The McLean-Alanreed area had its share of wrecks during the Christmas holidays, but most were the result of the ice and snow storms that had hit the area, and not alcohol-related, as is often the case during this holiday season.

"We feel we have been quite fortunate not having many alcohol-related accidents," said DPS trooper John Holland. 'Most people were not mixing drinking and

driving and we believe the results show it."

"Whether people stayed off the roads due to the weather, or the passage of the stricter DWI laws caused it, we're glad
