## State Officials Plead For Light, But Answer Is Still No

State Representative Foster Whaley and State Senator Bill Sarpalius have acted on numerous complaints from McLean citizens concerning the stoplight on Interstate 40, but no action has been taken by the state highway department. Both representatives have contacted the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation concerning the stoplight at Main and I-40

which was destroyed by a truck in an accident in August. The department has recently installed a

flashing light at the crossing.

It was a grim night for McLean football fans Friday as they watched Groom Tigers outplay the McLean Tigers in a 19-0 homecoming defeat.

The teams looked like equal competition during

the first quarter, as both sets of Tigers managed some good play, but Groom began its victory march late in the second quarter. With only 1:33 left on the clock, Ted

Britten's 33-yard pass to Rodney Bohr drove in the first score for Groom.

Wesley English's kick was good for the extra point, and Groom left the field at halftime with a

7-0 lead under its belt.

It was to prove that Groom was the dominating factor in the game as another score, this time on a blocked punt, gave the visiting team a larger

margin. Rodney Bohr used the blocked punt to run 43 yards for that gain, and the score advanced to Groom 13, McLean 0. The second touchdown came halfway

through the third.

With 5:21 left in the fourth, Groom dealt the death blow on a six-yard touchdown pass from Ted Britten to

COLLEGE STATION — Although seven-tenths of the Earth's surface is water, there is hardly more than a drop of fresh water for drinking and industrial use, says a Texas A&M University researcher specializing in recycling treated wastewater.

Research has already given planners an idea of the limits on available groundwater, said environmental engineer Dr. Bill Batchelor.

certain traffic warrants must be met before a traffic signal light can be legally installed on a street or highway. We have made an engineering study at the requested location and the volume of traffic at this location does not satisfy the warrants as required by the law, therefore, a stop and go signal light can not be legally installed.

Since our conversation, the Department has installed a flashing light at this location which flashes amber on Interstate 40 and red on the crossing street. This should warn the traffic on Interstate 40 to be cautious and should require the crossing traffic to stop before proceeding across Interstate 40.

We hope that this will provide adequate protection for the citizens of McLean.

We appreciate your continuing interest and concern in traffic matters, and we appreciate your support of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation in our efforts to improve the highway system.

Dear Mr. McKee:  
We have recently received a great deal of correspondence from people in McLean who are justifiably upset by their loss of their traffic

light on I-40.

In our conversations with Mr. Cranston in your office in Austin, we have learned that McLean is not eligible for a new traffic light because there is not a high enough traffic count. We ask you to reconsider. The amount of traffic may not be extremely high in McLean, but the kind of traffic that cruises I-40 is fast and dangerous. Many people in McLean have a very hard time crossing the street, and the intersection borders on a public park, which frequently contains small children.

McLean is a very special situation. It is the last town in the U. S. with I-40 running through it.

The traffic signal will only have to be in place in McLean until the town is bypassed by I-40, which should not take more than a year or two. While McLean may not be the biggest town in Texas, the people there deserve protection from the I-40 traffic. Let's give them that protection before it is too late.

Thank you for your prompt attention to this matter. We will all be able to sleep better at night knowing we did the right thing for the people of McLean.

