor any other prophet of optimism would have dared suggest that within its first decade the Canal would earn a profit. Its chief justification. concerned the national defense, and the establishment of competition with the transcontinental railroads.

Although both Canals are open to shipping of all nations, British vessels constitute the majority of those using Suez (55.8 per cent), while American vessels are 54.5 per cent of those using Panama. For 1924, ships of 21 nations used

has been in other ways advantageous to Panama. "A" constantly increasing proportion of maritime shipping now adays uses oil fuel. Oil-burning ships seek routes on which they can most cheaply 'buy oil; and because 'Cali fornia oil can be put so cheaply into the bunkers of vessels passing through the Panama ditch, there is a substantial inducement to prefer this route. This will in creasingly favor Panama and militate against Suez, as the number of oil burners increases. Moreover, Panama's advantage will still further increase as the enormous oil re sources of Venezuela, Colombia, and American, countrie other South are developed.


If cheap petroleum has thus served Panama so well, Panama in turn has equally served the American motor ist, who consumes most of the world's petroleum products. For Panama has brought the Pacific Coast petroleum to the eastern market at costs which but for the Canal, would be vastly greater. 
