Is Chamber Dead?

Another organization in McLean is dying a slow, but sure, death. When the McLean Chamber of Commerce was revitalized three years ago, over 75 people attended the initial meeting. Officers and a board were elected, and projects were planned. Through that first year, meetings were well attended, and several things were accomplished for the City of McLean.

Since that time, the participation in the organization has gotten less and less until we have about four or five people who attend the meetings.

What happened?

Is McLean too small to maintain an organization like the Chamber? Or do the people feel that the purposes of the organization are not worthwhile? Has it been a failure of leadership? Or is each person expecting someone else to do the job?

I don't intend for this to be critical of anyone person, but I am puzzled by the lack of interest by our businessmen in the organization. A Chamber is designed to promote business, to bring people to our town where they will spend money, and that's what I thought business people were interested in. At most Chamber meetings, one or two owners of businesses in McLean are present. The others have never come to a meeting, or attended one or two and never came again.

If the Chamber is not needed in McLean (and that may be the case), then the organization should disband, and the money in the treasury given to a worthy cause.

If the Chamber is needed, but you feel it has taken the wrong direction to help McLean, then changes need to be made. What could be done to encourage participation among the business people? What could be done to make the organization worthwhile to you?







Magee Named To Council

Ruth Magee of Mc-Lean is one of 10 women from throughout the Texas Panhandle area who have been selected as members of the Area Advisory Council at West Texas State University.

The Area Advisory Council was established in 1978 through the WTSU office of Programs for Women, now known as the Returning Student Program, to help assess the educational needs of women throughout the Panhandle.





Homemaker News

Quail season is here, and many avid hunters are bringing in those tasty game birds. Game birds provide variety to meals and families of Texas sportsmen and contribute high quality nutrients. Utilization of this wild game means conservation of a valuable resource and can be a food budget stretcher the year round.

Storage Freeze small game birds such as quail and dove immediately after packaging. Keep the meat at 0 degrees F., or lower until it is used. Quality meat correctly wrapped in moisture vapor-proof freezing paper may be kept frozen at this temperature from 9 to 10 months to a

year. Thaw birds by

placing the package in the refrigerator for 12 to 18 hours. This slow thawing will tenderize the meat.

Preparation Quail are small birds weighing about 4 to 6 ounces. When considering the number of servings, allow at least one bird per person to be served. Quail meat is white and tends to be dry. It needs a protective cover of bacon or other

fat and frequent basting.

might enjoy trying: Roasted Quail With Mushrooms

4 quail 4 slices bacon 1 tbls. butter or margarine.

Wipe quail inside and out. Bind each bird with a slice of bacon. Put birds into a buttered pan and roast at 350 degrees






