## County Officials Will Try Computers

Gray County voters will see a new type of ballot in the general election Tuesday. The long ballots, printed on two sides, will allow election officials to use computer-type counting machines when the polls close.

In the past, all ballots

have been tabulated through a lengthy process at the polling places.

Now, all ballots will be transported to Pampa, and fed into the machine which will count the votes, according to Wanda Carter, county clerk.

The Optec II machines, purchased by the county for about \$9,000, will tabulate all ballots marked properly. Voters must use a lead pencil and will color in an oblong rectangle next to their choice. The ballots

will still allow voters to vote a straight party ticket, but Mrs. Carter reminded voters that there are constitutional amendments on the back of the ballot which must be marked.

The county court has

appointed five people to supervise the tabulation. Jerry Sims is the central counting station judge. Mrs. Carter is the central counting station manager, an official from Computer Election Systems which designed the

computers will serve as tabulation supervisor, and Paula Brock and Kelly Brock will serve as tabulation clerks.

Mrs. Carter said that the computers will count a ballot approximately every five seconds. She

said that officials were estimating that tabulation will take about five hours if as many as 7000 ballots are cast. The ballots must be hand fed into the machine. If a ballot has write-ins or any type of irregularity it will be kicked out by the machine, and then be hand counted.

"If this system works, the county will try to buy the rest of the system which includes a programmer and an eraser," Mrs. Carter said.

The computer counting system should eliminate any human errors which might have been possible under the old system.

## Claude Mustangs Outlast McLean Tigers 34-6 Friday Night

The McLean Tigers fell Friday night in a 34-6 stampede by the Claude Mustangs. The victory

was the first of the season for hosting Claude.

The Mustangs scored early in the first quarter

on a 16-yard run by running back Todd Brown. Reagan Haney's PAT was good to set the

lead at 7 for the Mustangs.

Another touchdown run, this time a 14-yarder

by Tim Knox, pulled the Mustangs farther up the victory ladder. Haney's second extra-point kick

brought the Mustangs to 13 at the beginning of the second quarter.

With only 33 seconds

left on the first half clock, Knox connected with a pass from Shawn Farrar for five yards and the third Mustang touchdown of the night, leaving the halftime score at Claude 20, McLean 0.

Midway through the third quarter Knox paced off fourteen yards to bring the ball into McLean's endzone, upping the Mustangs to 26.

McLean took the action early in the fourth after recovering a Claude fumble on the Mustang 26. From there a steady drive advanced the pigskin to the one, where Tiger Elson Rice edged it in for the score. The try for two failed, but McLean was on the board with six, and fourth quarter score was Claude 26, McLean 6.

Claude came back during the last of the fourth when Farrar managed a 75-yard punt return to the McLean goal, bringing the Mustangs to 32. Farrar's pass to Knox was good, and Claude took in two more, for the final tally of the ballgame - Claude 34, McLean 6.

"The score was disappointing," said coach Joe Riley, "but in some areas we showed a definite improvement in our skills. Our passing game was really good; we had a 70-yarder that was called back. But our punt coverage hurt us bad."

McLean will host the football game Friday night. The Tigers are scheduled to play Booker at 7:30 Oct. 29 at Duncan Field.

"We'll mainly try to contain Gary Mills," coach Riley said. "He's a definite all-state candidate, already having rushed for about 1300

Regardless of what excuse you can come up with, it's just not good enough.

In the primary election, most of the voters in McLean were 50 or over.

I've tried to analyze why this age group is so conscientious about voting, and why the younger people just don't seem to care. The only thing I can decide is that the older generation has been through enough hard times - the Depression, World War II, the various assassinations - that they realize the importance of voting.

The rest of us have been lulled into thinking that the relatively

trouble-free climate of the last few years will last forever. So we don't vote. Either that, or perhaps we became so cynical during Vietnam and Watergate, that we don't think any politicians are worth the trouble to vote.

