WEEK'S PROGRAM WILL BEGIN WITH PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Scouts Will Attend Church In A Body Sunday

A radio program, featured by the address of Franklin D. Roosevelt, who is an honorary president of the Boy Scouts of America, will be given in behalf of the 26th anniversary of Scouting Saturday evening from 5:30 to 6 o'clock, Scout officials here have been informed.

All Scouts and Scouters of Eldorado will gather at the Scout hut Sunday morning, form in double file and march to the Methodist Church where a space will be reserved for them to be seated in a body, while they hear a sermon delivered by Rev. P. S. Connell, at 11:00 o'clock.

Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock the main program of the week will be given at the Schleicher County Court House, to which everyone who is interested in Scouting is invited. The program includes, opening by the scouts, songs by the entire audience, and speeches on scouting in Eldorado. J. A. Whitten chairman of the Scout Committee will have charge of the meeting.

125 Herefords To Be Exhibited At Fat Stock Show

San Angelo, Feb. 7.—The registered Hereford Show, along with all other departments of the Fifth Annual San Angelo Fat Stock Show and Rodeo, March 7-11, has been enlarged and accommodations made for handling more than the 125 animals expected for the exhibit.

Cash awards in this division total \$480. Entries to date indicate the Hereford barn will have its capacity of animals, the choice stock of the best herds in the Southwest.

In connection with the show will be held the regular registered Hereford sale, set for March 9, the third day of this year's exposition. Sixty-one animals, including 59 bulls and two females, will be offered in the auction.

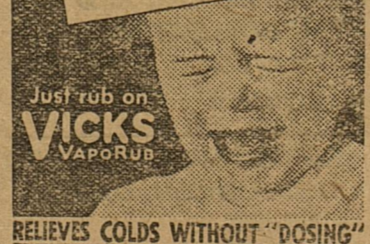

A good attendance and a splendid program was the reward of the hostess and the club members on last Thursday when the Self-Culture Club held its regular meeting.

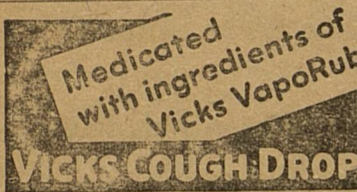
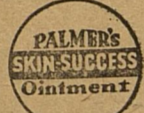