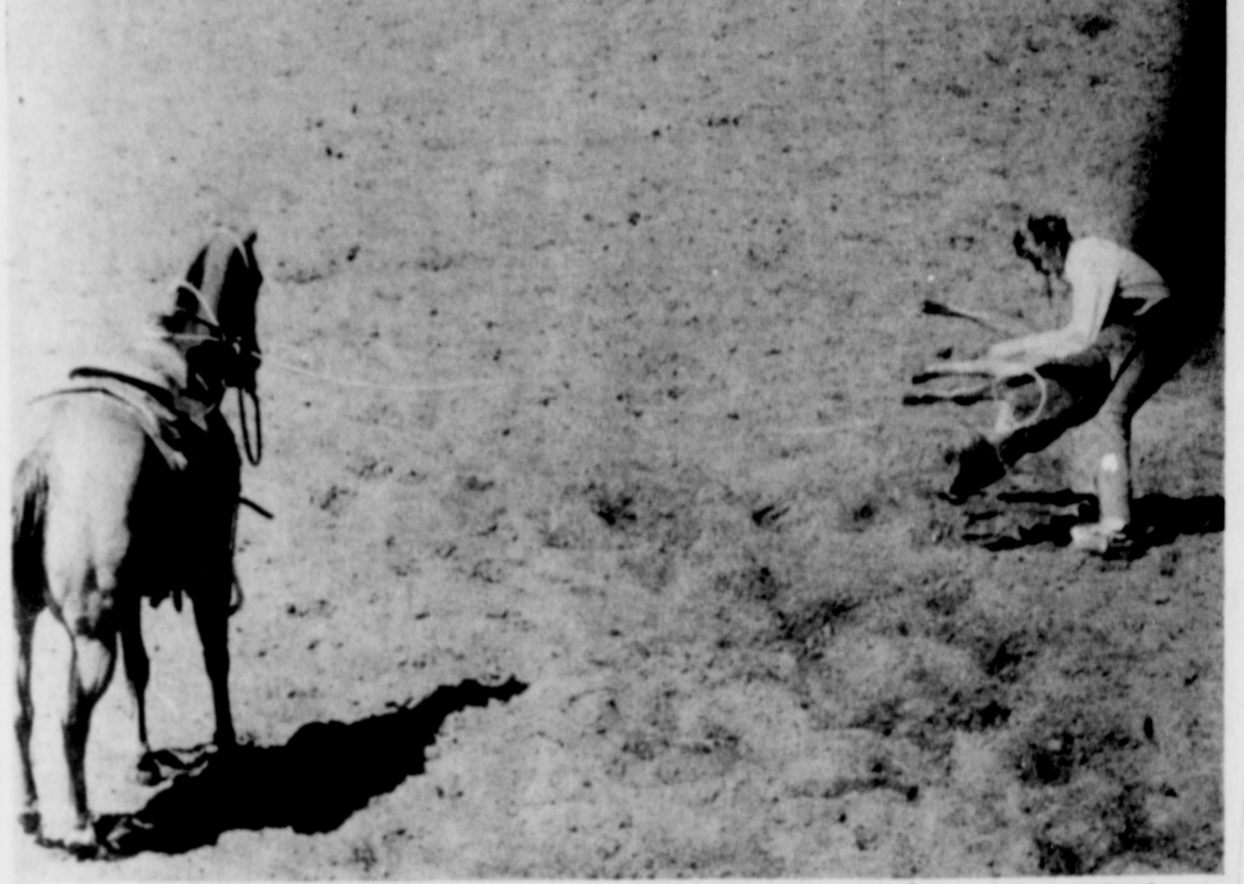

## Texas A&M engineer fears chemicals may affect water quality

COLLEGE STATION — The quality of some drinking water is a big question mark, says a Texas A&M University environmental engineer.

The average person consumes about half a gallon (two liters) of water every day from the kitchen tap, cooked food, coffee, tea and soft drinks.

But researchers in water quality aren't sure what effect, if any, is caused by minute levels of chemicals now being found with regularity in the nation's underground water tables, says Dr. Bill Batchelor of Texas A&M's Civil Engineering Department.

### ORDINANCE NO. 206

AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE TAX RATE AND LEVY IN AND FOR THE CITY OF McLEAN, TEXAS, FOR THE YEAR OF 1982, UPON ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID CITY OF McLEAN, TEXAS, FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING FOR THE GENERAL FUND FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1983; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY; PROVIDING THAT IN THE EVENT ANY PROVISION OF THIS ORDINANCE BE HELD UNCONSTITUTIONAL AND INVALID, THAT SUCH HOLDING SHALL NOT AFFECT THE REMAINING PROVISIONS HEREOF; AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCE AND PARTS THEREOF IN CONFLICT HERewith.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF McLEAN, TEXAS:

SECTION . There is hereby levied for the year 1982, upon all real property situated within the corporate limits of said City of McLean, Texas, and on all personal property which was owned within the corporate limits of said City of McLean, Texas, on the first day of January, A.D., 1982, except so much thereof as maybe exempt by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, a total of 45/100th (\$.45) Dollars on each One hundred and no/100 Dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation on all of said property, which said total tax is levied in the provisions hereinafter set forth in this ordinance.

