Drop Politics Awhle

Much of the political talk of the past two months may have been helpful in clearing the political atmosphere in Texas, but it is high time to drop politics and get back to business. September is usually the beginning of the busiest season in the State and Texas now needs more business and industrial enthusiasm than it has shown through the summer months. Drop politics and get down to business. Persuade the successful candidates to use whatever energies they have left in doing something worth while for their communities and their State. Point out to them that it is expected that they shall continue to show the interest in the welfare of the people they manifested during the campaign. Texas needs a business and industrial awakening more than it has needed a political shaking up and it needs leaders in every community.

The same kind of enthusiasm shown in the recent campaign, though along different lines, would soon start Texas well along toward the ten million population it should have by 1940.

Political Rest Needed

Texas needs to be relieved of biennial elections. It is to be hoped that the next legislature will submit an amendment to the constitution providing for elections every four years, and it is also to be hoped that the candidates to be elected this year may all render service of such noble kind that they may all be re-elected without opposition. The official good enough to serve the people two years should be able to prove to them that he is good enough for four years' service. No officer should have to spend one-fourth of his term of office trying to get elected or another term.

Good Starting Point

In his campaign for Lieutenant-Governor Senator Witt strongly advocated "economy in expenditures." The voters believed him and gave him the nomination. He will perhaps pardon the suggestion from one who has served in that office that the best starting place for "economy in expenditures" is with the expense account of the Senate itself, which employs about twice as many stenographers, committee clerks, sergeants at arms, doorkeepers, pages and other employees as are needed for the expeditious transaction of its business. Legislative expenditures could be reduced nearly one-half by requiring employees to render full-time service. Employment by the legislature has come to be regarded too much as a public sinecure.

Sponsoring Public Libraries

Civic clubs, and especially women's clubs can hardly find better work to do than establishing and sponsoring public libraries. There is no public library in Texas so well equipped it can not be improved by the co-operation of such clubs. The field for useful help is almost unlimited. There is no excuse for a town or community in Texas being without a library except the indifference of the people. Organized effort can supply the need, but this effort should be continuous because of the necessity for keeping libraries supplied with the right kind of reading matter.

Patronize Local Industries

The owner of the Big Bend Sentinel at Marfa has a State-wide reputation as a good printer—acquired it before he went to Marfa. Despite the excellent work his printing office turns out, some of the local business concerns send to other towns for their printing. This somewhat irks Mr. Meeklin, and it should. The concern that ignores local printing offices that are

prepared to do good printing, does not deserve patronage of any people who are interested in building up a town. They should be told in plain terms to seek business in the communities they themselves patronize. Towns are built through co-operative effort, and those who will not co-operate with others should be ignored when it comes to rendering business favors.

Helping Local Interprise

The officials of an oil company at Pecos show the right kind of community spirit. Pecos is noted for its fine cantaloupes. Recently these oil men bought 93 crates of Pecos cantaloupes and sent them to relatives and friends in widely separated parts of the United States. If people generally would emulate the example of these men and send local products as gifts when making presents to others, these gifts would assist greatly in advertising products for which different sections are trying to build up trade and help to increase production and sales. On a trip to the lower Rio Grande Valley last winter this writer did not find a Valley product on the menus of any of the hotels at which he stopped and when he ordered an orange juice for breakfast he had to pay as much for it as is charged in a railroad dining car. Evidently the Valley is not as interested in exploiting its products as it should be.

Some Texas Losses

From data recently gathered it is estimated that Texas is losing nearly \$200,000,000 because sufficient effort is not made to have Texas people stay in Texas on their vacations, although much money is spent every year advertising Texas as a vacation resort for citizens of other States. The first thing the average Texan seems to think of when considering a vacation is how far he can afford to get away from Texas.

