While the spectators stood around the fence shivering, most of the young contestants were busy, with some adult help, grooming their hogs or steers. And when they got into the show area, it was obvious that all the 4-H members had on their minds was catching the judge's attention. The cold was forgotten, and some of the young people even discarded coats or coveralls during the judging period.

The top award winners in the 1978 show were Steven McAnear, who had the grand champion a Duroc, and Joe Mercer, who showed the grand champion steer, a crossbreed.

The reserve champion hog ribbon went to Bill Hambright for his crossbred barrow, while Teresa Woods took the reserve champion steer award with her crossbreed.

Showmanship trophies were captured by Eddie Brooks in the hog show and Greg Gabel in the steer show.

The man who attracted the gazes of every contestant was Kenneth Kensing of White Deer, the judge for both the hog and steer contests.

Students Eye Livestock Competition In Pampa

The McLean young people who participated in the stock show here last week will be taking their livestock to Pampa this week for the Top O' Texas Stock Show and Sale, to be conducted at the Show barns in Recreation Park.

Eleven steers and 11 barrows shown by 19 McLean 4-H members and five steers and five barrows shown by local FFA students are expected for the Gray County Junior Show, scheduled for 1 p.m. Saturday.

The Top O' Texas Regional show, slated for Monday, will attract the same McLean entrants. Noon on Sunday is the deadline for weighing in of all livestock for the Top O' Texas show and sale.

Monday will be devoted to the judging of all junior livestock classes. Dr. John McNeil of Amarillo will judge the steers beginning at 8:30 a.m. Monday. Jim McManigal of Canyon will judge the swine division beginning at 2 p.m.

About 40 FFA livestock judging teams from Area I will compete Tuesday, with re-

gistration to start at 8:30 a.m. in the stock show sales arena.

Mike Harkins, Greg Henley, and Curtis Simpson will represent the McLean FFA in the judging contest.

The Frank M. Carter Scholarship of \$500 to attend the Texas Tech University department of agriculture will be presented to the outstanding FFA student in Area I.

Judging of registered Hereford classes, including the Junior Heifer Show, will be Tuesday at 1 p.m. The Hereford Association's annual banquet will be Tuesday night at 7:30 p.m. at the M.K. Brown Auditorium, where Texas Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown will speak.

Both the junior and registered sales will be Wednesday, with Col. Walter Britten of Bryan as the auctioneer. A bidders' breakfast will be in the stock show dining room from 7 a.m. to 8 a.m., preceding the junior livestock sale at 8:30 a.m.

The registered Hereford sale is slated for 2 p.m. Wednesday.

Work Displayed At Schools

Parents and interested residents attended an open house at the McLean schools Tuesday night in connection with Texas Public Schools Week.

Elementary, junior high, and high school

classrooms were open to the public, and displays of the work of elementary and junior high students were viewed.

The high school science department hosted a display.

At the close of the open house, a program in the high school auditorium featured music by McLean students.

High school band members who received first division ratings on their solos or ensembles in a recent contest performed their pieces.

First through the fourth grade music students of Mrs. Janet Glass and Mrs. Bobbi Stalls sang railroad songs, dressed in railroad costumes.

The high school boys are entered in a track meet at Panhandle this weekend, while the high school girls will be competing at Lefors.

The high school teams won't be at full strength, however, with several of the athletes gone to an FBLA convention in San Antonio.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is the second of two stories about the only graduates of McLean High School who are playing college basketball. Last week's story featured Cindy Sherrod. The article this week is reprinted from the Plainview Daily Herald, with some corrections.)

Sheri Haynes, as a kid growing up on a ranch in the Panhandle town of McLean (pop. 1,062, about the enrollment of Wayland Baptist College), thought of little else but playing for the famous Flying Queens.

And, after "making a mistake," she left the national women's championship team to do it.

The three-time all-state player left Delta State, Miss., at mid-term last year to transfer to Wayland, disenchanted with unfulfilled promises of more playing time on a club that seldom pulled its starters.

She played the rest of the year with the Queen Bees but got to join the varsity for the NWIT at

Amarillo and the homecoming game. This season, the blonde junior has found her niche, averaging six points a game as a back-up to playmaker Kathy Harston or, at times, playing alongside the Southlake Carroll sophomore.

How she wound up at Delta State in Cleveland, Miss., is an unusual story in itself. She was the cover girl on the second issue of the Panhandle-Plains Basketball Magazine in 1974-75, and Delta's general recruiter, Melvin Hemphill, saw the magazine and contacted her.

Although offered scholarships at the University of Nevada at Las Vegas, Delta, and other schools, she chose to go with the Mississippi school, which had just won the first of three straight national titles. "They acted like they really wanted me, and I liked the people real well," she recalled.