SECTION 2. An ad valorem tax of and at the rate of 45/100th Dollars on each One hundred and no/100 (\$100.00) Dollars of assessed valuation of said taxable property is hereby levied for the year 1982 for the purpose of providing revenue for the General Fund in the City of McLean, Texas, for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1983, and such tax when collected, shall be appropriated and deposited in and to the credit of the General fund of the City of McLean, Texas.

SECTION 3. All taxes herein levied shall be due and payable on the first day of October 1982. Such taxes not paid in full by the 31st of January, 1983, shall bear penalty and interest as provided in Article 7336, R.C.S. of Texas.

SECTION 4. All Ordinances and parts thereof in conflict with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of McLean, Texas, that notice of the enactment of this Ordinance be given by publication of the same in the official newspaper of the city.

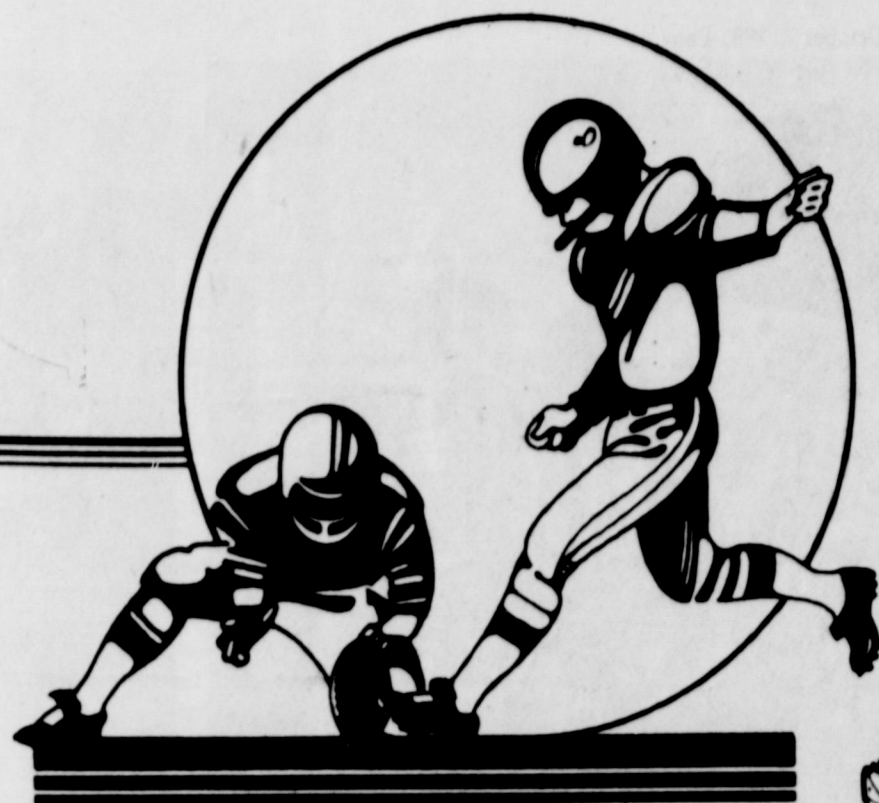

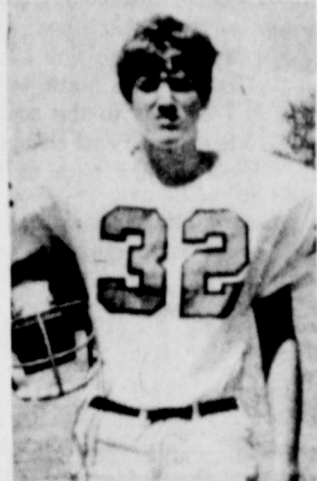

## SWCD Board Election Set For Tuesday

An election for a director to Zone 4 on the Gray County SWCD board has been scheduled for Oct. 12 at the Gray County Courthouse Annex in Pampa.

