Groom Tigers Should Be Well-Balanced Team

No superstars are expected but a much improved overall well balanced team are the words from Head Coach Frank Belcher to best describe his 1982 Groom Tiger football team.

The Tigers will return 13 lettermen, 6 on defense and 7 on offense with good senior leadership expected from Russell Britten, Aaron Wieberg and Travis Ruthardt. Also Rodney Bohr who did not play last year is planning to suit up which will help the team a great deal, says Coach Belcher.

Coach Belcher believes the strengths of the 1982 Tigers will lie in the offensive linemen where all but one will be returning. Two running backs will return as well. The team should be bigger overall than last year and finally a strength Coach Belcher believes is a good sign is the good freshman class coming in to help out.

A couple of weaknesses to this year's team as seen by

Coach Belcher are the teams size and depth.

Tiger fans can expect a new type of offense used this fall in the "multiple T and on defense we will be using a 59."

Tigers to watch this fall will be Russell Britten at fullback, Rex Ruthardt and Aaron Wieberg at halfback positions. Ted Britten is expected to call signals at quarterback along with Jeff Britten. The offensive line will be anchored by Seniors Travis Ruthardt, Scott Peeples and Rodney Bohr along with Juniors Louis Leven, Wesley English and Sophomore Heath Cave. Key defensive players will be ends Wesley English and Rodney Bohr, tackles Quintin Kempf and Louis Leven and noseguard Heath Cave. These players should provide strength up front along with Aaron Wieberg, Rex Ruthardt, Ted Britten and Jeff Britten in the secondary.

Coach Belcher's primary goals this fall are to have fun and be disciplined.

Coach Belcher is in his first year as head coach of the Tigers after coming from Pampa and also coaching previously in Canyon and Bay City. Assisting Belcher will be Melvin Morris, beginning his second year in Groom and Larry Doyle, also coaching his first year in Groom.

Belcher looks for Wheeler and Phillips to lead the district, "if the Tigers falter," but added, "Booker, Lefors and Claude could slip in as playoff contenders."

Wandering Skunks Foul City Air, Create Potential Danger For McLean Residents

Numerous skunks have been sighted within the city limits of McLean in the last few days, according to Department of

Public Safety trooper John Holland, and a few have been killed. Although no rabid skunks have been confirmed,

Holland warned residents to be sure that pets were vaccinated.

"Skunks are among the most dangerous carriers of rabies," he said. "Even dogs and cats which are fenced in can be exposed to the skunks," Holland warned.

He said parents should also caution small children to stay away from the black and white animals

"Several sightings have been around the school and the park. We assume that the animals are eating out of the trash cans in both places. Their proximity to the school makes it especially important that the children be warned," he said.

Holland killed one skunk in the city limits, and several residents report killing the animals

within the last week.

Glen Curry said that he had not sent in skunks to Austin to be tested for rabies. "The skunks are not sent unless they come in contact with humans," he said. Funds for testing all skunks were cut early in the year. Curry said that this is about the time of year when the animals are usually seen in McLean.

City officials urged residents to be careful about putting food in trash cans or leaving table scraps out in the yard for domestic pets. "The skunks are attracted by the food, and they seem to be willing to brave exposure to people to get at the food," Mayor Sam Haynes said.

If residents spot a skunk, they should notify

local law officers. If anyone comes in physical contact with a skunk, he should check with his doctor immediately. Unvaccinated dogs and cats should be watched carefully for any sign of rabies. Texas state law requires that all pets be vaccinated every year for rabies, so residents should check to see that vaccinations are current.

Perhaps this is the ultimate cultural level of a super-consumer society like ours: our literature and art have been replaced by television commercials.

Someday on college campuses, English majors will be required to take literature courses such as 383 Commercials from 1890 to 1950, 432 The Advanced Art of Commercial Dialogue, 421 A Relative Study of The American Commercial and the European Genre.....

