BUCK BAILEY WINS CITY GOL PHONORS

In the finals of the Pullman golf club championship tournament, A. B. (Buck) Bailey defeated Dr. H. B. Briggs in a match that was featured by Bailey's long drives. Bailey was never in trouble, finishing the first nine holes two up and winning the match on the fourteenth hole. Briggs was driving well but his approaches were uncertain and his putting badly off.

On the 305-yard first, Bailey's drive was hole high and he took the hole with a par when Briggs' approach failed to make the green. The second was halved, and Bailey took the 284-yard third, his drive being past the green. On the fourth, Bailey's drive was again well over 300 yards and he took the hole with a birdie four. The fifth was taken by Briggs, when Bailey failed to sink a short putt. Briggs also took the 237-yard sixth with a birdie, his drive coming to rest four feet from the pin. The next two holes were halved, and Bailey took the ninth, when his approach shot, which was rather fast, struck the pin and stopped dead at the hole.

With the match two up in his favor, Buck took the tenth with a birdie three. The eleventh was halved and Bailey took the twelfth. The thirteenth was halved. On the fourteenth Bailey's tee shot made the green, while Briggs' was short. On his second failing to make the green, Briggs conceded the hole, giving Bailey the match, five up and four to go.

SCHOOL TAX ELECTION Called For October 27, 1928

The Eldorado School Board has ordered an election to be held October 27th, 1928, to see whether the people of the Eldorado Independent School District want to vote to raise the tax limit to \$1.00, and allow the Board of Education to levy any amount of the \$1.00 they see fit for the maintenance of the school. The present limit is 50 cents, but the law allows to vote as much as \$1.00. The present 50 cents is entirely inadequate for the maintenance of our school. It is either raise the tax or the valuation of property. With the raise of the tax the increase will go to the local funds, if it is to raise the valuation, a portion will go to the State at large. Remember the date of the election and register your vote either for "The Maintenance Tax" or "Against [The Maintenance Tax]."

THEY GROW ONE VARIETY OF COTTON

One variety of cotton is enough for one community to grow, is the consensus of opinion of 530 Collin county farmers assembled at McKinney recently to discuss cotton standardization plans and to organize growers from 14 communities to market their one variety cotton. That these men have been profit-

ing by concentrating on the production of a single variety is revealed in reports to county agent Roy Saunders last year showing that growers of standardized cotton averaged 1/4 bale per acre while the county average was 1-7 bale per acre. The reports also show that standardized cotton also brought a premium over other cotton, which according to local cotton men, amounted to \$7 to \$10 per bale at McKinney.

KNOW TEXAS

Texas is the leading producer of the Bermuda onion, the annual value of the crop being around \$4,000,000.

At the end of 1927 the total resources of Texas building and loan association was \$92,300,000 and the total membership 162,436.

The bonded indebtedness of Texas is about \$4,000,000.

MARVEL OF SURGERY

Among the many marvellous uses to which electricity has been put none is more astonishing than the case of a Canadian World War veteran, who for nearly ten years carried a bullet in his lung. The bullet was located by means of the X-Ray, but in its position* it could not be reached by forceps. Therefore the surgeon took a sufficiently powerful magnet, and holding it over the patient's chest drew the bullet to a point where it could be seized with forceps through the windpipe. The operation saved the patient's life. Every day in hospitals throughout the United States, electricity is performing feats of life-saving that, only a few years ago, were not only impossible, but unimagined.

For that reason most of our business is owned by the great mass of the people who share in the profits and the losses.

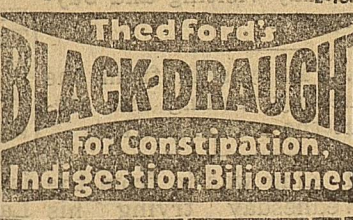
It is for this reason that all government, local and national must be the most stable.