Both of these reasons are shallow and meaningless. Voting is not your privilege. IT IS YOUR DUTY as an American citizen. And if you don't vote, I think you ought to be thrown out of the country!!!

### Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington

"My vote won't matter anyway."  
 How many Texans will be saying that to themselves Tuesday, November 2, as they contemplate making the effort to get to the polls?

With the thousands and thousands of votes being cast, that may seem to be a persuasive argument against making the effort. But it couldn't be further from the truth.

A single vote in many cases has changed the course of history: Elizabeth II is Queen of England today because the British House of Commons voted some 250 years ago in favor of the House of Hanover, 96-95;

•one vote cost King Charles I of England his head in 1649;

•the U.S. Senate agreed in 1845 to annex Texas by a one-vote margin;

•in 1868 the U.S. Senate twice failed by a single vote to convict President Andrew Johnson in his impeachment trial.

While on the topic of British and American history, did you know that the United States might still be under British rule, but for one vote?

On September 28, 1774 the First Continental Congress in Philadelphia debated the "Galloway Plan." This plan would have made the American colonies into a British dominion ruled by a Parliament and a British governor.

Virginia's delegate, Patrick Henry, opposed the plan in an impassioned speech. The Galloway Plan was defeated by one vote.

After America became an independent nation, the power of a single vote continued as a major factor in electing its leaders.

Thomas Jefferson in 1800 was elected President over Aaron Burr by one vote in the House of Representatives, following a tie in the electoral college.

John Quincy Adams in 1824 was chosen President by a one-vote margin when his race was decided by the House of Representatives.

Rutherford B. Hayes was elected President over Samuel J. Tilden in 1876 when a special Electoral Commission voted 8-7 in his favor.

John F. Kennedy had less than a one vote per precinct lead across the nation in his race for President. In Illinois and New Jersey, one-half of one percent of the votes cast swung 43 electoral votes to him. Reversing that small percentage of votes in only two states would have thrown his election into the House of Representatives for a decision.

The stories of one-vote election decisions don't just happen at a national level. According to one well-told tale in Washington, one California congressional incumbent saw his race end with a dead-even vote. State law required that the race be decided by having the candidates draw lots. The incumbent lost the draw and sank into political oblivion.

His secretary had decided she was too busy working at campaign headquarters to vote on election day.

In a Cincinnati suburb, a city council candidate was hospitalized on election day for an emergency appendectomy, without having voted.

He lost by one vote.

So one, single vote does matter. Make the effort to get to the polls on election day. Your vote could make all the difference in the world.

