







# McLean Teams Win Championship Bracket In Pee Wee Tournament

The McLean Pee Wee boys and girls took the championship in their own tournament last weekend in McLean, with the girls winning 22 to 10 over Shamrock, and the boys winning 20 to 12 over Hedley.

In the girls' championship, the fifth and sixth grade girls' teams played a scoreless first quarter, but scoring began early in the second ton with 2, and Misty the ice with two free shots from Shandee Rice, and Shamrock quickly followed with a field goal. McLean scored 12 points to 6 points for Shamrock in that period.

Scoring for McLean were Shandee Rice with 10 points; Darla McAnear with 8 points; Cissy Dalton with 2 and Misty Magee with 2.

The Clarendon girls scored 16 points to Samnorwoods 14 in a see-saw battle for consolation. In the boys' game, Clarendon and Samnorwood played an even first quarter, but the taller Clarendon boys pulled ahead in the second period, and never gave up the lead. The game ended at 18 to 8 for Clarendon.

## Homemaker News

Welcome to the world of computer mania! That's right, the personal computer industry has swept the country. There are more than two million computers of all sizes, shapes, and prices.

The computer is characterized by its components (screen, keyboard, disk drive or cassette recorder, and printer); a price range of \$99 to \$6,000; and a size that fits compactly on a desk-top. Home computers perform a variety of tasks. They may be used as: word processors; management of investment portfolios; membership rolls or mailing lists; running home security systems or appliances; monitoring collection of refunds from cents-off coupons; homework help for kids; family budgeting; "spreadsheet" financial planning; and many others.

Are you ready to own a home computer? In addition to the good things computers can do for you, there are disadvantages. Some reasons for not buying a personal computer include: (1) Don't buy one if all you really need is an electronic typewriter or a good programmable calculator. (2) Don't buy one for a single use. (3) Don't buy one if you don't have the time and energy to spend learning.

There are several basic components that make up any computer system. (1) First, there is the computer itself. With smaller systems, you get only the computer and keyboard. (2) The next component is the screen. You may use your TV screen with some models or purchase an RF modulator screen, or monitor. (3) Some computer systems include a disk drive as part of the price, but most of the time you pay extra. Many systems use an ordinary cassette tape recorder to store information. (4) A dot matrix or daisy wheel printer is another basic component. (5) Finally, software or the programs which allow your computer to perform tasks are basic to the system.

Get to know computers before you invest in one. Good sources include: books and magazines on personal computing for the beginner; your local computer retailers; and colleges and adult education programs. Once you understand the possibilities of a good computer system, set some guidelines for yourself. Decide on a price range. Decide on a capabilities range. Determine what you expect to use your personal computer for, how much you plan to use it, and what applications you might have for it in the future.

There are five basic outlets for buying a personal computer: mail-order; office equipment dealers; computer stores; equipment manufacturer's outlets; and department stores. Mail order

houses offer the best bargains, but offer little or no follow-up support to customers. Office equipment dealers may not be as committed to satisfying the home computer buyer. The computer retail stores are the safest bet for beginners. You may expect to pay more, but most offer more help to the buyer. Equipment company stores are the best if you know your product is the one you want to buy. The department stores are just entering the field. They soon may challenge


established retail outlets.

Look at different models and talk to several dealers. Make sure you find a dealer who will service the computer and give you advice to get started.

Ask for a demonstration of the computer you are considering and try it out yourself. Ask some good questions when you think you have found the system you want.

Ask questions, evaluate your needs, and try out computers before buying.

