Residents Complain Of Gas Odor

week with complaints of a foul odor from the City's gas lines. City superintendent Bob Glenn explained to The McLean News that the odor was caused when the City added more calodorant to the lines. "Calodorant" is an expensive chemical designed to cause an odor in gas lines as a safety factor. Glenn said that the extra chemical was added after Ty King, a representative of the Texas Railroad Commission, who was making an inspection in McLean, said there was not enough of the material in the gas lines, according to his tests.

The normal amount in the lines is one pound per million cubic feet of gas, Gle said. The chemical was added to the lines Monday, and the amount turned up

on King's orders Tuesday. Glenn emphasized that the City keeps the chemical in the lines at all times, but that the amount was above normal last week, causing the foul odors. "Any odor indicates a leak," Glenn said. "The leak may be very small, and may not be dangerous, but the homeowner should check for leaks if he detects an odor." Glenn tives said that people would become accustomed to the odor, and not smell it unless it was very strong. Someone who had not been exposed to the chemical would notice the odor, however.

Glenn said that the City was not responsible for leaks past the gas meter.

detected the odor, he could call the City Hall. The City employees would then cut off the gas, have the resident turn off all gas appliances, and then the City would conduct a "Shut-in" test. If the test shows a leak which is past the gas meter, then the resident should call a plumber, Glenn said.

Ben Ezatt in The Canadian Record.. Election of judges to state high courts often seems to be an exercise in ignorance for Texas voters, who have no way of knowing the qualifications of judiciary candidates who traditionally run low-key races, and the results often

An increasingly painful result of this selection proceeds in recent decades has been the evolution of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, which is the court of last resort in Texas for all criminal cases, into a legalistic hair-splitting travesty of justice which allows our most vicious criminals to make a mockery of the decisions of trial courts and juries and imposes a heavy burden on expense of taxpayers.

Overturning decisions of trial courts and juries on the flimsiest of technical grounds in the most serious of our criminal prosecutions, the Court of Criminal Appeals succeeds either in freeing the most vicious of convicted criminals or in thwarting the final disposition of their cases through endlessly expensive years of appeals and

This has been going on through at least the last two decades with almost predictable regularity. Few if any capital cases have been settled with a single trial and conviction...and many of them are still going through appeal and retrial processes years after the initial trial because nine capricious judges can suspend the collective wisdom of trial court judges and juries on often-trivial points of law or whimsical interpretations of them.

Scores of convicted murderers and rapists are still cooling their heels on death row in the state penitentiary, at great expense of taxpayers and to the devastating frustration of the victims of their crimes, of law enforcement officers, and of jurors and judges who weighed the evidence against them initially and found them wanting

The reversal of the murder conviction of Paul Berry Bush, the drug-addict burglar who gunned down Hemphill County Deputy Corky Guthrie when he was caught in the act of breaking and entering a local drug store for the avowed purpose of obtaining narcotics, is only the latest case in point. The Criminal Appeals Court reversed the Bush conviction because seven of the nine

other convicted rapists and murderers... Hawkins,

So what can you do about it? Not much, perhaps,...but you, as a voter, can make a small beginning with the May 3 elections by doing your bit to prevent the re-election of three judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who are up for election this year. You can not only refrain from voting for them, but you can urge your friends elsewhere in

Two of the candidates whose names will be on the ballot Criminal Appeals.

In Mr. Rawls' case, that would be evidence the Criminal Appeals Court would undoubtedly throw out as "guilt by association", but the voters of Texas, not the Court of Appeals, will make the decision in this case...and that's a hair the voters may not want to split.

We can't offer much guidance, yet, on the other candidates. Presiding Judge Onion has no opponent, so he will presumably be returned to the throne...but you don't have to give him a vote of confidence. As for the others, in this election year and up-coming ones, we urge you as voters to withhold your support from any of the Judges who are now members of that farcical court. If we can't do better by replacing them, perhaps at least we can't do worse...and if the message of the ballot box comes through strongly enough, we might even succeed in reversing the trend toward judicial anarchy.

BRUCELLOSIS IN TEXAS

AUSTIN - Governor Bill appointed a Clements Brucellosis Evaluation Committee last March to help decide what to do about this problem that has troubling Texas cattlemen. Representative Leroy Wieting, House Agriculture and Livestock Committee Chairman, and I. Chairman of the Senate Agriculture Subcommittee, were chosen as co-chairmen.

Brucellosis is a great problem in some parts of the state. We are fortunate, with our drier weather and lower humidity, so we do not have the problem to the extent that ranchers in other parts of the state have.

As most of you know, there are two ways of dealing with the disease. One method in wide use is to "test and slaughter." other is the calfhood vaccination program.

Ranchers in South Texas are very much opposed to the test and slaughter method. Many ranches in that part of the state are very large, with thousands of head. Running every head through a squeeze shoot to draw blood is an expensive proposition. If a reactor is found, current regulations require another test 30 days later, and another test 60 days after

While the problems are not as bad in our part of the state, a full-scale roundup and test is no easy or inexpensive matter for the Panhandle or South Plains rancher, either.

For these reasons, and others, the Brucellosis **Evaluation Committee made** two recommendations:

One, research at Texas A & M should continue to try to find a better vaccine. The vaccine now in use makes some cows that have been vaccinated show up as

Two, the Animal Health Commission should promote vaccination. It should educate cattlemen about the economic advantages of vaccination, and it should try to encourage the U.S. Department of Agriculture to ease movement restrictions on cattle vaccinated with the reduced dose strain 19 vaccine.

We all realize that brucellosis must be controlled to avoid a possibility of quarantine of all Texas cattle. But the economic conditions of ranching today demand that we control the disease in the most economical, practical way possible. We think vaccination, especially with federal funds now available to help defray the cost, is a good practice.

PINK EYE

Eye burning, itching and discharge are some of the things noticeable with "pink eye"...properly called conjunctivitis. With pink eye, there is an inflammation of the delicate membranes that cover the eyes and the inner portions of the eyelids. There are three main causes of this relatively common problem. 1. CHEMICAL IRRITATION: wind, dust, sunglare, arc

welding, and chlorine in swimming pools. ALLERGY: allergens in the air such as pollens from trees and grasses; usually seasonal; lasts from two to

INFECTION: occasionally due to bacterial infection or the sometimes dangerous herpes virus; commonly associated with the common cold; eyes are often matted together on awakening.

With the exception of herpes and sometimes bacterial infections, pink eye usually runs its course in about three days. Warm, wet washcloths placed over the eyes will remove matted material and help relieve discomfort. Medicines are seldom needed. A physician should be contacted if symptoms persist for longer than a few days or if discomfort is excessive.

> McDonald explained that the project is funded by the federal government, with no costs to the landowner. He said, however, that the sponsoring counties are out some expense to secure landrights, move obstructions to the constructions. and other minor costs.

"The landowners give the sponsors (the commissioners) and SCS permission to construct, inspect, operate, and maintain the structure. No other rights of private landownership are given up by the landowner," Mc-Donald emphasized. The lakes may not be used by the public for recreation,

unless the landowner decides to do so. McDonald said that anyone trying to could be prosecuted for trespassing, just like he unlawful entry onto private property. The first step in obtaining

a watershed project, Mc-Donald said, is for the local people, the landowners, and sponsors to see the need for flood control. Then that group secures land rights. The SCS takes over and pays 100 percent of the cost of the overall design, survey, and construction.

Following construction of the dams, the SCS vegetates all the area which has


been disturbed during construction. 
