Dwyer Given Three-Year

Clements Inauguration Tuesday

William Perry Clements, the first Republican to be elected Governor in Texas in 105 years, will be sworn into office Tuesday in Austin.

Inaugural festivities will begin Monday with a victory reception and cocktail party at the Austin Municipal Auditorium hosted by Clements for Governor Campaign, at 6:30 p.m. and a Texas Heritage Festival Dinner also at the auditorium at 7:30 p.m. On Tuesday, a breakfast hosted by Governor-elect and Mrs. William Clements and the Dallas Chamber of Commerce for the 66th Texas Legislature members and their spouses will begin at 8:15 a.m. At 10 a.m. a prayer service will be held at

First United Methodist Church in Austin. Clements and Lt. Governor Bill Hobby will be sworn into office at noon on the south steps of the Capitol. A traditional Texas barbeque will be served at 12:30 in the West Wing of the Capitol, followed by the Inaugual Parade at 2:30 p.m. At 4:30 p.m. a Young Texans Celebration will begin on the southwest lawn of the Capital, and a

the public will attend the inaugural symphony. Five balls are planned for the evening celebration.

Clements was born on April 13, 1917, in Dallas. After graduating from high school at Highland Park, where he was the first HPHS football player to be named to an All-State football team, he worked in the South Texas oil fields.

eering for two years at Southern Methodist University, Clements worked for a Texas oil field service company. He resigned at age 28 to establish his own business - the Southeastern Drilling Company. The company, now known as SEDCO, is a major international drilling contractor, employing approximately 15,000 people. Clements' active par-

lican Party began in th 1950's when he worked as a poll watcher for t Eisenhower campaign worked precincts doordoor in support of the Republican Party. In 1964 Clements State Finance Chair for George Bush's U.S. Sen ate campaign, and in 1970 he served as Bush's Dallas County FL nance Chairman.

Supply and Morgan's Laundry burglaries, access to the buildings was gain-ed through the back door of the auto supply build-

Using a welding torch and other tools from the building, the burglars then alternately cut and welded the door of the safe, taking an estimated three hours to cut through the safe door. After the safe was open-

ed, papers were strewn about in apparent search for cash. The break-in netted about \$2600 in cash from the safe. Two sets of sockets were also taken in the robbery.

Morgan's Laundry was entered through a window in the wall which separates the laundry and the auto supply store. The window was broken, cash drawers rifled, and an unsuccessful attempt was made to open a change machine in the laundry.

About \$100 and two cases of carbonated beverage were taken in that robbery. The break-in at Bentley's Fertilizer was ap-

parently fruitless. A spokesman for the firm stated that although a window had been broken and checks and papers

scattered around, no cash was taken since there was none left overnight

Texas Has Long History Of Unique Inaugurations

When William P. Clements, Jr., places his hand January 16 on the worn Bible used to swear in Tex-

traditions connected with gubernatorial inaugurations. Many of the state's chief executives have contributed some unique approaches to that solemn ceremony. Jack Maguire, Executive Director of The University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio, has been researching Texas governors and their inaugurations for many years. Here are some of the facts he has turned up: When Texas joined the Union, the first gubernatorial inauguration was held on February 19, 1846, in front of the frontier structure that served as the State Capitol. As the Lone Star flag was lowered and the American flag hoisted, President Anson Jones stepped down with the words, "The Republic

of Texas is no more" and James Pickney Henderson was sworn in.


The present Capitol, com-

pleted in 1888, could proud-

ly lay claim to being the seventh largest building in the world. The first swearing-in ceremonies in that structure took place in 1889 with the well-dressed guests filling the galleries and the House of Representatives. However, they were forced to sit on the floor because furniture was not yet installed. One writer observed that Texas inaugurals have been bigger'n Dallas, better'n any other and bragged on from here to Alaska." However, Governor Sam Houston's 1861 inaugural didn't begin to live up to this inaugural, so Lieutenant Governor Edward :Clark

stepped in and Houston returned to his Huntsville home.

The first native son sworn into office was James Stephen Hogg who became governor in 1891. The event was marked with fireworks shot from the Capitol Dome a torch parade, dances and the only inaugural banquet to be served at the Capitol. Miriam Amanda "Ma" Ferguson became Texas' --and America's --- first wo-





Ruth Magee, McLean city councilwoman, was recently appointed to the revue committee of the Health Systems Agency of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.


The nine-member committee is responsible for revueing all applications to the HSA, including certificates of need for nurs-





million -- 43 percent above the FY 1977 level. according to W.H. (Bill) Pieratt, State Director. Of the \$525 million, 98 percent of which are loans repayable with interest, over \$345 million are farm loans. Housing loans accounted for almost \$96 million, over \$50 million went for community facilities improvements and more than \$33 million were used for business- industrial financing. State Director Pieratt said that 1979 will surpass this year's record amount of farm loans through the government agency. FmHA will be the last resort for many producers who cannot obtain elsewhere, Pieratt said. Bankers expect the 1979 interest rate for farmers to average about 10 1/2 percent, the most that can be charged individuals by national banks. State banks, due to a state usuary clause, may charge no more than 10 percent. New farmers, depending on their particular situation, may have problems getting financed. The FmHA interest rate of 8 1/2 percent looks good to producers, even though they would rather stay with their local banker or Production Credit Association office. Pieratt said that although

FmHA funds come from the federal budget, most FmHA customers repay loans. "So far our losses have been extremely light, " he said. "Farmers have stayed in there. It's the characteristic of Texans to pay their bills. In speculating that 1979 FmHA loans would exceed those in 1978, Pieratt says he believes there will be adequate funding from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Pieratt said 10, 299 FmHA loans were made to farmers in fiscal 1978. "A lot of people have criticized the bureaucracy of Farmers Home Administration, but it has saved a lot of farmers. he said.

Pieratt said, "A state reorganizat pleted this year, BUT IT DOES NOT INVOLVE THE CLOSING OF ANY FIELD OFFICES SERVING TEXAS FARMERS AND RANCHERS." Under the plans, new district offices will service all community, multiplefamily housing and organization project loans. 

In a down-to-the-wire game, Miami's B-team boys squeaked past Mc-Lean's B-team by one point with a final score of 16-15.