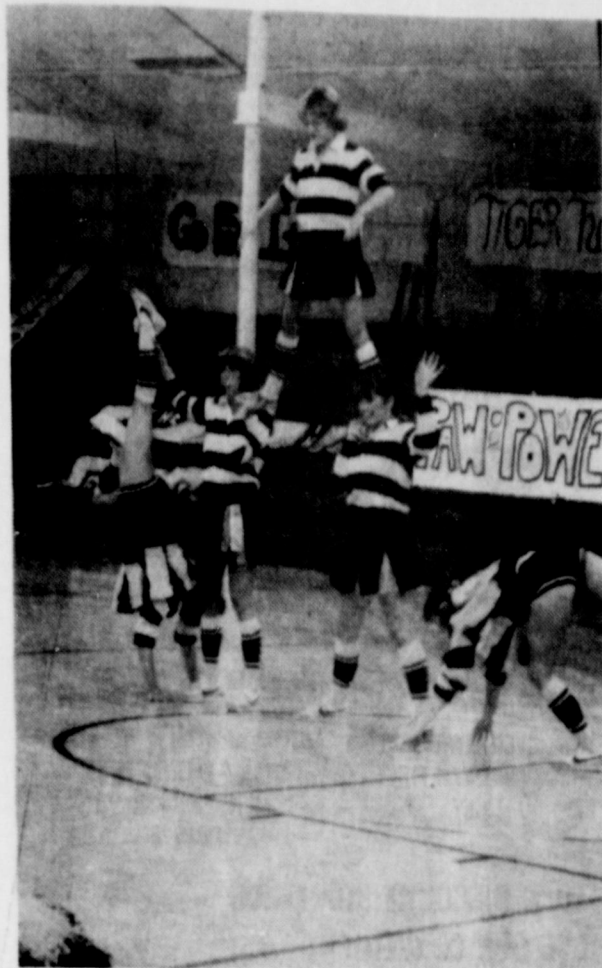

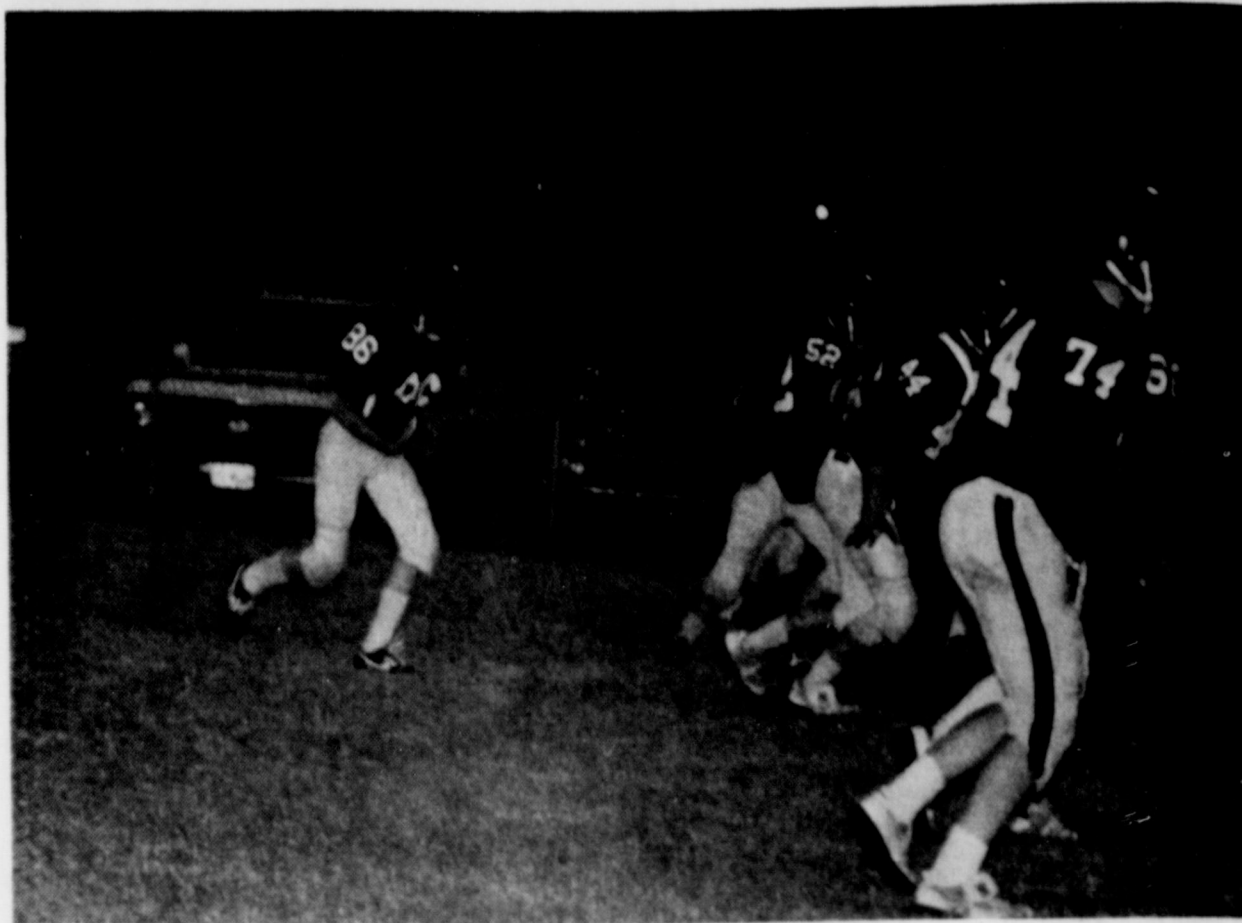

### In The Kitchen

One of the first dishes that novice cooks usually learn to prepare is a simple cookie recipe. However, since I did not learn to cook until I was grown, I never really learned to enjoy preparing home baked cookies. They are, however, my favorite dessert. I realized this week that I have had very few cookie recipes in this column, so to make up for that, I'm going to share with you some of the delicious cookie recipes I found in Nan Ezzell's "Petticoat Patter" recipe cards from The Canadian Record.

**Beth Bomar's O'Dolly**  
1 stick oleo  
1 1/2 cups crushed graham crackers  
1 can coconut  
1 package chocolate chips (small)  
1 cup nuts  
1 can sweetened condensed milk  
Melt oleo in square pan. Make layers of ingredients in order listed. Do not stir. Bake in 325 degree oven for 45 minutes.

**MARY HADDOX'S CARROT COOKIES**  
Cream together 1 cup shortening or margarine and 3/4 cup sugar. Then add 1 well-beaten egg and 1 cup cooked, mashed carrots.

Stir together 2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, and 1 1/2 tsp. salt. Add sifted ingredients to mixture, then add 1 teaspoon vanilla and 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Bake on greased baking sheet. Drop by teaspoonfuls. Bake in 350 degree oven for 15 to 20 minutes.

**MRS. MACK MACIAS' MANUELOS**  
2 cups flour  
1/4 tsp. baking powder  
1/4 tsp. shortening  
1/2 tsp. sugar  
1/4 tsp. salt  
7 large egg whites, un-beaten

Mix above ingredients together. Knead on lightly floured board until smooth and not sticky, being careful not to add any more flour than necessary. Roll out until smooth. Pinch off very small balls. Roll each ball out as thin as possible, then stretch over a bowl and pull edges very carefully until dough is very thin, almost transparent. (Greasing the edge of the bowl lightly will prevent dough sticking to it and tearing.)