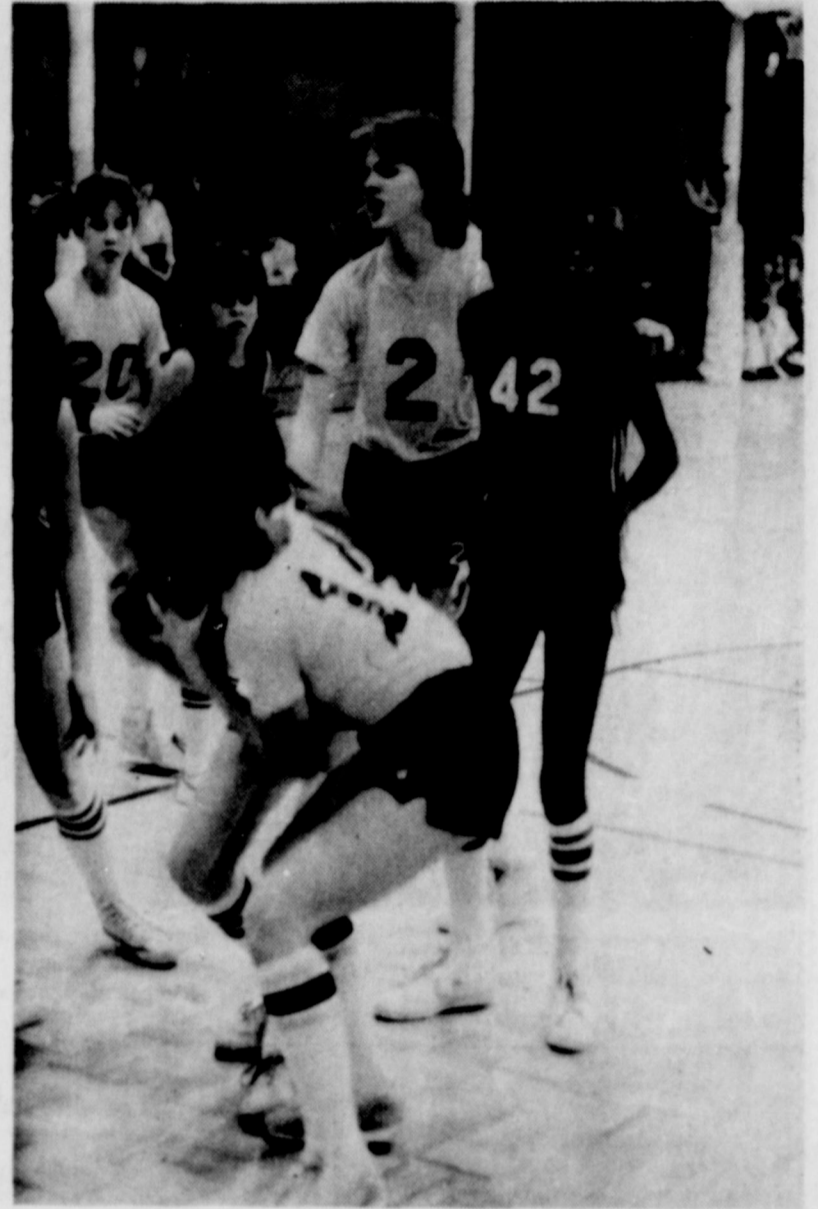

News From Your Gray County Extension Agent

As soon as our snow stops, it looks like spring will be here. The other day when the snow melted off, there were spring flowering bulbs showing up real well. A lot of plants grow under a warm blanket of snow. Anyway, spring is coming and gardeners are going to be hard at work on pretty days now getting caught up on seasonal work that needs doing.

Texas Grape Day

The 1983 Texas Grape Day conference will be March 24-26 in Lubbock at the Holiday Inn at the Civic Center. We have program details and registration information at the Gray County Extension office. From time to time, we have had inquiries about growing grapes and this will be an excellent opportunity to

learn the latest in grape growing.

Pruning Rules

Pruning season is here. This is the time of year that many fruit growers dread most. It's not that pruning is such a difficult or overly time-consuming task, it's just the thought of cutting these precious trees.

The best time to prune your favorite fruit tree or grapevine is immediately before it breaks bud and begins to bloom or leaf. In Gray County, March and April is the best time. If you prune any earlier, buds and blooms are stimulated into early growth. Early growth plus a late freeze or frost equals loss of this season's fruit crop and possibly a damaged tree.

Pruning makes plants stronger. If strong branches are selected

which point in the right direction, then the whole tree is stronger. A stronger tree produces and supports more and larger fruit. Nothing is more discouraging than planting and growing a fruit tree for several years only to have the first heavy load of fruit break it down and ruin its appearance. So prune to select and strengthen.

Secondly, pruning stimulates. Most fruit is produced on or from year-old wood. The peaches and grapes which you eat this spring were actually initiated and formed last year. So, if new growth is not stimulated each year by pruning, a fruitful plant can become a mass of old, non-productive wood. For each year a tree or vine is neglected, production is reduced.

The third reason for

pruning is to make sure you have not been too stimulatory as outlined above. If you prune every year and follow proper cultural techniques, the tree or vine will initiate many more buds than it can possibly support if all bloom buds turn to fruit. To prevent too much fruit set and subsequent limb breakage or small fruit, much of this over-productivity can be removed at pruning time. Thinning the fruit probably will still be recommended, but pruning helps.

One of the most important factors in proper pruning is the pruner's attitude. The motto of dedicated pruners is: "When in doubt, cut it out." This may sound harsh, but most novice pruners remove less wood than they should.

Remove all dead and diseased wood first. Then correct all rubbing branches by removing one or the other. Cut out injured branches so that disease or insects cannot enter the tree. Next, remove inconvenient branches. An inconvenient branch is one which hangs on the house during a windstorm, overhangs a walkway, or is in the way when you're mowing the lawn.

Suckers and water-sprouts are branches which grow from below the ground or near the ground. They generally grow faster than the top of the tree. Generally, remove sucker growth as soon as it appears in the summer. Gardeners sometimes cut the main trunk to let the vigorous sucker grow. This causes a problem if the tree is grafted since the sucker

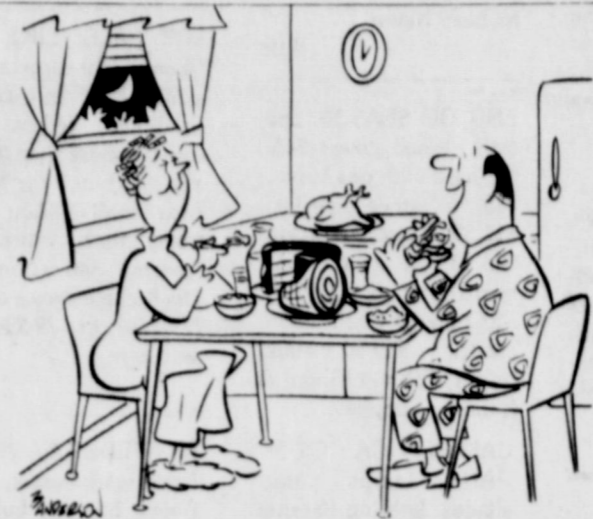
grows from the rootstock on which the desired fruit variety was grafted. If this is the case, the sucker will produce an undesirable fruit.

After removing dead and diseased wood, rubbing branches, injured branches, inconvenient

branches and suckers, the next cuts are for height control. This is especially true when pruning peach trees which must be flat-topped and bowl-shaped. From this point on, consider the proper shape and design for the

particular fruit tree being pruned.