But, for someone used to playing all or most of the time--she averaged 42 points a game as a senior, scoring 71 against Wellington--the bench was unusually hard to ride.

After Delta won its second national title at State College, Pa., in 1976, beating Wayland 61-60

in the semifinals, Sheri admitted, "It was pretty neat but I really didn't feel like I was part of it."

She contacted Dean Weese during the summer about coming to Wayland, but her Delta coaches assured her she would play more. "I had the scholarship at Delta and decided to go back, but it was just the same. So I decided to transfer at semester to get a half year of learning in the Wayland program," Sheri said. "The girls here were all so friendly. That sure helped me get adjusted."

"The main difference between here and at Delta is that out there we never worked on defensive drills. Hardly ever a word was said about defense." She parallels the two teams as being well-drilled, but adds, "I think we need to play with more enthusiasm."

The middle of five children of Mr. and Mrs. John M. Haynes, lifelong McLean residents, she got plenty of basketball-playing experience with two older brothers and two younger ones. Her dad played at West Texas State, and both parents were

high school players at McLean. "They really encouraged me," Sheri said with a broad smile. Basketball wasn't her only forte in high school, as she competed in track, golf, and tennis, excelling in all. "Dad got me to running in track meets starting in the fifth grade," she said, recalling that her best times in high school were 11.0 in the 100, 7.0 in the 60, and she also ran on the 440 relay. She participated in all three of those events at regional her senior year. Quickness is one of her biggest assets as a basketball player.

Also, she was the state Class A golf champion as a senior and went to regional in tennis as a sophomore. "I still like basketball best," she admitted. She also enjoyed riding horses and branding cattle. A P. E. major, she's unsure if she wants to coach after graduation. Right now, she likes to entertain thoughts of achieving something no other player, man or woman has ever done: to play for two different national championship teams. If the Queens can make it to Los Angeles this month, she'll have that chance. And, coincidentally, Wayland very possibly could play Delta State in the semifinals.

Gray County Voters Should Check Voter Registration

PAMPA-- Any Gray County residents who have moved or who did not receive the new voter registration certificates which were mailed from the Gray county Tax Office in November are asked to report to the tax office to re-register, according to County Clerk Wanda Carter.

Mrs. Carter said the request applies to those who did not receive the new, yellow voter registration certificates.

Incorrect voter registration numbers were issued to residents of the Laketon and Alanreed precincts, and those persons are asked to have the numbers corrected, Mrs. Carter said.

Mrs. Carter said the new lists must be mailed to the county clerk's office by April and that Gray County residents should re-register immediately.

To comply with state law, Laketon and Alanreed voting precincts were combined because neither precinct separately could meet the required number of voters (100) for a precinct.

"However, a new law allows a minimum of 50 voters per precinct, and Gray County commissioners reopened the two separate precincts; but at that time the registration numbers were not changed," Mrs. Carter said.

If you have no proof of age, you may sign an affidavit attesting that you are 62 or over.

The passport is available at almost all federal areas where it may be used, so it may not be necessary to get your passport before beginning your trip. Wayland Queens Compete In Regional AIAW Tourney

The Wayland Flying Queens have yet to be tested in playoff basketball action as they compete this week in the Southwest Regional AIAW Tournament at Nacogdoches.
The Plainview-based Queens rolled over four opponents without breathing hard last week at the Texas AIAW tournament, outclassing the University of Texas for the third time this year in the finals, 98-76. Sheri Haynes of McLean saw little action and scored two points.
The Queens were to meet McNeese State Wednesday in the first round of the tourney at Nacogdoches.
If victorious as expected, they would play today (Thursday) the winner of a game between Texas Tech and Northeastern (Okla.) State.
Seven of the 16 teams in the state tournament qualified for the regional affair. In addition to Tech and Wayland, they are:

Texas, Stephen F. Austin, Houston, North Texas, and Baylor.
One of the top-seeded clubs in this week's tournament is LSU, ranked No. 2 in the nation. The top two teams in the regionals will advance to satellite tournaments next week.
Wayland, the nation's 3rd-ranked outfit, averaged 106 points per game in the state tourney to its opponents' 49.
The Queens set a school scoring record in an opening round rout of Texas Lutheran. Wayland beat TLC by 103 points, 130-27. Haynes contributed 8 points in a balanced attack, as Kathy Harston was high with 18.
Wayland then ripped Lamar University 85-41 (Haynes scored 4) and Texas Tech 110-52 (Haynes had 8) to reach the finals against the Lady Longhorns.
The Queens sported a 27-3 season record going into this week's action.
