The district 3-1A standings as of Jan. 19 were released recently by the *Amarillo Dailey News*. The McLean Tigers found themselves in second position with a district win-loss record of 2-1. Claude led the pack with a 3-0 record, Groom was third with a 2-2 record, fourth was Phillips with a 1-2 record and Lefors was fifth with a 0-3 district tally.

The Tigers were scheduled to challenge Claude's first-place position Tuesday night, but results of the game were too late for press-time.

"No one team has the district sewn up this year. Too many of the district groups are too close together," said Tiger coach Jerry Cook. "We've surprised a lot of people this year. The

fight for the district championship is going to be a battle to the very end," he said.

The Tigers were handed their first district loss Jan. 20 when they traveled to Groom to face the red Tigers. McLean found themselves unable to overcome several obstacles during the game, and lost to Groom 58-50. Tiger Scott Stubbs led the scoring for the Tigers with 18 points. Randall Wynn followed with 12, Robert Swaner had 10, Martin Gately had six, and Darin Corley had four.

In previous action, the Tigers defeated Hedley 64-40. The game, originally scheduled for Jan. 19.

Martin Gately led the scoring with 19 points, Scott Stubbs had 13, Wynn had 12, Corley had

eight, Darren Johnson had five, Robert Swaner had four, and Darrell Myers had three.

The Tiger junior varsity played the Groom Tiger junior varsity Jan. 20, and lost 52-22. Darren Johnson led the scoring with 18 points. Jerry Money had four.

In District 3-1A girls standings, the Tigerettes are currently tied for third place with a 1-2 record. Claude is leading the district at 3-0, Groom is second with 3-1, Phillips is third at 1-2,

and Lefors is fifth at 0-3.

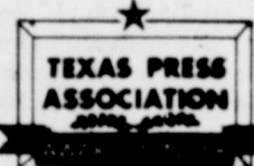
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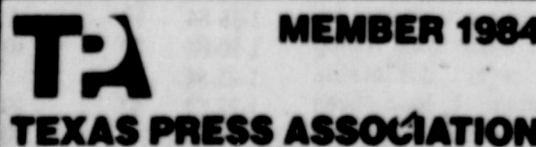

Sen. Sarpalius Appointed To National Conference

Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby announced recently the appointment of State Senator Bill Sarpalius (D-Hereford) to serve with legislators from other states to monitor the disposal and storage of high-level radioactive waste.

The National Conference of State Legislatures has organized the working group under the provisions of the Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982 which mandates legislative involvement in facilities selection for disposal sites. The legislative group will act as a forum to air legislative views on all aspects of the Department of Energy's (DOE) high level radioactive waste siting program.

In addition, the group will be advised of the latest technological advancements in testing and drilling programs for such waste.

"The disposal of high-level nuclear waste is a problem which we must be fully prepared to deal with," Lieutenant Governor Hobby said. He added, "I am pleased to have a legislator with the background of Senator Sarpalius collecting information and presenting our views before the committee. His district is concerned with the siting problem, and therefore it is important that he have firsthand information about what is going on at the national level on this critical issue."
