A scarlett cardinal spent all afternoon Sunday trying to win a battle with his own reflection in our den window. The brightly plumed bird tiptoed around the gnarled honeysuckle bush just outside the north window of our den. From time to time he pecked on the window, always in the same place. He didn't seem to mind how many people came to the window in answer to his summons. He was not quite so oblivious to twoyear-old Charlie who climbed into a chair by the window and tried to be friendly by knocking back on the window.

When the sun set, the bird's reflection in the window faded, and he flew off somewhere to his nest, probably smugly thinking that he had beaten off another enemy from his territory.

This gorgeous bird has made his home in our yard for several months now, but I have never decided exactly where he has his nest. According to our Audobon Society bird book, the cardinals like to nest in honeysuckle bushes, evergreen trees, or privet hedges. Since we have the first two in abundance in our yard, I'm sure that he and his family are around here somewhere.

I've tried to watch out for her, but I have never seen his dull-colored mate. Perhaps she looks too much like the ordinary sparrow to attract much attention when she flies around the yard. At any rate, I'm glad the birds have decided to make a home here. The male is so beautiful that he is always a joy to watch.

And just think what a lucky male he is! He gets to wear the beautiful clothes in the family, and spend all his time marking "his" territory, and fighting enemies no more dangerous than reflections in a window. Human males probably wish they could be so lucky.

appointed five people to supervise the tabulation. Jerry Sims is the central counting station judge. Mrs. Carter is the central counting station manager, an official from Computer Election Systems which designed the

computers will serve as tabulation supervisor. and Paula Brock and Kelly Brock will serve as tabulation clerks.

Mrs. Carter said that the computers will count a ballot approximately every five seconds. She

estimating that tabulation will take about five hours if as many as 7000 ballots are cast. ballots must be hand fed into the machine. If a ballot has write-ins or any type of irregularity it will be kicked out by the machine, and then be hand counted. "If this system works.

the county will try to buy the rest of the system which includes a programmer and an eraser." Mrs. Carter said.

The computer counting system should eliminate any human errors which might have been possible under the old system.



John F. Kennedy had less than a one vote per precinct lead across the nation in his race for President. In Illinois and New Jersey, one-half of one percent of the votes cast swung 43 electoral votes to him. Reversing that small percentage of votes in only two states would have thrown his election into the House of Representatives for a decision.

The stories of one-vote election decisions don't just happen at a

national level. According to one well-told tale in Washington, one California congressional incumbent saw his race end with a dead-even vote. State law required that the race be decided by having the candidates draw lots. The incumbent lost the draw and sank into political oblivion.

His secretary had decided she was too busy working at campaign headquarters to vote on election day In a Cincinnati suburb, a city council candidate was hospitaliz-

ed on election day for an emergency appendectomy, without hav-He lost by one vote.

So one, single vote does matter. Make the effort to get to the polls on election day. Your vote could make all the difference in



In The Kitchen



One of the first dishes that novice cooks usually learn to prepare is a simple cookie recipe. However, since I did not learn to cook until I was grown, I never really learned to enjoy preparing home baked cookies. They are, however, my favorite dessert. I realized this week that I have had very few cookie recipes in this column, so to make up for that, I'm going to share with you some of the delicious cookie recipes I found in Nan Ezzell's "Petticoat Patter" recipe cards from The Canadian Record.

Beth Bomar'S O'Dolly 1 stick oleo 11/2 cups crushed graham crackers

1 can coconut 1 package chocolate chips (small 1 cup nuts

I can sweetened condensed milk Melt oleo in square

pan. Make layers of ingredients in order listed. Do not stir. Bake in 325 degree oven for 45 minutes.

MARY HADDOX'S CARROT COOKIES

Cream together 1 cup shortening or margarine and 3/4 cup sugar. Then add 1 well-beaten egg and 1 cup cooked, mashed carrots.

Stir together 2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, and 11/2 tsp. salt. Add sifted ingredients to mixture, then add 1 teaspoon vanilla and 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Bake on greased baking sheet. Orop by teaspoonfuls. Bake in 350 degree oven for 15 to 20 minutes.

MRS. MACK MACIAS' **MANUELOS** 

2 cups flour 1/4 tsp. baking powder 1/4 tsp. shortening

1/2 tsp. sugar 1/4 tsp. salt

7 large egg whites, unbeaten

Mix above ingredients together. Knead on lightly floured board until smooth and not sticky, being careful not to add any more flour than nec-Roll out until smooth. Pinch off very small balls. Roll each ball out as thin as possible, then stretch over a bowl and pull edges very carefully until dough is very thin, almost transparent. (Greasing the edge of the bowl lightly will prevent dough stick-

ing to it and tearing.) Fry in deep hot fat Crisco shortening or oil) until golden brown. Manuelos may dry a little before frying, but

this will do no harm.)

After frying, dip manuelos in syrup and drain on waxed paper. Makes 11/2 to 2 dozen.

**SYRUP** 1 box brown sugar 2 cups water

4 whole cloves 1 stick cinnamon

Boil above ingredients just enough for the spices to flavor the syrup, do not boil to thick stage. Pour about 3/4 syrup into frying

pan, add 3/4 cup dark Karo, allow to come to boil and keep at medium heat until thick. (Thin down occasionally with remaining syrup or add more Karo as needed.) Manuelos may be made one or two days ahead of time, but no longer as they will become soggy.