The election will be held at 8 p.m. Wallace Birkes, chairman of the board, now holds this position.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a Soil and Water Conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision for which the election is being held. The person must also live in Gray County, and be 18 years of age.

A legal qualification state that a candidate for the office of SWCD director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age, and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live within the zone. Zone four of the district includes an area from a line beginning at the northeast corner of the county, going south along the county line, seven miles, then west along section line 15 1/2 miles, then north seven 7/8 miles to the county line. Then east along the county line back to the

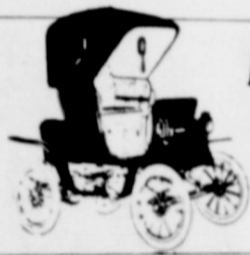
northeast corner of the county.

Current members of the board of directors of Gray County SWCD are Wallace Birkes, chairman, Pampa-Laketon area; Jim Shaw, vice-chairman, McLean-Alanreed area; Neal Stovall, secretary, Pampa area; other members are Curtis Schaffer, Groom area, and Tony Smitherman of the McLean area.

The purpose of the Gray County SWCD with headquarters in Pampa is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch land in the district, and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state, and federal agencies, and other organizations, and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a volunteer nature to the landowners and operators.

### Orange Cake

Mrs. Bunny Shultz  
1 box butter cake mix (Duncan Hines)  
1 small can mandarin oranges (not drained)  
1/2 cup Crisco oil  
4 eggs  
1/2 cup or more coconut  
Mix all together and beat with beater. Pour into three layer cake pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Remove and cool.  
Frosting: 1 can (med.)

crushed pineapple with juice  
1 3 oz. box instant pudding

Mix together well with mixer and spread between layers and sprinkle with coconut. Also spread on top and sides and sprinkle with coconut. Cover with Saran Wrap and refrigerate.

Can keep in refrigerator three or four days. Can also freeze it. Better after it sets.

### Pineapple Cake

Mrs. Floyd McMinn  
2 cups flour  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
2 tsp. soda  
1 #2 can crushed pineapple including juice

Mix together and bake in 9 x 13 pan at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

1 1/2 cups sugar

1 small can milk

Let boil four minutes, remove from heat, add 1 cup coconut, 1 cup pecans, and pour over hot cake.

