



Owens will receive a cash award of \$250 in addition to the silver medal. Vail medals are awarded each year by the Bell System, to employees for noteworthy jub. c service. Rock Springs is a community of some

1,200 people, in southern 'exas. It has neither railroad nor telegraph connections, the telephone being its only means of communication. The nearest towns are sixty or more miles distant.

He had returned home from work about half an hour before the tornado struck. Realizing the imminence of the storm. Owens ordered his wife and two small children and his sister and her two small children to go into the house and seek protection by lying un-der the dining room table.

Closing the door with great difficul-ty, due to the wind pressure, Owens himself crawled beneath the table just

Owens' first thought was to get his family to safety, but he discovered neighbors who were caught in the wreckage and assisted them first. Other men arrived shortly and Owens turned his family over to them and at once set about restoring telephone serv-

ice so that aid could be summoned. Owens drove to Lis brother's home about a mile out of town. Here he found the wires of the toll line still at tached to the poles. Removing the telephone from his brother's house he climbed a pole and connected the in-strument to the toll line leading to Kerrylle, sixty miles · ay. He re-ported the situation to the telephone manager at Kerrylle, who in turn ar-

By being satisfied with reasonable volume during the days of high static, we may reduce the background noise to a minimum. The power of transmitters is not reduced during the summer months. Hence in most localities there is ample signal strength from leading stations to ride well above the usual summer static, with the exception of the occasional thunderstorm in the immediate neighborhood. Yet who expects idea, radio conditions every night? Try driving your automobile through a thunderstorm at night, with the dazzling flashes of lightning, the torrential downpour of rain, with the ignition system in difficulties due to moisture, and other troubles! Still, we do not speak of summertime automobile handicaps. We are willing to forego motoring during the occasional

storm of winter or summer. Quality Programs

Programs are maintained at the highest standards, although in keep ing with seasonable moods and activities of outdoor weather, they may be pleasantly different from those of indoor weather. The skilled program director, in fact, pays close attention to the demands of his summertime audience.

As to the radio listener, there is just as much reason to listen in during the summer as during the winter Music, enlightenment, contact with the world, the thrill of sporting events, participation in history in the making, and other program features form a rich mental background for our summer life.

If anything, radio may truly be enjoyed to better advantage amid the outdoor setting made possible in warm weather. The acoustics are frequently better when windows can be thrown open. Radio is at its best outdoors, on the porch or even on the lawn. Indeed, too little attention has been paid to the stage setting for the radio presentation, and summertime offers us many an opportunity. in this direction.





of radio. The skill required in piloting a big gas bag is not generally appreciated by the laity, hence the need for radio in their donely vigil throughout the may not be altogther clear. A balloon having no motive power of its own, must drift along with the winds, somewhat after the fashion of a sailing ship. However, the balloon has one decided advantage over the sailing ship, in that it moves in the vertical as well as the horizontal plane. By throwing out ballast, the pilot can rise; and Ly, valving the gas, the pilot can deseend. Skill in piloting the balloon is nocessary to take full advantage of the favorable winds that exist at various levels, and to avoid adverse winds and serious storms. Hence a knowledge of meteorological conditions is an invaluable aid to successful ballooning.

There is still another human element that enters into consideration. A balloon in flight does not have the noise, the dash and the vibration of the swiftly moving airplane or airship. Instead, the big gas bag floats along with the wind, and, at night, the balloonist is completely enveloped in a black isolation unbroken by any human contact. This monotony is a se-






