## ELDORADO SERVICE STATION BURNS

Saturday morning between six and seven o'clock the Eldorado Service Station, owned by Van McCormick, burned with all its contents and for awhile the buildings on the south and east side of Main Street were threatened. The origin of the fire is unknown but indications are that it started from the flue. When the night watchman left at six o'clock, Mr. Alexander who works at the station was up and had built a fire in the stove. He went to the cafe to get breakfast and on returning found the building on fire. The alarm was turned in and in a few minutes many were on the scene, rendering what assistance they could with the present "bucket brigade".

## ELDORADO DOWNS SAN ANGELO

Last Friday afternoon the Eldorado Eagles showed their superiority over the San Angelo Kittens by trouncing them to the score of 42 to 0. The Eagles scored in the first few minutes of the game, Stewardson blocking a punt and then plunging the ball over on two line plays. From then on the game was Eldorado's and never were Coach Williamson's Eagles in danger.

San Angelo won the toss and chose to receive, Eldorado defending the West goal. Stewardson kicked to the 20 yard line, the ball was returned 15 yards. On an end run San Angelo made 2 yards. The next two plays, Stewardson broke and threw the Angelo backs for losses. He then broke thru and blocked the punt which was recovered by Eldorado on San Angelo's 20 yard line where Stewardson, on two hard line plunges carried the oval over for the first score. The try for point was missed. Eldorado again kicked and the Kittens were held for downs and were forced to punt, W. Murphy making a nice return, placing the ball again deep in the San Angelo territory. Three line plays, the last one by Stewardson put over another marker for the home team. The rest of the half was not very exciting, Eldorado having the ball in their possession and gaining through the line and around end at will.

The second half was featured by long end runs and several passes of the home team. San Angelo making four first downs but could not break loose for any score.

The fourth quarter was featured by an 85 yard return of a punt by W. Murphy through the entire Angelo team for a touchdown. He had almost perfect interference.

All the team played good ball and had it not been for Hamberlin, full back for the opposing side the first downs for the Kittens would have been much lower. He was a first string player for the San Angelo High School but was ruled ineligible on account of the age limit.

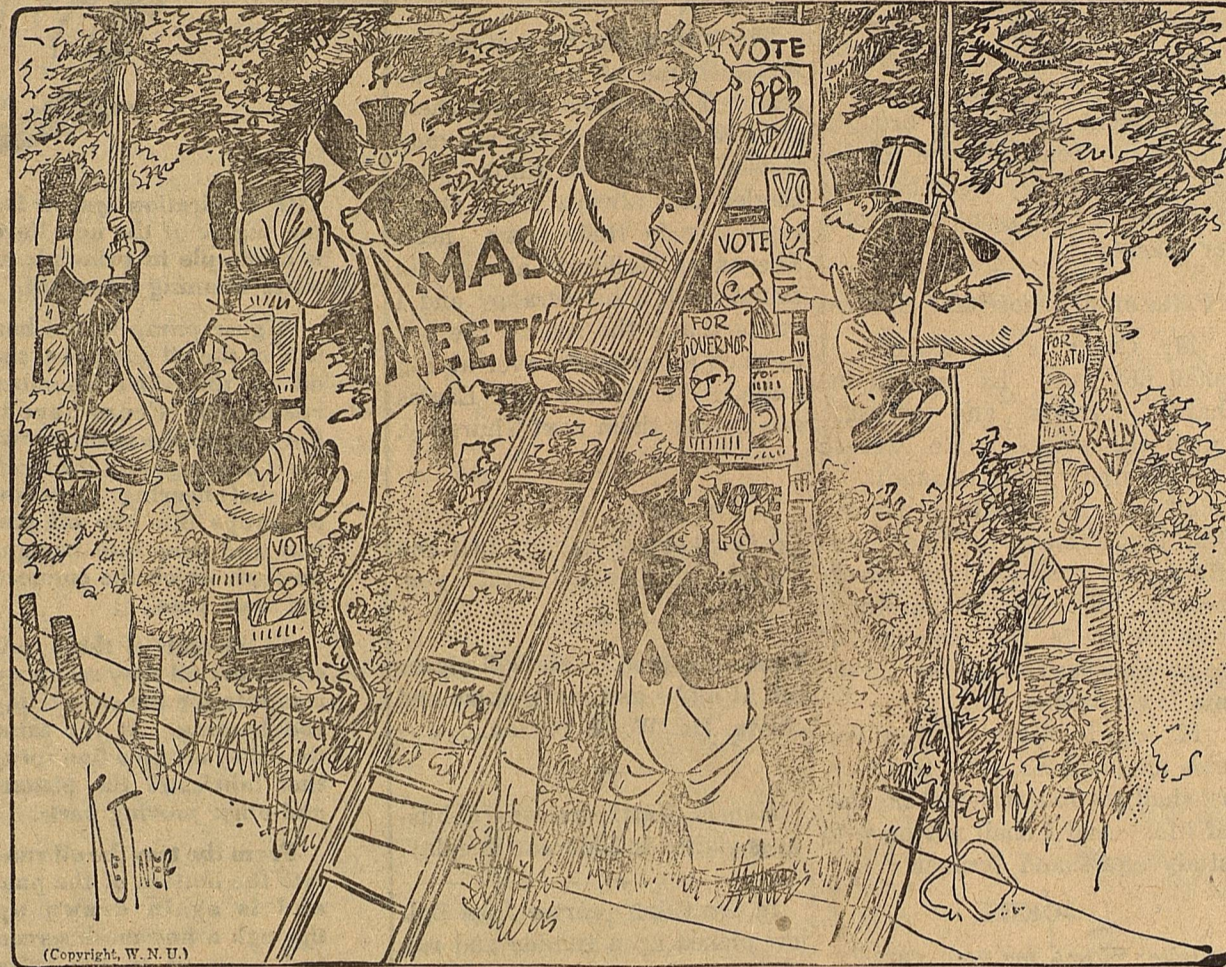
### CHURCH MONDAY NIGHT.