Fry in deep hot fat (Crisco shortening or oil) until golden brown. (Manuelos may dry a little before frying, but this will do no harm.)

After frying, dip manuelos in syrup and drain on waxed paper. Makes 1 1/2 to 2 dozen.

**SYRUP**  
1 box brown sugar  
2 cups water  
4 whole cloves  
1 stick cinnamon  
Boil above ingredients just enough for the spices to flavor the syrup, do not boil to thick stage. Pour about 3/4 syrup into frying pan, add 3/4 cup dark Karo, allow to come to boil and keep at medium heat until thick. (Thin down occasionally with remaining syrup or add more Karo as needed.) Manuelos may be made one or two days ahead of time, but no longer as they will become soggy.

**Confidential Advice Given On 24-Hour, Toll-Free Number Will Help With Alcohol Problems**

Area residents who need confidential help with an alcoholism problem can now call toll-free 1-800-692-4165 from anywhere in the Panhandle and get referral information. The new service offered by the Amarillo Council on Alcoholism is made possible by a grant from the Texas Commission on Alcoholism.

The 24-hour service is linked to a corps of volunteers who are avail-

able to give information on treatment and rehabilitation programs, and prevention methods. A volunteer coordinator has been selected by the Council and training of the volunteers is under way.

"This service is for anyone who has a problem with alcohol", said Don Pipes, Executive Director of the ACA.

"When we hear about someone having an alcohol problem, we usually

think of a person who drinks too much and needs to stop. We're certainly going to be dealing with those kind of people but, we're also going to be helping the families of those abusers, employers who are trying to find help for a worker and people who need more information about alcohol treatment and rehabilitation".

"A major problem the abuser has," Pipes continued, "is in making that first call for help. If he or she is somewhere

outside Amarillo, it takes considerable effort to make a long distance call.

