SCHLEICHER HAS GINNED 3,950 BALES OF COTTON

C. S. Chich, County Weigher, reported Tuesday morning that 3,950 bales of cotton had been ginned in Schleicher County up to date and that he was sure that the complete ginning would run above 4,500. Schleicher has enjoyed a season of prosperity this year.

NEW RAY MAY MAKE ALCOHOL FROM WATER

Remarkable advances in synthetic chemistry are promised through the use of high-speed electronic bombardment through the new Coolidge cathode-ray tube according to the Journal of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers.

Prof. H. Plauson of Germany has perfected an improved tube with which the stability of many types of molecule and atom can be upset and transformed to other types of stable compounds, producing transformations hitherto thought to be impossible.

The new high velocity cathode ray will, it is reported, convert the waste products of petroleum stills and coke ovens into rubber, alcohol, acetic acid and valuable drugs and perfumes. It is also stated that moist air is converted directly into nitric acid, that synthetic rubber can be made with great rapidity, and that with cold water and air as raw materials it is possible to make alcohol, methanol, acetic acid, ether and other such products.

"In fact, the claims made for this new agent are so remarkable that if they are substantiated, it would appear that an entirely new era in synthetic chemistry is opening," says the article. "It is to be hoped that these claims, which appear at present almost extravagant, will be duly substantiated by repetition of a report. Accounts of such further studies will be awaited with keenest interest."

506,000 POUNDS FALL CLIP MOHAIR SOLD MONDAY

The accumulation of fall mohair held in storage by the Edwards County Wool and Mohair Warehouse Co., amounting to 290,000 pounds and that of the Rocksprings Livestock Loan Co. amounting to 216,000 pounds was sold at 65 and 75 cents per pound to Draper and Co., Boston and delivered on board cars at Camp Wood Monday and Tuesday.

The price this fall, as predicted by Mr. Brown in last week's Record, was off, yet the growers in this section are satisfied, in that the warehouses here secured a price that was very satisfactory, for reports have reached this office that this fall clip had sold for as low as 61 and 71 cents as some other concentration points, while rumors are out to the effect that some of the warehousemen had secured a fraction above this price on the kid hair. Menard reports the best price this season and we understand this was a contract sale, made some time ago.

Taking it all in all with the clip weighing out very heavy on account of range conditions throughout Edwards county, our ranchmen feel that they have done very well with this fall's clip.

Another thing that must be noticed and appreciated by the growers in Edwards county, and that is that returns are made to the ranchmen immediately after the sale is made, our warehouses do not hold up on remittances thirty, sixty and ninety days, as has been reported from some other concentration points.

If our growers had been given

credit for the tariff on this commodity they would have received a much higher price this fall, yet they are satisfactory.

Now the wool clip will be offered for sale, possibly some time in the early part of next month and no doubt the buyers are together on this, yet we feel that our ranchmen will receive a very good price for this fall's clip on account of its excellent quality and weight, yet they can feel assured that they will not receive the benefit of the protective tariff on this article, as the buyers always manage to get this additional margin.

But the ranchmen of Edwards county can rest assured that the warehousemen of Rocksprings will always secure for them a price that is at the very head of the list on wool and mohair and returns will reach them promptly as sales are made. —Rocksprings Record.

TRYING TO FIND CORN

COLD WILL NOT KILL

What is believed to be a unique application of electric refrigeration has recently been used by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. To test the cold resisting qualities of corn, a large refrigerating unit has been built on a frame work. This is rolled to the corn to be tested and the refrigerator is lowered so that it covers four hills at once.

The plant has been in operation for several weeks. Certain strains of corn have been found which are not injured by a temperature of 32 degrees maintained for an hour. Other strains were killed or injured.

In one case where the refrigerator held the temperature around the corn at 32 degrees for an hour on two nights, a hybrid stalk remained perfectly green and healthy. Another hill showed one stalk in good shape and one killed.

SCHOOL TAX CARRIES

Only a small portion of the voters of the Eldorado Independent School District turned out at the Saturday's election, but the majority was strong for the tax among those who came out, the tax carrying 93 to 57, almost two to one. This will enable the school board to secure enough money to insure a nine months school.

ELDORADO RUNS WILD

The Eldorado football team swamped the Robert Lee high school team by a tune of 100 to 0 last Friday on the local field. The inexperienced team from Robert Lee could not cope with the experienced and flashy backs of the home team. Never was Eldorado in danger of being scored on, the visitors making only two first downs.

Robert Lee won the toss and chose to receive. McClatchey kicked off. The visitors were held for downs and were forced to punt. On the first play after Eldorado gained possession of the ball, McClatchey on a wide end run behind perfect interference ran about fifty yards for the first score. After this the home team scored at will.

At the beginning of the second half the visitors showed a little more fighting spirit but after a few long runs gave up and the boys made the score an even 100 in the last half, scoring five touchdowns in this period.

The interference of the Eagles was almost perfect, every boy on the team doing his duty and never left anything for the other fellow to do. There were no individual stars to mention on Eldorado's team but will take the entire team as the stars of the game.

The boys have no game this week end but will go to Del Rio next Wednesday and if the boys display the same brand of football that they have in the last few games, we predict a very close score or a victory. The team has been strengthened a great deal by the return of Billie Stewardson, who is an experienced player, a good line plunger and a real punter for a high school team.

He will take a place in the backfield and Parker a very consistent player, whether winning or losing will return to his post in the line.

Report Here Is That 800,000 Pounds Was Disposed Of

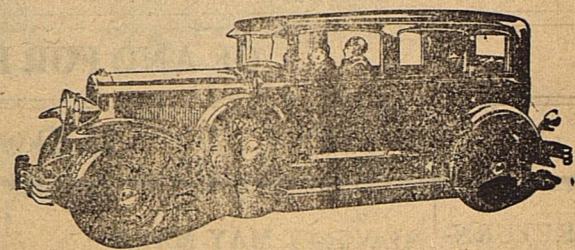

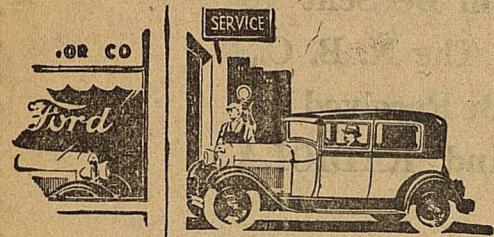

THE LOAN VALUE OF PECAN LANDS

Brownwood, Oct.— Under the title, "The Loan Value of Pecan Lands", a subject of state wide importance will come up for discussion and conference at the Pecan Institute to be held here on November 15-16, under the sponsorship of the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce. This is the first time in history that this matter has been taken up publicly.

Judge M. H. Gossett, president of the Federal Loan Bank of Houston, will be the chief speaker. Some fifty representatives of National Farm Loan Associations are expected as well as a large number of land owners and bankers within a radius of 75 miles of Brownwood.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce will be represented by Homer D. Wade, Manager, and other officials of that body. Mr. Wade has been gathering pecan data for the last two years, showing the value and earning power

of land on which pecan trees grow. Informed pecan men have long been aware that Texas is far behind in the production of papershell pecans, whereas, the state of Georgia is cited as having thousands of acres of papershell orchards which return a large annual income. The open forum on this matter at the Brownwood meeting is expected to be the first step in establishing an extra value for pecan lands as a basis for loans, thus directly and indirectly affecting all citizens of the State. Invitations have been sent to more than 200 banks within 100 miles of Brownwood, asking them to have a representative present to take part in the deliberation.