Don't forget: if you want to vote in the November election, and you have not registered, you must do so by Oct. 1. Go to the McLean City Hall and ask Pat Bailey for a voter registration card. It will only take a few seconds. This election may be one of the most important in our history, and your vote will count.

Another rapidly changing aspect of American life is the unbelievable growth of the mail-order business. When I was a child, the only catalogue that I ever saw was a Sears, Roebuck, and it was a relatively colorless, unromantic offering with mundane household goods and cheap clothes.

But, wow, two things have changed! I have been saving all the catalogues I have received in the last month, and I now have over a hundred. It's true that there are a few duplications, because my name must have been on several mailing lists. But the variety of merchandise is just mind blowing.

You can buy the most exotic or the most common things by mail now. Consumer items that were once reserved for the big-city shopper are available to anyone in the country. Most of the

catalogues even offer a toll-free number which you can call 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

I really believe it is the most incredible, revolutionary change in our buying habits in this decade.

Not only are more and more people shopping through the catalogs, but more and more companies are entering the obviously lucrative field. I got a catalog the other day called "The En-

chanted Doll House," that contains the most fabulous collection of dolls and doll house furniture that I have ever seen. I have almost had to splint my dialing finger to keep from using that toll free number and ordering some of the beautiful things pictured.

There is one aspect of this mail-order revolution that is definitely dangerous to the economy of the small town: the more

News From Your Gray County Extension Agent

Conference Set For Fruit Growers

Anyone interested in trying his hand at commercial fruit production needs good insight into exactly what is involved. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, can provide just that.

A special New Fruit Growers Shortcourse is set for Oct. 4 at Rudder Center on the Texas A&M campus. This will be a three-hour session starting at 6 p.m. that outlines the basics of fruit production in Texas. The 30th Annual Texas Fruit Growers Conference will follow Oct. 5-6.

The beginners short-course will deal with planning and developing a complete orchard management program.

Information will be prepared on variety selection, planting, weed control, water management, training and pruning plants, insect and disease control, economic investments, cash flow and estate planning.

Many people interested in commercial fruit production are often not familiar with the expense and hard work involved in establishing a new orchard.

This shortcourse is designed to answer many questions that potential fruit growers may have and to give them some idea of all the details involved in commercial fruit production.

The two-day Texas Fruit Growers Confer-

ence for those already in the business will provide the latest information on various phases of fruit production by growers, Texas A&M staff and representatives of several other universities.

Registration information on both the New Fruit Growers Short-course and the Texas Fruit Growers Conference is available from the county Extension office. A \$25 registration fee covers both programs, proceedings, and membership in the Texas Fruit Growers Association.

Seasoned Firewood Best For Heating

It's time to start thinking about firewood for those cold winter nights that are sure to come before long.

Although green wood will burn, seasoned and dry wood has more heat value and will not deposit excessive creosote in chimneys and stovepipes.

Any moisture in wood reduces the recoverable heat. The heat must first dry the wood so it will

burn. So wood cut in late fall or winter doesn't have time to dry adequately. Thus, we recommend cutting firewood in spring and summer.

Split wood will dry faster than wood not split. Stack wood loosely in piles on a couple of rows of bricks. This keeps wood off the ground and prevents decay while at the same time allowing faster drying.

Stacking firewood in a sunny location and covering it with clear plastic also helps moisture to evaporate, thus speeding up drying and seasoning.

Since water vapor will condense on the plastic, adequate ventilation is necessary. Keep plastic off the ends of the firewood to allow air to flow and to keep condensation from wetting the wood.

If trees are cut for firewood in the summer, you may want to leave tops and limbs on for a week or more. Leaves draw moisture from wood and help it to dry more quickly.

Herbert A. deBries with Dianne Hales
Dr. Herbert A. deBries is highly qualified to produce a book such as "Fitness After 50," as he is director of the physiology of exercise laboratory at the Andrus Gerontology Center at the University of California. He is the author of four textbooks on health science and the physiology of exercise, and serves as consultant to the President's Council on Physical Fitness. Dianne Hales, (whose contributions also grace this publication) is the co-author of a college textbook on health and fitness and serves as contributing medical editor of "World Book Yearbook."