We feel the toll-free number will make that first step easier to take."

Figures assembled by the Regional Alcoholism Authority show the volunteers will be busy. About 7% of the area population, or just over 21,000 people, are directly affected by the disease of alcoholism.

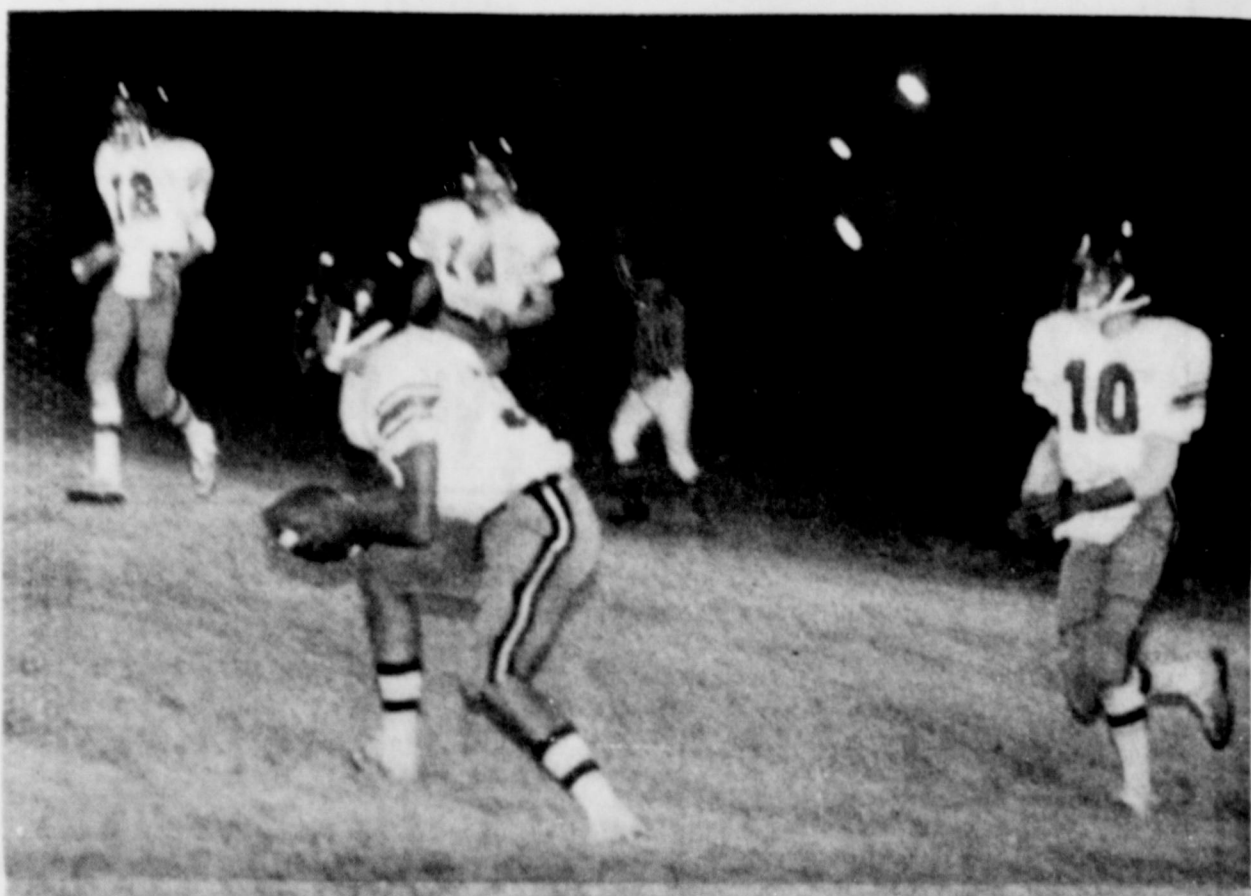
