Our readers will be glad to know that work has been resum ed on the J. D. Wesner No. 1, W. R. Nicks, which has been closed down since Ohtober 16, when it dlosed its first 5,000 feet dontract. The new contract calls for the total depth to be 6,200 feet. W. R. Nicks is 4 miles east of the J. A. 