The two authors mentioned above show us all

that it's never too late to be fit. In fact, older people benefit greatly from a regular exercise program. Such chronic ailments as high blood pressure, shortness of breath, obesity, nervous tension, and fatigue can all be overcome or improved through the simple, self administered exercise regimen presented in this book.

Even those people who have been out of shape for years find this exercise prescription a safe and effective means of gaining positive good health. With a combination of walking, jogging, and four simple calisthenics, everyone, no matter what age or what shape you are in, can retain vigor and overcome many of the problems usually associated with advancing age.

The book contains clear illustrations of how each exercise is done, tables showing the amount of exercise appropriate for people a varying levels of fitness, and charts for keeping track of your progress. "Fitness After 50" is a complete exercise prescription for everyone who wants to live longer and enjoy life more, and it is now available at Lovett Memorial Library.

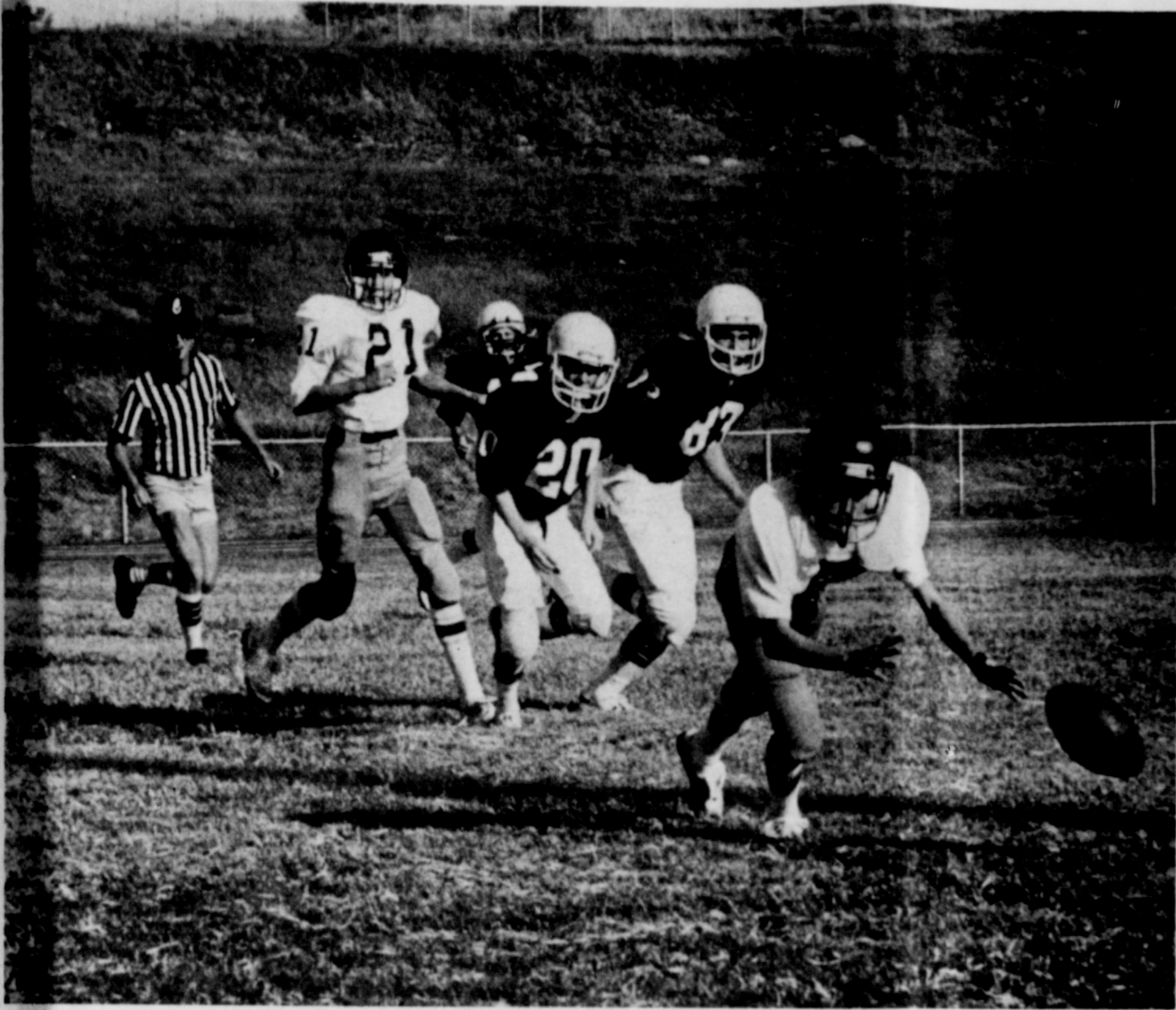

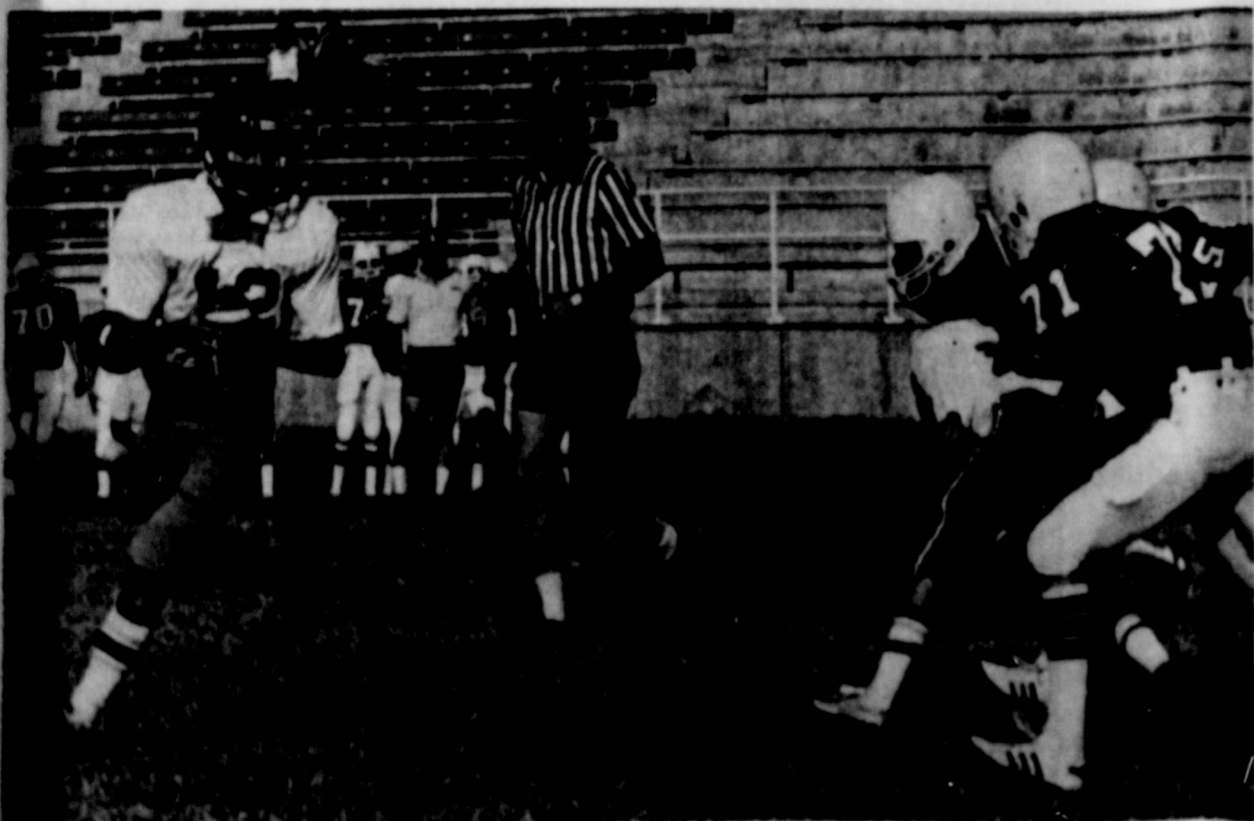

Library To Host Open House Sunday To Show 1600-ft. Addition

The McLean Lovett Memorial Library will host an Open House Sunday afternoon from 2 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. to show the public the newly completed addition. The 1600-square foot room was completed a few weeks ago.

Improvements to the library include new carpet throughout and fresh paint on the walls. The former reading room has been converted to a meeting room.

The new addition contains the library's book collection. The room features brick walls, sky lights, and ceiling fans. A special reading area for

children has been designated in the room. The spacious accommodation is roomy enough to house the library's traveling collection of art, and the rotating packets of tapes, large print books, Spanish language books and sound film strips.