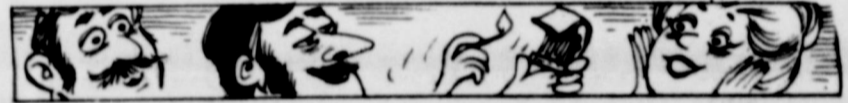

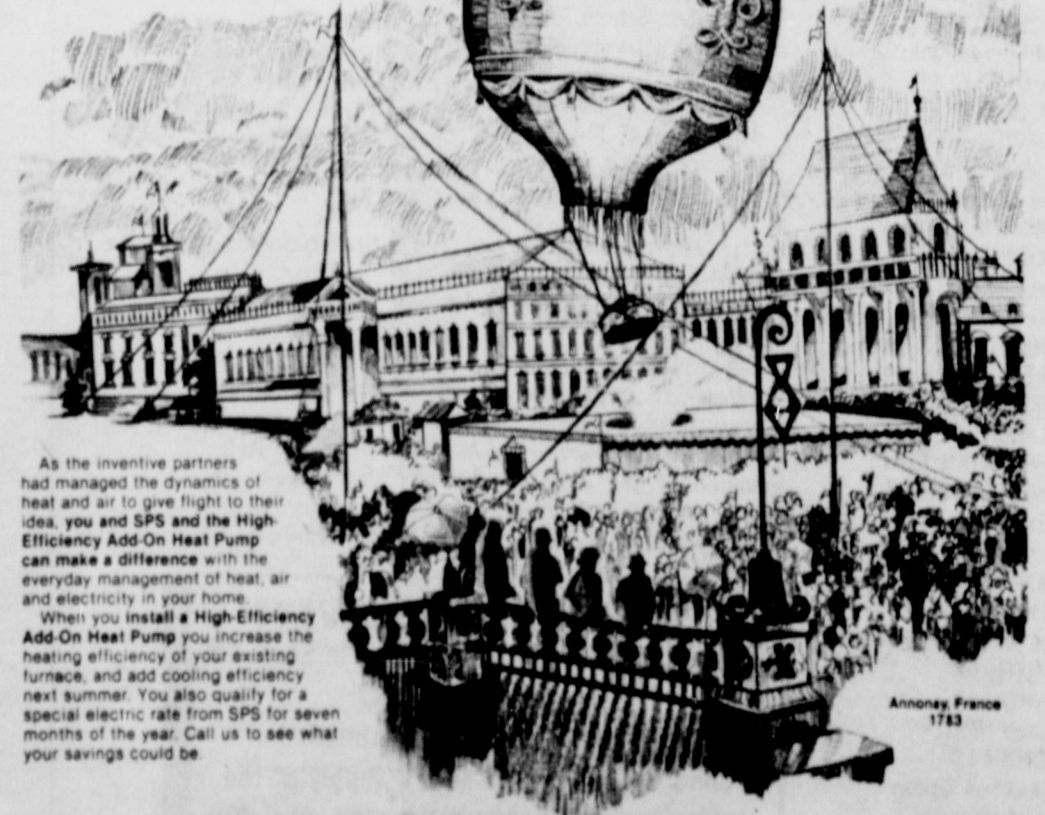

### Helping Your Child Get The Most Out Of School

As the fall school term progresses, both parents and teachers will be making efforts to see that children get the most out of school. Already many elementary schools have had parent teacher nights to foster a mutually rewarding relationship.

Many different things determine how well a child does in school. Interests, temperament, parent-child relations, teacher-pupil relations, intelligence, learning style, and personality problems can each affect how well a child learns. Normally, children want to learn and will usually keep trying as long as they feel grown-ups are with them.

### Help For "Underachievers"

Some youngsters are labeled underachievers because they do not meet adult expectations or because they have personality problems. Many so-called underachievers are bright but fail to learn as well as their classmates. Some of the characteristics of the bright "underachievers" includes: (1) they see themselves as inadequate persons; (2) they have lower aspirations than achievers; (3) they have lower popularity and are less likely to be viewed as a leader by their peers; (4) they have poorer personal adjustment than that of achievers; (5) they do not like school as well as their classmates do; (6) they do not enjoy learning from books; (7) their vocational goals are not as clearly defined as those of their peers; (8) their study habits are not as good as their peers; (9) they have narrower interests than their classmates; (10) they tend to come from homes that are broken or emotionally inadequate in some ways.

Adults help children do their best when they have realistic expectations and do not push them too hard or too fast. It is unrealistic to expect a child to always do his best at everything he attempts. Parents can also help their child learn by providing stimulating and challenging experiences and then reinforcing the child for his ac-

complishment. Children also benefit from guidelines and limits so they know what others expect of them. They need opportunities to learn by doing and encouragement and support from concerned adults.

### Positive Parent-Teacher Talks

The skills of effective parent-teacher teams can build a quality finished product -- an inquisitive, well-adjusted growing child. Parent-teacher conferences can be a vital, constructive, learning situation for parents as well as teachers.

Parents and teachers should agree on fair, reasonable goals that benefit the child and bring pleasure and learning to the youngster. Helpful dialogue about what parents want for and expect from their child as well as the teacher's expectations and professional responsibilities to the child and class as a whole can be a vital step.

Parents can provide two important tools -- personal support and interest -- that the teacher can use to help a child

grow and develop while in school. Together parents and teachers can figure out the strengths of the child. When one knows that's right with a child, the school and home provide a complementary support system that tends to accelerate the talents a child possesses and play down poor school habits.

A competent education and an effective parent are like an accomplished musician -- they devote years and effort to acquire skills and techniques. Once acquired, they are unseen. Good communication skills between parents and teachers are the "silent force" behind good students.
