McLean citizens have until November 22 to comment on new HEW rules that if adopted, would probably close the McLean Hospital. The HEW proposals would allow about four beds per 1,000 people. McLean's hospital would only be allowed about five beds and even Amarillo might lose 284 beds.

The proposals would not only affect hospital capacity but vital service such as obstectrics and radiation therapy would be cut back.

Congressman Hightower is very concerned and said that these proposals are a backward step for rural health care in this country. The congressman suggested citizens interested in health care send their comments on this issue to Daniel J. ### Seek Soil - Water Conservation Help

Many farmers and ranchers of Gray County are seeking help in soil and water conservation. This year the Soil Conservation Service in conjunction with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service administrated two cost - share programs. These were the regular Agriculture (onservation Program which runs annually. Then the Drought and Flood Conservation Program was in effect from June to October.

The ACP resulted in thirty-seven request for SCS technical assistance which consisted of ten ponds, two water storage facilities fourteen irrigation pipelines, five land leveling, three tailwater pits, one waterway, one erosion control dam and one stock pond. These conservation practices were cost shared anywhere from fifty to seventy-five per cent of the actual cost, not to exceed set average county cost.

The DFCP was a special program brought on by earlier drought conditions of Gray County. Many farmers and benefited ranchers greatly from this program. We had thirty-four irrigation pipelines, eight tailwater pits. twelve ponds, one land leveling, two terraces, and six diversions. This gives a total of sixtythree requests for SCS assistance. All were eighty percent cost shared not to exceed set average county cost.

These figures alone show that farmers realize what soil and water loss can cost them now and in the future. They have watched gulfields caused by water runoff. They have watched fuel bills soar on their irrigation wells. While much of their water was running down the county bar ditches.

But due to government programs such as ACP, or special programs like DFCP, they can help prevent this. Financial aid helps farmers and ranchers install much needed conservation measures with only part of the cost incurred by

### armers-Ranchers Cotton Trading Hunters Need To Increases This Week Practice Safety

Trading increased this week as the volume of cotton available for sale grew. Physical prices for most mixed lots ranged from 41.00 to 44.00 cents per pound, most qualities bringing 250 to 300 points over the loan. At present, little, if any premium is being paid for grades higher than 32 or staples longer than 32. Growers received an average of \$62 per tonfor cottonseed.

About 12,500 samples were classed at Memphis for the week ending Friday, November 11 bringing the season's total to 29,400. This compares to 7300 as of this date last year.

Light spotted grades made up 68 percent of the smples classed while white grades made up 32 percent. The predominant grades were 3º with 40 percent, 4º w th 24 percent, 31 with 17 percent and 41 with 12 percent. Major staple lengths were 31 with 43 percent and 32 with 28 percent. Micronaire readings were in the desirable range of 3.5-4.9 on 89 percent of the samples tested. Eight percent miked above and three percent miked beow this range. Average pressley for the week was 86 0 0 pounds per square inch.

November brings to mind Thanksgiving turkey pumpkin pie visiting relatives and other holiday images. However, November retains a special place in the minds of thousands of Texans; it marks the beginning of the state's regular hunting season for quail deer and tur-

It is truly an exciting time of year, especially for those young hunters who are going hunting for the first time. If you happen

to be in this group, the Texas Praks and Wildlife Department hopes you take more into the field than a loaded gun and your enthusiasm.

Hopefully, you will take along a knowledge of hunting safety and safe gun handling. The r fle or shotgun you will be carrying has been designed to kill, and the bullet or hot it shoots cannot tell the difference between a deer or a man.

A careful study of hunting accidents has shown that most of them could have been avoided if those involved had practiced hunting safety. (areless gun handling along is responsible for at least 35 percent of the accidents which occur in Texas each year.

To protect you and your hunting companions while hunting to gether with loaded firearms. there are several rules to follow that parallel common sense.

The cardinal rule is to consider every gun as if it were loaded whether in the home or a field Guns carried into camp or home must always be unloaded, taken down (taken apart) or have actions open. It is best to case forearms while traveling from your residence to the field or from one field to the

Be sure that the barrel and action are clear of obstruction such as mud or snow. Even cleaning patches left in the barrel could cause an explosion.

Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot and that includes your hunting companions tv screens livestock and windmills.

Be sure of your target before pulling the tr gger as this can be the most dangerous time of the hunt f you haven't identified the bird or animal. Femember, if you miss your target that bullet or load of shot will continue to travel for quite a distance.

Since many hunting accidents occur while climbing in and out of deer and duck blinds, the hunter must b sure the gun is unloaded at this time.

Crossing fences accounts for manu accidents as the hunter becomes snared by the barbs or hooks the trigger on a post. Sportsmen hunting alone should unload the firearm and lay it on the ground with the muzzle pointing away from him. Asthenumber of hunters increaaes

so does the potential danger when crossing fences. In this situation, both hunters should unload their guns and while one holds the firearms the first hunter crosses

Fresh fruits and vegetables offer some top economy buys at Texas grocery markets this week according to Mrs. Gwendolyne (lyatt.consumer marketing information specialist.

Items in best supply at the most economical prices are cranberries grapefruit oranges apples, tangelos, tangerines, bananas and gra-

In selecting cranberries, look for plumpness. good color and size uniformity. Also they are easy to freeze. Simply put the orig nal package n the freezer.

Fresh potatoes and onions are this week's "spotlight items" for thrifty choices. Other good values are cooking greens. hardshell squash and sweet potatoes. Additional economy

buys are pumpkin, carrots broccoli eggplant cabbage, rutabagas and green peppers.

Fryer chicken prices have fluttered upward slightly, but whole chickens are still an economy choice. In egg buying, Grade A, large-size eggs generally are the best

value, although prices are a bit higher. That trend likely will continue through the holiday season as demand for eggs increases.

Impulse buying may send family food costs soaring. Avoid haphazard food buying by planning menus and then making a shopping list from them. This cankeep trips to the store down to one a week and mean even more savings.