The room began as a dream of late library board member Boyd Meador, who pushed the idea for several years. Avid library supporter Alice Short Smith left the institution a \$15,000 endowment in her will to begin the fund for the library. In August of 1981, the M. K. Brown Foundation gave the li-

brary \$45,000 to complete funding for the project.

Construction began on the new room in late March of this year.

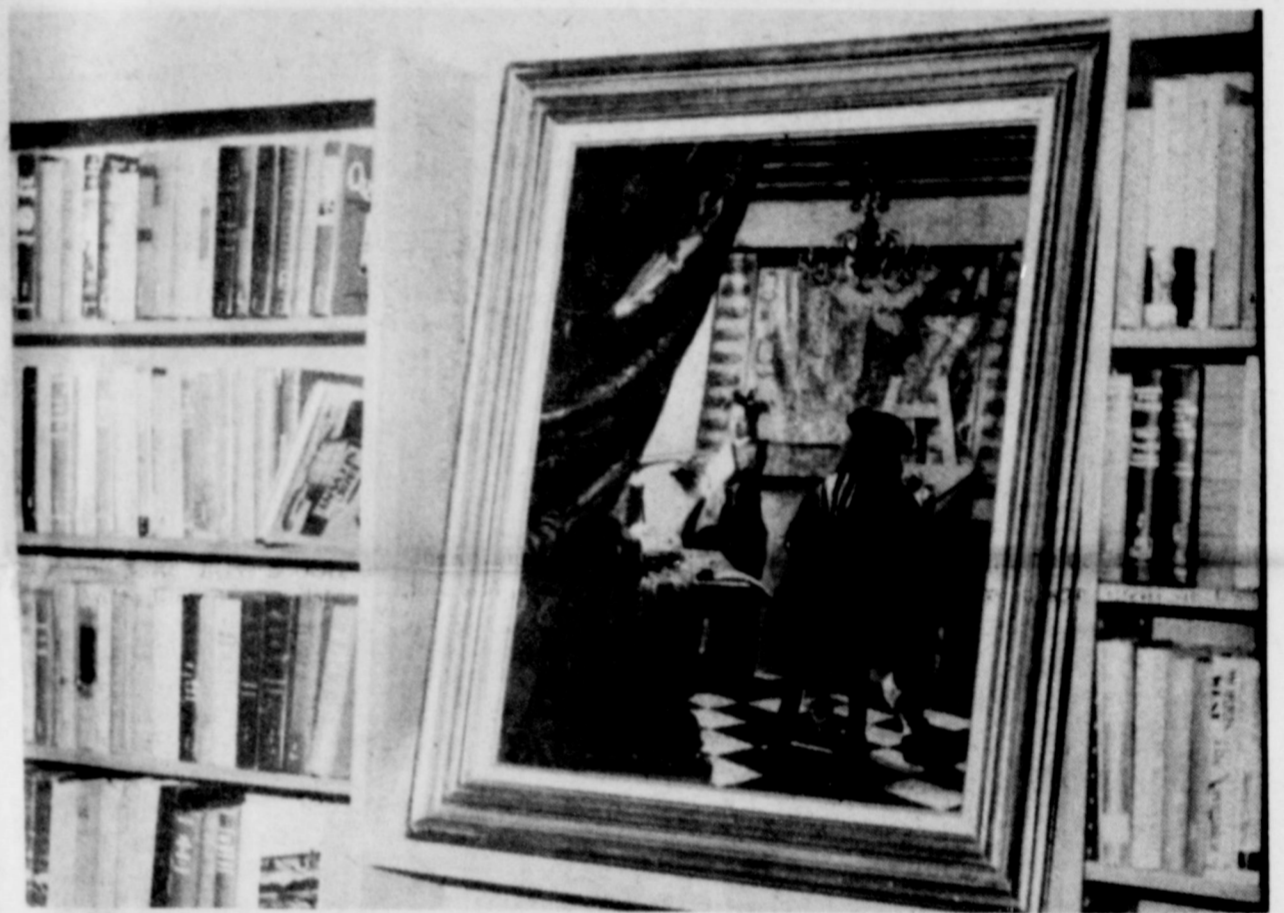
Included in the furnishings at the library will be a four-shelf glass display case, donated by Catherine Patterson Phillips, now of Tacoma, Wash., who was the person responsible for getting the citizens to form a library in June of 1940. After she had received a degree in librarianship from the University of Oklahoma, she returned to her home town of McLean and began urging the townspeople to start a library. A collection was

