When Mr. DeLong came to the Concho, this country was an aria section of Texas, no railroad, no towns and only scattered settlements for a post. The first town started was Ben Ficklin and Sam Pollock of San Angelo, but then of Ben Ficklin, attended Mr. DeLong's wedding and was at his funeral Sunday

Mr. DeLong witnessed this unsettled country, inhabited by Indians, buffalo and wild game, turn into one of the best productive section of the state. Mr. DeLong and his brohers dug and put in the Christoval Irrigation ditch and irrigated land and sold hay to the Army post at Fort Concho.

His life was a thrill to sit and hear him tell of his early frontier life and bought the Indians away from the settlement on the South Concho.

THE EASTER DINNER

"What does Easter mean to you Lea o' lamb or bonnet new?' Quite likely it means both! Roast lamb just naturally belongs in the Mrs. Carson West was visiting Easter dinner menu, according to Miss friends in Eldorado Monday from the Inez S. Wilson, home economist, and she suggests the following recipes as

being specially good. Leg of Lamb, French Style

Small leg of lamb, boned 1 teaspoon minced parsley

1 finely chopped shallot

1 clove bruised garlic 2 tablespoons butter

1 onion, sliced

1 carrot, sliced Salt and pepper

Mix the parsley, shallot, garlic, seasoned with salt and pepper. Sprinkle this mixture on the inner surface of the meat. Tie the meat into compact shape and place it in a roaster, contain ing butter, onion, and carrot. Season well with salt and pepper. Bake for one-half hour in a hot oven and then at a lower temperature until the meat is done. Serve with gravy made from the drippings in the pan.

Crown Roast The Crown Roast of Lamb makes a beautiful dish for the Easter Sunday dinner. Have the crown prepared at the market. Protect the ends of the ribs from charring by putting cubes of fat salt pork on the end of each rib. Fill the crown with bread dressing. Put in a hot oven (500-525 degrees F.) for 20-30 minutes, then reduce heat to 350 degrees F. and continue roasting until done. Decorate the ribs with paper frills or carrot or potato balls. Pile new peas on top of the dressing in the center of the crown.

Roast Lamb, Virginia S For a smaller roast get a shoulder of lamb. Rub with butter, dredge well with flour and season with salt and pepper. Put in a hot oven until the flour is brown, then reduce the heat and baste every 10 or 15 minutes with grape juice or cider. When done remove the lamb to a hot platter, add one-half glass of current jelly to the liquid in the pan and thicken it with flour. Surround the roast with bacon



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FRANCE AND UNITED STATES TO HONOR MEMORY OF WASH-INGTON AT PARIS EXPOSITION

France and the United States will join in honoring the memory of the patriots of both countries who helped to win independence for the American Colonies, and especially in paying homage to the memory of George Washington, during the six months of the International Colonial and Overseas Exposition, sponsored by the French Government, which will open near Paris May 1. The American ex hibit at the exposition will help to bring the world-wide Celebration of the Two Hundredth Anniversary of the Birth of George Washington in 1932 to the attention of all nations.

To emphasize and cement the long standing friendship of the United States and France, which began during the American Revolution, an exact and fullsize reproduction of Mount Vernon, home of George Washington, is being constructed on the banks of the River Seine to serve as the admin istration building for the American exhibit.

C. Bascom Slemp, of Virginia, who is Commisioner-General of the United States to the French exposition, is also a member of the executive committee of the George Washington Bicentennial Commission. He has just returned from Paris and is now busily engaged in arranging to have appropriate furnishings and other mater ial sent from this country to be placed in the duplicate of Mount Vernon on the Seine, and to have the overseas possessions of the United States rethe exposition.

The executive committee of the George Washington Bicentennial Com mission has adopted a resolution offically endorsing the reproduction of Mount Vernon in France. The building in addition to being the headquarters of the American Commission to the French exposition, will be used as a museum in which will be placed articles connected with Washington and his time, loaned by the French and American Governments and citikens of both countries.

The George Washington Bicentennial Commission is urging Americans to "join in this patriotic endeavor" by contributing Washington to be exhibited in the Mount Vernon building. Among the many articles which the French government is lending to the United States Commission in Paris are an original miniature of General Washington and one of Martha Wash ington, a large topographic map of Yorktown painted in 1830 on the spot by order of Louis Philippe, a series of medals and documents pertaining iginal bust of Lafayette, taken from Versailles and very little known, auto graphed documents of Rochambeau, Louis XIV and Marie Antoinette and numerous other articles of historic

The official hostess at the Mount Vernon building will be Miss Anne Madison Washington, a descendent of John Augustine Washington, nephew of George Washington. The building will be furnished as nearly as possible like Washington's home. Among the things which Mr. Slemp is taking to Paris to place in the building are the key to the Bastille and a byy of a picture of Louis XIV, both given to Washington by Lafayette; reproducous Frenchmen and American colonists, and other articles appropriate to






