Yes---We Have No Fire Department

Strange as it may sound-the colder it gets, the hotter the firemen and insurance adjusters become—Yea, if we had the firemen—That heat of course is not caused by the weather; it is brought about by more work.

Statistics reveal that severe winter weather causes an epidemic of fires. It is not difficult to see why this is so. In an effort to be comfortable, people force their stoves to the limit and also make makeshift heating agencies. Under these conditions, it is natural for more fires to break out, and this means more work for the fire department—if we had one—and more losses for the insurance companies to adjust.

If you don't want your house to become so hot that you will have to park outside, you should exercise the utmost care in operating your stoves—especially when the mercury drops to low temperatures—For we have no fire truck in Eldorado.

A little time spent in an effort to secure firefighting equipment for Eldorado is a good step too. If you feel that Eldorado is not safe from the re-occurance of the 1934 fire, you will do well to ask the city commissioners to do something about this serious problem.

Schleicher County Praised; Shouldering Local Reliet Problem

Schleicher County officials long with the commissioners of Crockett and Sutton counties, drew praise this week from Adam R. Johnson, relief director, for their declaration that local governments should shoulder relief burdens.

Schleicher county joined with Crockett and Sutton counties in employing a welfare worker, a prerequisite to distribution of federal surplus commodities.

Application Will Prove Amount Annual Income Applicants should be able to prove their yearly income be-

cause the old-age assistance law provides that \$360 yearly for single persons and \$720 yearly for married couples must be the total of revenues received by applicants from all sources including the State aid, Orville S. Carpenter, executive director designate of the Old-Age Assistance Commission said today about the new law.

"Applicants should be prepared to make a full and complete statement of all earnings for the wo years immediately preceedng application," Mr. Carpenter declared.

"The cash or security clause in he new law necessitates that aplicants be able to tell the exact mount of money they have in the bank. They should be prepared to give a description of all securities owned, serial numbers, from whom purchased, etc.," he explained. "If securities were sold, the name of the purchaser must be known. Full details about all securities handled, bought, or sold during the last two years must be provided.

"Not only does the requirement concern earned income, but aid received from any source must be listed," Carpenter stated. Section 7, subsection (e) of the new law reads that the application shall contain the following information:

If receiving aid from any source, the amount received and from whom, or if such aid be not in cash money, then a description of such aid tendered, together with the name of the source of such aid and from whom; the amount received from the United states government, State or county, public or private charit-Due to many of the members able organizations, corporations,







Club work in 1929. He has been a member of the Schleicher county club for 7 years. 1936 will make his eighth year. During that time he has fed out 103 lambs and 5 calves. He has made outstanding records during that time. He has won 37 ribbons and \$347.00 in prize money.

Gene is the second boy from this county to win one of the trips to the International Livestock Show at Chicago. He was selected to be the Gold Star 4-H Club member from Schleicher County at the 1935 Farmers Short Course. Gene is working on his eighth demonstration and has 25 lambs on feed. George Williams Jr.


George Williams Jr. is not a beginner in 4-H Club work. ht has fed out two calves before this year. He has 6 lambs ready for the County Show.
