

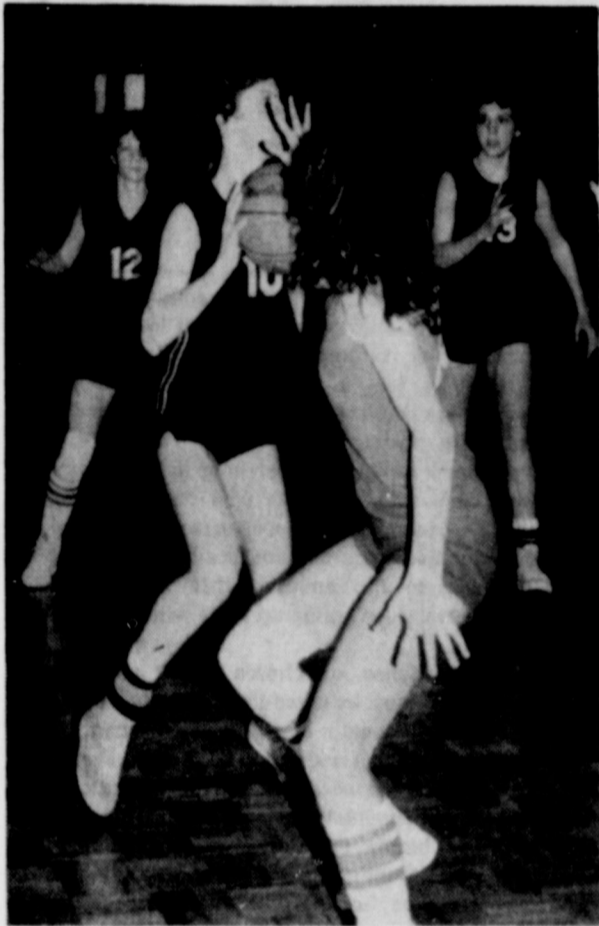

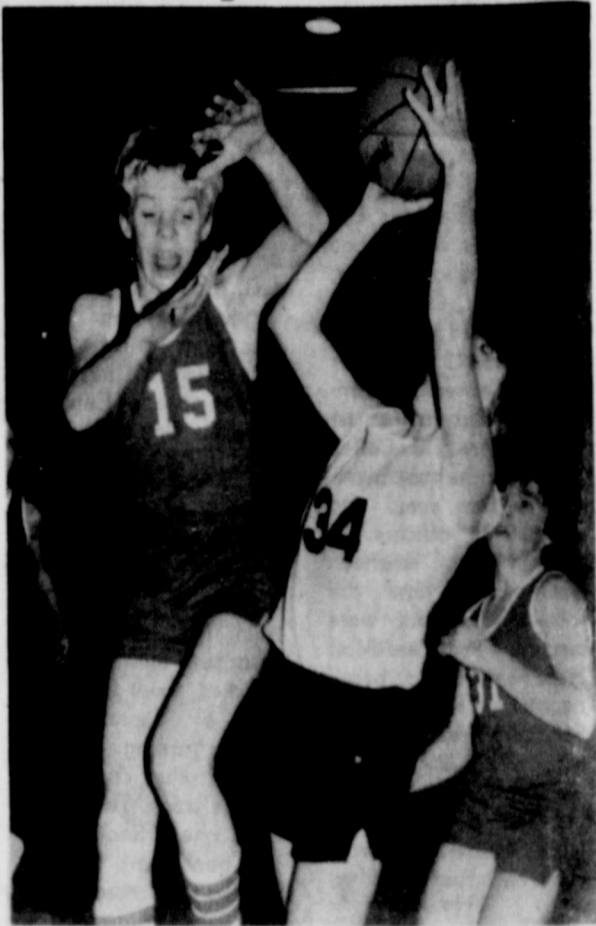

Cubettes Walk Away With Trophy In McLean Invitational

McLean's junior high Cubettes walked away with the championship trophy Saturday in the annual McLean Invitational Tournament, and the Cubs lost a close battle to Clarendon's 8th grade team, to lose the championship trophy.

The Cubettes started the tournament by defeating Hedley 26-21. Shandee Rice led the scoring with nine points, Terri Lee had eight, Angie Reynolds had five, and Misty Magee had four.