No Need to Worry

A Killeen farmer is not worrying

about where his living is to come from another year. He has a flock of 350 young hens that will be laying next fall and winter. Although he is regarded as a good cotton grower, he says his past experience proves that the hens will pay him better than his cotton crop. He expects to give the flock plenty of feed and attention, but knows the returns will justify this.

Red River Irrigation

Applications for irrigation permits on the Red River are now being made to the Texas Board of Water Engineers. In ordinary years there is too much rather than too little rainfall in the section from which these applications are coming, but the rainfall this year has been so light and so unevenly distributed that farmers are preparing to do irrigated farming. The time is not far off when all the valley farmers of Texas will conserve and use all the water available along the streams.

Fall Farming

In former years practically all the fall farming and truck growing done in the State has been in South Texas. Central and East Texas will engage largely in fall vegetable growing this year. From Livingston, Jacksonville, Smithville, and other points reports come that large acreage will be planted in cucumbers, radishes and other quick growing vegetables if weather conditions are favorable.

Unemployment

The census reports that about 80,000 Texans were unemployed when the census was taken. Cotton farmers in South Texas are making every effort now to get 25,000 more cotton pickers, but with rather poor success. Preparations are being made where labor can be secured, for fall crop plantings. There is little excuse for the idleness to be found in the towns and cities now. Next winter these idlers who will not work will be steal-

ing or seeking charity. The police are under obligations to the public to start town idlers in the direction of the cotton fields.

Getting Natural Gas

Smithville, LaGrange, Schulenburg, Welmar Hallettsville and a number of other towns in that part of the State

are granting natural gas franchises and are being promised gas by Christmas. Texas has gas in plenty and it is up to Texas towns without gas to make satisfactory contracts to secure this economical and convenient fuel.

Announces the New Domestic Service Rate

"First—perhaps I'd better introduce myself. I'm the Electric Man, and to me has been given the task of explaining the new rate schedule that has been adopted by the West Texas Utilities Company.

"This new schedule, with all service through one meter and low follow-up rates, I will call the Home Comfort rate, because it enables you to receive economically the many Home Comforts and Conveniences possible through the application of electricity to your household problems. It is designed to encourage the use of electric service, and allows a premium of lower rates in proportion to the amount of service used. The new Home Comfort rate is based on the wholesale discount system, and is divided into three parts, as follows:

Initial rate 12¢
INITIAL RATE—12¢ net per kilowatt-hour for the first 4 kwh used per room per month.

2nd rate 7¢
SECOND RATE—7¢ net per kilowatt-hour for the next 5 kwh used per room per month.

Low rate 4¢ or 3¢
LOW RATE—4¢ net per kilowatt-hour for all additional energy used per month, without cooking or heating—
3¢ net per kilowatt hour for all additional energy used per month where service is also used for heating or cooking.

"There are many interesting facts regarding this new rate, too many to go into at one time, so I'm going to divide my explanations into sections. In subsequent messages I will endeavor to show you the many different advantages of the new rates. Watch for me next week."

CHEATING

I put this down as the brumbling habit of an old man.

But one day, after about a year, I happened to appear unexpectedly. He was not in evidence. Upon inquiry I discovered that he was using my time and some of my materials on a private job of his own. We had a solemn conference and decided to part.

When you put a man on his honor and then have him take advantage of your trust it is a blow to your faith in human nature. So I was depressed and a little sore.

But only for a few minutes. Then I said to myself: "How foolish I am to let this thing worry me! This man has cheated me out of a few hundred dollars but what a petty thing that is compared with the way he has cheated himself! All his life he has held a nickel so close to his eyes that he couldn't see a dollar. All his life he has lived on alibis, watching the clock, stealing a little here and there from his employers, an imagining that he was doing well for himself. "And where is he at sixty? Poor and jobless, and a failure. Reaping

what he has sown."

The old idea of Heaven and Hell was very bad because it made us think that our reward or punishment is coming to us in some far-off place hereafter.

In the same way most people misinterpret the verse in the Bible which reads: "Be sure your sin will find you out."

