ROMAN CATHOLIC MARRIAGES

In his address over the radio Monday August 27, Dr. L. R.

Scarborough said the following: "The second tenet of the faith to which he beholds, on the ground of which I oppose him, is the marriage law in the Roman Catholic Church and that la wis very definite and is known everywhere and written in the records and life of the church. And that is that marriage without the presence of the Roman Catholic priest is null and void and is not marriage at all. The law of the Catholic Church says that civil marriage is "legal concubinage"; and the Catechism of that church says, in answering the question, "What is civil marriage or marriage by a civil officiency of Protestart visition. officer or a Protestant minister is base concubinage."
