If you are a good gardner you will make money and if you are a poor gardner you will learn a lot about nature and get some exercise that you probably need. If you are a man with a family you can interest the youngsters very much and this is a part of their education, to know nature and her ways and there is no better place for them to learn than in their own back yard under the direction of their father.

ORDER FOR LUMBER EXCEED PRODUCTION

A slight increase in lumber produc tion occurred in the week ended Febmary 9 against the like 1934 week according to the National Lumber Manufactures' Association. Production for the week of 1.057 mills was 157,145,-000 feet; shipments, 171,930,000 and orders received, 186,356,000. Revised figures for the previous week show 1.192 mills reporting production of 154,558,000 feet, shipments, 202,222,-000, and orders received 205,042,000.

Total orders were 19 percent above output, softwoods showing excess of 16 percent and hardwoods of 16 percent. Shipments were 9 percent above production. All regions except northern pine, northern hemlock, and northeastern hardwood reported orders above those of corresponding weeks of 1934, total orders being 42 percent above those of a year ago.





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
