Sales Tax Holiday

Texas families have an opportunity to stretch their clothing budgets during the second annual Sales Tax Holiday, Aug. 4-6. No state or local taxes will be charged on most clothing and footwear priced under \$100.

Among the items that will be exempt from sales tax are: dresses, coats, sweaters, jeans, shirts, boots, shoes, diapers, gym suits and work clothes, uniforms, suits, pants and trousers.
