

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

It is the same principle as that stated in the sermon on the mount as Jesus said, "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy" (Matt. 5:7), or as He said, "For with what judgment ye judge ye shall be judged; and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again" (Matt. 6:2). Paul made, it clear that this rule works both ways with this familiar passage, "Whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life everlasting" (Gal. 6:7-8). Sow bad, reap bad; sow good, reap good.

## Apricultural Agent by the County Extension Office. Texas A. e. M. College Extension Service

Most cotton farmers are getting anxious for a good hard freeze so cotton harvest can begin before bad weather sets in. With cotton prospects good, the price of cottonseed has been on the cheap side sofar this Fall downstate.

(attlemen need to consider feeding while cottonseed as a winter supplement because both cotton farmers and cattlemen could benefit by doing business with each other. Most years will see cottonseed as a good buy forcattlemen, but this year it is even more of a bargain unless prices change alot. Cattlemen can save about onethird on a protein supplement by using whole cottonseed.

Whole cottonseed contains 23 percent crude protein and 90 percent total digestible nutrients, is the situation then (TDN). This is 10-15 percent more protein and 30 to 60 percent more digestible energy than the typical 20 percent protein range cubes which may vary in fiber from 10 to 20 percent. This extra energy is particularly helpful in successfully breeding and wintering fall calving

It is more economical to feed cottonseed when you can purchase 10 lbs. of whole cottonseed cheaper than you can feed 3.5 lbs. cottonseed meal and 6.5 lbs. of sorghum. Cottonseed are easy to handle in a bulk form if you have a dry place to put them. Also the seed can be stored for several years with no apparent loss in feed value and mice do not bother them. However, the disadvantage to feeding cottnseed is the need for

bulk storage. Seed can be sacked as needed and fed two to three times per week. Troughs are preferable but seed can be feed on good grass turf with little loss.

From a nutrient stand point, a 1,000 pound cow nursing a calf should perform about the same when receiving 2 lbs. of cottonseed and 22 lbs. of average hay; pr 3.75 1bs. of a 20 percent protein cube, with fiber 10 percent or less and 20.25 lbs. of hay. Greater and more nearly equal amounts of the two supplements would be reto supply adequate protein where only dead grass or poor hay is available.

WHEAT PROBLEMS

Wheat farmers seem to be in for a bad time. Maybe this is nature's way of combating the wheat surplus problem. checked a wheat field belonging to Lewis Davis, east of Pampa and found someflea beetles. Also I have heard of other reports of flea. beetles causing loss of wheat stands in a few fields towards Miami and Laketon.

Flea beetles occasionally cause serious damage to the edges of wheat fields, particularly near grassy fence rows. These quite small, shining black beetles jump readily when approached. They feed on wheat leaves, occasionally eating small holes in them so that leaves look skeletonized. The plants. become bleached and die when heavily infested.

Generally flea beetles, move into fields from the borders. When this treatment of infested field margins, plus about 50 additional feet into the field is generally adequate for effective control. However in visting with Kenneth Gray he found flea beetles infesting an entire field and not just along the field edges. He also found a lot of mites.

With all of the insect problems that some farmers have encountered this Fall, ranging from cutworms, false wireworms, flea beetles and mites, producers need to keep up frequent inspections of wheat fields and check thoroughly when spots or areas begin to change condition rapidly.

Cool fall weather need not put an end to the enjoyment of root crops and greens fresh from the garden. In fact, the onset of cold weather will improve the flavor of the root crops.

Crops such asturnips, beets, carrots. parsnips and radishes will grow on through the fall into November and December. Gardeners can prolong the growth of lettuce collards, mustard and kale into the late fall by erecting simple plastic shelters over the rows.

There are some precautions which should be taken to extend the bountiful yield of gardens, as hard freezes will damage the exposed crowns quired (5 to 6 lbs. daily) of root crops. A coarse mulch shuld be spread at least two to three inches deep around the base of the plants and