They say: "Lots of people sin and are never found out. Therefore the verse is untrue."

But the verse does not say that your sin will be found out. It says, "Be sure your sin will find you out." — be sure that it will settle down in your heart and mold you in its own image.

That's a terrifying thought, or a very encouraging one, according to the way you live. Everything you do has its influence on what you are.

When you cheat you cheat yourself. And whatever you do that's decent automatically and inevitably builds you up.

THE FAMILY DOCTOR

WARM-WEATHER WARNINGS

Ice-cold water is a tempting beverage during the heated season; not only that, but every possible dainty in iced dishes keeps our youngsters busy devouring all they are able to pay for. From tens of thousands of counters, ice cream in endless variety of combinations, is dispensed, and too often is swallowed as fast as the husky master or maid can get it down.

This would all be very well—something serious didn't result; not in every instance, of course, but now and then, and it's tough for the victim when it happens; which makes this word of caution timely.

A very excellent New York surgeon told me some time ago, that cases of appendicitis were five times as frequent in August as in December. He attributed the fact to the wholesale eating and drinking of ice-cold foods and beverages during the hot months. He was operating on a fifteen-year-old girl at the time he spoke to a post graduate class. "This little lady," he said, "doubtless frequents cold-drinks stands and drug-store fountains Sunday afternoons and every evening in the week; she has probably averaged five to fifteen ice-cold dishes or drinks at each visit to the resorts."

"No, the beverages are not impure; you couldn't find a germ in any of the stuff dispensed," he continued; "it's the COLD that does the mischief. All intestinal tracts contain germs—and these do not attack a healthy canal; but, chill the delicate lining of the stomach and bowel, and the natural juices that are protective are stopped in their functioning; the germs increased millions; appendicitis results."

It follows then, that iced drinks and foods should not be taken, or, certainly not in excess. If taken at all, they should be warmed in the mouth before being swallowed—eaten slowly. We should never swallow an ice-cold spoonful; can you remember that?