In their second game of the tournament, Rice once again led the Cubettes to victory, this time, defeating Clarendon's 8th grade team. Rice had 10 points, Reynolds had six, Lee and Darla McAnear each had two and Magee had one.

In the championship game against Skellytown, McLean routed their opponent 33-11, and walked off with the first-place trophy. Angie Reynolds led the scoring in the championship game with 14 points, Rice had eight

points, Kim Beaver had six, Terri Lee had three, and Linda Reid had two.

The Cubs began their tournament play against Clarendon's 7th grade team, defeating them 43-15. Loyd Morris had 14 points, Huey Green had

10. Jeff Parker had seven, Sid Brass had six, and Floyd Morris had four.

Hedley fell to McLean 34-23 in second-day tournament action. Loyd Morris led the scoring with 10 points. Jim

Anderson and Huey Green followed with six points each, Jeff Parker

and Floyd Morris had five each, and Sid Brass had two.

Luck did not hold for

the Cubs, however, as they lost the championship trophy to Clarendon's 8th grade team, 31-20. Loyd Morris had seven points, Jeff Parker had five, Sid Brass, Floyd Morris, Tony Hambricht, and Huey Green each had two points.

Tigers Win Two, Better District Record Tigerettes Lose To Phillips, Beat Lefors

The Tigerettes lost senior Maria Eck and the game when they faced the Phillips Blackhawks here Jan. 10. Miss Eck was injured in the beginning of the third quarter, suffering a broken bone in her right hand. Miss Eck, who has been the high point for the Tigerettes in almost every game, will be sidelined for the remainder of the basketball season.

At the end of the first half, the Tigerettes led Phillips 18-12, but by the end of the third quarter, Phillips had narrowed the Tigerettes lead to 24-22, and holding McLean to four points in the fourth quarter, defeated McLean 42-28.

The Tigerettes rallied back, however, to defeat the Lefors Pirates in their next match Jan. 13. Freshman Jem Ann Rice and sophomore Melanie Billingsley led the Tigerettes to their 37-16 victory, contributing 13 points each. Sophomore Kristie Thompson had 100% from the free-shot line, sinking six penalty baskets. Senior Angie Wilson had a 3-point total for the game, and sophomore Lee Ann Tate had two points.

Tigers Martin Gately and Robert Swaner with 18 and 15 points, respectively, led McLean in their 57-52 victory over the Blackhawks from Phillips, Jan. 10.

The Tigers jumped out to a 14-8 lead in the first quarter, and although

Phillips caught up to within five points, they could never overcome the Tiger offense and close the gap. Other Tigers contributing to the game were Randall Wynn with ten points, Robert Swaner with eight, and Darin Corley with six points.

The Tiger then traveled to Lefors, Jan. 13 and sunk the Pirates hopes for revenge from a previous 3-point loss to the Tigers, McLean won the battle 37-36. Martin Gately and Robert Swaner each had 12 points, Scott Stubbs had six and Randall Wynn had seven.

The junior varsity Tigers lost to Phillips 58-15 Jan. 10. Jerry

Money and Bill Watkins had four points, Chet Bohlar had five, and Carl Sherman had two points.

The JV Tigers recovered from their loss, however, and upset the Lefors JV Pirates 26-20. Overcoming a three-point Pirate lead at halftime, the Tigers kept Lefors from the score board in the third quarter, and only allowed six points in the fourth to cinch their victory.

Jerry Money led the scoring with 16 points, and Darren Johnson had 10.

The high school roundballers were scheduled to travel to Hedley Jan. 17, but the non-district games were cancelled due to poor weather conditions.

McLean School Board Extends Contracts

The MISD school board met for their monthly meeting Jan. 10, at 7 p.m. Present were Loyd Hunt, Joe Magee, James Hefley, Darryel Herndon, John Holland, superintendent Jim Rutherford,

and business manager Shirley Johnson. Board member Tommy Cole was absent.

Loyd Hunt opened the meeting with a prayer. The December minutes

were read and approved, and members approved the December checks, the December financial statement, the December tax-assessors report, and the December cafeteria report.

Members then voted to accept the Madge Page Cup Award. Details on the award have not been completely worked out.

