Much has been said in the past about fire protection for Eldorado. Many plans have been mentioned periodically with nothing definite being accomplished. So, the need is even great er today for fire fighting equipment than ever before in Eldorado

The writer along with other members of the Lions Club were appointed as a committee to try and get something done about this allimportant question. The committeemen have been planning and schemeing for the past week. First we figured on buying the necessary parts and assembling a truck at home equipped with pumper, tank and the necessary hose and other apparatus. Finding that this would cost more money than could be raised, we made a trip to San Angelo and a demonstration was given us of the booster tank fire truck, of Chief Parker fame. Before we arrived at the San Angelo Fire Station I think every member of the committee had, decided in his own mind, that this type truck would not fill the bill. However, after looking the outfit over and being given an opportunity to try it out and operate the nozzle at the end of a long hose we decided that the most economical thing for Eldorado to do would be to buy it.

Admitting that new equipment would be much more desirable, and more efficient, the small investment required for the used truck will, in our opinion, be the best buy for Eldora do.
After a plan was presented to the County Commissioners at their regular meeting Monday of this week, they heartily agreed with us and authorized $\$ 200.00$ toward the purchase of this authorized

"Each applicant should be able to describe all personal property, including jewelry, furniture, auto mobiles, and live stock, in addi tion to his or her real property, Mr. Carpenter explained.
All applicants should have the following information available. (1) Original purchase price and date of purchase of all pro-
perty. (2) Description of property ing block number, etc.
(3) Amount property rend ered for on tax rolls.
(4) Name of lien holder and mount still due on mortgage, a well as total equity in property Also date and amount of lien.
(5) Description of all pro perty disposed of during the last

YEAR-TO-YEAR COMPARISON LIVE STOCK SHIPMENTS
Austin, Feb. 14-For the firs time in many moths the year-to year comparison of Texas live stock shipments to Fort Wort
stockyards and interstate tockyards and interstate point favorable, according to the Business Research. From July 1935, throughout the remainder of the year each of the monthly shipments were far below those of corresponding month of 1934 This situation was the result of the Government's huge cattle purchasing program during the summer and fall of 1934 in the drought stricken areas and also
the shipment of unusually large the shipment of unusually large
numbers of animals through regular commercial channels becaus of the shortage of and high price of feed in comparison with the price of live stock, it was pointed out.
Shipments of all classes of live stock during December totaled 4,765 cars, an increase of 7 per
cent over the 4,450 cars during cent over the 4,450 cars during the like month in 1934. Interstate plus Fort Worth car shipments of the various classes of livestock during December 1935, and 1934, respectively 199 cars; calves, 943 agains 199 cars; hogs, 374 against 254 cars; and sheep, 248 against 22 cars;
cars.
"Practically the entire increase in shipments went to the For
Worth market," the Bureau's re port said. "Receipts in this market by truck showed a phenomenal increase over the year befor in line with the trend of receipts by truck to this market, established several years ago. Receipts by rail decreased except in the case of sheep. Substantial in crease occurred in cattle and calf shipments to feeding areas, not ably to Lllinois, Missouri, Kansas lowa, and Colorado; and to the grazing areas of Arizona and New Mexico.