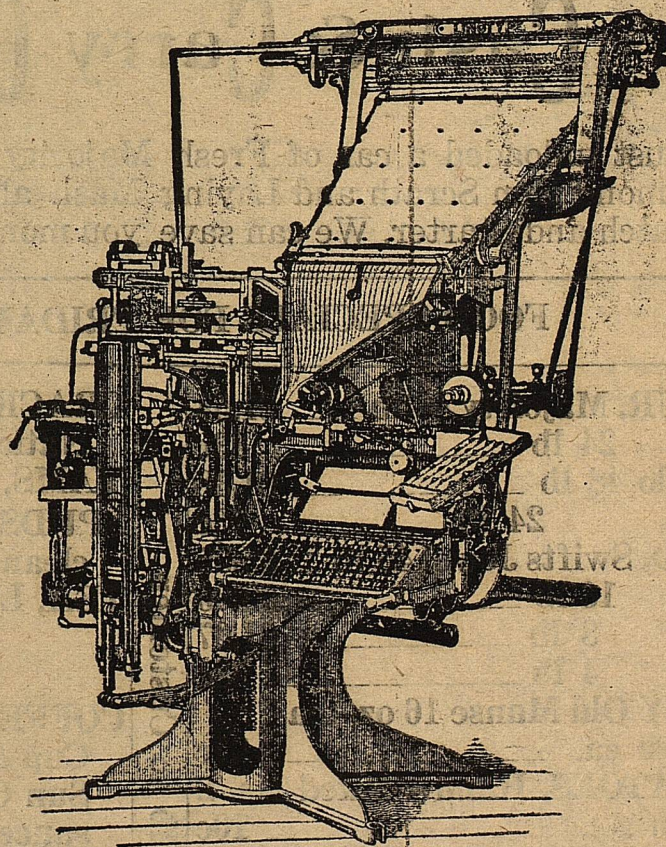

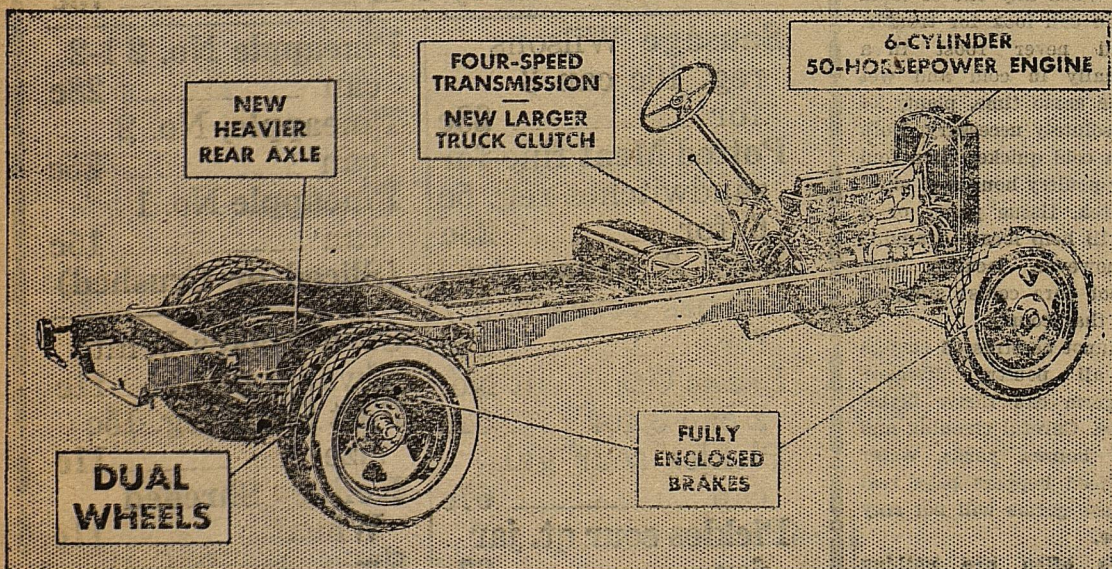

CONTROL OF COLDS AND ROUP

Colds and roup cause a heavy loss in poultry every year. Not only thru death, but slow growth and poor production. Thousands of dollars are spent every year trying to cure colds. If we were one-half as diligent in preventing this disease as we are in applying remedies after it is there, we could save a lot of money, time and worry.

Sanitation, ventilation, correct feeding and management are four very important factors in the control of colds in all poultry. When any one of them is neglected, you can look for trouble.

Birds should never roost in a draught, especially in cold and wet weather. At the same time, plenty of fresh air is absolutely necessary. Nothing will start a cold quicker than foul air. Study your poultry houses at night. A burning match, tissue paper or a light feather will help locate draughts. Remember, however, locating the draught will not cure colds; stopping it is the thing that counts.

Sanitation cannot be stressed enough in controlling all poultry diseases. Even a cold germ can thrive better in a filthy place. Careful cleaning and disinfection of houses, yards, water fountains and feed hoppers pays real dividends. Disease germs will not stay in a clean place.

Summer colds often are nothing more than nutritional roup. Feeding a well balanced ration with plenty of good tender greens is all that is necessary to prevent this sort of cold. In fact, proper feeding means stronger and healthier birds, which enables them to resist colds as well as many other diseases.

At the first sign of colds, give the birds a dose of Epsom Salts, using from three-fourth to one pound per hundred mature birds. Use some good disinfectant in the drinking water to prevent the rapid spread of the disease. There are a number of good commercial preparations on the market for this purpose. Spraying the birds after they have gone to roost with a fine mist of a solution, especially prepared locally, use a mixture of one-half gallon water one-half gallon coal oil and four table-spoonsful turpentine. In fact, anything that helps to open the nostrils of the birds may be used. No remedy, however, will be effective unless the cause can be checked.