The board approved holding an election in

April for two three-year terms on the board. They also approved the band trip to Six Flags sponsored by the band boosters, to be scheduled at a later date.

In further action, the board approved the new high school grading policy presented by principal Ron Cummings. Beginning with the 1984-85 school year, grades 93-100 will be excellent, 85-92 will be good, 75-84

will be average, 70-74 will be poor but passing, below 70 will be failing.

Superintendent Jim Rutherford had two years left on his contract, and the board extended his contract one year, at \$4,500 above state schedule. He is now on a three-year contract.

Business manager Shirley Johnson's contract was renewed for 1984-85 at \$3,250 above state schedule.

Councilmen discussed with Jim Hayes the legality of placing signs along Interstate 40. Further information is still needed by the council, no action was taken.

Councilmen also learned that the city must have a certified law officer on

duty. No immediate action was taken.

City fathers then decided that all bills to the city must be paid in full. Partial payments on bills will not be allowed.

A new gas pump for the city warehouse was purchased by councilmen from Tascosa Pump Services of Amarillo.

L.L. Rodgers was ap-

pointed to the Lovett Memorial Library board and Charlotte Hefley and Johnnie Allison were re-appointed to three-year terms to that board by councilmen.

Councilmen voted to pay current bills.

City fathers went into an executive session at 9:10 and adjourned at 10 p.m.

previously mentioned places?

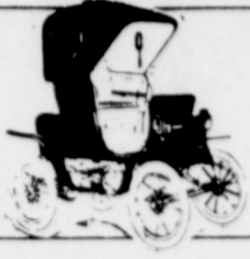
As I am writing this column, (Tues. morn.) the snow is really coming down, and the forecast is for some more snow with very, very, cold weather again.

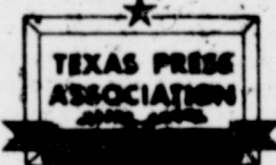

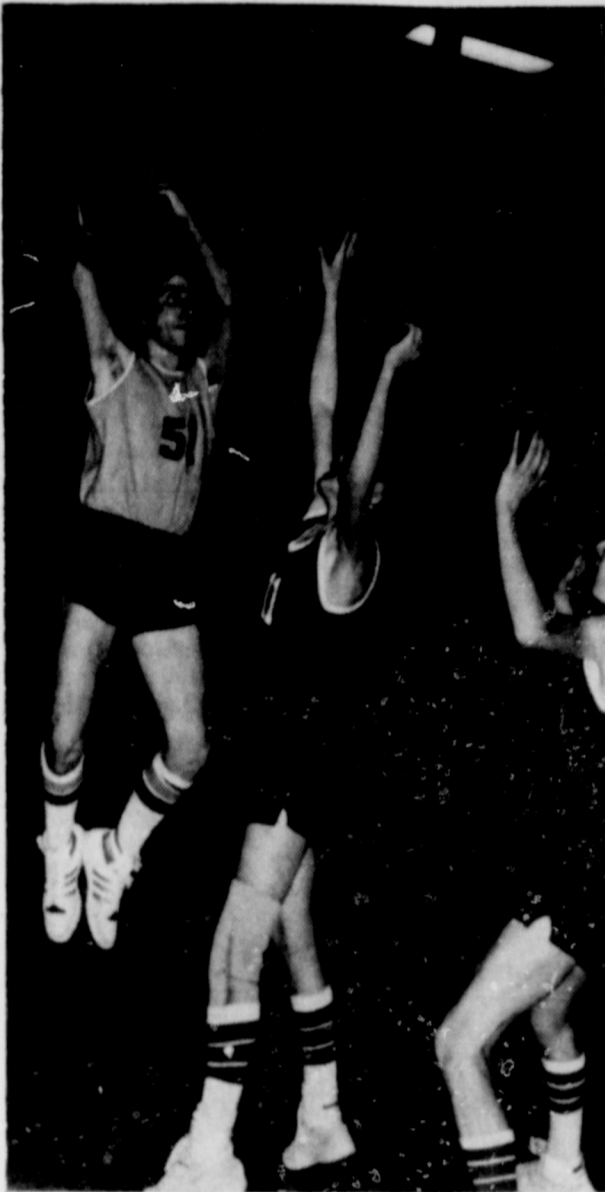
