Nine Injured in **Highway Accidents During December**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 13 accidents on rural lighways in Gray County during the month of December, according to Sgt. J. W. Wison, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in nine persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$6,920

The rural traffie accident summary for this county during the calendar year 1966, shows a total of 221 crashes resulting in six persons killed, 122 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$118,300.

"When the final reports are tabulated, we will find that more people were killed in Texas traffic accidents during 1966 than in any prior year in the history of this state," the sergeant stated. The final count is expected to be about 15% more than the 3,028 traffic deaths in 1965. This increase should be a challenge for every individual to put forth his best defensive efforts to prevent accidents during



Senior Citizens Urged To Check Claims For Doctor Bills

Older people in the Panhandle who have paid doctor bills but have not yet claimed their medicare insurance payments are invited to have their claims checked by the Amarillo Social Security office before mailing them to the medicare insurance carrier, according to Travis C. Briggs, district manager.

Some benefit payments are de laved because the applicants do not include all the necessary information with their claims. Briggs believes most people should need this help only the first time they make a medicare claim. "The 'Medicare Handbook' which is given to all beneficiaries explains how to make the claims," he said.

The doctor can apply for the medicare payment directly and bill the patient for the amount not paid by medicare, or the patient can pay the doctor and request reinbursement from the medicare insurance carrier. A statement from the doctor showing treatment given and charges already paid by the patient must be furnished. The request for payment form is mailed to the insurance carrier by the doctor or the patient.

"The social security office does not make the decision or pay the claim," Briggs said. "The law requires that payments be handled through the selected medicare insurance carrier. But we can help answer questions about medicare and assist people in our area to get their applications ready."

The Amarillo social security office is located at 1006 S. Adams, telephone is DR 6-5151, and is open 8:15 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, and is open until 7:30 p.m. on Thursday.
