#### UNEMPLOYMENT

It is quite clear that nobody has any exact information of the number of employable persons still unemployed in the United States. That is, the number who would take jobs if they were available. They claim that there are still 11 million industrial workers unemployed, the reply has lately been made, based upon Government statistics, that at no time even at the peak of prosperity, did industry ever employ more than 9 million persons, and as there are now more than seven million on industrial payrolls, the unemployment in that field cannot amount to more than two million.