slowly put together, and for 17 years the library operated out of a room in the City Hall.

On Aug. 30, 1957, the 1800-square-foot limestone building was officially dedicated, and the name of the library was changed to the Lovett Memorial Library.

On display at the library Sunday will be three flags donated to the library and to the City of McLean by our three representatives. Senator Bill Sarpallius donated a Texas flag which flew over the state capitol the day the McLean War Memorial was dedicated; U. S. Rep. Jack Hightower donated a flag which flew over the capitol in Washington; and Texas Rep. Foster Whaley donated a flag which flew over the state capitol in Austin.

The flags will be displayed on stands which were bought as memorials. One is in memory of Harvey Hudgins, and two stands were given in memory of Boyd Meador.

Let's Mae Hess and Bert Darsey brought us a copy of the recipes used in the cook-off, and they sound absolutely wonderful. If your family loves beef as much as mine does, you should try some of these recipes. This week we are bringing you the winner:

BEEF 'N RATATOUILLE FLAN

Helen S. Gately
Rhode Island
2 lbs. ground beef - chuck
2 Tbls. butter or margarine

1 Tbls. oil
1 cup chopped onion
2 large cloves garlic, minced
4 cups 1/2 inch cubes pared eggplant
2 medium green peppers, cut into thin strips
2 cups thinly sliced zucchini
2 cups sliced mushrooms
4 medium tomatoes, cored and cut into thin wedges
2 tsp. basil leaves
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
2 Baked Pastry Shells*
3 cups shredded Swiss cheese

Parsley sprigs
Brown beef in large frying pan; pour off drippings. In another large frying pan, heat butter and oil; add onion and garlic and cook until onion is translucent. Add eggplant, green pepper and zucchini. Cook, stirring constantly, about 5 minutes; reduce heat. Stir in mushrooms and tomatoes; stir-fry several

minutes. Stir in beef, basil, salt and pepper. For each flan, sprinkle 1/2 cup cheese on bottom of pastry; spread 1/2 beef mixture over cheese; top with 1 cup remaining cheese. (Flans may be refrigerated or frozen at this point.) Bake in hot oven (400 degrees) 15 minutes. Garnish with parsley sprigs. 10 to 12 servings.