## A PLEA FOR TOLERANCE

By Calvin Coolidge, President.

If we are to maintain our position of understanding and good will with the nations abroad, we must continue to maintain the same sentiments at home. We are situated differently in this respect from any other country. All the other great powers have a comparatively homogeneous population close kindred in race and blood and speech and commonly little divided in religious beliefs. Our great nation is made up of the strong and virile pioneering stock of nearly all the countries of the world. We have a variety of race and language and religious belief. If any of these different peoples fall into disfavor among us, there comes a quick reaction against the rest of us from the relatives and friends in their place of origin which affects the public sentiment of that country, even though it may not be actually expressed in the official action of their government. Such misunderstandings interfere with our friendly relations, are harmful to our trade and retard the general progress of civilization. We all subscribe to the principle of religious liberty and toleration and equality of rights. This principle is in accordance with the fundamental law of the land. It is the very spirit of the American Constitution. We all recognize and admit that it ought to be put into practical operation. We know that every argument of right and reason requires such action. Yet in time of stress and public agitation we have too great a tendency to disregard this policy and indulge in race hatred, religious intolerance and disregard of those who harbor them. Instead of being a benefit they are a positive injury. We do not have to examine history very far before we see whole countries that have been benighted, whole civilizations that have been shattered by a spirit of intolerance. They are destructive of order and progress at home and a danger to peace and good will abroad. No better example exists of toleration than that which is exhibited by those who wore the blue toward those who wore gray. Our condition today is not merely that of one people under one flag but of a thoroughly united people who have seen bitterness and enmity which once threatened to sever them pass away, and a spirit of kindness and good will reign over them all.

## EDUCATION A MEANS TO PROMOTE PEACE

Washington, D. C.—The exchange of ideas on education furnishes one of the best means for the promotion of understanding and good-will among the different nations, and serves as a strong impetus toward world peace, in the opinion of Dr. Paul L. Dengler, Austrian representative of the Institute of the International Education and director of the Bureau of Education recently to arrange for cooperation between the educational agencies of the United States and his country.

The Austro-American Institute of Education, founded in Vienna in 1926, acts as a sort of educational clearing house. It distributes information about Austria and America, their schools, courses of study, professors, and academic work in general, gives advice and aid with regard to living quarters, guides, tutors, physicians and other essential matters; works out detailed programs for studies or investigations, sight-seeing expeditions and excursions; issues letters of introduction and makes contracts most advantageous for the visitors with people or institutions; secures permits for visits to schools, welfare or similar institutions; arranges lectures, exhibits, and organizes and conducts a summer school for English speaking visitors.