Note: Flan may be prepared a day in advance, refrigerated and then heated in hot oven (400 degrees) for 25 minutes. If frozen, heat 50 minutes.

*Baked Pastry Shell
2 cups flour
1 tsp. salt

3/5 cup plus 2 Tbls. shortening

4 to 5 Tbls. ice water
Combine flour and salt. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse meal. Add water, 1 tablespoon at a time, until mixture leaves sides of bowl and forms a ball. Divide in half and roll out into two 12-inch circles. Line two 9-inch flan rings, two 9-inch quiche pans or two 9-inch pie plates with pastry; trim excess pastry from top edge. Prick pastry on bottom and sides with fork. Bake in preheated very hot oven (450 degrees) 10 to 12 minutes or just until pastry begins to brown.

CRIME: IT'S THE VICTIMS WHO ARE LOCKED UP

I want to talk to you this week about an issue that troubles me greatly and which I know is of great concern to Texans. It seems that whenever I have spoken about crime in the past 12 months I have gotten a strong and troubled response. No matter where I am—Jewett, Roma or Dalhart—people tell me they are angry and afraid about crime in our state.

This anger and fear concerns me for two reasons. First, because this kind of anger and fear serves as a sort of "jail" for innocent people. They are the ones locked in their homes at night while criminals go free. The second reason I am concerned is because unless something is done to stop the crime epidemic, people will be ripe for the kind of politician who will play on citizens' fears. The result could be that Texans lose their liberty in return for their "safety". In that sense, the crime problem is like a cancer gnawing at democracy.

The incumbent Lt. Governor's response to the crime issue has been shameful. While

he has been in office the crime rate has risen 131/4. He has done nothing to attack crime in a substantial way. In fact, he has fought stronger anti-crime measures. He openly opposed the new wiretapping law designed to catch drug dealers. He openly opposed the Governor's anti-crime package by putting it in a legislative committee run by a hostile Senator, who promptly bottled it up. Much of the package passed anyway and now Mr. Hobby has the gall to go around the state taking credit for it!

His sympathies in the fight against crime are evident. Not long ago he allowed the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) to hold a fundraiser in his Houston mansion and he proudly defends it. The ACLU has consistently opposed laws that would make it easier to deal with the crime problem. I think such two-faced maneuvering is disgraceful. It is obvious that if we are going to attack the crime problem, if we are ever going to give law officers, judges and prison guards the tools they need to make us safer, Bill Hobby will have to go.

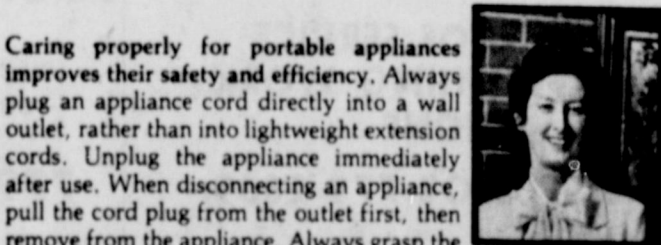

Air can enter your home through cracks around doors, windows or any other place where two materials or parts of the house meet. To find air leaks around your home, wait for a windy day, then turn off your furnace or air conditioner. Hold a small piece of tissue or a candle next to cracks around windows and doors. If the tissue or candle flame flutters, leaks are reducing your home's energy efficiency. Weatherstripping and caulking can help plug these leaks and save you money, too.

Caring properly for portable appliances improves their safety and efficiency. Always plug an appliance cord directly into a wall outlet, rather than into lightweight extension cords. Unplug the appliance immediately after use. When disconnecting an appliance, pull the cord plug from the outlet first, then remove from the appliance. Always grasp the plug itself; do not pull on the cord. When cleaning portable appliances, first check the instruction book to see if the appliance is immersible. Then wash it with hot sudsy water and rinse and dry thoroughly. And always read the instruction book before using an appliance for the first time.