The institute is also much interested in establishing scholarships in America on reciprocal basis; promoting the exchange of professors, and establishing an Anglo-American Library in Vienna. Austrian teachers and students are thus enabled either to study at American universities or learn much of American life and education at this institute.

The game Thursday with the Big Lake Owls looms as one of the best games of the season for the Eldorado fans. Big Lake is a strong team, defeating Eldorado once and are coming over here with the same motive in view.

The Eldorado Eagles are in tip-top shape for the game and are determined to win, this being their last game of this season.

The boys have all shown a real fighting spirit this season and deserve the backing of the entire town. They have played real football all year, going up against teams that were not supposed to be in their class but with their "dogged" determination and the excellent coaching of Williamson took away all advantage the other teams had over them.

We hope the weather clears in order to give our small but shifty backs a chance to show what they have been holding back for this game. A muddy field would give the Oil town a great advantage, having a heavier squad but if the field is dry we think our boys will offset this weight in better faster football.

The American Federation of Labor can not be a menace to American institutions from a manufacturer's standpoint, and at the same time deserve condemnation because of tendencies contrary to Communistic doctrine. This would be impossible. Therefore, if the Federation continues its same policy of legitimate activity for the benefit of the workers of the country, it is likely to grow in favor with the people who are neither of the Communist class nor of the class that employs labor on the scale of mass production.

In other words, the fact of having received censure from sources directly opposite from each other in viewpoint, such as manufacturers and communists, leaves room for the conclusion that the American Federation of Labor is pretty much of a happy medium in its attitude toward American industry. —Pickerrill Service.

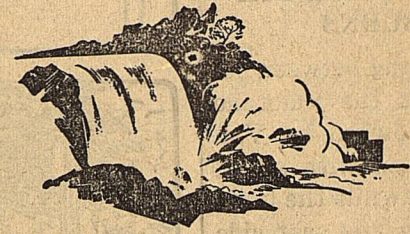

# The new Ford has a very simple and effective lubrication system



THE lubrication system for the engine of the new Ford is as simple in principle as water running down-hill.

A gear pump in the bottom of the oil pan raises the oil to the valve chamber reservoir. From here it flows on to the main crankshaft bearings and the front camshaft bearing. Overflow oil drops into the oil pan tray and runs into troughs through which the connecting rods pass.

There is just one thing for you to do, but it is a very important thing . . . watch the oil! Change the oil every 500 miles and be sure the indicator rod never registers below low (L).

If the oil level is allowed to fall below low, the supply becomes insufficient to oil all parts as they should be oiled.

### STYLE GREATER ASSET THAN BEAUTY

"A woman does not have to be slender to be chic, but she must study herself and determine the lines best suited to her type, then select a model which is smart and correct for her type. Present styles can be adopted by the large woman. There are a great many side drapes used today which are especially good for the stout woman. Suplice lines are kind to the woman of ample proportions and vertical lines which extend from neck to hem, the use of panels, loose draperies, rows of buttons and plaits are very becoming to the stout woman," so Mrs. Dora R. Barnes, clothing specialist in the A. & M. College Extension Service explains.

"The woman with over-developed legs should not wear skirts which are too short. V neck lines and deep neck lines are usually becoming to the large figure and fitted garments which cling but are not too tight tend to reduce one's size. It is very important not to over-fit, for example: A large arm will look larger if the sleeve is too tight. Tightness at the top of the hip is correct at present but there should be ease everywhere else.

"High lustre materials should be avoided by the large woman. She should likewise shun a sharp contrast of color when it breaks the figure horizontally. The short necked woman should try to increase the apparent length of this connection, and the narrow shouldered woman should try to get the effect of more breadth by use of raglan sleeves, bertha, drop shoulders, etc. By increasing the apparent width of shoulders the apparent size of the hips is reduced.

"All accessories should be selected to bring out the best lines. The person of short neck and double chin should never wear a choker necklace but a long string of beads. All these things are important, for woman's dress aids her progress by giving her self reliance and self respect."
